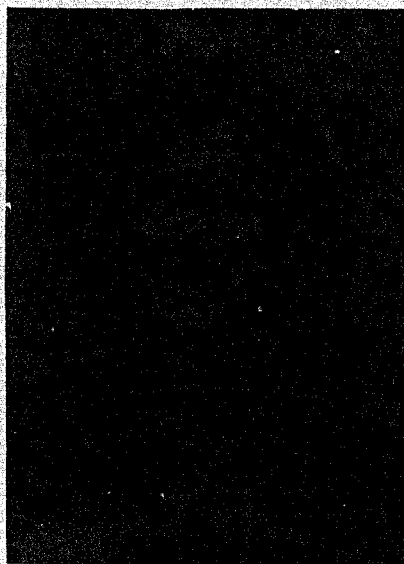

Coyotes Defeat Mountaineers; at Bronte Friday

The Richland Springs Coyotes dampened the spirits of Santa Anna football fans when they won 40-19 in the homecoming game Friday night. It was the first district game for the two teams and gave the Coyotes a 3-2 record for the season and dropped Santa Anna to 1-5.

Richland Springs opened the scoring in the first quarter, then the score evened when Tommy Lewis scored a TD on a 20-yard run. The Coyotes gained at 14-6 lead by halftime.

The Richland Springs scoring group added two more TDs before Jody Brusenhan passed to Paul Martin for the second Mountaineer score. Brusenhan scored the final TD for Santa Anna in the last quarter and David Chaffin added an extra point.

Norris Lewis had a total of 102 yards rushing, and the Mountaineers had a total of 150 yards passing with Paul Martin as leading receiver.

Santa Anna will travel to Bronte Friday night for a 7:30 p.m. game.

The Junior High and Junior Varsity teams were idle last week but will travel to DeLeon today. The JHS team will play the DeLeon Seventh Grade team at 6 p.m., followed by the Junior Varsity game with the DeLeon freshmen at 7:30.

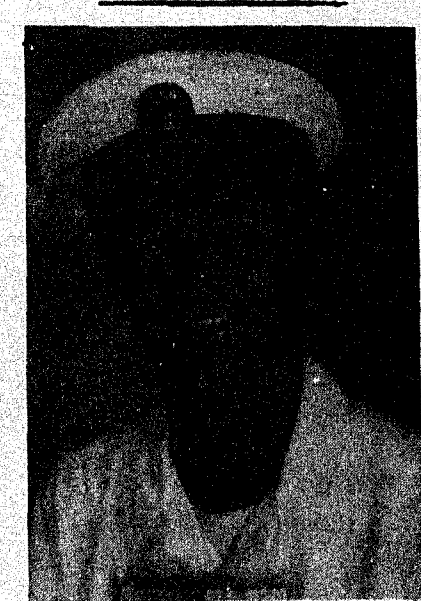
Slides of Work Shown Saturday At SDA Service

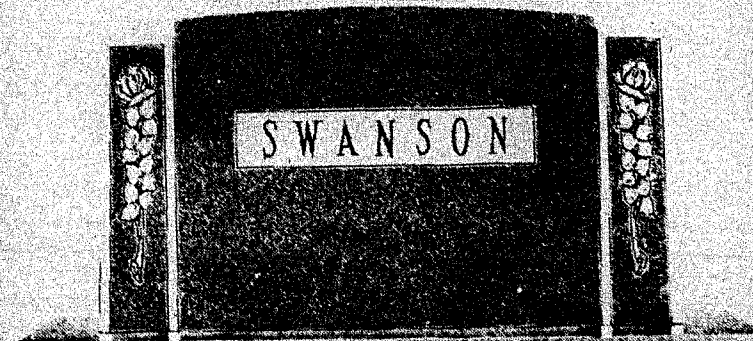

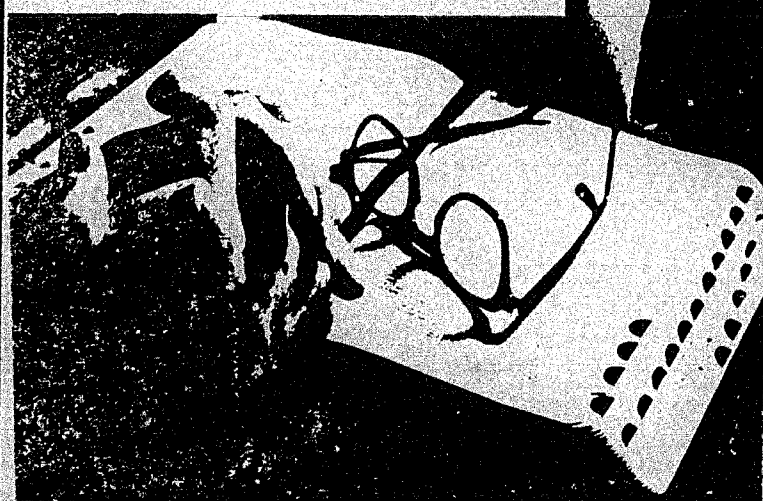
