The funeral home was constructed at the South First and Willis site about 25 years ago when owned by Hosch Brothers. The remodeling is the first major renovation project in many years.

Students and faculty at the Santa Anna schools will have a long vacation during Christmas. Classes will be dismissed at the end of school Thursday, December 23, and resume Monday, January 3.

Trash Hauling Gets Complaints From City Folks

Many local people have voiced complaints about the additional charges for trash hauling over and above weekly garbage pick-up. The charge is \$7.50 for each load hauled by the City dump truck.

Due to the increased costs of maintaining the city service, the extra charge is necessary. Also charged is \$3.50 per pick-up load of trash hauled by city residents to the dump ground.

Another criticism of the disposal process is that the city dump ground is only open on Friday. City leaders remind people that the dump ground is now closely regulated by the Air Pollution Board and the one-day schedule is mandatory for the City.

The present arrangement is the best solution city leaders have found for the garbage disposal problem. However residents may coordinate their clean-ups with the early spring city-wide clean-up drive when trash and garbage will be hauled free of charge for several weeks.

VFD Auxiliary Officers Elected For Coming Year

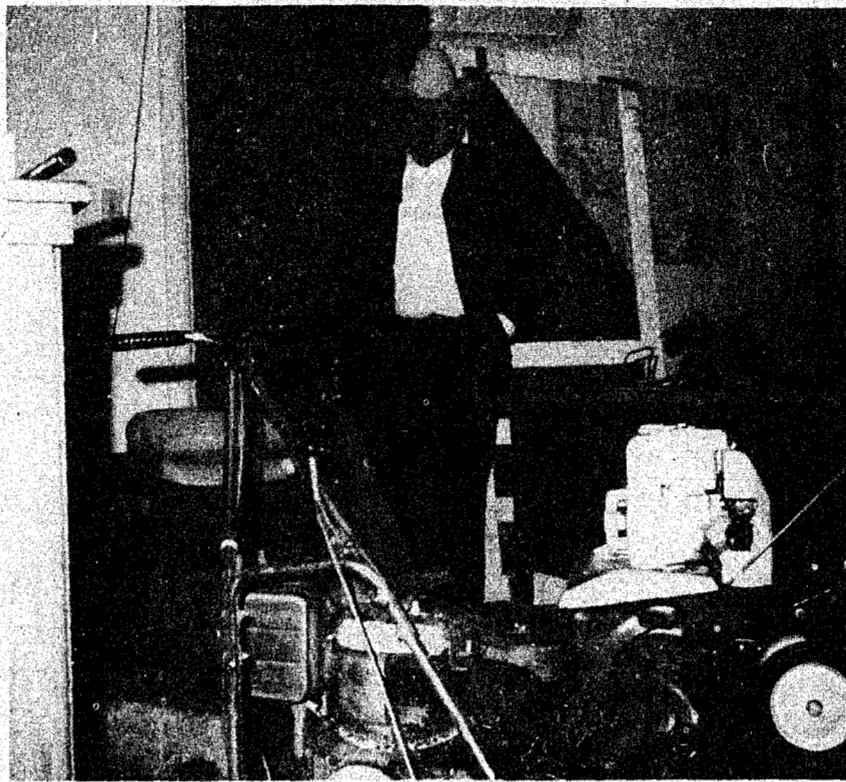

AREA BURGLARIES SOLVED

Many Items Are Recovered At Brady Residence

Coleman County Sheriff's Deputies were busy Tuesday where they were recovered.

After an investigation of a month or more, suspects were arrested and the items recovered at a Brady residence. Also found at the location were items stolen in Johnson, Brown, Tom Green and McCulloch Counties. Some of the Coleman County property remained at Brady Police Department for transfer to Coleman later this week.

According to Deputy Sheriff Morris McDonald, the local officers have been working on the burglaries and thefts that have taken place during the past three months. Some suspects have been arrested and several more are expected to be involved in the theft ring.

Included in the items recovered this week are lawn mowers, tiller, gasoline engine, chain hoist, guns and tape players. Other items found at the location include television sets, guns and numerous other items stolen in surrounding counties.

Among the items identified were guns taken from a residence, a riding lawn mower, and the tiller stolen from Santa Anna Cemetery.

Equipment stolen from the Bangs Cemetery is also expected to be recovered when the case is completed.

McDonald and Deputy J. D. Fry have urged people to report missing items and give descriptions as the theft ring has operated in this area for several months and numerous items are still to be identified.

The local law enforcement officers, Brady Police officers Texas Rangers and Brown County officers worked until early hours Tuesday morning searching the Brady property and making identification of many of the items. The local officers were given credit for much of the investigation and are hoping this will clear up most of the burglaries that have occurred during the past three months in this area.

Santa Anna High School basketball teams made a clean sweep of the triple header with the Rochelle teams in games at Perry Gymnasium Friday night. The games were the district debut for the varsity teams.

The SAHS Varsity team won 89-50 over Rochelle with Joe Dean

Early taking high scoring honors with 19 points. Terry Day and Bobby Permenter each scored 16, and Joe Joe Morris had 14.

Rhonda Rhoades led the girls team with 28 points for their 58-31 victory. Gaye Harvey scored 20.

At the state convocation of the Royal Arch Chapter, the awards were presented by J. J. Swatsue of Winters, District Deputy Grand High Priest, who was making his official visit to the chapter. Similar awards were presented the group from the Royal and Select Masters by George M. Garrett of Winters, District Deputy Grand Master of Grand Council.

Brown County Farmers Sell 19.4 Million in Products

The market value of all agricultural products sold by the 1,147 farms in Brown County in 1974 amounted to \$19,438,000, according to a preliminary report of the 1974 Census of Agriculture released today by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census. Production expenses on these farms totaled \$20,181,000 in 1974.

The figures are for farms qualifying under the definition first used for the 1959 Census of Agriculture: A farm includes all agricultural operations conducted at any time during the census year under the control of an individual management, provided that sales of agricultural products amounted to, or normally would amount to, their products \$5,473,000; and

at least \$250 for places of less than 10 acres or \$50 for places of 10 acres or more.

Figures for farms with sales of \$2,500 or more are shown for 1974 and 1969. These farms accounted for \$18,818,000 of all agricultural products sold in 1974 and \$8,483,000 in 1969.

There were 582 of these farms in 1974 compared with 632 in 1969. The average size increased from 678 to 744 acres during the five years. The value per acre increased from \$127 to \$258 raising the average value per farm from \$86,350 to \$192,064.

The market value of livestock and their products on farms of \$2,500 or more of sales was \$10,515,000 in 1974; poultry and crop sales, including nursery products, \$2,829,000.
