## Elderly Santa Anna Woman Dies in Sunday Night Fire

Mrs. Myrtle Scott, 87, a longtime Santa Anna resident, died Sunday night of smoke inhalation Wallis a fire at her home on Wallis Avenue. Mrs. Scott, a lived alone in her small frame home just west of the Texaco service station at the corner of Wallis and the Rockwood Highway intersection.
According to reports from the Volurteer Fire Department and
Deputy Sheriff M. R. Simmons Deputy Sherifi M. R. Simmons,
the fire was discovered about 9:30 p.m. by an Abilene family enroute from Brady to Abilene, Although a light was on in the kitchen of the Scott home, the passerby, G. R. Curtis, could get no response at the home. Mrs. Curtis ran to the home of a neighbor, Mrs. Cliff Herndon, who called Simmons and the VFD.
Mr. Curtis broke the glass in the kitchen door to gain entry to Mrs. Scott's body near the found Deputy Simmons arrived at the scene in time to help Curtis bring scene in time to help Curtis bring
Mrs. Scott outside. Justice of the Peace Walter Holt ofColeman later pronounced her dead at the scene.
The Fire Department was soon at the home and quickly extinguished the fire which was smouldering in a bed. Investigation by the VFD and Sheriff's Department showed a
flat iron wrapped in clothing apparently ignited the bedding. The iron was on the kitchen stove and burned clothes in the sink indicating the woman attempted to extinguish the fire before being overcome by smoke. There was no fire damage to the home except the bed and bedding except heavy smoke damage in the rear of the house. Funeral services for Mrs. Scott were held Tuesday, January 11, at Henderson Funeral Chapel
in Coleman. Rev. W. M. Price in Coleman. Rev. W. M. Price,
pastor of First Baptist Church officiated at the services with burial in Santa Anna Cemetery. Mrs. Scott was born August 16, 1889 in Ellis County, coming to Santa Anna with her family in 1905. She married Willis Ashley in 1906. He died in 1931.
She married John B. Scott in Santa Anna February 1, 1934. He died in 1952.

## Tax Payments Near Deadline

Many people who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their fina installment of 1976 estimated Federal income tax no lator the Monday, Jana mendéd estimates from those whose 1976 income tanged substantially during the ast quarter.
Many taxpayers first met the Mairements for filing a tax declaration during the last three months of 1976, according to the internal Revenue Service Taxpayersare generally required to file an estimate if they we the IRS more than $\$ 100$ no covered by withholding. The estimates in this case are due January 17.
There is one exception to this rule, the IRS said, and that's when taxpayers file their returns and pay all taxes due by January 31. In hat case the installment is nor required, the mended declaration is an original required 17 declaration required IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provides dditional information and may be btained free from local IRS offices.
Farmers who have not filed heir 1976 declaration of stimated Federal Income Tax must file and pay that tax by Monday, January 17. The sole exception to this rule s if they file their income tax return and pay the total tax due by March 1, the Internal Revenue Service said today.
Farmers are defined as those ersons who earned at least two hirds of their 1976 gross income from farming.
IRS Publications 225 . "Farmer's Tax Guide," and 505, Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available free at local IRS offices.

Producers of Upland Cotton have voted in favor of amending promotion order to provide for a supplemental assessmenton each bale of cotton they market, the.$U$. . Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced.
A preliminary count of returns on a mail referendum which ended Dec. 17 shows that 67.1 percent of the producers voting favored the proposed amendment, with 35,042 the proposal, Approval by two hirds of the producers voting two by a majority accounting for two thirds of the cotton represented in the referendum, was necessary or the amendment to become effective.
Effective date for the amendment will be determined after the referendum results are officially tabulated ano announced, a process which will take about two weeks, according o officials of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. Beginning with the 1977 crop, we supplemental assessment percent of the value of of one determined by the cotton board and the Secretary of Agriculture This amount, together with the \$1 per bale growers now pay, will be used to strengthen cottons competitive position and to maintain and expand domestic and foreign markets and use for $U$. S. Cotton. The administration of this program is handled by the Cotton Board, compriesed of producer epresentatives named by the Secretary of Agriculture
Another provision of the Board beginning with the 1978 crop, and with the approval of the Secretary to increase or decrease the assessment rate long as the total supplemental assessment does not exceed one percent of the value of cotton as determined by the Cotton Board and the Secretary.
The amendment also authorizes reimbursement of USDA UP to $\$ 200,000$ for referendum expenses and for cost up to five employee years costs up
annually
The State of Texas recorded
