

#### Santa Anna Man To Work With Co. MH/MR Center

Coleman County Human Development Center, an agency affiliated with Central Texas Health-Mental Mental Retardation Center, has opened in Coleman on West Pecan, just across from the Post Office. Rondoe Horton of Santa Anna, former deputy sheriff, is caseworker and Mrs. Lois Pate is secretary.

The MH—MR agency was created by the State Legislature to provide comprehensive mental health and mental retardation programs for area reaidents. The Brownwood center opened in 1970 and serves seven counties including Coleman.

There is currently a caseload of some 60 clients for Coleman County, A grant from the National Institute of Mental Health enabled the center to open in Coleman.

#### Three SA Men **Arrested For** Vandalism Here

Coleman County Sheriff's officers arrested three young Santa Anna men during the weekend for vandalism that occurred Thursday and Friday nights.

According to the report, a tire on the car of Dennis Higgs was slashed Thursday night at the school gymnasium, and an 18year old man was charged with the incident. County Judge Pete Skelton fined the man \$250 plus court costs and gave a 30-day probated jail sentence. The young man will also make restitution for the damage and pay \$10 per month probation fee, reporting periodically to the County Probation officer.

In a Friday night incident, also at the school gymnasium, the CB antenna was taken from a vehicle. Two young men were arrested for the crime, one a 21-year-old and the other aged 17. County Judge Skelton fined the two \$250 each plus court costs and restitution for damage. The first incident was a Class A misdemeanor for crime over \$20; the Friday night incident was a Class B

misdemeanor. Sheriff's officers credited the arrests and solution of the crimes to tips from witnesses and other information. They expressed appreciation to those who will be alert for acts of vandalism or other crimes and assist the Department with the investigations.

#### **COLD MINNESOTA WINTERS** VIEWED BY NATIVE TEXAN

(Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wille of Chatfield, Minnesota have been visiting in Santa Anna recnently with their son, Bob Wille and family. The following article was sent them by a friend. It was written by Lee E. Reed to the Rochester, Minn. Post Bulletin.)

As a native of the warm state of Texas, I must comment on winter here in the northland. You may call this Texas bragging, but here's what I see as plain facts;

You have three kinds of winter weather up here. It's either snow, blow, or just plain low, and it keeps right on going at zero or below. It's so cold here that I've seenbald eagles in stocking caps and hawks on the prey wearing ski goggles. Over on the Mississippi River the pike will jump right into the fisherman's creel just to get warm. It's so cold that the last snow mobiles I saw were wearing a snowmobile suit.

The farmer's livestock aren't doing much better either. It's so cold that the sheep are wearing long underwear and the hens are laying snow balls. The cows are giving ice milk. The cattle are so cold that they can't even move

them to market. They just crack off the tail and horns and put the rest of the beef in the frozen food counter.

And then there is the northland wind. The wind's so strong that the snow starts to fall in Montana and doesn't land untilit gets to Minnesota. The wind gets so bad that the geese flocks had to stop flying and form car pools. the wind blow snow so thick you couldn't see your own nose if it hadn't turned bright blue. Sometimes it's so cold that even the wind is afraid to come out. The air gets so still, and your breath gets so frosty that you can still see everything a person has said for the last hour. And I wouldn't be exaggerating...the ground gets so hard you can't thaw it with a blowtorch or drill it with a ten foot icicle. The ground gets so so hard and cold that the gophers have to sleep in bird houses. And the lakes get so hard frozen that the schools of fish let out for the holidays.

It's so cold up here that driving is a real survival contest. Some days you don't know whether to start the car, take the snow mobile or hitch up the family dog. A car that will start in January is a neighborhood status symbol. People have beenknown to give jumper cables for Christmas gifts. It's so cold that an engine starts by growling at your like a timber wolf with a bad chest cough. And the averagescar will try to hibernate up here the davit goes off warranty.

It's no lie to say the roads can get slick. They get so icy that anyone caught driving over 55 is cited for speed skating. There are so many cars off the road they

should mark the ditches for diagnal parking. It's so cold up here that they will do anything for a little hot air. In the winter they never want a politician to stop speaking. A windbag could get a full time job just for talking.

But what makes up for all the cold weather are the folks who live here. I't not stretching it a bit to say that they're the greatest bunch this side of Amarillo. They thrive through the long cold by keeping extra active friendly and helpful. They may be shivering on the outside but inside they have hearts as warm as a bowl of Texas



#### More Completions, Sites For Oil Wells in SA Area

Republic Mineral Corp. of Houston will drill No. 1 Rice-Pitts as a proposed 2,700 foot wildcat six miles south of Santa Anna. The drillsite is in the Creed T. Bendleton Survey 276 on a 100acre lease.

Sigmor Corp. of San Antonio has staked anothersite, the No. 4 J. E. Brewer in the RegularField two miles east of Santa Anna. The planned 2,400 test is on a 240 acre lease in Abaslom Williams Survey 655.

Sigmore Corp. completed the No. 1-A J. E. Brewer three miles east of town with daily pumping potential of 31 barrels of 28.6 gravity oil plus 45 barrels of water. Depth of the well is 2,555

has completed several wells south of Santa Anna.

The No. 8 S. R. Stanberry is located in the regular field eight miles southeast of Santa Anna. Daily pumping potential is eight barrels of 31 gravity oil, plus 30 barrels of water from perforations at 1,290 and 1,300 feet. The well is in the Pleasant Young Survey 494. The No. 9 Stanberry in the same survey was gauged at six barrels of oil daily.

Pautsky completed the No. 8 C. E.Kingsbery in the same regular field area in the same survey. Daily potential was nine barrels of 31 gravity oil plus 22 barrels of water. Casing was set at 1,503

In the KROC Field eight miles southeast of Santa Anna the Pautsky No. 23 Pettway was completed with daily potential of seven barrels of 31 gravity oil plus 30 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at

1,290 to 1,304 feet. The No. 24 Pettway is in the same Pleasant Young Survey 494

while the price is stable.

Oh he's "planned for results" alright. We're going to take the block and tackle and we're going to pull her in, that is if he can remember where he put the block

and tackle.

With only 60 minutes of daylight left I run and look to and fro while he trots off to look hither and yon. Nothing! We backtrack. Mind you it isn't that we don't trust each other's looking, it's just the way we do things. I trot off to look hither and you and he runs to go over my to and fro again. One thing he's positive about. He put it in a good dry place where the mice can't chew the ropes. I believe him! He finally "brainstorms" 45 minutes before daylight goes.

After the traileris backed up through the brush, the big problem regards us with large brown eyes and "it's not going to work" written all over her face. She hasn't read the book about turning minus into plus, but she witnessed the departure of old Sam so she takes the wait and see approach.

The pulley is rigged (and rerigged three times). With red fingers wrapped around the pulley rope the dash into the trailer is begun, and inch by puffing inch with lots of reversals, broke routines, and brainstorming, the tailgate is finally closed on a very undignified little bundle of cow.

After three weeks our little minus can finally stand up by herserif, and she's learned all about his plus business. She likes a bucket of ground maise, plus a

bucket of oats, plus a bucket of cotton seed served up with a few kind words if you please.

Yes sir, now that we've got the experts working for us, things should begin to look up around

#### Early Day History Recalled In New Book By Local Author

When the town of Santa Anna moved to the area where the depot would be, S. H. Phillips put up a small boxed building for a drug store, and Dr. J. P. Mathews had his office in a room at the rear. Mathews was soon married to Miss Emma Chambers, whose family came bringing their valuable antique turniture, their great square piano, their delicate china and other relics of the considerable fortune which the Civil War had destroyed. Chambers had been a Confederate officer and was known as Colonel Chambers. Besides Emma there was another daughter, Luella, who never married, she wasa piano teacher in town for many years. The sons were Ed. Clarence, Ben who was a well-known photographer in Brownwood, and who took many of the pictures shown in this book.

L. V. Stockard, the depot agent, soon built a nice two-story rock store at a corner just a block from the railroad station. W. R. Kelley had a general store across the street, but he moved into the new store and was there for some years. Charlie Hunter put in a drug storethree years later, with mahogany shelving and wroughtiron ice-cream furniture.

The upper floor was an assembly hall, being called the Opera House, with a stage and dressing rooms, and many were the professional troupes who played there, and many the ometalent productions as well. It was from the north window of this upper floor that a young boy aimed apistol, many years later, at a in the street just to see if he could hit him, and he did.

The lower floor has had many businesses, through the years, and is in use at this time as a storage room.

Down on the east corner of this same block, M. Tyson had a drygoods business for a long time, and he also opened his own bank on one side of his store. He nad two sons and a daugher, Ambeline, who kept a horse and rode on some afternoons with her cousin, Undine Stockard, both wearing long elaborate riding habits which showed off well on

their sidesaddles. L. L. Shield, the progressive merchant, from Trickham. moved his operations to Santa Anna, and as fast as he got one business going he put up another building and started another. One of the pictures in this book shows the whole block of stores which he owned, directing every one of them himself, and making a success of them all.

S. J. Pieratt, a farmer and school teacher came to Santa Anna from Williamson County; he farmed north of the mountain at first, then south of town and then opened a grocery and furniture store. His large family grew up and married into other good families, and then this remarkable man was elected county judge for several terms and went into the real estate business in Coleman.

L. O. Rendleman arrived south of Santa Anna in an early day. The Rendlemans had a daughter, Elizabeth, who married Tom McAllister, and sons, Luther, Eph and Charlie and an older son who did not come with them. Eph Rendleman was a mechanical genius, who owned the first thresher in the area, a big engine powered with steam, and also much other machinery and one of the first automobiles in the town. The Rendlemans were prosperous and very jolly people.

Col. Weaver was another of the former Confederate officers who located in Coleman County, buying a sizeable ranch north of the mountains, but building a good home in town. Of his children, Allison founded and operated the telephone system, Burgess went into banking. Era was a teacher until her marriage to a popular dentist, A. B. Strozier; Ernest operated the family ranch for years, and there were other children as well.

# The VA Says

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors Full information is available to any VA office.

Q—I was honorably discharged in 1970 and have had problems in obtaining employment. Can I return to school under the GI Bill to obtain my high school diploma and thencontinue training to improve my employment possibilities?

A—Yes and the time you spend in school toward your high school diploma will not be charged against your educational entitlement under the GI Bill.

Q—I am rated 40 per cent disabled for VA compensation. Can I receive additional benefits for my wife?

A—Additional benefits for dependents of veterans with service-connected conditions are limited to those rated 50 per cent or more disabled.

Q-Why is my VA pension allowance reduced when I receive an increase in Social Security benefits?

A—VA pension is payable to wartime veterans with permanent and total disabilities, not resulting from service. The monthly stipened is based on the amount of annual income a pensioner receives from other sources. Social Security payments and other retirement benefits, less a 10 per cent exclusion allowed by law, are included in the annual income.
