## Elections Saturday Three ISD Trustees, City Officials To Be Chosen

A record number of people are expected to go to the polls Saturday in Santa Anna as contests in both the City and School District elections have made the annual event more interesting than usual.

The School District election will be held at the Lions Club Building from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. with Rose Bass as election judge and Lorene Rice and Barbara Kingsbery as clerks.

Voting will also start at 7 a.m. at City Hall where Mrs. B. A. Parker will be election judge. Clerk will be Heritetta Gillbreath.

Eight candidates are vying for the three vacancies on the Board of Trustees for the School District. They include the incumbents, Glen Scarborough, Sammy Powers and Eddie W.

Hartman and also Virgil Lancaster, Donald Strickland, Orabeth McIver, Raymond DeLeon and Donnie Neff. The three with the largest number of votes will be elected for three year terms.

Glen Copeland is unopposed for Mayor, and Quinton Daniel is unopposed in his bid for the one-year term vacated by Copeland and held by appointee Roy Joe Harvey the past six months. Seeking the two council spots are incumbent Gale Brock, Dale Bradley, Billy Riley and J. T. Avants. Julian Kelly did not seek re-election to the City Council after serving two terms.

Quite a few absentee votes have been cast in both elections indicating more interest than usual. Everyone is urged to go to the polls Saturday to note their choices.

## Auto Mishap Takes Life Of Young S-Anna Woman

A head-on automobile accident Saturday, March 26, north of Brady took the life of Sherry Scarborough Turney, 17, and severely injured her husband, Mark Turney, and his sister, Linda Suthreth McCullough of San Marcos. The mishap occurred at 11:15 a.m. near the Fife farm road about four miles south of the Colorado River. The lone occupant in the other vehicle, a woman from Abilene, was thrown clear of the wreck and had less serious injuries.

Mrs. McCullough and Mark Turney were taken to the Brady Hospital, then transferred to Brownwood Community Hospital. Turney suffered broken ribs and internal injuries, multiple facial cuts and abrasions. Mrs. McCullough was more seriously injured with a broken leg, two broken arms, broken pelvic bone and internal injuries. Both were getting along well early this week.

The three local people were enroute to Santa Anna to attend a wedding shower for Mrs. Turney. Both vehicles were completely demolished in the accident in which Mrs. Turney was killed instantly.

Funeral services for Sherry Scarborough Turney was held Monday, March 26, at First Baptist Church with Rev. W. M. Prince, pastor, and Rev. Chester Rommel, pastor of Rockwood Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Santa Anna Cemetery under the direction of Stevens Funeral Home of Coleman.

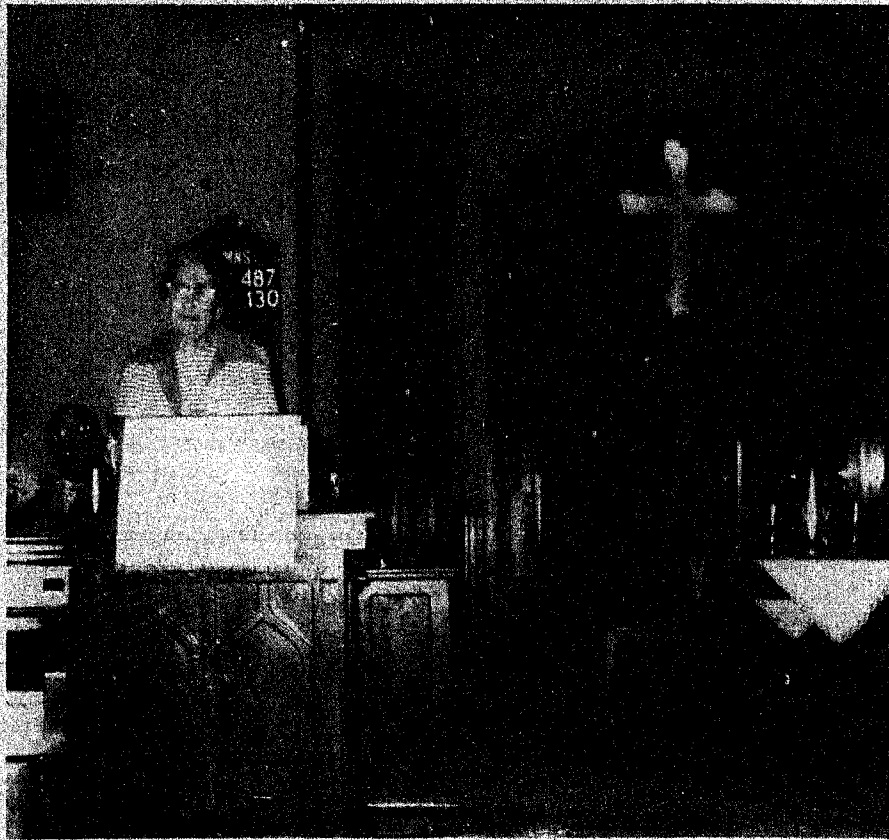

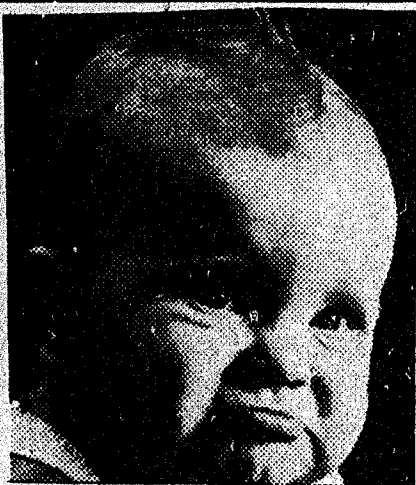
## Gets Special Designation Historic S-Anna Church
