Heavy Rains Saturate Area

The Coleman County area has the best prospect for a good grain crop in several years as soaking rains fell in the area during the past week.

From two to five and one-half inches of rain was reported in the different areas of the Coleman County, with Santa Anna receiving an official 3.70 inches.

The rains began on Wednesday of last week with up to one inch recorded in most areas. More moisture fell the following day and through Sunday. Most creeks, lakes and tanks are full in the community, and fields and pastures are saturated by the rainfall.

Mishap At Rig Causes Injury To SA Youth

SA District Track Champs Girls, Boys Win Titles In 14-B Track Contests

Karl Wagner, 18, of Santa Anna is in the John Sealy Hospital in Galveston being treated for burns on his face and hands he received in an accident early Saturday morning. Karl, an employee of Search Drilling Co., was burned when butane exploded near the drilling rig where he was employed.

Wagner received the most severe burns on his hands as he shielded his eyes when the explosion occurred. His brother, Mark also received minor burns in the incident in the Williams Community north of Brownwood. Mark received emergency treatment following the mishap.

Karl was treated at Brownwood Community Hospital then taken by car to Galveston by his aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Harrel Cupps who remained in Galveston until Sunday.

Although painfully injured, it is not thought skin grafts will be necessary. Doctors said he would be in the burn center at least two weeks.

Cindy Cozart and Tracy Duus each had two gold medals in the girls events, while Joy Smith and Jennifer Rutherford had one each and the 440 and mile relay teams took first place.

Winning for Santa Anna and earning a right to represent the district at the regional meet Saturday are the following: Cindy Cozart, first in triple jump and 80 yard hurdles, second in 440 yard dash and a member of the 440 and mile relay teams.

Tracy Duus, first in high jump and mile run; Jennifer Rutherford, first in 440 yard dash and a member of the 440 and mile

relay teams.

Joy Smith and Celeste Simmons first and second in the discus event; Belinda Phillips second in triple jump. Terry Kilcrease placed second in the 880 yard run, and a member of the 880 yard relay team. Others on the relay team are Marla Mills, Suzette Cozart and Tammy Benge. Those on the 440 relay team are Belinda Phillips, Rhonda Rhoades, Cozart and Rutherford. Girls on the mile relay team are Carolyn Lewis, Rutherford, Rhoades and Cindy Cozart.

Other girls scoring points for Santa Anna were Suzette Cozart and Linda Sanders, second and fifth in 440 dash; Carolyn Lewis, Marla Mills and Phillips, third, fifth and sixth in the 220 dash; 80 yard hurdles, Lois Gordon third and Ginger Smith, sixth.

Lewis and Phillips, third and sixth in the 100 yard dash; Grace Siller and Tammy Benge, third and fourth in the 880 dash. Lois Gordon was third in the mile run, and Belinda Phillips was fourth in the high jump.

Tracy Duus, Joy Smith and Celeste Simmons were third, fifth and sixth in shot put; Cindy Cozart and Rhonda Rhoades were third and sixth in long jump and Kim Bray was third in triple jump.

The Regional girls track meet will be held at Cen-Tex Stadium at Brownwood Saturday, April 23. Fourteen Santa Anna girls will take part in the meet which starts with field events at 9 a.m. Preliminaries begin at 12 noon and finals will be held at 3 p.m.

The boys regional track meet is slated Saturday, April 30, in Brownwood.

Jay Weathers and Paul Martin took a clean sweep of the hurdles events, placing first and second respectively in both the high hurdles and intermediate event. Mike Pape won first in the mile run, and Joe Guerrero was second in the 880 event.

Members of the mile relay winning first are Gip Allen, Joe Dean Early, Joe Guerrero and Jay Weathers. Those on the 440 relay winning second were Albert Salazar, David Chaffin, Martin and Allen.

On the 440 yard relay team that won second are Jerry Don Culpepper qualified for the regional meet by winning second in the mile run. Others placing in the district meet were Freddy Fellers, Mike Pritchard and David Chaffin, third, and sixth in shot put; Pritchard and E. J. Bible, fourth and fifth in discus; Weathers and Doug Hall, third and fourth in high jump.

Also Mike Pape sixth in long jump; Joe Dean Early and Rodney Duus, third and fifth in 880 dash; David Chaffin, fifth in 100 yard dash; Tony Malaer, fifth in 120 hurdles, Guip Allen, Albert Salazar and Stephen Cullins, third, fourth and sixth in 440 dash; Mike Warnock and Albert Salazar fifth and sixth in 220 dash; Doug Hall, fifth in intermediate hurdles; and Joe Malaer, third in the mile run.

Senior Class Favorites Are Named For '77

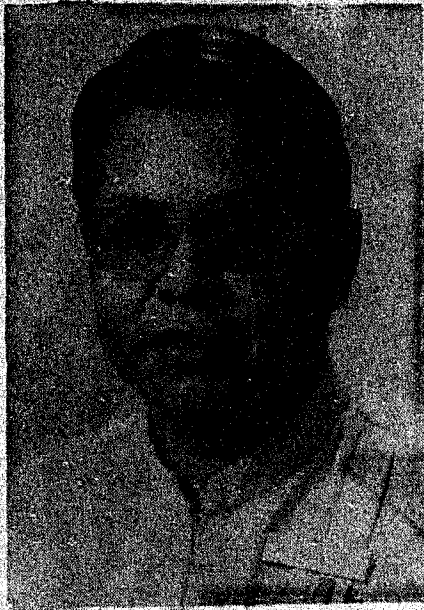
The Senior Class of SAHS elected their favorites at a recent meeting of the group. Those chosen were Robin Smith and Salvador Salazar.

Fine Louisiana Homes, by Harnett Kane, and showed slides of some of the more famous old pre-Civil-War houses.

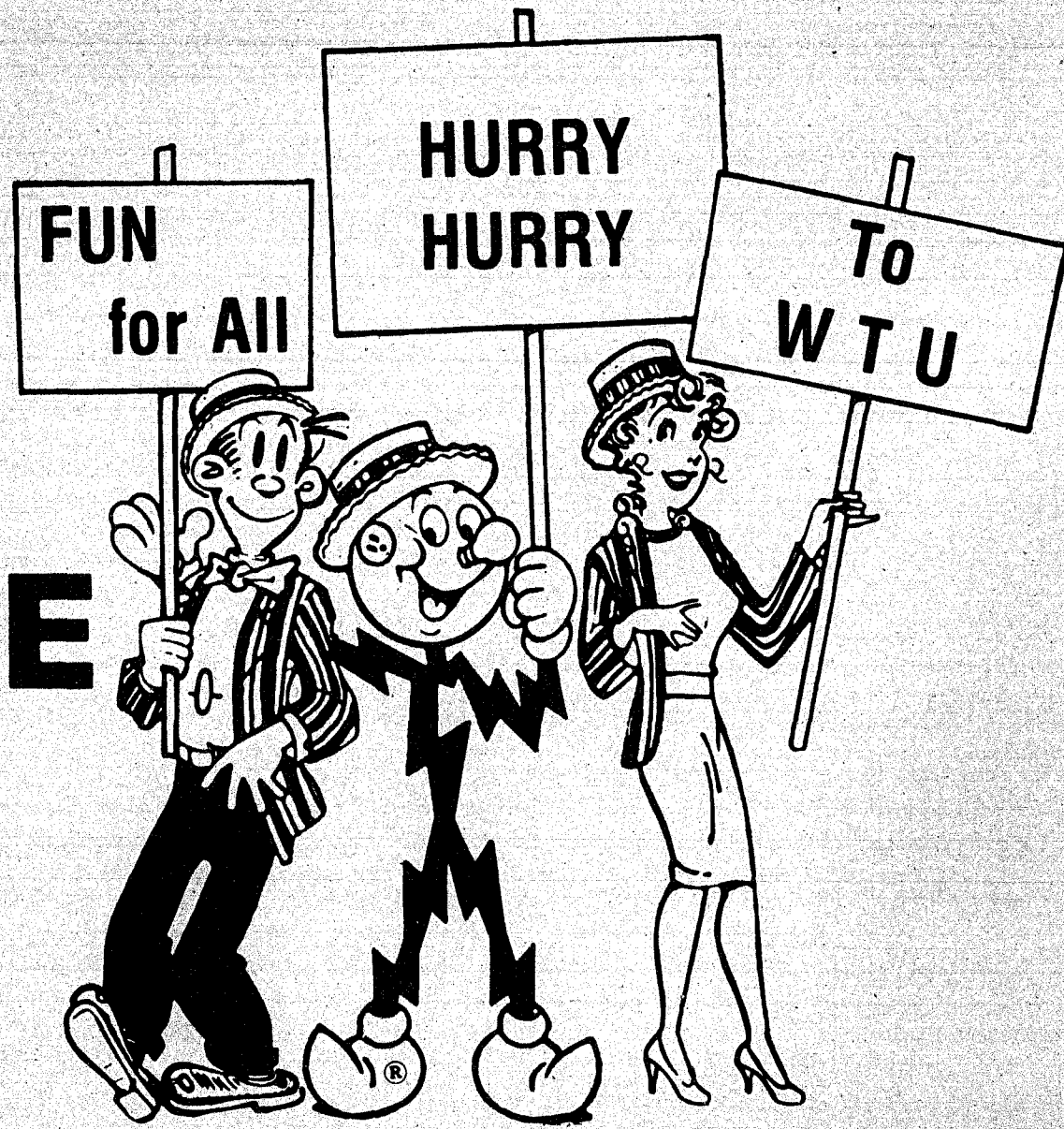

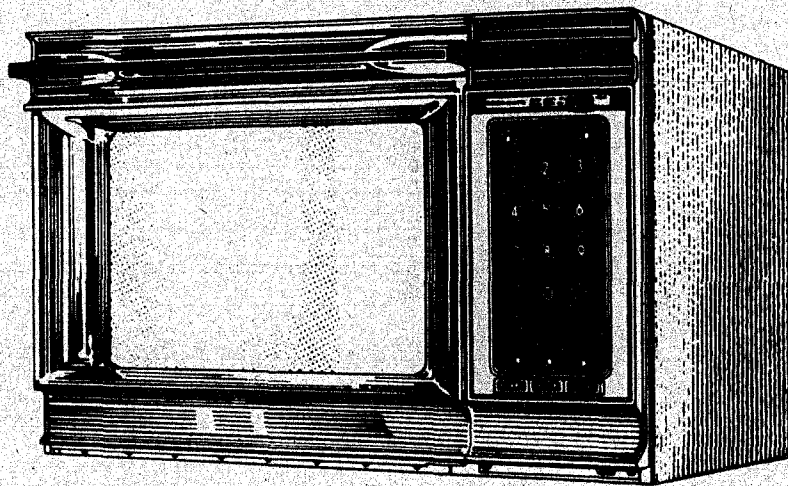


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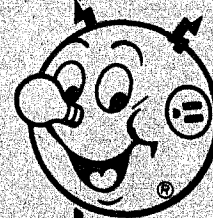

Land Heritage Notations Set In The State

May 1 marks the resumption of the Texas Family Land Heritage Program, and Coleman County farms and ranches may have the opportunity to join the 1,000 properties which have already been registered statewide. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

All of the honorees who have qualified since the program was instituted in 1973 can trace continuous production of their historic lands back 100 years or more to family member founders.

The program serves as a means of honoring the mammoth contributions of productivity from Texas' agricultural lands as well as the dedication of those who have made this bounty possible. Also important is the fact that it provides a unique means of gathering and preserving the knowledge passed on through the generations about agricultural development of Texas.

Application forms for the program may be obtained from county judges, county historical commission chairman or by writing the Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12842, Austin, Texas 78711. Deadline for submitting completed applications is August 15.

While all applicants must receive county judge certification before submitting their completed forms, final decision concerning the land's eligibility rests with the TDA staff.

Under the rules of the program, an applicant must own the land and reside in Texas, while any land in the process of being sold to a non-relative is ineligible. The line of ownership of the property may be traced through wives and husbands, children, brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews.

The land under consideration must meet the following criteria: U. S. Census definition of a farm; 10 acres or more with agricultural assets of \$50 or more a year or, if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

The land must have been agriculturally productive and owned and operated by members

of the family for 100 years or more. If all the land was ever rented out, it will not qualify.

If, however, only a portion of the land was leased, as much as 10 acres were retained in the family for agricultural production which netted sales of at least \$250 annually, it may still be eligible.

The applicant must live on the land and work the property, or if living off the acreage, must actively manage and direct the everyday operation of the farm and ranch. Absentee ownership of land devoted to hunting and timber leases and similar enterprises will not qualify.

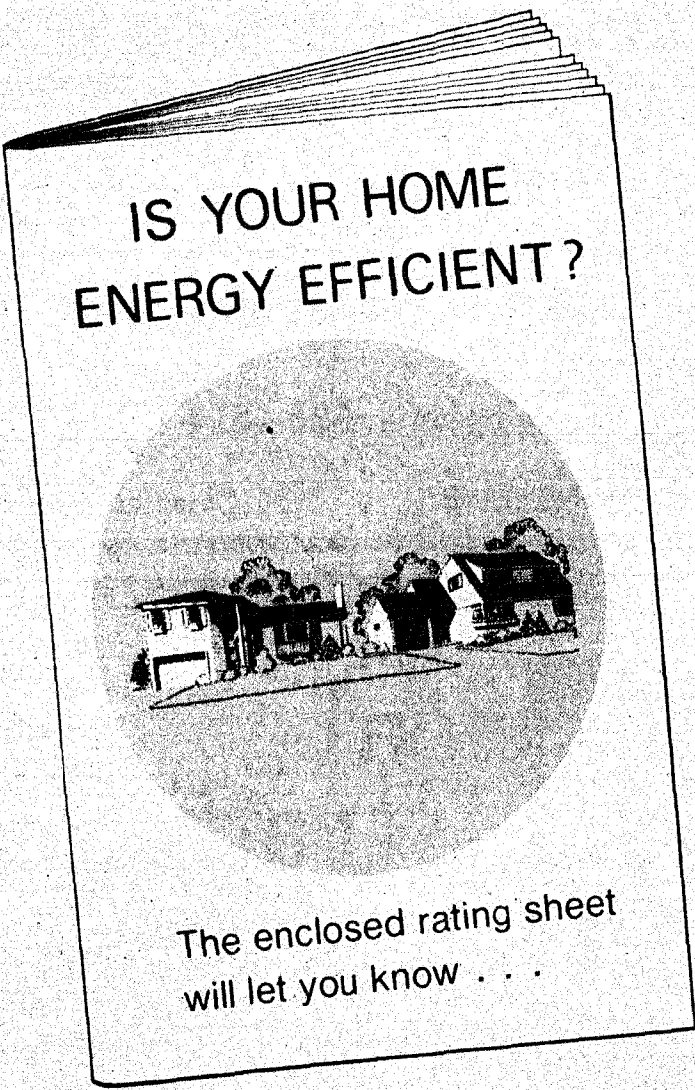

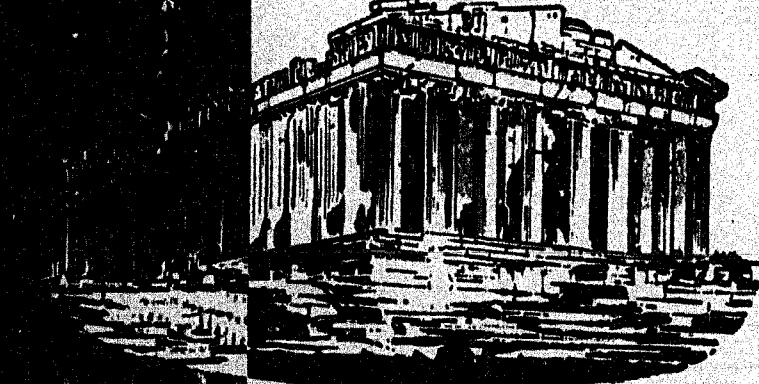

ASCS NEWS

Price support payments to wool producers in Coleman County totaled \$30,948 for the 1976 marketing year. The drafts were put in the mail on Monday, April 11, and by this time should be in the hands of some 206 Coleman County producers.

The payment rate for the 1976 marketings was 9.6 percent of the net sales proceeds on shorn wool, and 25 cents per hundred pounds live-weight on unshorn lambs. Promotion fund deductions amounted to 1.5 cents a pound for shorn wool and 7.5 cents a hundredweight for unshorn lambs.

The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended, provides for the support payments to producers for wool and mohair. The Act supports the price for shorn wool at 72 cents per pound and for mohair at 80.2 cents per pound, grease basis.

Payments this year were much less than last year, in that there was almost \$258,000 paid for the 1975 marketings. The difference is, of course, due to an increase in the average price received by producers for their marketing of wool. In checking with some area warehouses, wool has been selling for about 80 cents a pound.

There will not be any support payments made on mohair for 1976 due to the average price received by producers being much larger than the support rate of 80.2 cents a pound. Presently, mohair is selling for around \$3.00 a pound.

All wool and mohair producers are encouraged to bring your sales receipts on 1977 marketings to the county office whenever you complete your sales. We will keep them on file for you and submit your application for payment later in the year.

All users of certain restricted chemicals including agricultural producers and many home owners and home gardeners are urged to attend a very important meeting Friday, April 22, at Coleman High School Auditorium, at 1:30 p.m. to qualify for a private applicator certification.

This certification will be needed to purchase chemicals which are restricted in a list to be published next fall. Included will be insecticides, fungicides, fumigants, harvest aid chemicals and others.

Without the required certification, private users will have to hire certified commercial applicators for the needed work. At the conclusion of the meeting, questionnaires will be distributed to be completed and turned in, and application forms will be filled out to be mailed to the Texas department of Agriculture in Austin. Certificates will be mailed later to applicants, enabling the holder to purchase the chemicals.

Dr. Nick Wilson, Extension Entomologist, will present several hours of slides in a program designed to educate the viewers on safe and proper use of all types of chemicals.

Regulation will be through the retail outlet and will be rigid. So, if you are an agricultural producer, home gardener, or if you use chemicals on your home lawn or on shrubs, or use pesticides in any way or form, attend this meeting.

More Drilling Activity In S-Anna Area Oil Patch

More drilling locations have been staked south of Santa Anna in the past few weeks.

Republic Mineral Corp. of Houston staked three locations, all slated for 2,700 feet.

The No. 1-A-E. L. Brown Estate is on a 216 acre lease in the Wharton CSL Survey 496.

The No. 2-A-E. L. Brown Estate is in the same survey. Also planned is the No. 8 Brown Estate on a 228 acre lease five miles south of Santa Anna.

The No. 1 Virgil C. Newman is on an 80-acre lease in the same survey.

A wildcat drilled seven miles southeast of Santa Anna has been completed as a dual gas well. It is the No. 1 Z. O. Henderson in the R. Perry Survey 95.

The well was drilled by Subsurface Energy Corp., and from the upper pay it had an

absolute open flow of 115,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 846 and 848 feet, treated with 250 gallons of acid.

The test from the lower pay had an absolute open flow of 280,000 feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 2,025-35 feet.

The No. 1 Joe Paul Morrow in the same area was gauged at 1,200,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 878 to 882 feet. The well is in the W. B. Williams Survey 145.

The D. Herring Oil & Gas Co., of Coleman staked two regular field locations four miles north of Trickham. Both are on the Casey Herring 40-acre lease in the Bonds and Sanders Survey 91.

A wildcat 10 miles south of Santa Anna is planned by D & B Oil Inc., of Arlington. The No. 18 G. B. Bartolomew is in the Williams Farris Survey A-279 a 183 acre lease.

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
