Several Contracts Extended At ISD Board Meeting Tue.

Contracts of school principals and athletic coaches were extended at the Tuesday, February 8, meeting of the Santa Anna School Trustees. Contracts of High School Principal Kenneth Bowker and Elementary Principal Ruth Dodson were extended one year each; contract of head coach and athletic director Anthony Strother was extended two years. Contracts for coaches Dennis Higgs, Bruce Smith and Rebecca Martin were extended one year. All the personnel also have academic assignments in the local schools. Other faculty contracts will be studied at the next meeting.

Rev. Brewer Died Tuesday

Many people of our community were saddened to hear of the death of Rev. Bill R. Brewer, 43, who died Tuesday, February 15, in Scott and White Hospital in Temple. Rev. Brewer was pastor of Santa Anna First Baptist Church for several years, moving to McGregor in 1973 and last year taking the pastorate of a Killeen Baptist Church.

An Arkansas native, Rev. Brewer was taken suddenly ill last Thursday and remained in critical condition until his death Tuesday.

Survivors are his wife, Mildred; one son, Nathan, and a daughter, Sonjia, all of Killeen.

Funeral services were pending but planned for today or Friday in Killeen.

MAY HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS TAKE BI-DISTRICT GAME

The Santa Anna Girls Basketball team was winner of the District 17-B championship Friday, February 11, in a play-off game with the Brookesmith girls. The score was 40-35 in favor of the local girls. The game was played at Brownwood High School gymnasium.

The Brookesmith team went ahead in the first quarter but were soon overpowered by Santa Anna as they scored 15 points in the second quarter. The local girls kept their lead until the final whistle.

Rhonda Rhoades scored 24 points to lead Santa Anna; Gaye Harvey scored 10 and Kim Bray scored four.

Starting guards were Melody Allen, Jimmie Gail Rutherford and Cindy Cozart.

Other members of the varsity team are Ginger Smith, Debbie Buse, Joy Smith, Tammy Benge, Tammy Coyle, and Jennifer Rutherford, manager.

The SAHS bid for Bi-District title was denied by the May High School girls who defeated the Mountie team 76-31 Monday night at Brownwood Coliseum. Despite the hard work by the Santa Anna guards, tall Bonnie Buchanan of the Tiger team put in 58 points to lead the May girls. Miss Buchanan has averaged 48 points per game this season for her team that is ranked second in Class B State polls.

May's guards kept Rhonda Rhoades to 12 points with Gaye Harvey leading the scoring with 17. Kim Bray scored two.

The May girls team will play in the regional tournament at Tarleton State University next week for a chance to compete in the state tourney later this March.

Santa Anna girls basketball team has not won a district title since 1971 which was the third the district crown in a row. In 1972 they lost to Talpa-Centennial in a play-off game for the championship.

The entire community is proud of the local team and pleased with the manner Coach Higgs and the girls represented the school and town.

Local Teacher Is Candidate For Council

The first candidate for Santa Anna City Council election signed an application for a place on the ballot. Billy Riley, SAHS vocational agriculture teacher, is the first to make announcement as a candidate for the April 2 election.

Three Councilpersons and the Mayor are to be elected at the coming election. Appointed Mayor Glen Copeland and Councilpersons Gale Brock, Roy Joe Harvey and Julian Kelley have not stated their intentions at the present time.

There are no additional candidates for the School Board which election will also be held April 3. Glen Scarborough has filed for re-election and Donald Strickland is a candidate for one of the three positions to be filled. Other incumbents are Eddie Hartman and Sammie Powers. COLEMAN POOL TO BE CLOSED; NO SWIMMING PROGRAM PLANNED

Announcement has been made this week that there will be no summer swimming program this year for Coleman County youngsters. The ending of the annual program is a result of the closing of the Coleman Pool. Major repairs are needed at the privately-owned facility west of Coleman, and the owners do not plan to get pool back in operation.

Leaders of the Santa Anna and Coleman Summer Recreation organization met with the Commissioners Court in Coleman Monday morning to seek funding for a new swimming pool, but no funds are available for such a large project. Other means of financing the project will be investigated.

Hundreds of Santa Anna children have learned to swim or taken part in the summer swimming lessons held each year for about 15 years. Local women have assisted with the program to provide a school bus for transportation and arranged for trained instructors.

Mrs. Charles Hosch is current chairman of the local organization. Partial funding for the local program has been from the Community Chest fund and other donations.

Phillips To Teach Hang-Gliding

"One of man's oldest dreams has become his newest sport," says Ewart Phillips, who will instruct a continuing education course in hang gliding at Howard Payne University beginning Feb. 24.

The course is composed of a ground school, CED 1001A, which will meet at 7 p.m. for three consecutive Thursdays, Feb. 24, March 3 and 10, and flight training, CED 1001B, which will be scheduled afternoons and on Saturdays, as dictated by the weather and the work schedules of participants.

Enrollment in the ground school is unlimited, but flight training will be conducted in small groups of three to six students each.

"The two-part course is designed to allow participants to enroll in the ground school without committing themselves to the flight training until they know more about the sport," says Phillips. "The ground school is a good place to learn about the sport and to decide whether to become a participant in flight."

In ground school, students will learn the basics of footlaunched flight, the care and use of equipment, and safety precautions. Included in class sessions will be slides and films question answer periods. At the end of the three classes, participants should have the knowledge necessary to decide whether or not they wish to begin flight training. Fee for the ground school is \$15.

Flight training will be conducted on several hillsides, depending upon wind directions. Training will teach the student safe launching procedures, flight, in-flight course corrections and safe landings. Participants will be trained until they can launch themselves safely with and without supervision. Fee for flight training is \$25.

"Once considered the realm of crackpots and daredevils, hang gliding has taken its rightful place among the other active sports and has been taken up by thousands of people from all walks of life," says Phillips, who is also head of the modern language department at HPU.

"Although the sport may be considered dangerous when compared to bridge or checkers, a sensible pilot with proper equipment is probably safer on the hill than he was in the automobile that took him to the site," he said. "If he doesn't exceed his level of competence and judgement, he is less likely to get hurt hang gliding than if he were playing touch football."

"Learning to fly is one of the most personal things you will ever do," he said. "Success depends entirely on how much you want to fly."

The VA Says

Q- As a veteran, may I use the GI Bill for correspondence courses?

A- Yes. If you are eligible for benefits and the correspondence course is approved for VA training, the VA will pay 90 percent of the cost of the course.

Q- I purchased a home in 1957 and had the loan guaranteed by the VA. I sold the home and the loan has been paid in full. Is it possible for me to obtain another VA-guaranteed loan?

A- Since you disposed of the home the original GI loan has been paid in full, your loan privilege can be restored. Contact your nearest VA office for full information.

Q- In 1965 I bought a \$5,000 "JR" insurance policy because I was totally disabled. I have a \$5,000 World War II "V" policy on waiver. Can I get a waiver of premiums on my "JR" policy too?

A- No waiver will be granted for total disability in existence at the time your insurance became effective.

Q- What are the dates of war service to qualify for VA nonservice-connected pension as a Vietnam-era veteran?

A- Aug. 5, 1964 through May 7, 1975.


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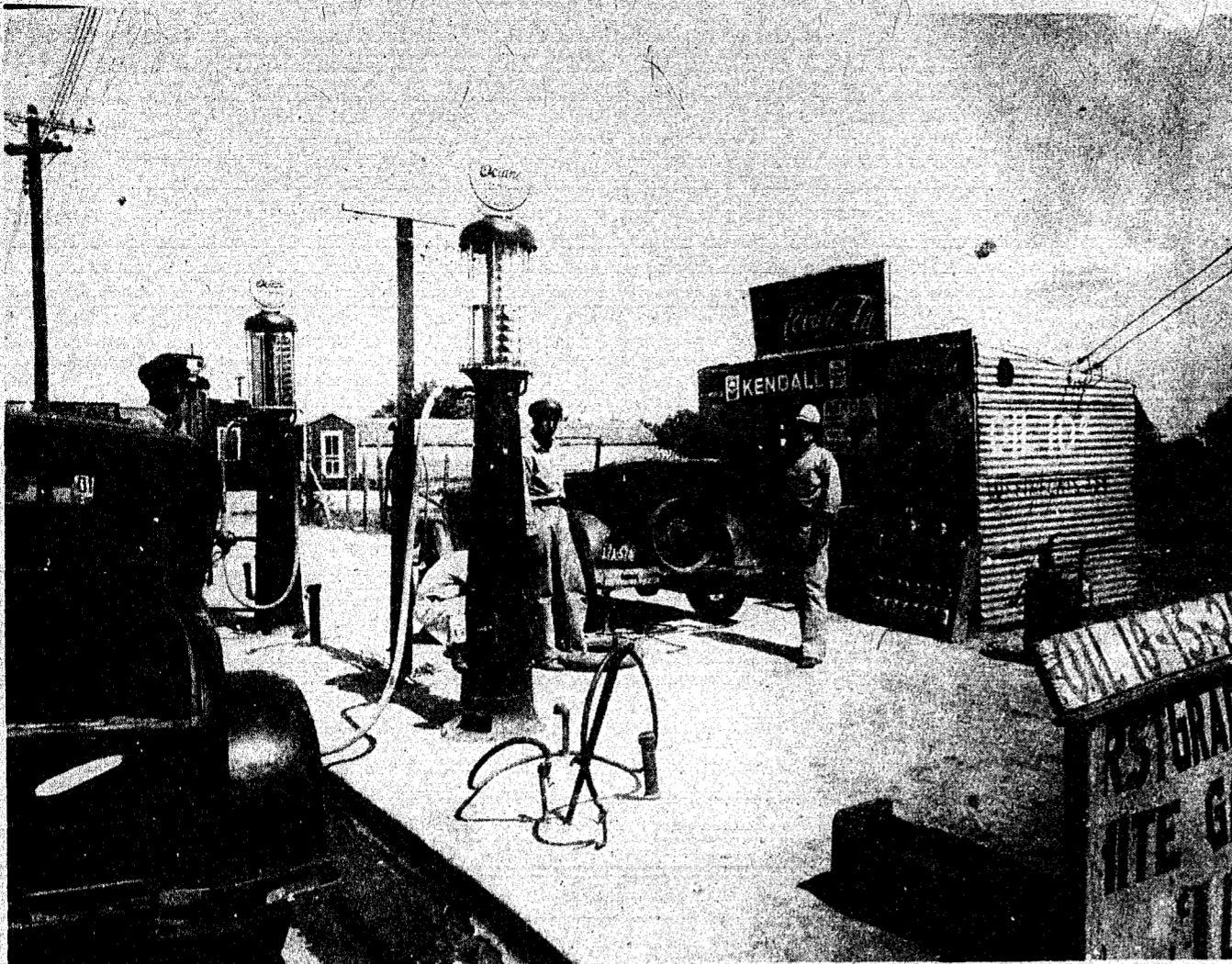

Mother of S-Anna Resident Marks Her 104th Birthday

SANTA ANNA—Mrs. Lera Jane Whittington Hipp, a Santa Anna man's mother, marked her 104th birthday anniversary Wednesday, February 2, at the Southland Villa in Temple where she has been living about a year, when the residents honored her with a birthday party. During the celebration Mrs. Hipp sang some old hymns, "He Made Him Whole and He Would Not Be Denied" and

"I'm Going Home To Die No More."

Mrs. Hipp's eyesight is failing and she is hard of hearing but she enjoys singing gospel hymns and visiting with her family. She is a Methodist.

Her husband, the late James Andrew Hipp, a carpenter, and Lera were married in the Temple area July 7, 1887 when she was 14 and he was 23.

They had eight children, four of whom are still living. They are James Calvin Hipp of Temple, George Hipp of Santa Anna, and twin daughters, Vera McMillan of Baytown and Erie Putman of Highlands. Mr. Hipp dies in 1948.

Mrs. Hipp also has 19 grandchildren, 22 great-grandchildren and 37 great-great-grandchildren. A son, James Calvin Hipp, 87, and this wife attended the party.

Another son, George Hipp, 83, of Santa Anna married Bessie Watson 1913, in Milam County,

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they came to Coleman County in the fall of 1920 because of a drought in Bell County, coming to live in Santa Anna in 1926.

Mr. and Mrs. Hipp have six living children a son is deceased.

Mr. George Hipp hasn't seen his mother in some years because of family illnesses, but hopes to visit her soon.





IRS Explains W4 and W4E

Recently IRS has detected some confusion among employees concerning proper filing of Form W-4. Some workers hold the mistaken impression that they can legally stop employers from withholding tax from their pay by filling out a W-4-E form and giving it to their employers. This type of mistake needs to be corrected immediately.

Internal Revenue Service District Director, A. W. McCannless, said that form W-4-E, "Exemption from Withholding of Federal Income Tax" was designed for students and other persons who do not receive enough income during the year to be legally liable to file a return.

The tax official said that misusing form W-4-E for controlling the amount of tax withheld from pay can bring on a myriad of miseries. For example, the worker opens the door to a penalty for supplying false information or failing to supply information to the employer. For this offense, the law prescribes a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and/or a one year jail term.

On the form W-4-E is a statement which reads "for use by employees who incurred no tax liability for 1976 and anticipate no tax liability for 1977." What this means is that you can use the form only if you did not owe and pay in tax last year, and do not expect to earn enough money this year to require a payment of tax.

And there's a civil penalty for tax law violation which might be imposed. Persons who do not have tax withheld from salary checks must estimate their tax every 3 months and send this estimated amount to Internal Revenue Service. (Self-employed persons do this-- the owner of a small family business for example.) If the taxpayer does not have the tax withheld from his salary, or pay quarterly estimates of tax, the IRS will add an estimated tax penalty of 7 percent.

What withholding form should the taxpayer use? The correct form is the W-4, "Employees Withholding Allowance Certificate." McCannless advises workers to make certain that it is current. The one now in use was revised in October 1976.

In working out the allowance on the W-4, try to make the amounts of tax withheld each payday add up to the total tax you will pay at the end of the year. Proper withholding is a painless way of meeting the responsibility of paying Federal taxes.

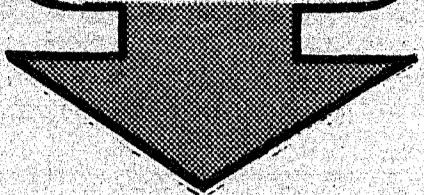

High School Seniors to Participate
