Absentee Votes Must Be Cast Next Tuesday

Absentee voting for the April 2 City and School District elections will end Monday, March 28. People who will be out of town on election day may cast their ballots ahead of time at designated places.

The City Hall will be open for absentee voting from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. each weekday; the High School business office is the site for absentee voting for the School Board and open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. each Monday through Friday.

The only contest in the City election is for City Council where four candidates, Gale Brock, Billy Riley, Dale Bradley and J. T. Avants, are seeking the two positions which expire.

Also unopposed on the ballot are Mayor Glen Copeland and Quinton Daniel, candidate for the one-year term formerly filled by Copeland.

School Board candidates are more numerous with eight people seeking the three places that expire. The incumbents seeking re-election are Sammie J. Powers, Glen Scarborough and Eddie Hartman. Others on the ballot are Virgil Lancaster, Orabeth McIver, Donald Strickland, Raymond DeLeon and Donnie Neff.

Both elections will be held April 2 in Santa Anna from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Marker Dedication Saturday

First Christian Church Gets Historic Recognition

Texas Historical Marker will be dedicated at the First Christian Church in Santa Anna on Saturday, March 26 at 2:30 p.m. Master of ceremonies will be D. H. Moore, superintendent of the Sunday School, and Rev. Andrew Thibedeaux, pastor, will give the invocation. Coleman County Judge Pete Skelton will present the certificate of the marker to Mrs. W. W. Stephenson, teacher in the Sunday School for many years. Mr. Stephenson and Mrs. Oscar Boenicke will unveil the marker, and Mrs. A. Preston Bailey will give a brief history of the organization.

Longtime members of the church will be introduced, as will out-of-town visitors. Mrs. C. D. Bruce and Danny Wheatley will ring the historic brass bell which has hung in the steeple since the building was erected in 1901. Following the program, the church will be open for visiting, and a social hour will be held in the church annex, which for years the parsonage and is itself historically interesting.



Foreign Unit To Be Aided By Offering

Three major projects in Europe and Africa will receive money from an offering at the Santa Anna Seventh-day Adventist Church next Saturday, according to Mrs. C. P. Wenzel, Sabbath School superintendent of the church.

Each quarter, on the thirteenth Sabbath, a special offering for missions is collected. Any amount over a specified sum goes into a "special project offering", for some special needy place. This is called the "overflow".

This quarter end the "overflow" will aid the Northern Europe-West Africa Division, one of ten such geographical units in the church. The money from the local church, as well as from all churches in North Africa, will go to build a library at the Adventist Seminary of West Africa in Nigeria; a girls' dormitory at the junior college in Finland (to replace structures that have been condemned by fire authorities) and a new building for the 100-year old Norwegian Publishing

City Sales Tax Shows Increase

Santa Anna's City Sales Tax receipts for the quarter totaled \$2,648.24, according to a report from State Comptroller Bob Bullock. The total for the month of February was \$516.

City sales tax is collected with the State sales tax and returned following processing at the State Comptroller's office. Monthly payments are not made for amounts less than \$500.

The larger quarterly total reflects the December Christmas sales. The State-wide revenue was the largest ever recorded up 18 percent over the same three-month period last year.

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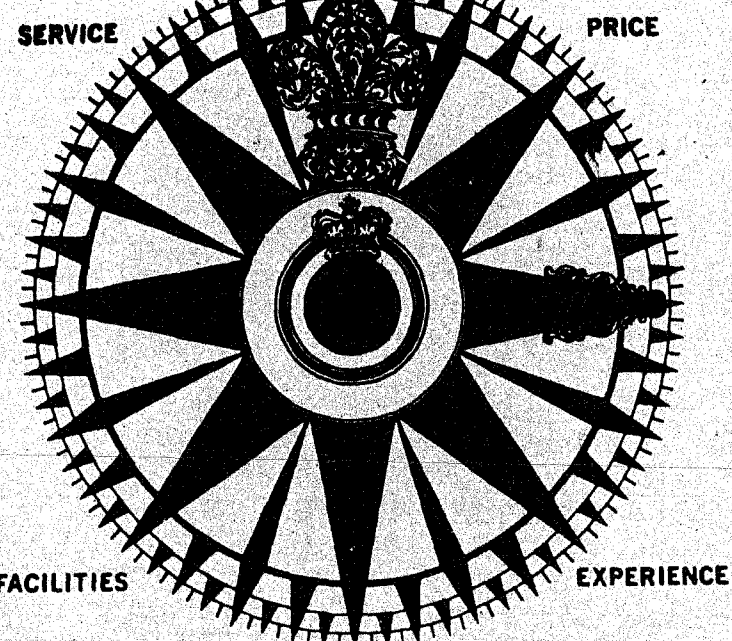

Man Known Here

Dist. Chairman Of Beef Group

Gene Newman of San Angelo has been named a district chairman of the Texas Beef Development Taskforce (BDT) a group working for a beef program that will raise \$30 million to \$40 million a year to improve the economic position of cattlemen.

Newman, one of 14 district chairmen in Texas, was appointed by J. D. Sartwelle of Houston, chairman of the Texas BDT. He and county BDT chairmen in this area, to be appointed soon, will be conducting an extensive educational program to inform cattlemen about the upcoming Beef Referendum, in which all cattlemen will be eligible to vote.

The Beef Referendum is to determine whether cattlemen want a national self-help program. It was authorized by the Beef Research and Information Act, passed by Congress in May of last year.

If approved by two-thirds of the cattlemen voting, there would be a uniform collection of three-tenths of one percent of the value on each animal sold. This rate will raise \$30 million to \$40 million a year to be invested in beef research, promotion, consumer education and foreign market development. Any cattleman not interested in participating may receive a refund, upon request.

"Every cattleman knows that we have been through the economic wringer the past three years," says Sartwelle. "This is a self-help program that can help every segment of our industry. Therefore I urge every cattleman to attend the informational meetings, to be scheduled in every county during the next 60 days, and to vote 'Yes' in the upcoming referendum, expected to be held in May or June."

Newman, a west Texas rancher and feedlot operator, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Newman of San Angelo and relative of several Santa Anna people.

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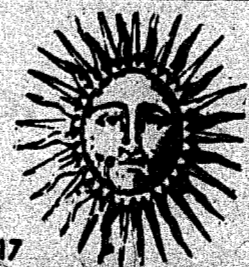

While most adults have long since quit playing with dollhouses and miniature furniture, one Santa Anna couple make no apologies for their continued interest in children's items.

William O. (Bill) and Virginia Storey design and make doll houses, children's furniture and other items at their home and shop on Whon Road. They have enjoyed the unusual hobby for the past five years.

At the request of their daughter, Terry Wilson of Austin, Mr. Storey designed and built a miniature dresser. Mrs. Wilson showed friends and neighbors who also wanted the tiny furniture, thus starting the new career-hobby.

Built for a kindergarten-age child, the furniture line now includes chests of drawers, poster beds, chairs, tables and a tall-backed "pouting" chair.

The best selling items are kitchen appliances with doors that open, handles that turn and drawers that pull. The white pine and plywood furniture is almost indestructible. It is left unfinished so that the new owner may paint or stain to their own wish. Most sales are to schools, kindergartens and day care centers.

Mr. Storey designed and built a kitchen unit measuring 40 inches in width containing simulated stove, refrigerator, sink and cabinet. It is becoming one of the most popular items because of the space-saving feature. A sturdy rocking horse is another favorite of children and adults.

Mrs. Storey has begun building dollhouses, adding carpeting and other details to the finished product. Mr. Storey helps with the carpentry, but she does most of the work herself. A miniature barn has also been added to the collection.

The Storeys show and sell their custom-made articles at art and craft shows as distant as Midland and Beaumont and have orders for items from all over the state. Mr. Storey has built one dollhouse, a replica to the home of the family that ordered it. He enjoys knowing the child for whom he is building the furniture or house.

Residents of Santa Anna for 12 years, Mr. Storey formerly was employed at the Bangs furniture factory and worked four years for the City of Santa Anna. He currently works for Henderson Funeral Home. He is an associate member of Santa Anna Fire Department. Mrs. Storey works part-time at Ranger Park Medical Center.

Deadline Near For Auto Tags

Have you picked up your 1977 motor vehicle registration sticker yet?

If not, be prepared to push the panic button.

That's exactly what members of the Tax Assessor-Collectors Associations of Texas are about to do.

R. W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, said today that county tax officials "literally were ready to crawl the walls" when the organizations' board of directors met in Corpus Christ recently.

"Very few motorists have registered their vehicles-- just like last year," Townsley said. "Tax offices are staffed to handle the anticipated rush to get stickers early, and they've simply got nothing to do."

Despite the easily handled stickers, which were initiated in 1976, and computer prepared registration applications-- which eliminate most of the delay formerly involved in typing registrations-- motorists simply aren't remembering last years' frustrating last minute lines.

"Tax collectors are waiting for the 'big crunch'," Townsley said. "Motorists will have no one but themselves to blame if they wait until the deadline April 1 to get their registrations. Every county in the state is running way behind schedule."

In the concert event, a IV rating was given the group.

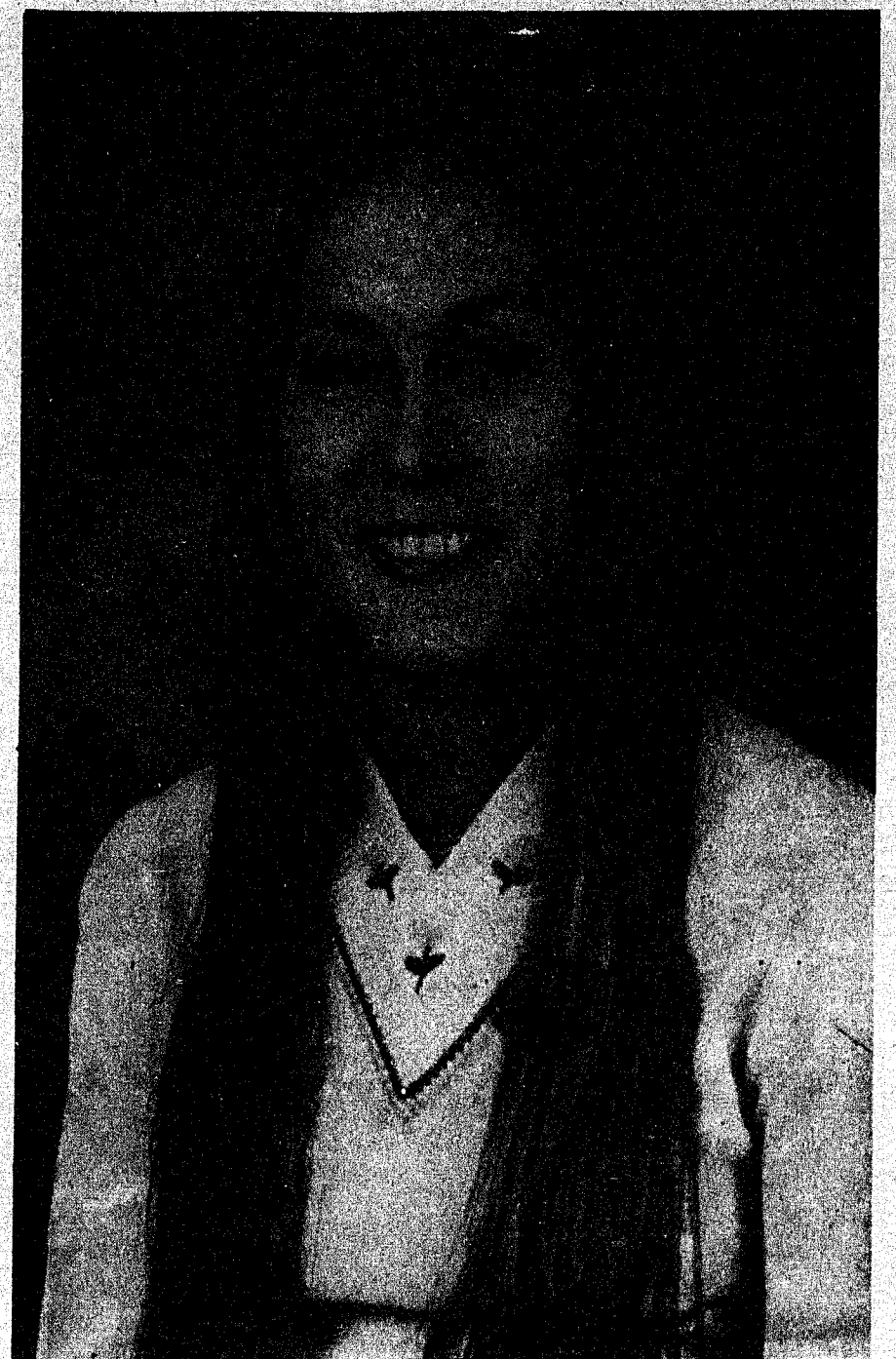

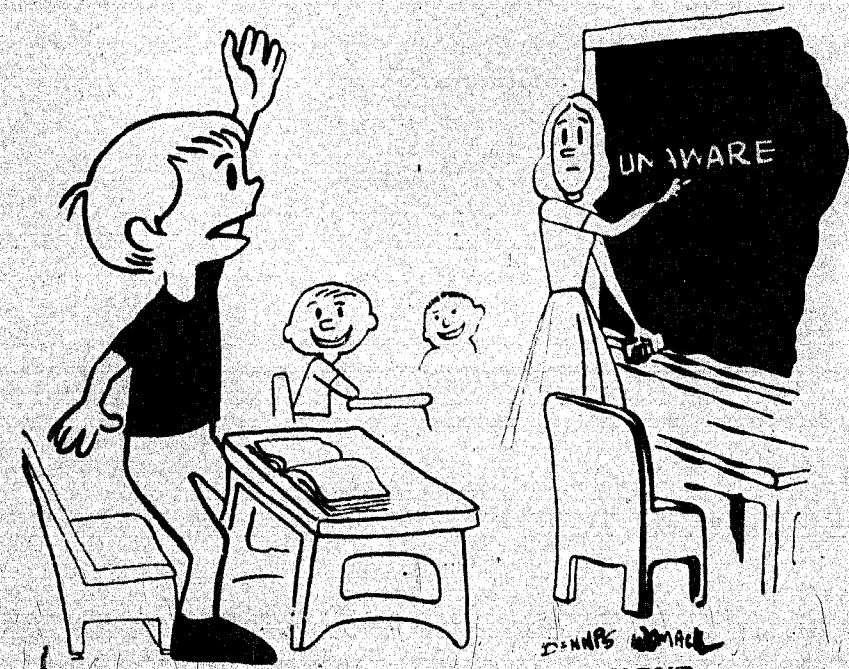

Decision to buy life insurance

COLLEGE STATION--A decision to buy life insurance should depend on needs of those who will receive its benefits, Lynn Bourland, a family resource management specialist, advises.

"Adequate life insurance is one way to have financial security for a family in case the wage earner(s) should die--and it provides protection from debt collectors to a single person's heirs.

"Also, life insurance enables anyone with a modest income and little savings to build an estate large enough for surviving dependents to continue their accustomed standard of living," she said.

Miss Bourland is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System--and she is author of "Life Insurance" (MP 1262), a publication available through County Extension Offices statewide. Among its several topics, the publication includes a chart to help families "size-up" their insurance needs, she said.

In determining whose life should be insured, it is most important to first protect a family from losing the main wage earner's income. A single person who owes no large debts has little need for life insurance, the specialist said.

How much insurance a family needs depends on the number and ages of children, the surviving

A minimum of four or five times the main wage earner's annual income is recommended by money management experts, Miss Bourland said.

"Also consider other financial factors that life insurance can protect.

"For example, in 1974, incomes were earned by 55 per cent of the wives in U.S. families. In addition to dollars earned, services provided by the homemaker--that would have to be replaced by paid help--should be considered.

"Before buying insurance on a child's life, remember to first adequately insure the main wage earners," she added.

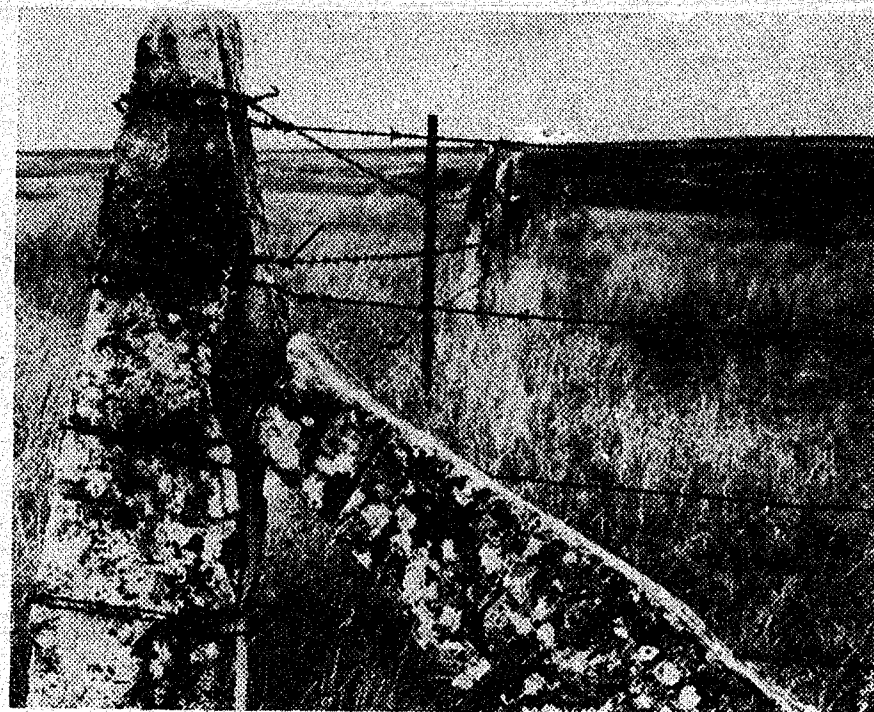
