SAHS Vo-Ag Teacher To Take Merkel Post

Billy Riley, nine-year vocational agriculture teacher at Santa Anna High School, has resigned the position to take a job as agriculture teacher in the Merkel School District. The resignation is effective June 30.

A native of Coleman and graduate of Coleman High School, Riley did his practice teaching at Santa Anna while a senior at Texas A & M University where he received his degree. He taught two years at Navice and Mozelle before taking the local position when A. D. Pettit retired.

During his tenure at Santa Anna the new vocational agriculture building was built and the shop equipped with new tools and equipment.

Riley expressed appreciation to the town and community for the support he and the vo-ag program have received. The move to another school is not an easy one, Riley said, but the offer with considerable raise in salary and facilities was too good to reject.

Light Harvest During Spring Turkey Hunts

Each year more and more hunters try their luck at hunting turkey gobblers in the spring. This year's kill was typically light according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department field biologists around the state, but hunter interest and skill is growing.

Forty-three Texas counties including Coleman were open to turkey hunting April 16 - 24. The April season also was the first time in many years that eastern turkeys could legally be hunted in Texas, with Tyler and Polk Counties open to the spring hunting for eastern turkey.

Most hunters had little experience at hunting turkey in the spring.

In the other 41 counties the Rio Grande turkey was the species hunted. Some of the best turkey hunting in Texas is in the area of Brown, Coleman, Callahan and Mills Counties.

Area biologist Larry Holland at Brownwood estimates 225 birds were taken in this region. He also reports more enthusiasm and participation in the spring turkey hunting than usual, despite heavy rains the first weekend.

Anonymous Donor Gives Book To Santa Anna City Library

Recently added to the Santa Anna City Library shelves by an anonymous donor is the book "Something More" by Catherine Marshall, author of the great best selling novel "Christy".

Not since "Beyond Ourselves", published thirteen years ago, has Catherine Marshall written about her ever-expanding spiritual quest, her life of faith, the joys and problems of life today, and her own growing family.

Now the author, in a rare blend of candor, fresh insights, and humor, guides her reader toward a joyful new life of affirmative experiences. She struggles with the difficult questions of how a loving God can permit good people to suffer, of why some are healed and others are not. Out of situations so current that the ink seems scarcely dry on the page, she shows the effectiveness of prayer not only against a cancerous growth of the body or a

wilting of the spirit but in the material world as well—a powerful prayer for financial help, for example. She writes unflinchingly of the reality of evil—Satan "alive and well" in our world, and how prayer is one of the best protections we have against him.

These are but a few of the areas Catherine Marshall explores and dramatizes in "Something More". Her style is that inimitable blend of autobiography, dramatic narrative, and Biblical lesson that has earned her literally millions of readers since the publication of "A Man Called Peter" in 1951.

Catherine Marshall is a religious explorer. She writes of personal tragedy and self-doubt with extraordinary frankness. The involvement of first her son and then her stepdaughter with the "youth rebellion," together with the death of two grandchildren in infancy, has forced her to re-examine her own faith, searching for new answers and old truths.
