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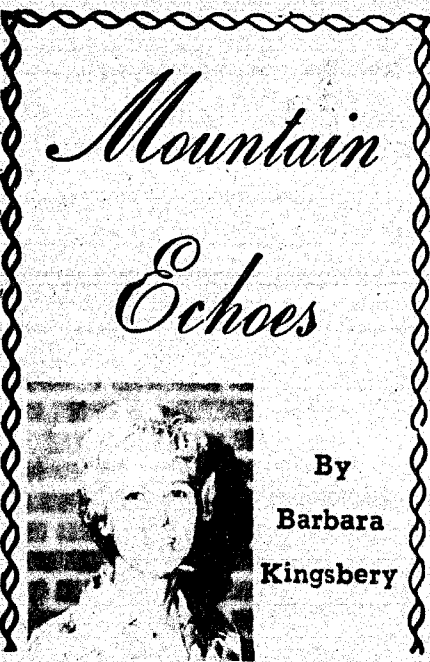

The Beef Referendum is to be voted on by U. S. cattle producers July 5-15. Early returns from the Texas Beef Development Taskforce showed only 18 percent of all Texas cattle producers and 11 percent of U. S. cattlemen registered to vote during the recent two-week period.

There is much support for the project that would initiate the Beef Research and Information Act and make an assessment from producers, feeders and processors to promote the beef industry. However there is opposition to the proposal citing a number of reasons the enactment might 'get out of hand'.

Cattle producers who are qualified to vote are urged to study the proposal and vote their choice during the next two weeks.

Coleman County received some welcome rainfall last week, the totals varying from community to community.

The rainfall measured 1.38 inches at the official gauge in Santa Anna with unofficial reports from two to two and one-half inches.

The rain was heavier south of town with three inches reported in the Cleveland-Leedy area. Those north of town did not fare so well as about one inch was reported. Burkett had an official one inch.

The largest rainfall reports came from south of the county where near Gouldbusk 4.8 inches fell during the day. Coleman had 2.33 at the official gauge.

Film Service Available Through SA City Library

Response has been excellent at City Library during the new daily schedule while the Library is open from 1 to 5 each weekday afternoon. A large number of readers have been by to choose books from the hundreds that are available.

A group of adult books have been placed on the shelves and are now available for readers. New children and youth books have also been placed there recently.

A new feature and service through the local library is a film loan program where 18 mm, 16 mm and Super 8 mm films are available free of charge. Those wishing to use the films must go by the library and make selections from the catalog and sign an agreement to pay for any damage that might occur. However there is no charge even for return postage, if the film is undamaged during use.

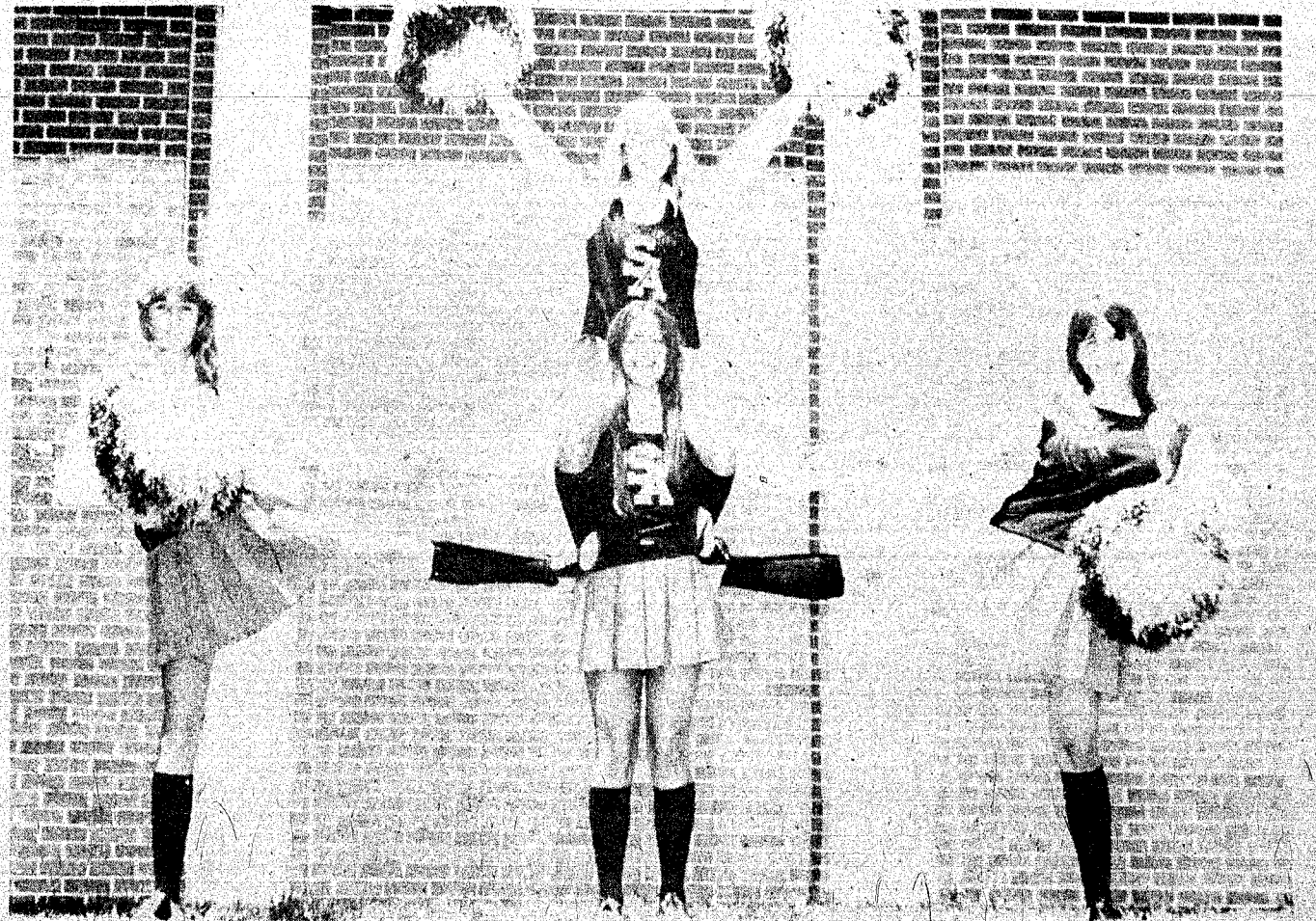
Included in the film library are comedy, travel, religious films, some of the old-time silent movies and Walt Disney productions. Many of these are suitable for children's parties

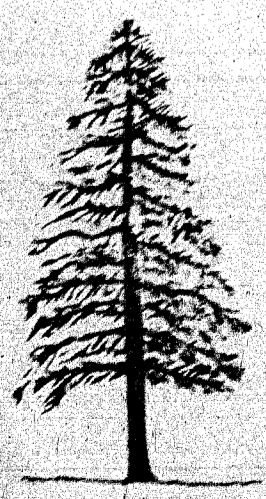
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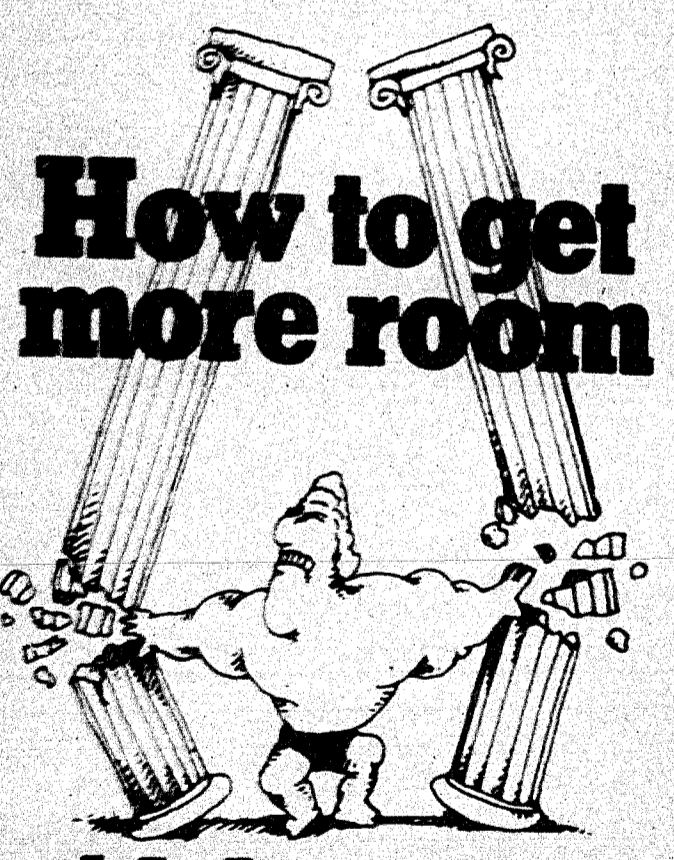
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Trickham News

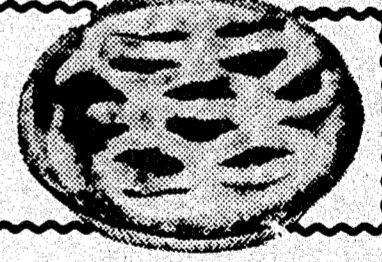

Food Benefits Are Available To Some Folks

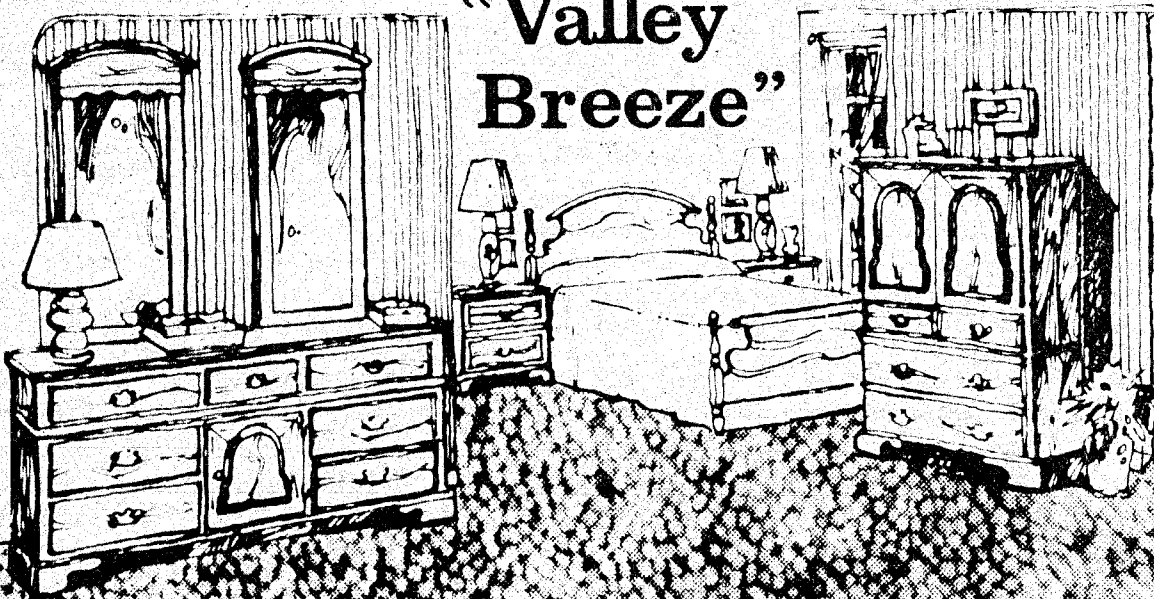

Holiday Toll May Be High

The Texas Department of Public Safety today warned that an unusually high number of traffic accidents and fatalities are likely to occur during the July 4th holiday weekend.

The head of the DPS, Colonel Wilson E. Speir, estimated that 51 persons would lose their lives in Texas traffic from 6 p.m. Friday, July 1 to midnight Monday, July 4.

"Based on past holiday experience, we believe many of the traffic accidents during the holiday period will involve either speeding or drinking. Also, it is likely that a high percentage will occur late at night or within a few hours after midnight," Speir said.

"Hopefully, motorists will drive defensively and be thoughtful while behind the wheel. I sincerely believe that if they would keep the principle of courtesy and concern utmost in their minds that it would make for a safe holiday," the DPS director added.

To deal with the problem of reckless drivers, the DPS will be utilizing all its manpower in a strong enforcement program. In addition, Department of Public Safety Troopers will be working with local enforcement agencies throughout the state, as well as the news media, trying to keep the public safety conscious.

During the July 4th weekend last year, 55 persons were killed in Texas accidents. Department of Public Safety records indicate the deaths were almost evenly divided between city streets and rural highways.

The most prevalent type of collision last July 4th involved only one vehicle.

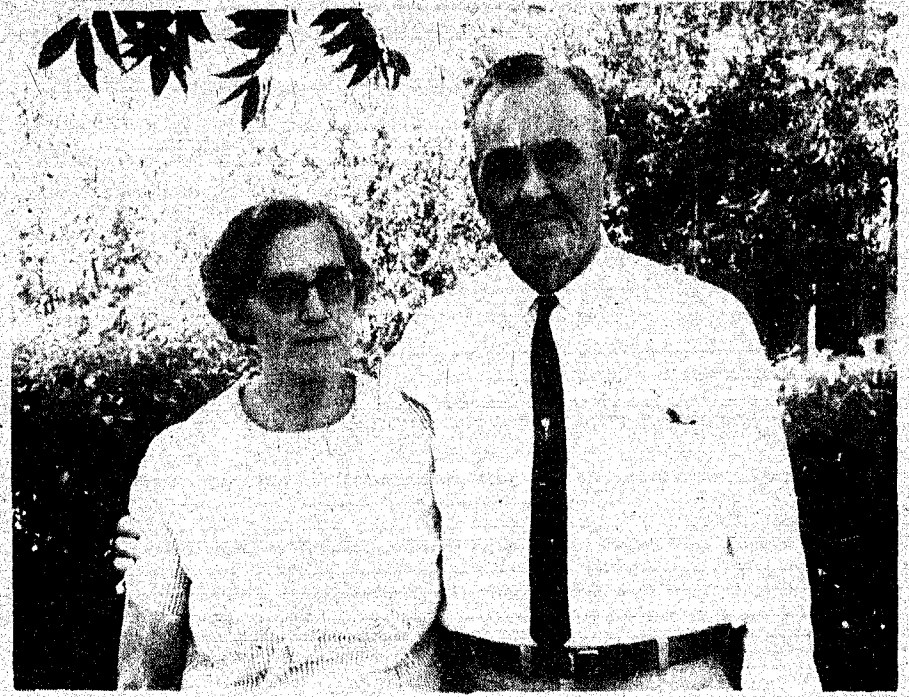

Medicare Rates Upped

Monthly premiums on the medical insurance of Medicare will go up starting July 1.

The basic premium rate will go from \$7.20 to \$7.70 a month, according to Don Austin, Social Security Manager in Brownwood.

Medicare medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses and is funded by individual premiums and Federal general revenues. The protection is offered to people 65 or over, to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more, and to many people under 65 with permanent kidney failure.

The Medicare law requires an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program. However the law also limits any increase in the basic premium rate to the percentage that Social Security benefit payments increased in the previous year. Social Security payments increased 6.4 percent in 1976, so the Medicare medical insurance basic premium rate was limited to an increase of 6.4 percent starting July 1--to \$7.70 a month. The premium is about one-third the cost of this protection. The Federal Government pays the remainder from general revenues.

People 65 and over who aren't eligible for Social Security benefits can get Medicare hospital insurance by paying a monthly premium if they also sign up for the medical insurance, Austin said.

The hospital insurance premium rate is based on the average monthly cost of this protection. Starting July 1, this rate will also increase.

Over 24 million people have one or both parts of Medicare.

For information on Medicare, people may meet with a representative of the Brownwood office who visits in Santa Anna every Wednesday. The representative may be found at the Mountain City Center from 9 to 12 on Wednesday.

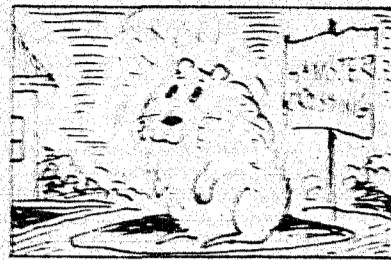
