Santa Anna Native Receives IBM Honor

A Santa Anna native, Thomas H. Simpson, 41, has recently been named an IBM Fellow for his contributions to the company. He is manager of systems services and development with IBM at White Plains, N. Y.

At the awards banquet at New York City's Waldorf Astoria Hotel last month, Simpson was honored as a technical leader and conceptual pioneer in the field of computer systems programming. His design of a multi-task operating system for NASA's IBM computers was vital to the ultimate success of the Saturn-Apollo space program. Subsequently he created a version of the NASA system, known as HASP which helped make IBM a leader in the field of high-speed batch remote job entry.

Simpson is the second employee of the division to receive that honor since the program began in 1963.

As an IBM Fellow, Simpson will be able to select and work on projects within his field for a

Banister Collection Open At Fort Concho Museum

A new exhibit opened recently at the Fort Concho Museum in San Angelo arranged from items donated by Mrs. C. D. Bruce of Santa Anna and Grady Banister of Burnet, children of the late Mrs. John R. (Emma) Banister. The large group of Indian artifacts and historical materials were from the collection of Mrs. Banister, secured during her many years in Coleman County.

It was Mrs. Banister's wish that the collection remain in West Central Texas where most were collected.

The Banister collection was arranged and displayed by Carol Schmidt of the Museum staff and is located in the Headquarters Building at the historic Fort. More items of the collection will be added later to the display or put with other displays in the six buildings housing historical items at the Fort site.

Prominently displayed is one of Mrs. Banister's most prized items, a beaded 'Prince Albert' coat, moccasins, armlets or leggings and a medicine bag which were found in a cave in Mason County in 1872 after an Indian raid. They have previously been exhibited at the University of Texas Museum in Austin and the Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio. Another group of objects

in the new display include materials found in a shelter cave along the Devil's River near the Rio Grande. These include a woven mat and sandal fragments, cordage, possible paint brushes, remnants of a shell necklace and a fire stick.

Other interesting Indian artifacts include ceramic bowls found in Coleman County, a bow from a San Saba County cave, and a wide variety of 'arrow points', drills, scrapers and other lithic tools and ornaments.

Objects included with the historical materials are an early Spanish cruciform stirrup found in San Saba County and a portion of the early wood dam built in 1756 at the Mission San Luis de las Amarillas near Menard. Numerous small ranching implements were also in the collection as well as tapestries, a dress and crocheted coat and accompanying accessories.

Of particular interest to the Museum are the military artifacts such as U. S. stamped tin cups, bits, stirrups and canteens.

The late Mrs. Banister was a school teacher who moved from Dallas County to Coleman County in the early 1890s. She married John R. Banister in 1894. He had been a trail driver, Texas Ranger and the first Chief Field Inspector

for the Cattlemen's Association. He also served as a special agent for the Treasury Department along the Mexican Border.

In 1914 Banister was elected Sheriff of Coleman County, serving until his death. Mrs. Banister was appointed Sheriff at his death, the first woman to hold that position.

She became interested in archaeology and anthropology in her later years and collected thousands of items. Her home in Santa Anna was a museum within itself during her lifetime and she enjoyed sharing and showing her collection. She was also active in civic and community work.

Joining the group for the official opening of the new collection Friday, July 1, were Stephen Schmidt, museum director, Carol Schmidt and others from the staff and several members of the Museum Board. Local people present were Mrs. C. D. Bruce and Mrs. Tom Kingsbery.

In these meetings there are programs for all ages from younger cradle roll to senior young people, and sermons and lecture sessions for the adults.

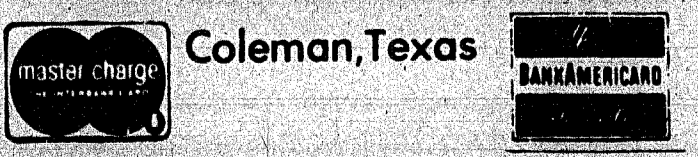

Older Texans' Jobs Available Through TFU Job Program

Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb, a job opportunity program for rural residents 55 years of age or older, will begin operating soon in Coleman County.

The purpose of the program, sponsored by Texas Farmers Union and funded through the Department of Labor, is to employ rural elderly to work in community betterment and conservation projects for non-profit organizations.

Currently Green Thumb projects operate in 36 counties throughout Texas. Green Thumbs are placed as individual workers who serve as homeaides, van drivers for Senior Citizen transportation programs, telephone reassurance callers, assistants in Title 7 nutrition programs, Senior Citizens hostesses, librarians, museum attendants, and in numerous other social service activities. Most counties have a Green Thumb crew which works throughout the county in improvement projects such as repairs for public schools, weatherization of homes belonging to rural elderly, public park improvements and other useful community projects working for both county and city governments.

Green Thumb workers are paid a minimum wage for a 20 to 24 hour week. Residents of Coleman County over the age of 55 with a farm or rural background and passing a physical examination, are eligible to apply. Green Thumb has served Texas for

seven years and operates in 36 counties. The program serves the rural elderly whose incomes are too low to meet the normal needs and whose job opportunities are limited.

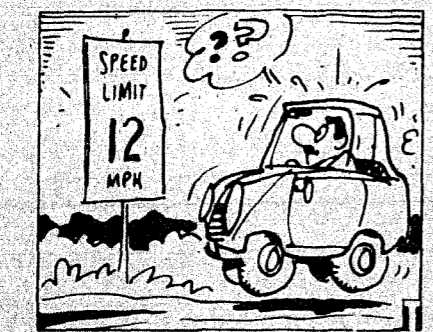

Oil Investment Co. of Fort Worth has completed the No. 2 O. B. Smith in the regular field five miles northeast of Santa Anna. Formerly the No. 1, the location is in the John M Rhine Survey 629.

Absolute open flow was 430,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 2,320 feet, total depth.

Crown Operating Co. of Dallas completed two wells in the Santa Anna (Marble Falls) Field. They are in the Howard Norris et al, 90 acre lease five miles east of Santa Anna.

The No. 1 Norris spots 2,090 feet from the south and 1,945 feet from the east lines of the Mary Ann Fisk Survey 630.

Absolute, open flow was 940,000 cubic feet of gas daily with a gas-liquid hydrocarbon

ratio of 110,000 - 1 of 38 gravity. The total depth was 2,610 feet plugged back to 2,490 feet.

Site for the No. 2 Norris is in the same survey. It had an absolute, open flow of 125,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Sigmar Corp. of San Antonio has staked the No. 1 Derryberry in the regular field three miles east of Santa Anna.

The planned 2,400-foot venture is on a 10-acre lease in the John Gray Survey 662.

Texzona Oil & Gas Inc. of Abilene will drill on the Jones-Kelly Estate one mile southwest of Santa Anna in the William Doran Survey 666. The well is a proposed 2,990 wildcat.

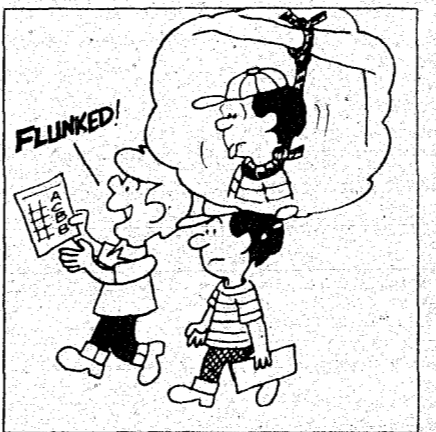
