Grain Harvest Underway Here

The best grain harvest in several years is underway in our area, with the local grain elevator open from early morning to almost midnight each day. More grain was received here the first four days of the harvest than during the entire season last year. Grain in the area should be harvested within three weeks if the weather remains favorable.

Grain was first brought in to the local elevator Thursday of last week, and a steady stream of trucks and trailers have arrived at Central Texas Grain Co. Both elevators are in operation with one handling oats and the other wheat.

Oats are yielding up to 60 bushels per acre with the average being about 40. Quality is good to above average. Wheat is averaging from 18 - 20 bushels per acre with the best at 30.

Early this week the price of oats was \$1 per bushel and wheat was bringing \$1.95. This is down considerably from the \$1.70 for oats and \$3.50 for wheat that farmers received last year.

Grain bought locally is shipped by rail to Fort Worth for sale and export.

Brady Jail Escapees Captured on Monday

The two jail escapees for whom a massive search was held last week were back behind bars Monday after eight days of freedom. McCulloch County officers captured the pair and had them back in the Brady jail which has undergone repairs to prevent further escape.

Jimmy Henderson, 19, of Olton was the first of the two to be apprehended early Monday when he made the mistake of hitching a ride with a sheriff's deputy on Highway 377 (Brownwood-Brady) north of Brady. Mark Duncan, 19, of Dimmitt was seen at the time and captured later near the Placid Community.

The two were reported to have been in the area since their escape, eating wild game they shot and food stolen from a ranch house. McCulloch County Sheriff Bill Strickland said the two young men were in good condition when captured.

The search for the two centered in the Rockwood-Whon area early last week with Coleman County officers spending several days in the search.

The two gained their freedom Sunday, May 22, by crawling through a ventilation shaft at the Brady Jail. Two other prisoners also escaped but were apprehended later the same day near Brady.

Service Group Gives Aid To Disaster Sites

The past two years have been unprecedented in human history in the number and intensity of earthquakes, according to Mrs. John Hart, Community Service Center leader.

'SAWS', the Seventh-day Adventist World Center, is a channel for providing quick disaster aid. The Santa Anna Church, along with other churches, took up a collection for that purpose. They also process used clothing to be sent to the warehouse in Watsonville, California to be in readiness for any disaster anywhere.

The disastrous earthquake in Romania in March was followed by a request from the Romanian Embassy for assistance. Within a day, SAWS presented a check for \$50,000 to purchase medicines and medical supplies. Ambassador Nicolae received the check.

In 1976 SAWS provided help to victims of natural and man-made disasters in Guatemala, the Philippines, Lebanon, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Chili, Peru, and more than a dozen other places.

Judging from the experience of the past few months, earthquakes will become an increasing hazard in much of the world, and SAWS will be there to help.

Screwworms In S-Saba Co.

MISSION.... James Kuykendall collected San Saba County's first known 1977 screwworm sample May 20 from the navel of a calf ten miles west of Cherokee.

This is the 20th known 1977 Texas screwworm case, according to Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows Jr., director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program. By May 24 of 1976 the state's screwworm case count totalled 1755.

THE San Saba County case is 100 miles northwest of the two cases which were collected on a Guadalupe County ranch near Staples May 12 and 14. A screwworm case was treated in Kinney County May 9; two in Terrell County May 13 and 14. Dr. Meadows says this wide spread of cases is a good warning that at least some native screwworm flies are active in the hill country and central Texas.

Meadows urges livestock owners to watch animals closely for signs of infestations. Samples of any worms found in wounds should be sent to the lab for identification.

He explains that efforts will be made to treat every reported case with sterile flies. Female flies mate only once in their lives.

Eggs produced after a mating with a sterile male will not hatch. When enough sterile to fertile matings occur screwworm populations eventually die out.

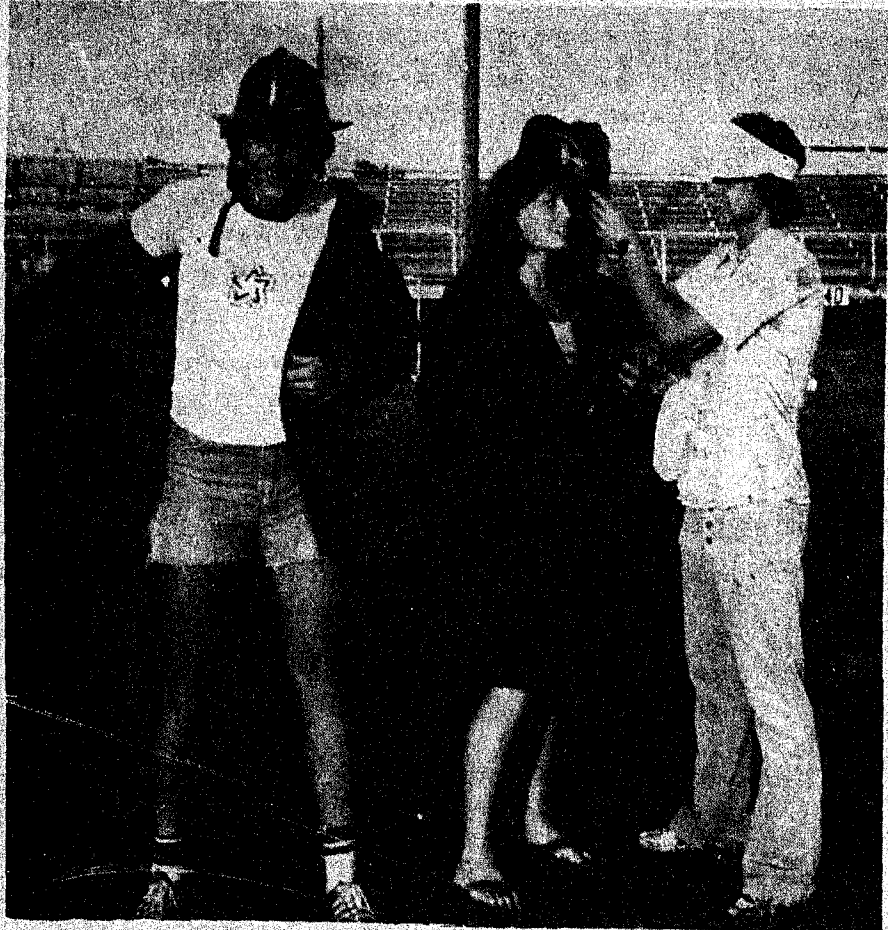

Frontier Life Related In Library Book

In honor of National Library Week, a copy of "The Golden Land" by Crystal Sasse Ragsdale has been presented to the Santa Anna City Library. The copy has been placed in the local library by Alice G. K. Kleberg and the King Ranch family of Kingsville, who sincerely hope the volume of living Texas History will be of interest and value to local readers, young and old.

The first copy was presented to the Texas State Library and formally accepted by Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director and librarian. In addition, the Kleberg Fund sent copies to each public and academic library in Texas and to outstanding Western Americana collections throughout the United States.

"The Golden Free Land" is a collection of personal narratives of ten pioneer Texas women who related their experiences of living on the Texas frontier from 1832 to 1880. Although each of the women speaks in her own words, Mrs. Ragsdale has carefully annotated the selections.

Women who speak in the volume include Louise Ernst Stohr, the first German woman settle in Texas who lived at Industry in Austin County; Caroline Ernst von Roeder von Hinueber of Industry and Yorktown, daughter of Fritz and Louise Ernst, founders of Texas' first German settlement; Rosa von Roeder Kleberg of Cat Spring and DeWitt County, matriarch of the King Ranch family; Augusta E. Wiegaffe of Comal County, daughter of Rev. Louis Ervendberg, pastor of the New Braunfels colony and founder of the first orphanage in Texas; and Louise Romberg Fuchs of Fayette and Burnet Counties, daughter of Johannes Romberg, early Texas poet.

Also included are Elise Willrich of Fayette County, wife of Carl Willrich, early Texas journalist; Ida Kapp of Sisterdale, wife of Dr. Ernst Kapp, scholar and political leader on the Texas frontier; Amanda von Rosenberg of Fayette County, wife of Ernst Altgelt, founder of the town of Comfort; and Mathilda Doebbler Gruen Wagner of Fredricksburg and San Antonio, frontier farmwife.

The Santa Anna City Library is open each Thursday afternoon from 3 to 5 p.m. where the new book and hundreds of others are available.

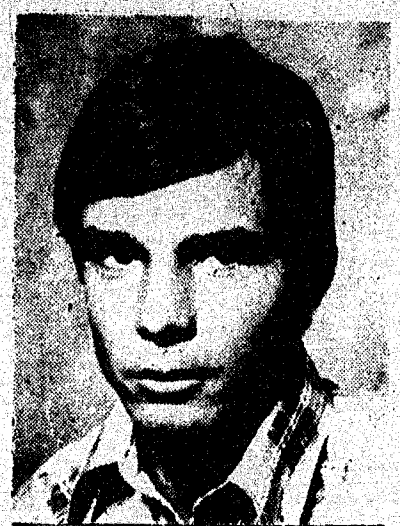
