An Additional Teacher To Be Hired At SAHS

The final budget for Santa Anna Independent School District for the current year was approved at the last meeting of the Board of Trustees, with the total to be \$528,000. All members of the Board were present for the meeting with Max Eubank presiding.

The bills and accounts for the month of August were reviewed and approved for payment. The \$11,639 figure included \$3,000 for new stadium seats, \$1,800 for a copy machine, and a large amount for instructional and janitorial supplies for the new school year.

Supt. R. C. Smith was authorized to hire an additional teacher for high school to relieve the class load for the present faculty. The school is eligible for an additional state-funded teacher based on the increase in enrollment.

Approval was given for an improvement project at the old gymnasium with siding to be installed later this year. The

County Fair Events Are Announced

The 1977 Coleman County Fair will be held Saturday, October 1, and promises to be the best in history. Besides the usual booths and exhibits by merchants and organizations, there will be a number of food booths, children's entertainment and activities and the popular women's division for exhibits and displays.

A new activity this year is a cake decorating contest for amateurs to be held at the Recreation Building on the Fair grounds at 1 p.m. that afternoon. Contestants in the youth and adult divisions will decorate their cakes on the premises and be judged at that time. A plaque and ribbons will be awarded winners in the contest.

Other divisions for the women's division include antiques, art, ceramics, plants, hobbies, home canning, knitting and crochet, needlecrafts, senior citizen crafts, grandparents brag contest and 4-H demonstrations.

Those wishing to enter exhibits in the fair are to have them at the Recreation Building at the fairgrounds between 8 and 9:15 a.m. that morning. They must be picked up by 6 p.m. that afternoon.

The County Fair is attended by hundreds of people each year and is a very popular event in the area.

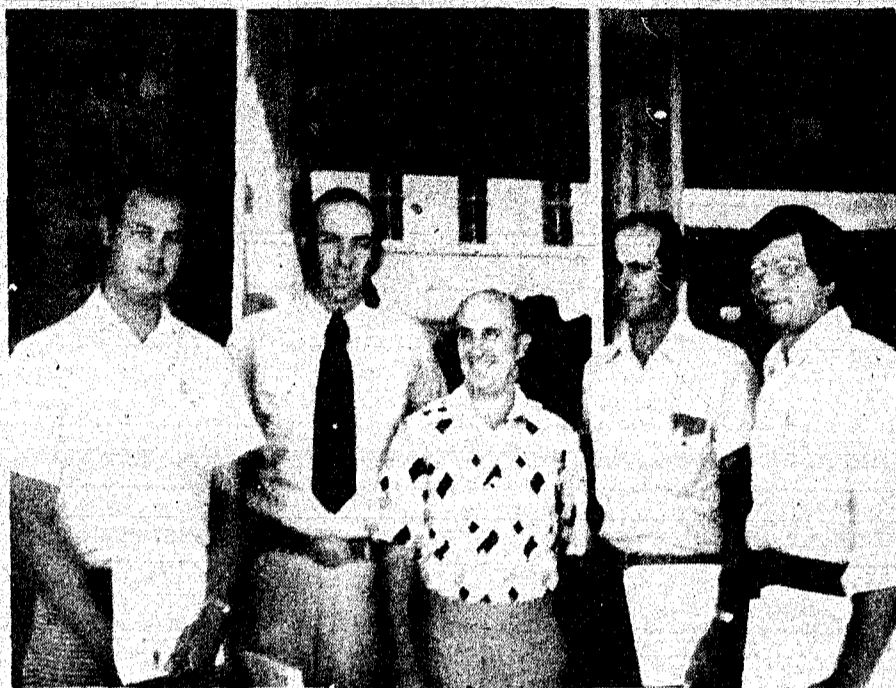
Ken Bowker, SAHS Principal, was named 'Booster of the Week' at the last meeting and will be a special guest of the team Friday night.

S-Anna 'Second Friday' To Start In October

What is purported to rival Canton's widely-known 'First Monday' is to start next month with Santa Anna 'Second Friday', a weekend trades and flea market at the west edge of town.

Jessie Dority of Bangs and her husband have purchased the 16-acre Hays property bounded by the Coleman Highway and Santa Fe Railroad, just at the San Angelo overpass, and are developing the site for the monthly flea market and are now enlisting exhibitors for the big event.

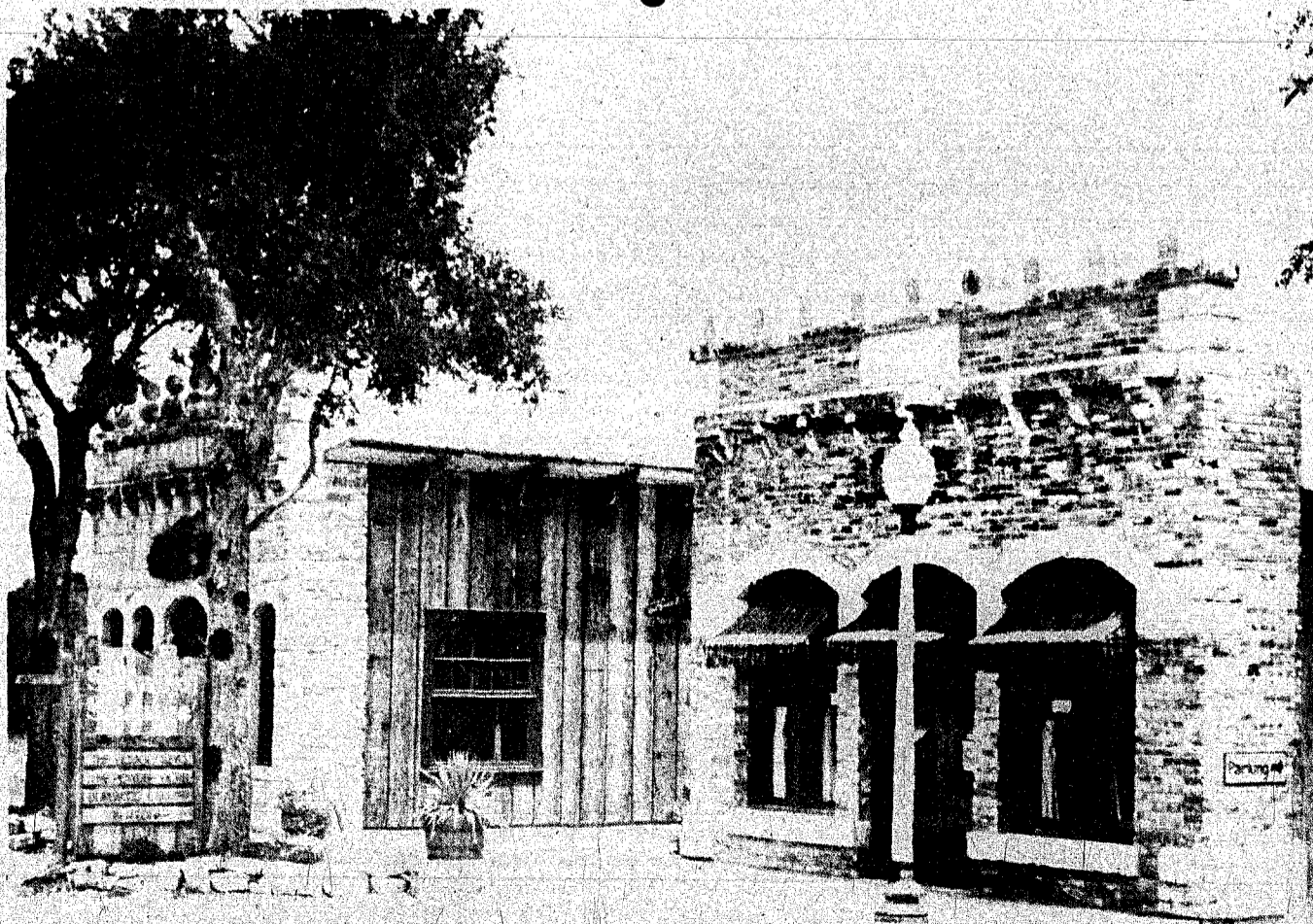
According to the Doritys, over 50 dealers and exhibitors have indicated they will be on hand for the first event October 14 - 16. The spaces at the site are available to anyone wishing to set up sales or exhibits, and charge for the spaces for three days is \$12. There is no admission charge to the grounds that will be

open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. Exhibitors may setup displays on Thursday, October 13, at no extra charge.

A number of area antique dealers will have booths at the event, and antique cars are to be on exhibit that weekend. Food concessions will be at the location during the weekend. Space for a craft booth from Ranger Park Inn nursing home has been donated, and all local exhibitors and dealers have a special invitation to show their wares.

According to Mrs. Dority, there are no weekend flea markets of this sort in the immediate area, and good crowds are expected to be on hand, especially after the monthly event is more widely known. Two Are Sought For '37 Reunion

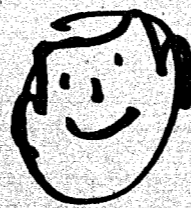
A reunion for the Santa Anna High School Class of 1937 has been planned during the October 14 - 15 homecoming, and all but two members of the group have been notified of the get-together.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

Early-day Buildings Restored

Rock and Brick Facades Add Charm to Salado Site

(The following story is from the Monday, August 29, issue of Waco TIMES HERALD).

SALADO - First you buy two old turn-of-the-century stone and brick store fronts.

Then you decide what to do with them.

This, says J. Bryant Reeves, is the order in which a dedicated collector operates.

What Reeves and his business associates, Darwin Britt and Lonnie Edwards, did with the two old store fronts they bought was to move them from their original location on the main street of Santa Anna out in West Texas, to Salado in Central Texas, and convert them into a unique specialty shopping center.

The hand-carved stone finials and brackets, along with the carefully fitted hand-cut arches over windows and doors, bring the new shopping center into complete harmony with this historical old village and its sparkling tree-lined creek.

Already open for business in the shopping center called Salado Square, are a shop featuring furniture and decorative items from redwood burls from the West Coast; an art gallery and antique shop; an antique shop specializing in nautical and marine items; an antique gun and weapon shop which also has handcrafted articles of wood, leather goods and hand-woven fabrics.

Soon to open in the center will be a shop specializing in handmade jewelry and paintings and drawings; and a restaurant to serve fine foods.

Reeves was raised on a ranch not far from Santa Anna and had seen the two old buildings all his life. They used to be stores. But in recent years they had been allowed to run down and stood vacant. He feared they would soon be demolished.

He got Britt and Edwards to go in with him, and they decided to buy the old store fronts.

Reeves said they spent many hours planning how to use the store fronts.

Britt is an experienced restoration planner. He left a position with International Business Machines in Virginia four years ago, moved to Salado, bought the historic old Barton House, which is built of native stone, and restored it. Reeves is an artist, art teacher and a consultant in restoration of old buildings. Edwards is also an artist, former art teacher, a sculptor specializing in bronze and wrought iron, and can build nearly anything with his hands. He works at a studio-shop with artist Forrest Gist at the old Stinnett Mill on nearby Salado creek.

Reeves, Britt and Edwards formed a corporation and built the 6,000 square-foot shopping center with an investment of about \$250,000.

Before dismantling the store fronts, they photographed them, numbered each stone and numbered its place on enlarged photographs so they could be reassembled exactly as they had been in Santa Anna.

Reeves said the row of stone finials on the tops of the store fronts were hand-carved from limestone slabs hauled down from the Santa Anna Mountains, which form a spectacular backdrop to the little West Texas town. He said a man named T. T. Perry chiseled the finials, the curved brackets and the carefully fitted keystone arches for windows and doors.

'He was a kind of sculptor in his own right', said Reeves.

'We couldn't bear the thought of these buildings' not being used again. We could have sold bits and pieces of them -- but we wanted to preserve them as an art form,' said Reeves.

The buildings were also well-known to Edwards. He is from Plainview. While serving at Fort Hood in the Army he made many trips between Plainview and Ft. Hood, passing through Santa Anna, and often admired the two buildings.

They seemed to fit in with

Salado as well as they did with Santa Anna.

Salado was settled in the 1850s and became an important stopping place for stagecoaches running between Austin and Waco. It was also an educational center, with Salado College and famed Thomas Arnold High School attracting students from a wide area. Stone ruins of the college are still there.

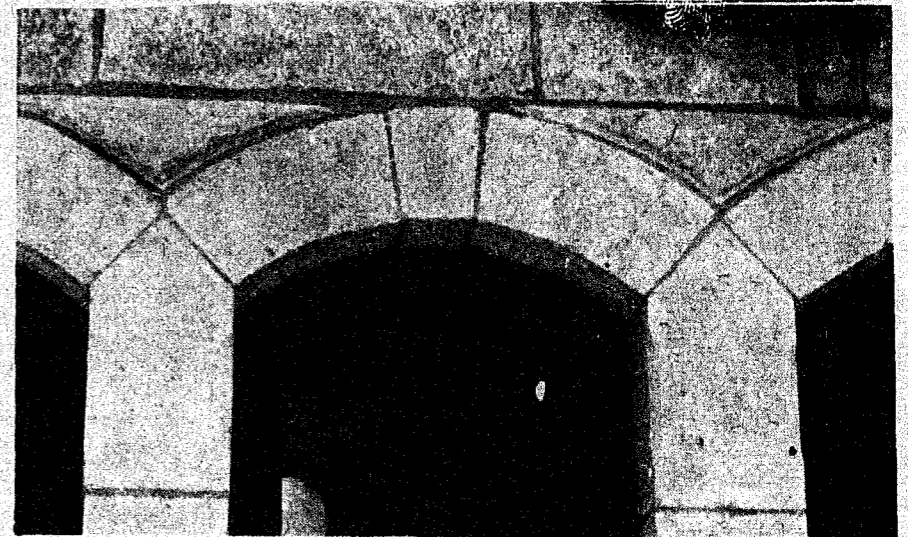
The Stagecoach Inn, where in the old days travelers ranging from Sam Houston to Sam Bass stopped, is still a famed eating place for people driving along Interstate Highway 35, which parallels and often coincides with the stagecoach route.

Other attractions in the present Salado are art galleries, a museum, antique shops and a high fashion dress shop.

Reeves said that 16 years ago he came to Salado as consultant for the restoration of the native stone building that became the Grace Jones Dress Shop and Thomas Wilkes' Antique Shop, and that he has loved the little village ever since.

'We hope using these old stone store fronts in Salado Square will set a standard for future development of Salado,' said Reeves.

Behind the stone and brick store fronts are the shops and soon-to-be restaurant, all opening into a bricked courtyard. The southeast corner of the courtyard is open. This opening and an opening in the west side allow the prevailing southeast breeze to come through, Britt explains.

Material for the structures behind the store fronts came from a wide area. Most of it is salvaged material. Some timbers came from old buildings in Waco, some from Temple. Bricks from the courtyard came from buildings demolished in Cameron's urban renewal program.

The Salado Square shops are of 'post and beam' construction. Siding is of vertical two-inch pine, some of it 14 inches wide. Floors are also of salvaged pine, some floor boards going 16 inches wide. They are two inches thick.

Reeves said they bought a number of poles that once supported the telegraph line that ran from Alpine to the Army post at old Fort Davis. He said they may use them to build some kind of arbor at Salado Square.

Salado Square, along with the Stagecoach Inn, the dress shop,

the other art galleries and antique shops, the museum and pretty Salado Creek, make this little village a welcome refuge from the busy interstate highway.

Inside its quiet shops and airy courtyard you can hardly hear the honking horns and roaring engines along the highway a few hundred yards away.

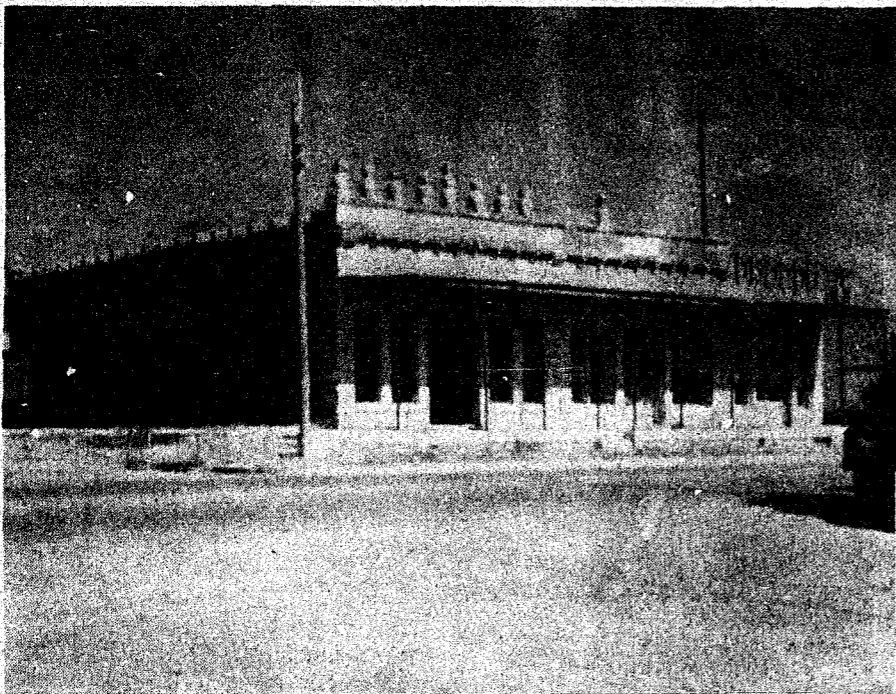
The breakfast was served at round tables for six in the game room of the Bruce home. Flowered cloths were used, and centerpieces were of liatrice and daisy mums.
