Food give-away slated for Tuesday

Cheese and butter will be given away to those who have previously registered on Tuesday, May 29 from 1 to 5 p.m. at City Hall in Santa Anna.

According to a spokesman for the city, those who have registered for the free food should bring a sack in which to carry the goods. The city

official also said that those who have registered are guaranteed the food, and it is not on a first-come, first served basis. Therefore, if the building is crowded when you arrive, you should come back at another time, and there is no need to wait in a long line outside. Everyone who registered, the official said, will get his or her food.

In police report: School burglary probe

Chief of Police Russ Ellis completed a 360 hour Basic Law Enforcement Training program last week in Abilene. Mr. Ellis attended the 9-week course at the West Texas Central Council of Governments Law Academy. Mr. Ellis said his attendance to the academy was necessary because the State of Texas did not accept his certification from Colorado when he moved here last year. He said he was pleased for having attended the academy because of the many changes in the law in recent years. He feels the refresher course will greatly benefit him and in turn, the citizens of Santa Anna, as he continues his attempt to improve the quality of law enforcement in this city.

Chief Ellis reports two arrests over the weekend. A 20 year old Santa Anna man was jailed for Driving While License Suspended, and a 28 year old Santa Anna man was arrested for assault.

The Coleman County Sheriff's Department, along with Mr. Ellis, is continuing the investigation into a burglary of the Santa Anna High School earlier this month. Mr. Ellis said that numerous items were taken, the value amounting to approximately \$800. Two other burglaries are still under investigation also. H & H Grocery was entered by breaking a front door. A quantity of cigarettes, candy, and other items were taken. The Boy Scouts room at the Armory was entered and a 9 x 10 foot canvass tent, valued at \$175, was taken. Mr. Ellis said all three burglaries occurred about two weeks ago.

Chief Ellis reminded residents of the upcoming Memorial Day Holiday weekend. He said this is the traditional start of the summer vacations and that more motorists than usual will be passing through town. He urges residents to be extra cautious this weekend on the city streets.

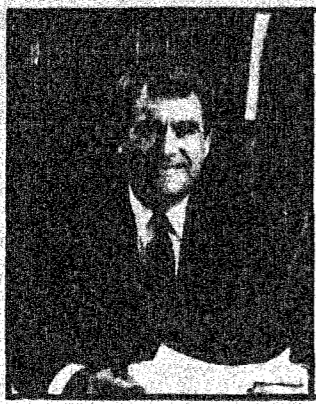

'TIME-SHARING' A COMMON LURE

My office has received numerous complaints about a form of vacation land ownership known as "time-sharing." Under most time sharing plans, the consumer buys the right to use a condominium or camping space in a resort area for one or two weeks a year for a fixed number of years or a lifetime.

TYPES OF COMPLAINTS

My Consumer Protection Division has received complaints both about the way consumers are lured into sales presentations and about the actual contracts signed by consumers.

Some promotional companies engage in deception to get people to come to their lengthy, high pressure sales talks. For example you may receive a phone call telling you that you are the winner of a gas grill, a grandfather clock, or a free trip to the Caribbean. In order to collect your prize, however, you must attend a sales pitch for the time-sharing company.

Consumers who have attended these presentations have often been disappointed in the quality of the free gifts they received. In addition, they learn that the big prizes are rarely given out.

While this sort of tactic makes consumers angry, it is very difficult to file suit over a free gift. When the consumer has not purchased or leased a product, he is not protected under our state's Consumer Protection Act.

Of course, the Act does protect consumers who are injured by misrepresentations which lead them to buy or lease the time-share.

MISREPRESENTATIONS

We have found that there are a number of misrepresentations that are commonly found in time sharing presentations. For example, the resale value of the time-share and the ease of reselling is often overstated. If you are interested in the resort itself and want to spend many future vacation hours there, then it may be a good plan for you. However, time-shares are generally not a good investment vehicle.

In addition, we find that salespersons frequently will misrepresent the exchange options available to consumers. Many time-share contracts are bought by consumers who think they will have no trouble exchanging a condominium on Lake X for a Swiss chalet.

Later, when it comes time to exchange, the consumer learns that he can only trade for certain other locations or that technical reasons have excluded him from the time-share bank.

The consumer may also be disappointed if he fails to determine what season he will be allowed to use his time-share. Some consumers have purchased time-shares at lowered cost only to learn that their share was only available during an off-season month.

Coleman Co. not among brucellosis free counties

About one third of the counties in Texas, 76 to be exact, are free of Brucellosis, figures from the Texas Animal Health Commission reveal, although Coleman County is not among them.

Coleman County is in Class C Area of Texas, and three herds among the 320 herds in the county are presently quarantined, according to Kirby Vanover, County Extension Agent.

Most of the counties free of the disease are in the Class B Area of Texas, which contains 141 counties in the western half of the state. In Class B, there are 72 counties free of brucellosis, which is more than half of the Class B area.

Four counties are free of the disease in the Class C Area which is the eastern half of the state made up of 113 counties. The four counties free of the disease in Class C are Marion, Newton, McMullen, and Jim Hogg.

In the Class B Area, there are almost 60,000 cattle herds; of that number only 145 are under quarantine.

In the Class C Area, there are more than 102,000 cattle herds of that number 1,710 are under quarantine. Social Security now due from exempt employee

Salaried employees of tax-exempt organizations, including charitable, religious and educational groups, are now required to pay social security taxes, the Internal Revenue said. The Social Security Amendments of 1983 require all such employees to pay these taxes, beginning January 1, 1984. Previously there was no such requirement, the IRS said, unless the employer had specifically requested that its employees be covered by social security.

Employees of organizations that are tax exempt under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(3) who earn at least \$100 a year are subject to social security tax on earnings, the IRS said. Employees will have 6.7 percent of their salary withheld at the same time the federal income tax is withheld. This amount

should be reflected, along with other deductions from the employees' paychecks, on the employees' regular payroll slips. The total withheld will be shown on the Forms W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, which should be furnished to all employees in January, following the end of the tax year.

The employer is required to contribute 7 percent to the social security fund for each employee. The employer reports to the government quarterly the total of 13.7 percent of wages for each employee. These percentages are set by law and may vary from year to year, the IRS said.

Social security is separate from income tax and these payments go into a special fund that provides for a federal system of old age, survivors, disability, and hospital insurance. There is an annual limitation or "cap" on social security withholding, the IRS said. Once compensation reaches \$37,800 (the "cap" for 1984), the withholding stops.

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Mesquite can be controlled

Because of a long-standing interest in brush control for water conservation purposes, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is helping to spread the latest developments in mesquite control at this timely season of the year for spraying.

Texas Tech Research Scientists B. E. Dahl and R. E. Sasbee have learned that ranchers can obtain from 50 to 75 percent mesquite root kill with chemical sprays. Application of herbicides are most effective during the plant growth cycle when carbohydrates are being translocated to the root and basal bud zone of the plant. This event occurs 42 to 63 days after budbreak and again 72 to 84 days after budbreak. If budbreak occurs on April 15, then the best time to spray would be between June 3 and June 17 and between June 28 and July 7. If the soil temperature at a 12-inch depth is over 75 degrees, (preferably 80 or higher) root-kill exceeding 50 to 75 percent can often be obtained provided the treatment occurs during the high carbohydrate translocation period.

Numerous herbicides, formulations and rates have been studied. Types of aircraft and application equipment as well as total spray volume and swath width have received a great deal of attention. Yet the average root kill remained consistently 20 to 25 percent statewide with a longevity of the treatment averaging less than seven years until this research breakthrough occurred. Although few herbicides are used to control mesquite, Dahl and Sasbee found that when one herbicide was effective, usually others were effective and vice versa. The effectiveness of all herbicides seems to be governed by carbohydrate translocation in the plant and soil temperature.

One benefit of mesquite control is increase of carrying capacity of pastures, from one-half to three animal units on the same acreage as previously supported one animal unit. The actual increase will depend on the degree of mesquite infestation at the time of the treatment. This type of increased production should provide tremendous economic benefits to local ranchers and their communities. Longer term benefits are a reduction of soil erosion, increased recharge to ground water aquifers and increased wildlife production. Springs which have dried up as a result of heavy infestation reappear and flow again after a mesquite control program.

Lost tax checks can be replaced

Sometimes circumstances occur which indicate that a taxpayer's Federal tax refund check may be lost or stolen. If this occurs, a taxpayer may contact the Internal Revenue Service to take the necessary steps to retrieve the check or to have a replacement check issued.

When a refund check is overdue, usually after ten weeks have passed since the tax return was filed, a taxpayer should contact the IRS to inquire about the refund. The taxpayer will be asked several questions regarding the return by the IRS representative and should be prepared to verify the information.

While there are several reasons that might explain why a check hasn't been delivered to the taxpayer, common ones include returns that are incomplete or that have a signature missing. These returns are

Fee Increase In Effect For Parks

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced that user fees for most facilities in state parks will increase, effective May 1, 1984.

The daily entrance fee or \$2 per vehicle and the \$15 annual entrance permit will remain unchanged, officials said. The only exception will be at Big Spring State Recreation Area at Big Spring, where the entrance fee will rise from 50 cents per vehicle to \$1.

The overnight fee for standard campsites will increase from \$3 to \$4, and campsites with electricity from \$4 to \$6. Campsites with electricity and sewer connections will increase from \$5 to \$7, and screened shelters will be \$8 instead of the current \$6.50.

The state park system offers a wide range of facilities, including group shelters, recreation halls, auditoriums, group picnic areas, swimming pools, golf courses, fishing piers and a full-service hotel at Indian Lodge in Davis Mountains State Park. Fees for using most of these facilities will be increased, officials said.

Fees charged at the Texas State Railroad between Palestine and Rusk will not change, but lease charges for filming purposes and charter rates will increase.

Officials also noted that several important changes in the reservation system for overnight facilities also will be effective May 1.

I have joined the National Guard so I will go to basic training in August, then attend Angelo State University in the spring.

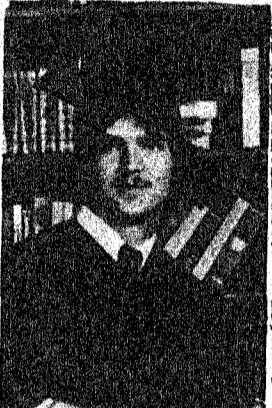
