Pour this around the base of the plant, being careful not to get any on the leaves. It is good to work bone meal and copperce around the roots of the plant. <br> To change the flower color, it requires a change in the soil Ph. or acidity. To change from pink to blue, use one fourth cup of sulfur around each three-foot plant. Spread it evenly over the soil surface just beyond the drip line back to the stem. Do not get the sulfur on the stem. <br> Lightly work it into the soil, not disturbing the root system. By making the soil more acid, you should get blue flowers. You may have to repeat each year. The first year may bring flowers that are between pink and blue or may be mixed.
