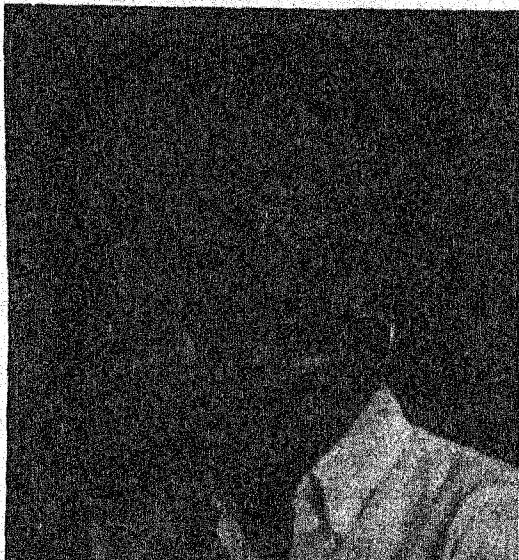

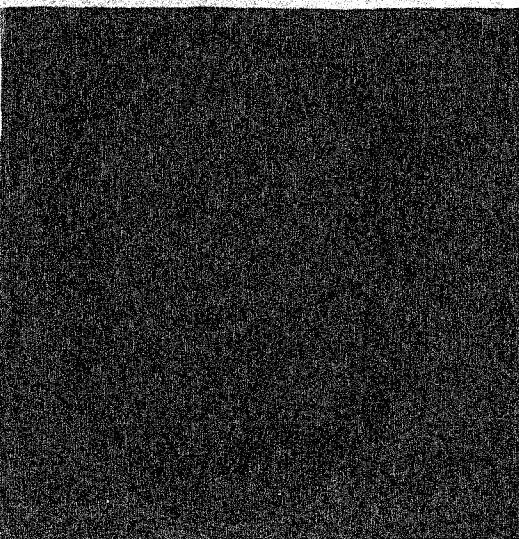

To end the week the cheerleaders sponsored a color and noise day as a prelude to the pep rally Thursday. The Junior High team defeated the Eden Bulldogs by a score of 42-26. Halftime activities included the announcement of the football sweetheart, Tammi Morrow, and the pep-squad beau, Reece McIver.

## Crime Prevention for Seniors

What does a burglar look for when he's looking for an easy target? Homes that present the least risk of detection and the greatest opportunity for easy entry, according to the information presented at a recent Green Thumb training seminar.

Over 100 Green Thumb workers from thirteen counties learned to look at their homes through a burglar's eyes when they met in Brownwood on October 9.

Homes that appear unoccupied and unprotected; homes without adequate locks and lighting; open or unlocked doors and windows; and home sites which provide easy concealment from neighbors and passing motorists wear 'Welcome Burglar' signs.

J. D. Chastain, formerly with the State of Texas, gave crime safety tips to participants and talked about the Regional Crime Lab.

Also on the program was Byron Sansom who talked to the group of seniors about changes in Social

Security.

State Green Thumb Director, Diane Parrish, talked with the group about administrative matters and presented a film from the Central Texas Chapter of the Red Cross that dealt with personal safety and fire prevention.

Green Thumb is an employment program for seniors that is sponsored by Farmers Union and funded by the Department of Labor under Title V of the Older Americans Act. Rural residents who are over 55 years of age and income eligible are hired by the program and placed with non-profit organizations where they provide services to their home communities. Green Thumb is an equal opportunity-affirmative acting employer.

Attending the session from Coleman County were Omil Slate, Gene McSwane, Letha Martin, all of Santa Anna and Myrtle Pepper, Dora Snodgrass, Lucille Gaston, Minnie Childress, Clarissa Story, Marjorie Harrell, Midge Coulter and Angel Hamm, sponsor, all of Coleman.

## Police Report

## City Council

The Santa Anna City Council met in special session on Monday, October 15th at 4:30 in the Mountain City Community Center.

Items on the agenda included acceptance of the budget and tax rate hearing.

Changes made in the budget included an explanation of transfers. After viewing the changes made in the budget since the last hearing, a motion was made to accept the budget. The motion died due to lack of a second.

Mayor Hartman explained that the city attorney and the city's accountant had been consulted and that their opinion was that the budget was sufficient as long as the transfers were explained.

The budget will go back to committee now for rework. The second item on the agenda was postponed until a later date.

## Get Ready for Halloween

For those of you who are getting ready for Halloween early, here are a few tips to remember.

High-spirited children excited about Halloween are rarely cautious during the big night out.

For this reason, a safe Halloween involves cooperation by parents, motorists, and homeowners to help prevent accidents, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Parents first should make sure their child has a safe costume. Cloth masks or entire head masks are dangerous because they can slip and block a child's vision or breathing. A good option is to paint a mask on the child's face with cosmetics or

grease paint.

Avoid loose-fitting costumes, which may catch on fences, bushes or other obstacles. Make sure the costume is not so long that the child can trip on it.

Dark costumes are difficult for motorists to see. If a child insists on one, use reflective tape or liquid 'paint' (available at hardware stores) that shines in the dark or reflects light. Put the tape or liquid on jack-o-lanterns, hats or bags that the youngster wears or carries.

Parents also should warn children not to eat the candy or fruit they receive until it is checked at home. If a party is held at a home,

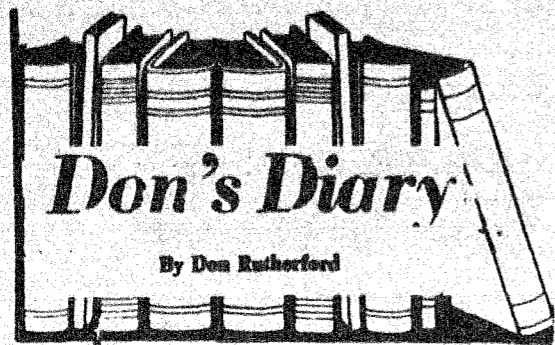
flameproof or fire-resistant materials should be used for costumes, caps and decorations.

Motorists can do their part by slowing down and driving with extra caution while in residential areas on Halloween.

Homeowners should light their property so youngsters do not trip over stairs or other obstacles. Lawn furniture and garbage cans should be put away and the garage locked.

Bring pets inside, for bands of noisy children may excite them. Cover any holes in the yard.

Following these common-sense suggestions will help ensure that children enjoy a fun-filled yet safe Halloween.

And what city or town for that matter isn't threatened by seemingly overwhelming crime and hurt. A city can take a lot of battle when inside its walls there is a river or a source of water. The river which the psalmist is speaking of is the Lord himself. The Lord is the river flowing to the people under pressure. He provides the life giving water to people surrounded by testing and trauma.

In verses 8-11, the psalmist speaks of our confidence in the future. For a better view of the future take time name but by God's eternal truth.

Because of our confidence in Christ we can endure the trials and tribulations of life. Hope is like a powerful generator giving us strength to stand tall in the face of evil and hardship.

For life to be full and have meaning we must have hope. Hope is not daydreams but a hope of glory that is born in God and moves beyond the shadow of today's hurts into the joy of being a child of God forever.

## POSTMASTER'S POINTERS

ANIMAL ATTACKS AND RABIES

An attack by any animal can be a frightening and painful experience. However, if that animal is a fur bearing animal such as a dog, cat, squirrel, fox, raccoon, skunk, or even a bat, there is also a risk of rabies—a disease which is usually transmitted to a human being by the bite of an infected animal, but also can be transmitted by coming in contact with the animal's saliva.

Recently, reported cases of rabies are increasing in many areas of the country, urban and rural areas alike. Citizens and safety and health personnel should be on the alert for reports issued by local health departments, follow the advice of local health officials, and routinely inform employees, especially delivery personnel, about prevention of and first aid for animal related injuries.

Citizens should be suspicious of any nocturnal animal that they come upon during the day. Avoid any animal that aimlessly runs around or walks as if dizzy; one that is snapping at people or objects; one that is foaming at the mouth (usually seen only in late stages); or one that has a tremendous thirst for water. A citizen who believes that an animal is rabid should report that information through supervisory channels to the proper law and health officials.

If you are bitten by or come in contact with a fur-bearing animal such as those described above, the following steps should be taken immediately.

1. Attempt to avoid further contact or injury.

2. Use animal repellent on an attacking animal if it may deter further attack. I have encouraged local merchants to acquire and keep the repellent on hand.

3. Retreat to a safe place. Wash the wound, preferably with soap and water, and rinse thoroughly.

4. Get medical attention immediately.

5. Remember the animal's description and location so it can be identified, captured and quarantined.

6. The incident should be promptly reported to law, animal control, and health officials. The Santa Anna Police Department assures me they respond to every call on leash law violations.

Remember that rabies is a viral infection of an animal's nervous system and is transmitted by saliva through bites, scratches, and, on rare occasions, by contacting contaminated parts of the animal's body. Avoidance of suspicious animals is the best prevention.

Recently a Texas rural carrier was attacked by a dog that jumped through her car window. She is presently going through reconstructive and cosmetic surgery. A Postman in San Angelo lost a finger involving a friendly dog attack a few months ago. You must keep your dog confined to a fence or a leash. It is the law. If you are attacked, it will be necessary for you to file charges. This will assist the Police department in eliminating the animal threat and prevent further attacks.

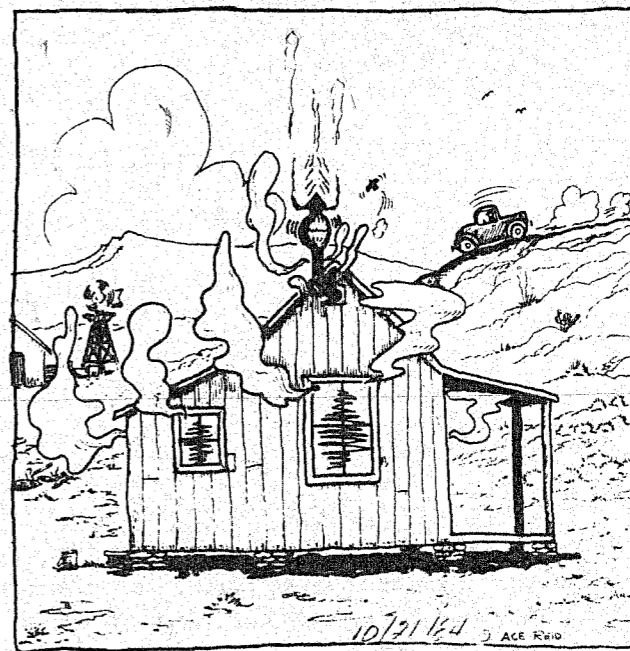

**Plant Place**

I wrote about repotting before bringing plants inside a few weeks ago. It's not too late to repot a plant that is root bound. Before bringing plants inside be sure to check for insects on the plant or in the soil. Wash dust from leaves. After bringing your plants inside you might discover different kinds of insects have invaded your plants. One of the most common is the soil gnat.

They say they won't do great harm to the plant, but they can damage the tender roots near the surface of the soil. You can rid the soil of these pests by putting malathion or seven dust in your soil. Just add to water, follow directions on label for mixing for spraying.

There are few plants that can survive without light of some kind. In fact, light is a most vital factor for the green plant. The plant goes through a period of adjustment from being brought back inside from cool shaded area. It has been accustomed to light through the summer months.

Insufficient care and improper light may result in yellow leaves or droppage of leaves or even complete loss of your plant. Most plants do best in medium to high light. The temperature is important to the care of the plants. It is very important not to get them too warm over a long period of time. Some plants can't tolerate gas heating. The room must have some ventilation.

Plants do better if the night temperature is lower than day temperature. Never place plants directly in front of heating or air conditioning vents. Over water or under water is the plants worse enemy. Consider size and type of plant, the stage of plant growth, the humidity, temperature, light, potting mixture, and air movement.

Do not over fertilize your inside plants. Plants in high light require more frequent fertilizing than those in low light. It will help to keep your plants free of dust by misting often and they love the moisture.
