Police Report

Allsup's Bandit Arrested

A 17 year old Santa Anna youth has been charged in the armed robbery of Allsup's store last week. The suspect, being held in the Coleman County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond, was placed under arrest at his residence by Deputy Mike Bowers. The arrest culminated an intensive joint investigation of the crime by the Santa Anna Police Department and the Coleman County Sheriff's Department.

Chief of Police Russ Ellis said the robbery occurred about 2 a.m. Monday when a man covered with a sheet threatened the clerk with a large knife and escaped with approximately \$100 in cash.

The investigation, which included an extensive search of the area and the interviewing of many people led the officers to the youth. Chief Ellis said the case against the youth will be presented to the grand jury within the next two weeks.

A Santa Anna man was discovered in the upstairs of a vacant house in the 1100 block of Bowie early Sunday afternoon. Chief Ellis said several girls, children of the house owners, entered the structure and were confronted by the man. They then ran home and Mr. Ellis was called. Ellis said the man apparently had stayed in the house overnight. The man was questioned by Mr. Ellis and the owner of the house, then release. Trespassing charges were not filed, but would be if the man returned, according to Mr. Ellis.

A severe electrical storm early Monday morning resulted in a house fire in the 300 block of Bowie. Chief Ellis said the pre-dawn blaze caused extensive fire and smoke damage to the frame structure.

Mr. Ellis said the occupants were apparently on vacation and no one was in the house. Chief Ellis noted that two vehicles ran across the

water hoses in the street while firemen were fighting the blaze. He said that it is a violation of the law to run over any fire hose, but that the greatest danger of such action is that it could result in damage to the hoses, preventing the firemen from saving someone's property and possessions or even their life. Mr. Ellis also said that sometimes the damage caused to the hoses can go undetected until the hose fails at a critical moment. He said the hoses are very expensive and would be difficult for the volunteer fire department to replace. Mr. Ellis reminds motorists to use caution in approaching a fire scene and to detour around if fire hoses are in the street. The hoses may be needed to save your life someday.

Chief Ellis said the storm, which dumped heavy rains in the area, also triggered a flash flood across US 84-67 approximately 5 miles east of Santa Anna at about 3 a.m. Mr. Ellis and Deputy Bowers directed traffic through the resulting debris for an hour and a half. The state highway department arrived with a large roadgrader to clear the tree trunks and limbs off the roadway.

Heavy traffic was noted in Santa Anna over the labor day weekend, Chief Ellis said, however, no accidents were reported. He said the holiday was very quiet, overall.

was a Thursday,' said Brister. 'The next day we went to an all-day track meet. It was a real learning experience.'

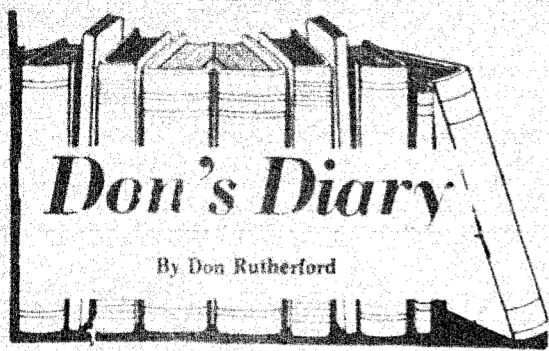
Brister said that initial experience working with junior high kids convinced her that she wanted to coach that age children.
