### POSTMASTER'S POINTERS

It's only two months away from Christmas. Have you given any thought to your Christmas mailings?

Each year the Postal Service spends many dollars to advertise the 'Mail Early Campaign'. Your cooperation in mailing early not only allows the Postal Service to adjust to the large increase in mail but assures you that your presents will be under the tree before Christmas Day.

Start saving packing materials before you start wrapping gifts. Don't short sell yourself by mailing articles that are fragile and have poor packing. Wadded up newspaper is good packing. Popcorn is also good packing for the most fragile gifts.

Please don't use string to tie your packages. It can get caught in the mechanized sorting equipment that the Postal Service uses. Filament tape wrapped the full length of the parcel, both ways will hold it secure. Scotch tape is great for wrapping presents for your tree, but don't use it for mailing.

Bring your parcels to the Post Office before you seal them and get our advice on proper packing. Remember, don't use mailing labels. Write directly on the parcel with a felt tip pen. Put that mailing label in the package in case the address becomes smeared.

Don't mail liquid in bottles, guns, drugs, explosives, or animals (dead or alive) without checking with your Postmaster.

Have a safe Halloween. If the candy is not individually wrapped, throw it away. If the wrapper is loose, throw it away. If you don't know the residents of the home, don't go there.

The Postal Service wishes to give the Santa Anna News a special thanks for allowing Postmaster's Pointers to appear in the paper each week. Santa Anna News, another local merchant, shop locally, it's good business.

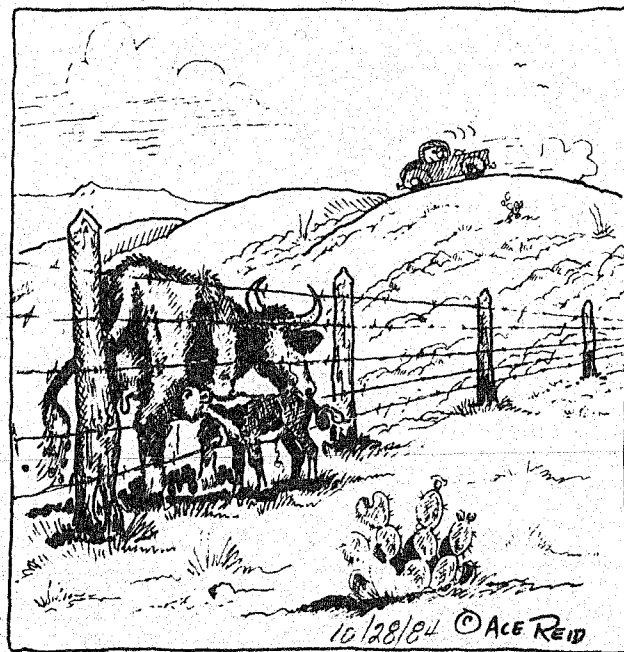

**Quilt for Florida The Starfish**

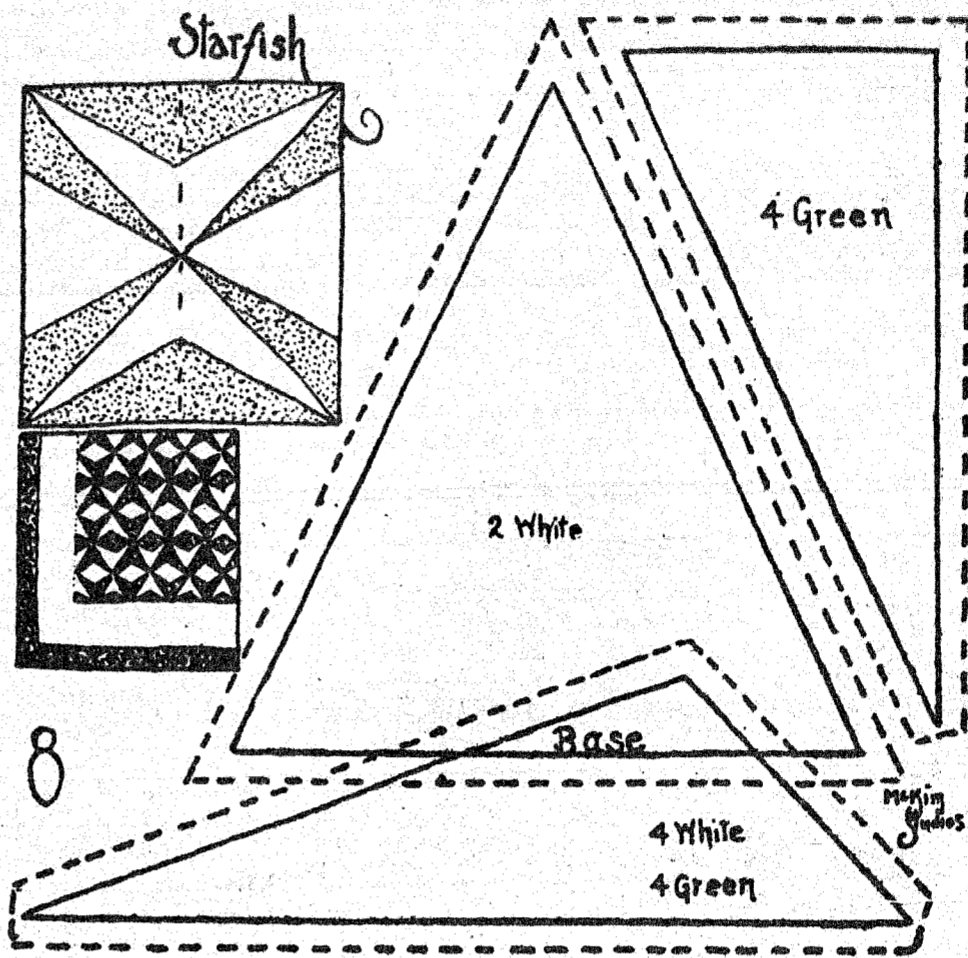
The designer of this gorgeous quilt must have enjoyed a real thrill when her triangles finally fitted themselves together into this beautiful repeat pattern! She had imagination to call it the 'Starfish', and as such we dedicate it to that delightful State, Florida.

Our patterns are planned to make a block 8 inches square. Seventy-two of these, or a center 8 blocks wide by 9 long, would complete about 64 x 72 inches. A six-inch white border, then a four-inch green border would bring this to quite a large quilt, about 84 x 92, and be much more distinguished with cable quilted borders than if more blocks continued clear to the edges.

Each block pieces in halves first, with the green cut half to reverse if the material has a right side. Then the center vertical seam places carefully so all contrasting points exactly join.

Allow 4 1/2 or 5 yards each of two colors. Sea-green or turquoise with white is especially lovely in this design, although of course it may be any two colors that you wish in your room.

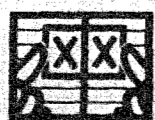

# Plant Place

by Edith Martin

The Norfolk Island Pine (Araucaria heterophylla) is fast becoming a very popular plant in the home.

It is not only a beautiful green plant, it is also useful. It is often used as a "living Christmas tree". The Norfolk Island is a tiny Island in the South Pacific.

The pine is very uniform. The central stem is straight and slender and the leader grows about six inches a year. The branches come out in tiers with small needles growing on the main stem as well as on the branches. The needles stay on the year round. The lower branches have been known to drop as the tree ages. The Norfolk Pine has been known to grow seventy feet high with its branches spreading about thirty feet on

its native Island.

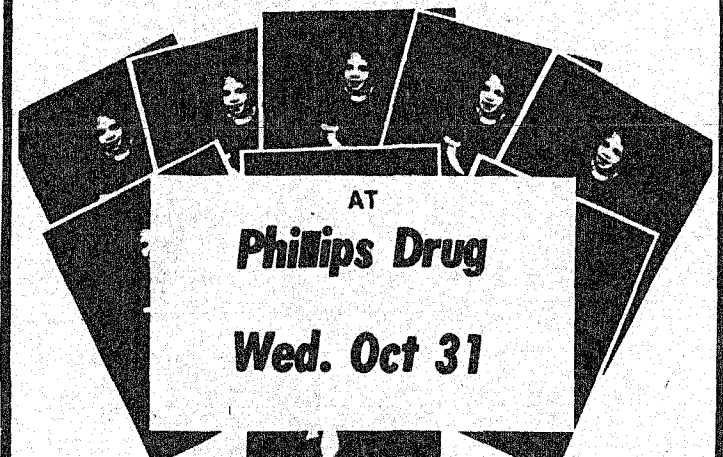
The size can be controlled by the size of container. It likes indirect light and moist soil. Never let soil become dry around the root system, but never soggy. Loss of branches can be due to letting soil become too dry. Alternate drying and soaking puts stress on the roots. This can cause it to drop its branches.

To have a healthy tree it should be repotted at least every two years using a two inch larger pot. I like to use about one-third each of potting soil, sphagnum peat moss, and perlite, adding some pine bark soil as it helps with the drainage and at the same time holds the moisture.

The pine should be fertilized every three to four months using any balanced house plant fertilizer.

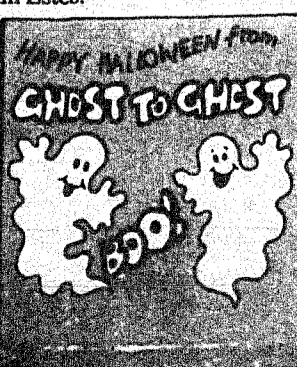

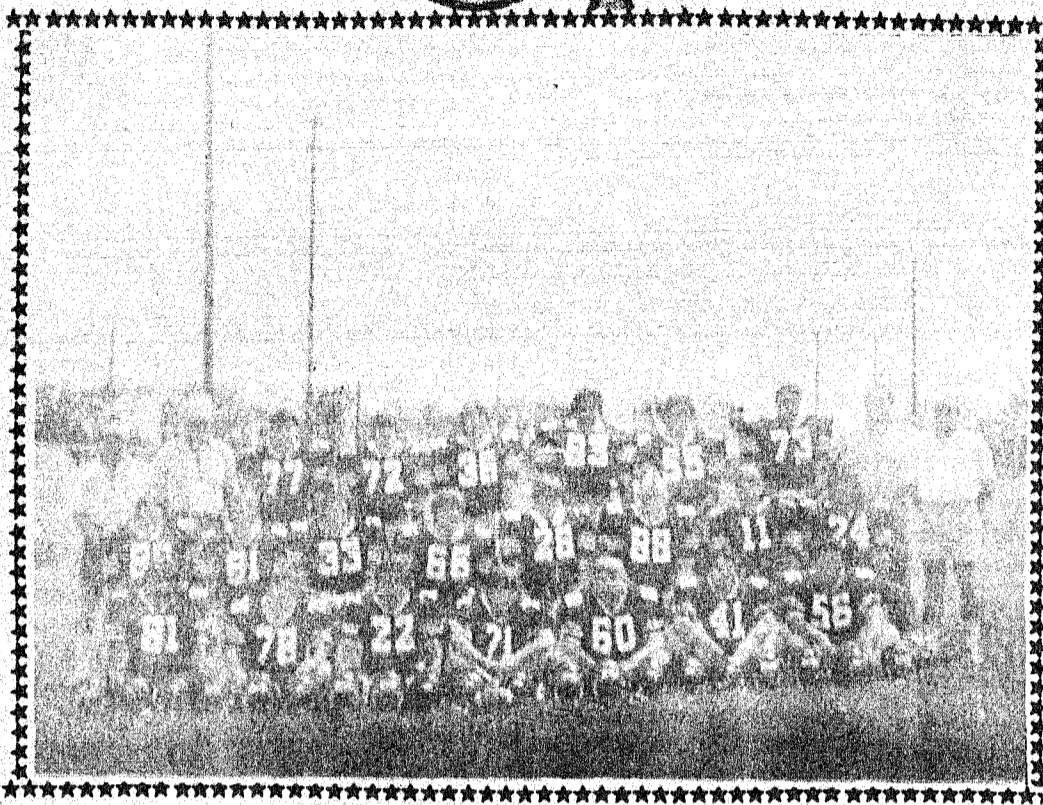

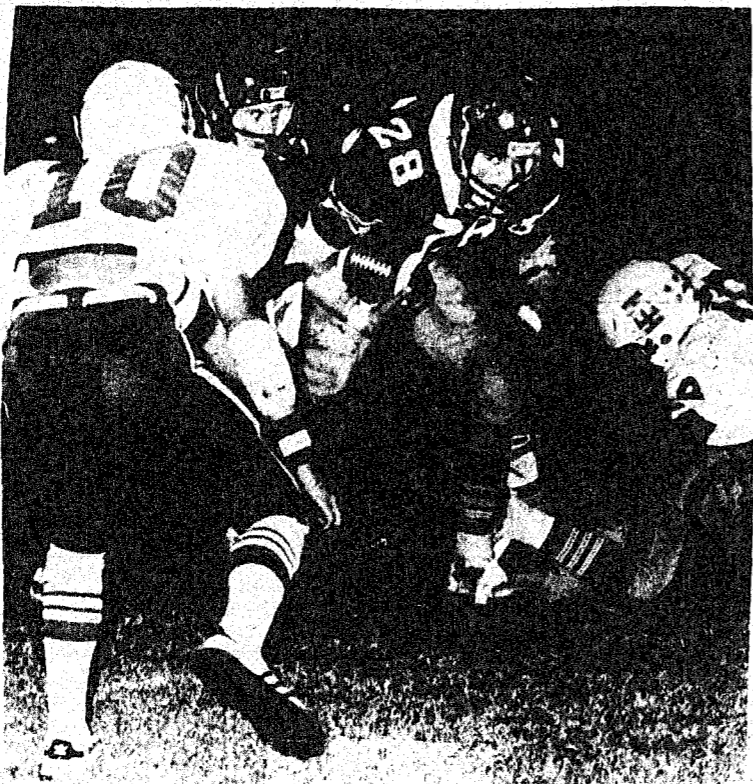
