


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

The city council meeting is tonight.

City Secretary Pat Rutherford wishes to inform the citizens that the presence of each and every one of you is desired at all regular and special council meetings. The meetings are public information. It should be noted that if you have questions for the council you should be placed on the agenda.

The Santa Anna City Council Special Session held on November 1. 1984, has been a productive one.

With 23 citizens and all the council the meeting was called to order.

The first item on the agenda was the budget, which was presented in a new departmentalized form. After

The second and final item on the agenda was the reading of an ordinance for the acceptance of the tax rate. The rate, which was approved earlier at .6277 per \$100 valuation, remained the same. The ordinance was passed with four council members for and one abstaining.

The Central Texas native has brought the influence of his background and rural lifestyle into his art. Born in Santa Anna, Texas, Larry McAnally spent his early years in Coleman and Callahan

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
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
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Livingston-Naron Wed
