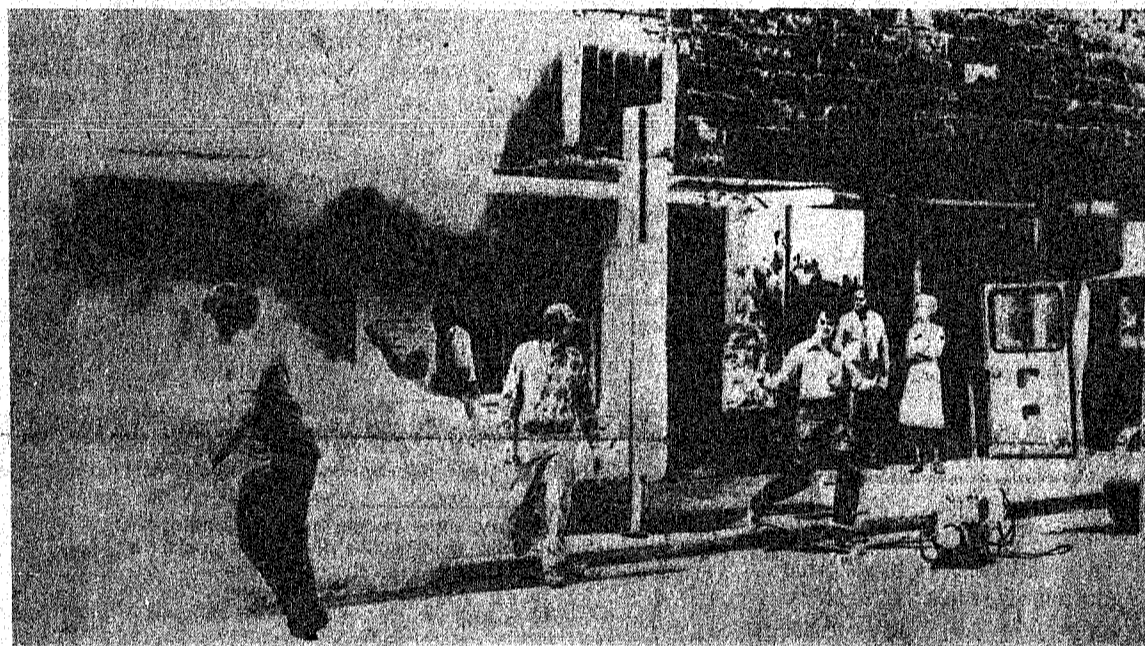
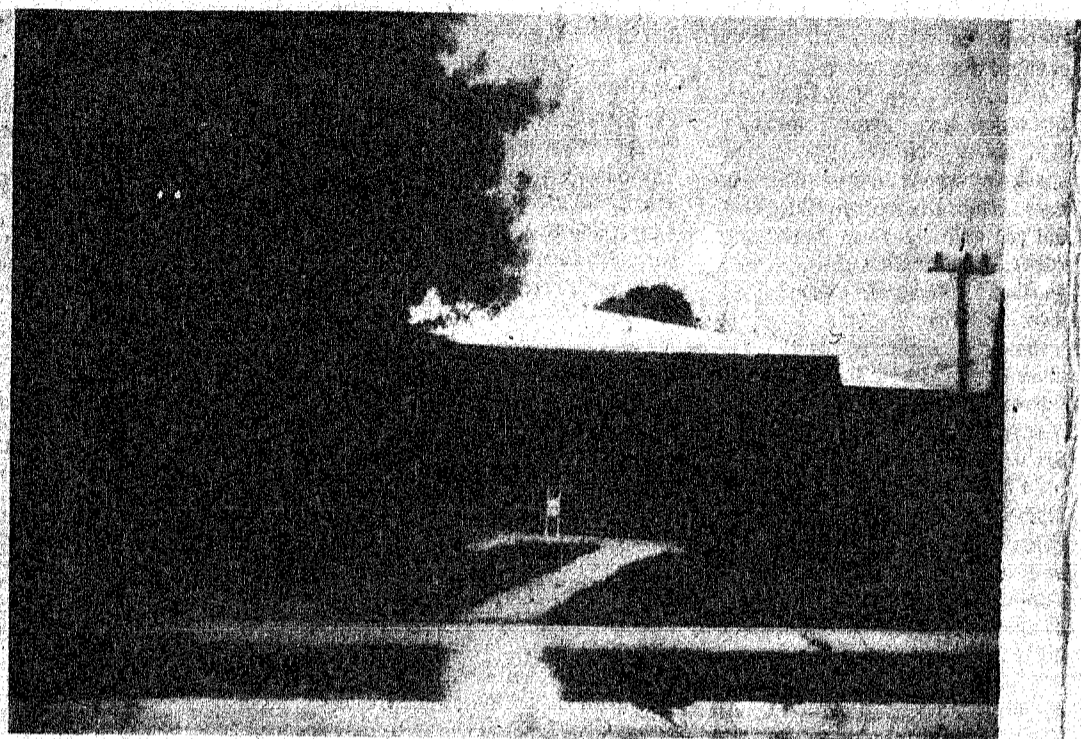
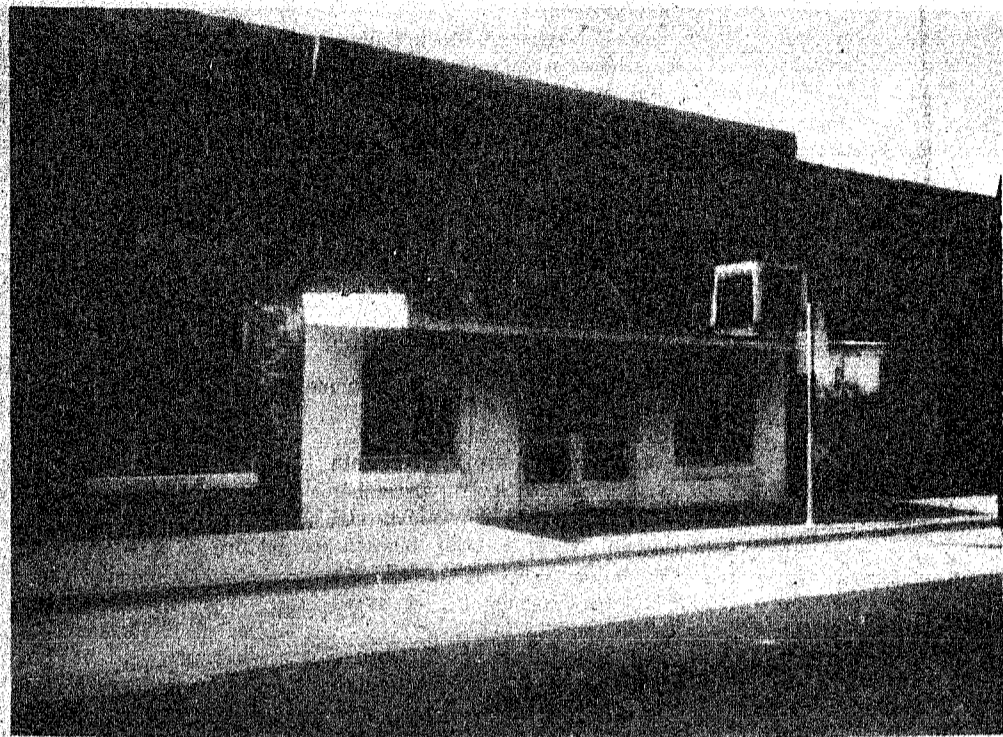

## Cotton Gin Receives Award

MEMPHIS, TN--Forty-three Texas cotton gins have received special recognition for attaining 100 percent producer support among their growers for the Cotton Incorporated Research and Promotion Program for the 1983-84 crop year.

The 43 Texas gins were among 338 gins in 15 states to attain 100 percent producer support for Cotton Incorporated.

In a letter of appreciation to the gins, Glen Stevens of Fresno, California, chairman of the Cotton Board, announced that these gins were the first to receive a special plaque in a new recognition program for 'outstanding industry leadership and 100 percent producer participation in the Cotton Incorporated Research and Promotion Program for the past crop year.'

According to Stevens, 'the gin is crucial to building grower support for the research and promotion arm.'

Continuing, he said, 'we hope that every gin will achieve this distinction because every producer dollar is needed in our research and promotion program to encourage more consumption of US cotton worldwide.'

The Cotton Research and Promotion program is an \$18 million 'self-help' program funded entirely by a voluntary grower per bale assessment, administered by the Cotton Board and conducted by Cotton Incorporated.

## YOUR FLOWERS AND PLANTS Helpful Hints

Arrangements of dried flowers, which can be just as beautiful as fresh flower bouquets, often include strawflowers, annual plants whose petals actually are modified leaves called "bracts."

For those who would like to try their hand at drying and arranging their own strawflowers, here are some tips from FTD florists:

• Pick or buy strawflowers at the peak of their color and bloom development. If picked too soon, the blooms may wilt; if picked too late, the flowers may shed.

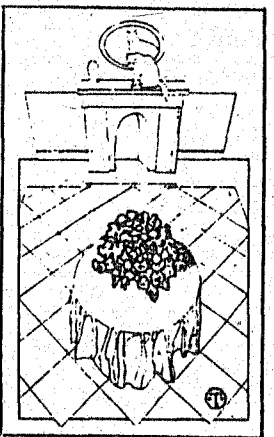
• Gather the flowers to be dried in small bunches, fastening the stems with rubber bands, sandwich bag ties, or gardener's twine.

• Hang the bunches upside down on a stretched clothesline or wire clothes hanger in a dry, well-aired room. The drying will take about a week. You also may have to tighten the ties from time to time because the stems will shrink as they dry.

• Arrange the flowers in a dry vase or container. You can use floral foam as a base if you like, but make sure it's dry, not soaked as when used with fresh flowers.

• Some people find it easier to arrange dried strawflowers when the stems are removed and replaced with a wooden pick or other artificial stem. To do this, bend a piece of florist wire full in half and insert the two ends down through the flower head, hiding the bend in the center of the flower. The ends of the wire then can be wound around a pick.

Q. I've become pretty good in flower arranging—Now I'd like to get my flowers to last a bit longer. Any suggestions?



A. Yes. Here are a few steps that can ensure your blossoms lasting longer.

1. Make the flower shop your last stop on the way home, especially in hot weather.

2. Clean the vase thoroughly with detergent after each use. Rinse with clear water.

3. Add floral preservative to warm water (approximately 100 degrees F.) and follow manufacturers directions.

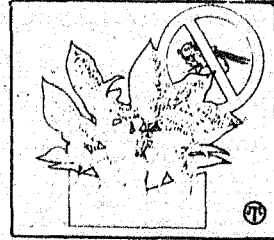
4. Remove any foliage that will be below the water line.

5. Cut off lower 1/2 inch of stem underwater immediately before inserting fresh flowers in vase water.

6. Keep flowers away from hot and cold drafts.

7. Change water when it begins to look tinged, about every three days.

Q. The other day I saw some white cottony blobs on my cactus. Any idea what they are and how I can get rid of them?



A. From your description, it sounds like mealybugs. This plant pest, appears as white cottony blobs, especially around leaf joints or in crevices. They are tough to control because they are well protected by a water-resistant waxy secretion. They suck the sap of the plant and can stunt and kill it.

The best advice is to be persistent with treatment. To eliminate mealybugs, dab them with diluted rubbing alcohol on a cotton swab. After the bugs die and fall off, wash the plant with warm, soapy water. Then rinse with clear water.

Particularly susceptible to mealybugs are cacti, grape, ivy, coleus, croton, African violet, dracaena, ferns and palms. The quicker you can spot trouble and take appropriate action, the better the results.

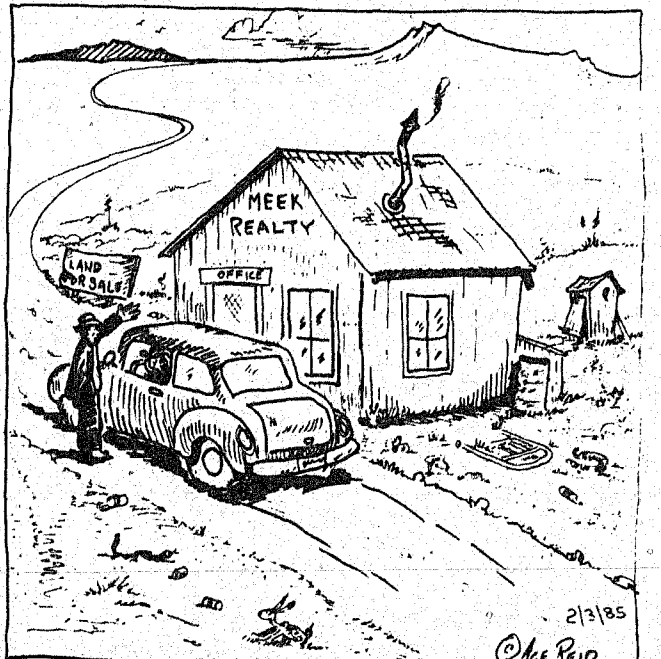

Now is the time to get your car ready for winter. A little planning and maintenance can help assure trouble-free operation of your automobile.

These car care tips to help you "winterize" your car are suggested by the "Service Professionals" at Chrysler Corporation:

**ANTI-FREEZE**

Anti-freeze should be replaced every two years. The cooling system should be drained, flushed with clear water, and the anti-freeze replaced.

How much anti-freeze should you use? A good rule of thumb is to use anti-freeze equal to one-half of your car's cooling system capacity. This is usually indicated in your car's operator's manual. A 50/50 mixture of water and anti-freeze protects the cooling system to about 30°F and helps prevent rust. Use a good name brand anti-freeze to insure reliability.

Check all heater and radiator hoses. Tighten clamps or replace hoses that appear mushy, swollen or show signs of leaks.

**BATTERY**

Clean the cable terminals and battery posts well with a wire brush. Put a light film of petroleum jelly on the terminals to prevent formation of corrosion. If the battery has filler caps, add water to the level indicated on the battery.

**TIRES**

Check your tire pressure. Under-inflation causes rapid tire wear and affects steering

control. Tire pressure drops over one pound for every ten degree drop in temperature.

Inspect your tires for signs of wear and the possible need for wheel alignment. Take the tires with the best tread and put them on the car's drive wheel positions to give the best traction.

**FUEL TANKS**

Some owners may wonder whether it is true that fuel tanks should be kept full in cold weather to prevent condensation forming in the tank, which might lead to gas line freeze.

"That's not likely to happen unless the vehicle goes rapidly from a cold into a very warm environment," says Ray Bollman, Manager-Serviceability, Chrysler Service & Parts Operations. "But keeping the tank at least half full in the winter is a good practice, then if you're stuck in the snow, and no help is forthcoming, you can run the engine and stay warm."

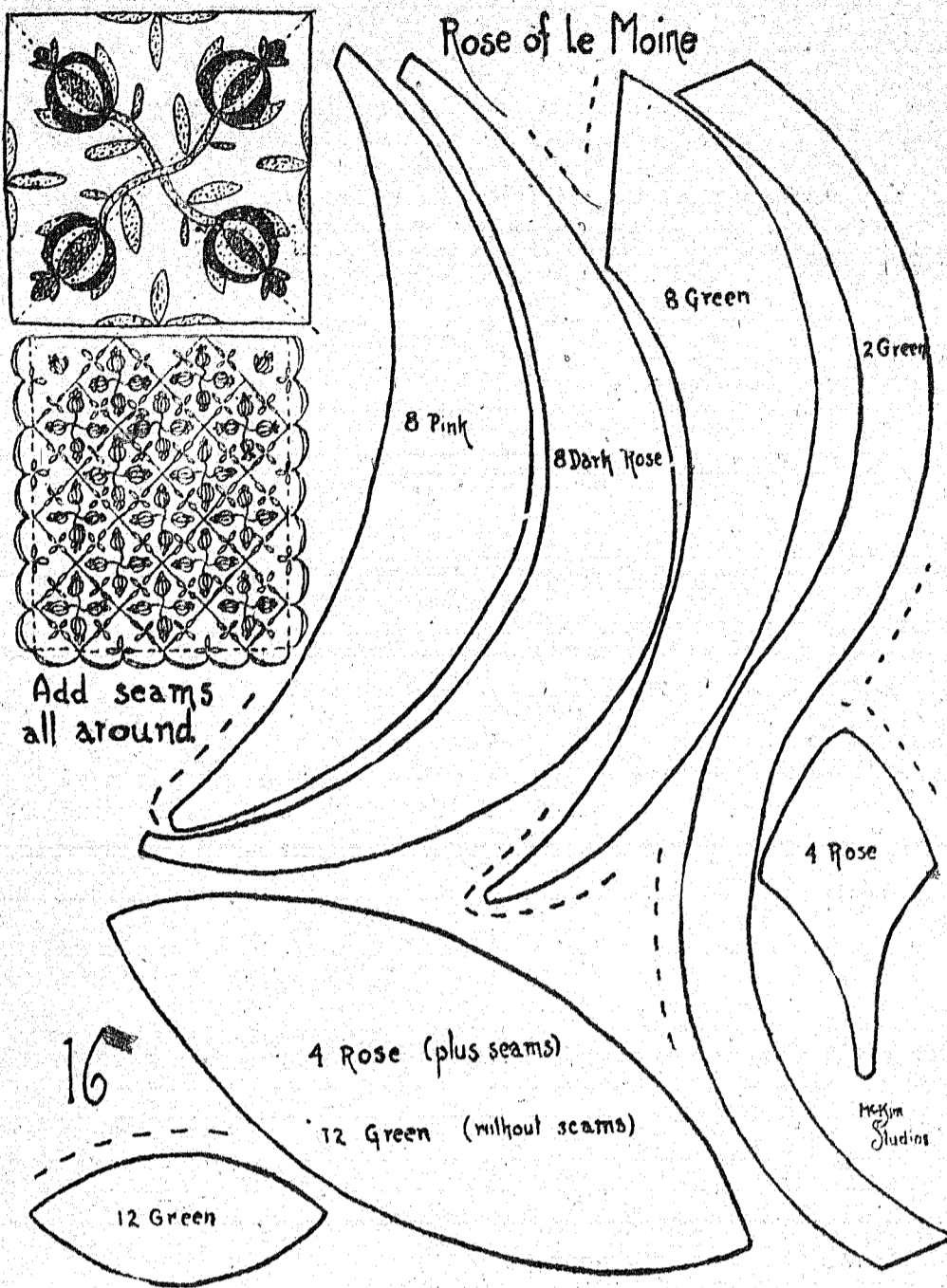
Bollman cautions that in such a situation, it's important to be sure your exhaust is downwind, and to open your car window at intervals.

**BELTS**

Inspect drive belts for the water pump and alternator for signs of cracking or wear. Adjust belt tension to prevent slipping. Loose belts can drain a battery or cause your car to overheat.

Maintenance is the least expensive item associated with car ownership. Avoiding a service call this winter is like putting money in your pocket.

**THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE**



**Quilt for Louisiana**

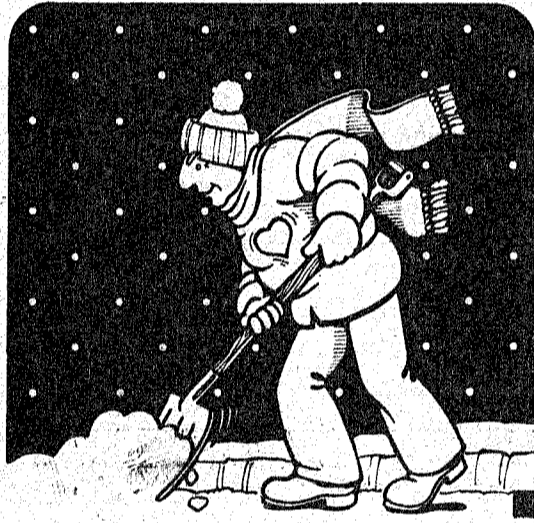
Quilt patterns may reflect the ancestry of their designers as surely does the Scotch burr or a Prussian hair cut.

Daintily French with a pleasing rhythm of line, balanced placings, and harmonious coloring is this elaborate applique, Rose of Le Moine. Foundation blocks are cut 16 inches square, which means about 25 inches on the diagonal. The plan of the entire quilt shows 15 complete blocks with 1/2 half blocks and a scallop border.

Applique units are cut, creased back a seam where something overlaps, as the rose center, and carefully basted into place. You will find pressing the 18 inch squares into dividing half and quarter lines will help in evenly placing the appliques. The outer point of center rose will be about 4 3/4 inches in from the corner of the block to make the stems space right; leaves turn at identical angles each time, and of course the leaves that cover the side seams can not be placed until blocks are joined.

A Rose of Le Moine quilt necessitates much precise needlework, but the finished product is unusually lovely in finest gingham or sateen.

Allow 9 yards of white, 1 3/4 yards each of three shades of rose to pink and 2 1/2 yards of green.



**Doctors Warn Against Shoveling Snow**

If the thought of a snow-covered driveway propels you out of bed looking for the snow shovel, you may want to reconsider. Cold air and hard work can be a double-whammy for your heart. Statistics show that there are more hospital admissions for heart conditions in any year when blizzard conditions prevail. Snow-shoveling is thought to be a major contributor to these unexpected fatalities.

More than 42 million Americans have some form of heart disease. Usually, the condition develops silently over many years. The first signal may be sudden chest pain, brought on by emotional stress or physical activity. Snow-shoveling happens to be very intense exercise. It is doubly dangerous, because the heart needs more oxygen to handle the added workload, but the cold acts against the delivery of oxygen by constricting the arteries and limiting the amount of blood available to the heart. This state of imbalance—when the heart's need for oxygen is greater than its supply — always sets the stage for angina,

or sometimes an even more serious cardiac event.

Any kind of chest pain should be diagnosed by a physician. It may simply be heartburn or another temporary condition, but the possibility of heart disease must be considered. Most patients with chest pain have coronary arteries that are permanently obstructed by deposits of fatty plaque, the most common form of heart disease. While it is impossible to cure this problem, it can be effectively treated with a number of medications. A very interesting new class of prescription drugs for this purpose are the calcium antagonists, such as Cardizem® or diltiazem. They are very effective in reducing the number of chest pain episodes without causing fatigue.

Doctors like to keep their heart patients active and following regular exercise programs. But they are quick to point out that snow-shoveling is out of the question for people with heart problems and should probably be avoided by anyone who is middle-aged and out of physical condition.
