## Oklahoma Natural Gas Company

William S. Baxter, marketing manager for Oklahoma Natural Gas Company in Ponca City, will retire March 1, completing 45 years of service with the utility.

Baxter was employed by Zenith Gas Company in 1940 as a customer serviceman in Alva. He was manager in Waynoka when Zenith Gas Company was acquired by Oklahoma Natural in 1965. In 1968 he was named marketing representative in Ponca City and was promoted to marketing manager in 1971.

A native of Santa Anna, Baxter graduated from Santa Anna High School. He attended Texas Technological College in Lubbock, Texas, and New York University in New York City. He received a bachelor of science degree from Northwestern State University in Alva, Oklahoma. He also received additional company-sponsored training.

Active in community and civic organizations, Baxter has served as elder, deacon and trustee of the First Presbyterian Church in Ponca

City; chairman of the established industries committee of the Ponca City Chamber of Commerce; Salta Fork District chairman of Boy Scouts of America; treasurer of Girl Scouts of America, Enid Council; and chairman of Woods County Red Cross Chapter. He has been a member of the Ponca City Industrial Authority, the Ponca City Utilities Advisory Board and the Waynoka Board of Education.

A World War II veteran, Baxter served in the US Army from 1941 to 1946, achieving the rank of major.

## Noah Project

The Noah Project of Brownwood is making a plea to the citizens of Brown, Coleman and Comanche counties for funding and help in locating a local house to be used as a shelter for victims of family violence.

The Noah Project, a non-profit organization, is run by a local advisory committee and volunteers dedicated to helping these victims of family violence. Since setting up a 24-hour crisis hot line on September 1, 1984, the Project has averaged 20 to 30 calls a month, transported 20 adults and 25 children to out-of-town shelters and spent approximately 4,000 hours in volunteer work. These figures are twice the projected estimates for this area and have made the need for funds and a local shelter critical.

has, quite literally, decimated the ranks of school sports teams, bands, FFA judge and show teams, and virtually every other conceivable activity.

So that you better understand what I mean, let me give you an example of a friend's child who lives in a neighboring district. The young man in question has remarkable ability to play the game of baseball and is one of the rare individuals, in high school sports, who might well be able to make use of his ability beyond public school. The young man is taking a full course load of six subjects and has an 'A' average in four subjects, a 'B' average in the fifth subject but, unfortunately, a grade of 67 in geometry. Under H. B. 72, of course, this young man is completely ineligible to participate in any extracurricular activities, including baseball, for the next six weeks. If, after six weeks, he brings the grade of 67 to 70 or above then he may participate. Strangely enough, he could bring his 'A' and 'B' averages down to a 70 average and still participate.

In my opinion there is very little in this set of circumstances to serve as an incentive to the child. Surely you can remember that at age 16 six weeks seemed like 'forever' and hopefully you see that the child is not just a lazy, disinterested student undeserving of consideration.

I am co-sponsoring H.B. 649 that would relax, I think to a reasonable degree, the academic requirements for extracurricular and co-curricular activities. This bill would change the grading period from a six week basis to a weekly basis (I think this will make a student work harder because they can see more immediate benefits for their increased efforts) and would, in an instance where a student is taking a full academic load, i.e., six courses, require a student to pass five of those courses. This relaxed condition is much more stringent than pre-H.B. 72 requirements and hopefully takes into consideration the reality of youth and the difference in individuals.

While I have no direct information, it is rumored that the Governor will veto this legislation, if passed by the House and Senate. Toward the end of seeing my bill passed into law, I know there are many of you who are interested in this very vital issue and I would not be dissatisfied nor disappointed to have several hundred people in Austin in favor of the bill when testimony is taken before the House Committee on Public Education.

### IS IT FAIR?

Let me take a slight step out of order this week and make a few comments about the most recent effect of education reform.

The first grading period after the effective date of H. B. 72's academic requirements for extracurricular participation has come and gone and

## TEXAS MOST WANTED

TYLER, Texas—Almost nine years have passed since Thomas Martin Eliason dropped out of sight.

Yet detectives from the Tyler Police Department, who have warrants charging Eliason with the April 4, 1976, slaying of a local businessman, say they get occasional reports of the elusive fugitive's wanderings.

'We've heard he's been in Houston, Dallas, Colorado, and even paid a visit to Tyler a few years back,' said Sergeant Nelson Downing of the Tyler Police Department. 'But the information has always been just a little bit late to catch him.'

This week Eliason has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the capture of the 41 year old fugitive.

Until that fateful April night in 1976, Eliason had only minor brushes with the law. He had been

arrested for burglary and some misdemeanor assaults.

But on April 4, investigators say the ex-soldier tried to force his way into his former girlfriend's second-story apartment. When that failed, investigators noted in their report, the suspect climbed up a gutter pipe and entered the apartment through a window.

Eliason's ex-girlfriend was inside the apartment with a male visitor she had recently met. The woman and her visitor tried to flee the apartment. The visitor was shot twice in the side as he ran down the stairs.

The victim managed to make it to his car, but was shot six more times with a 45 caliber automatic as he tried to start his car. Eliason's ex-girlfriend saved herself by hiding in some nearby bushes.

Eliason's pickup truck was found abandoned by police at a dump site near Tyler. His motorcycle was left

Think about it. If you're taking a beating, cheer up. God is just stirring the batter to bring you a blessing.

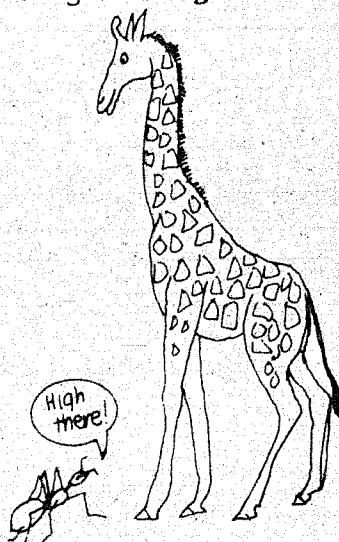

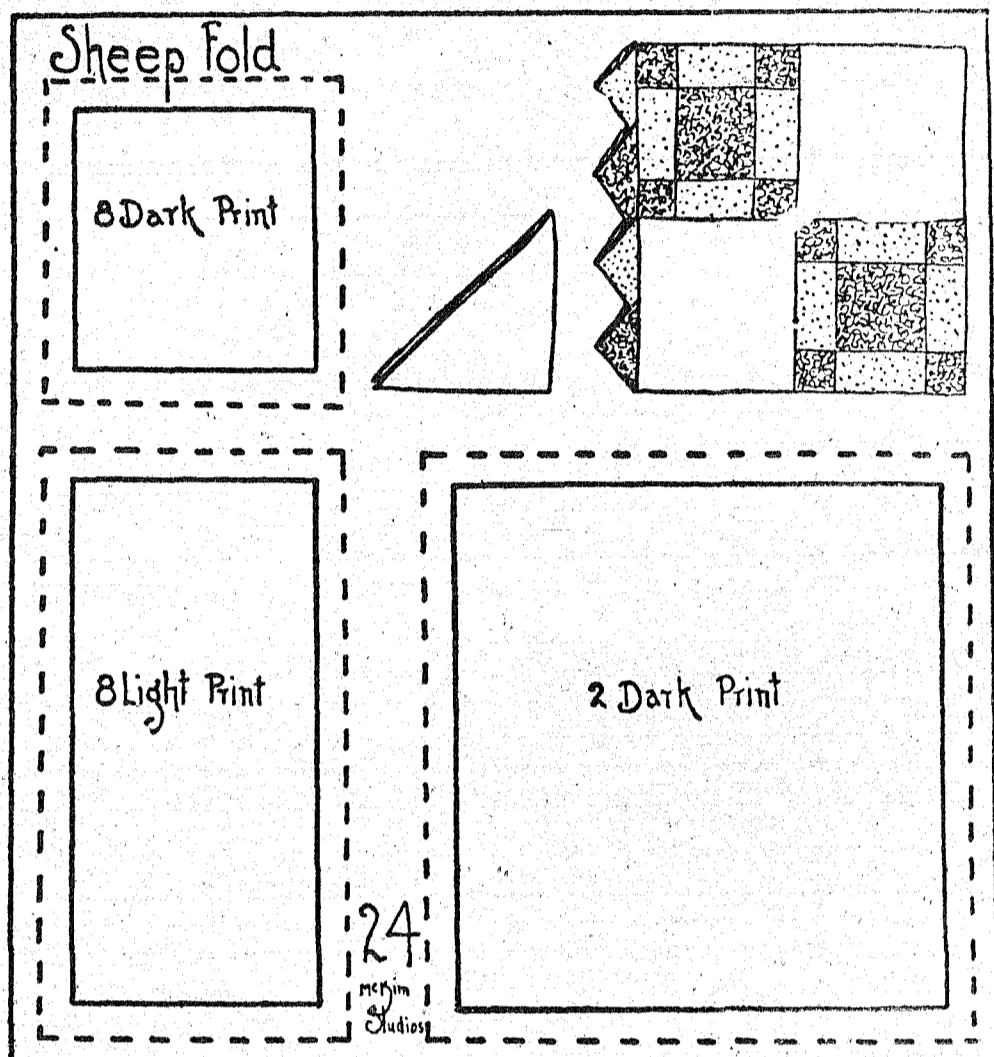
Coffee and donuts will be served during the morning session.

# Montana Quilt

If you are a novice at quilt making or want a project upon which a child may sew or a pattern that will use scrap material to good advantage, Sheepfold is a solution.

Half the surface of your quilt top will be plain six inch squares cut like the solid outline around the patterns. This uses 36 inch material to perfect advantage and these squares may be all unbleached, white or any plain tint such as pink, yellow or pale blue.

Variagated prints or perhaps shades of all blue or blue prints might be assembled for the dark squares with white, some plain light tint, light dotted percales or dainty flower prints for the oblongs. For a full sized quilt allow 3 1-3 yards for the 6 inch squares, 2 1/4 yards for the light oblongs and 2 1/2 for the dark squares in two sizes.

And while the subject is 'folds' allow us to introduce an extremely clever fold for a quilt border. Square cut any desired size, sew 3/4

inches are folded diagonally, then refolded to another triangle half that size. This brings the four raw edges to the top and make the completed unit four thicknesses. The next unit tacked just inside of this to overlap and set on for the entire distance around bottom sides and the bottom of your quilt. Such a border is usually added after the quilting is done, sewing along the top to turn and whip back the lining for a final finish.

This quilt, along with the many others that have been printed in the Santa Anna News, were originally run in the Fort Worth Star Telegram in 1934.

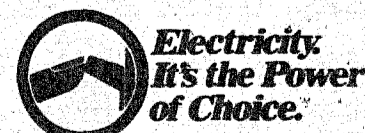
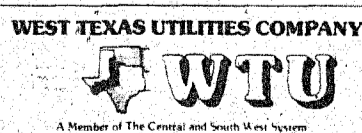

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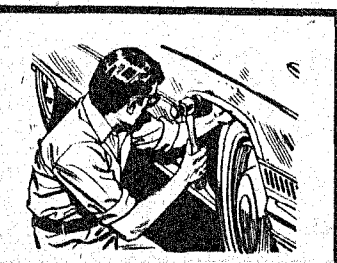
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
