Governor White Proclaims February as Heart Month in Texas

Texas Governor Mark White issued a proclamation designating February as Heart Month and urged all Texans to support the 1985 campaign of the American Heart Association.

In the proclamation, Governor White asked for support from the residents of Texas in the American Heart Association's campaign against heart and blood vessel disease, our nation's number one killer.

The proclamation reads, in part: 'Heart and blood vessel disease will claim over 325,000 lives and is expected to cost our economy \$72.1 billion in 1985. This is why the American Heart Association will continue to lead the fight against heart and blood vessel disease.'

Thousands of volunteers in Texas will join the effort to distribute heart information and collect contributions to support medical, research, education and community service programs. These American Heart Association programs are aimed at achieving its goal of preventing premature death and disability

caused by heart and blood vessel disease.

The proclamation continues: 'Through the funding of extensive research programs, and the implementation of community service and public education programs, the American Heart Association helped to lower the number of deaths due to heart and blood vessel disease. For the first time since 1952, deaths from heart disease in 1983 accounted for less than 45 percent of all deaths in Texas.'

'Through the support of its volunteers, cardiovascular research sponsored by the American Heart Association has grown 505 percent since 1976.'

'Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the month of February, 1985, as HEART MONTH in Texas, and encourage all Texans to support the efforts of the American Heart Association, Texas Affiliate, Inc.'

1985 Science Fair Scheduled February 23

Plans are underway for Coleman County's fourth annual Science Fair, sponsored by the Women's Civic League. The Fair is scheduled for Saturday, February 23 at the Coleman High School. The competition is open to any student enrolled in grades 4 thru 12 in any Coleman County School.

Grades 4 thru 6 will compete in a Sub-Junior Division, grades 7 thru 9 will be in the Junior Division, and grades 10 thru 12 will be in the Senior Division. All of the projects will be subdivided into two categories, either biological or physical science.

Entry blanks for Santa Anna students are available in the High School office. Entry deadline is February 18, when the forms must be turned in to your science teachers.

The Fair features an exhibit of the work of students at all levels who are interested in science. It provides an opportunity for display of their work to parents, teachers, other students and the general public.

Judging will be in the morning hours, and viewing by the public will

be from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. The awards ceremony will follow from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. Certificates of participation will be given to all students who have entries. Ribbons will be awarded to the first three places and honorable mention projects. A number of special awards and prizes will also be given.

Worthy projects presented with place awards of Awards of Merit in grades 7 thru 12 will attend the Abilene Science Fair March 6, 7 and 8.

Students are encouraged to start making plans for their projects, talk to their science teachers and get their entry blanks in by February 18.

The group gave food baskets to four needy families and smaller baskets to several elderly people living alone.

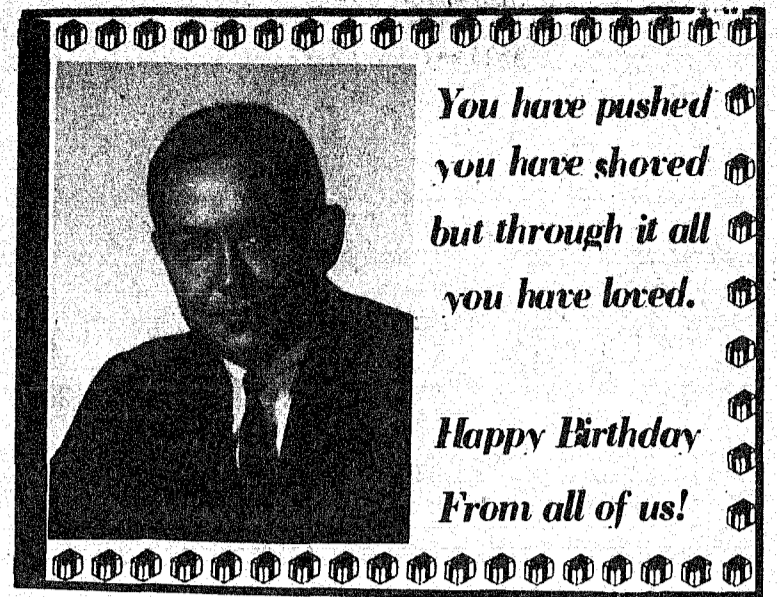

Of Use To You

Many people have asked lately, what can be done about the mold and mildew in my house this time of year? The following information is to help answer just that.

Water, frost or ice on the inside of windows is a chore to clean up and can produce conditions for the growth of mildew in your home, says a Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist.

Homeowners may not realize that it takes only four to six pints of water to raise the relative humidity of a 1000 square foot house from 15 to 60 percent, says Dr. Peggy Owens.

For example, a person breathing produces 1/2 pint of moisture per hour and mopping a 150 square foot floor will release 4 1/2 pints of moisture into the air, she explains.

In addition to normally generated moisture, certain heating methods can contribute to moisture in the home, Owens says. In very tightly sealed homes with good insulation and storm windows, the use of an unvented kerosene space heater can double the amount of moisture vapor generated in the house each day.

'The presence of continuous condensation on windows is a good sign of excess moisture,' Owens says. 'If frost or ice forms on a glass or metal frame and sash and if paint peels and wood rots, there is certainly excess moisture.'

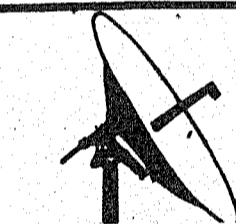
If a single pane of glass gets so cold that moisture condenses and runs down it in the winter, then double glass and-or a heating vent located beneath the window can eliminate the problem, says the specialist.

But sometimes condensation will occur on windows even when the relative humidity in the house is low.

In this case, condensation on windows results more from the cold window surface than from excessively high moisture in the room. Adding storm windows or polyurethane film to the windows, or placing heated air vents can solve the problem, advises the specialist.

If moisture condenses between the permanent window and storm window, or polyurethane film and the window, the warm, moist air from inside the house if leaking to the airspace between the two. To correct this problem, says Owens, seal the leaking spaces or ventilate the two windows. Ventilate the windows by drilling two 3/8 inch holes at the top and bottom of the storm windows or loosening them slightly.

When mildew or dampness is present on the ceiling or on the outside walls near the ceiling, there is a possibility that the insulation is not properly installed. In this case Owens advises repositioning the insulation in order to prevent cold wind from chilling the area where vapor will condense in your house.



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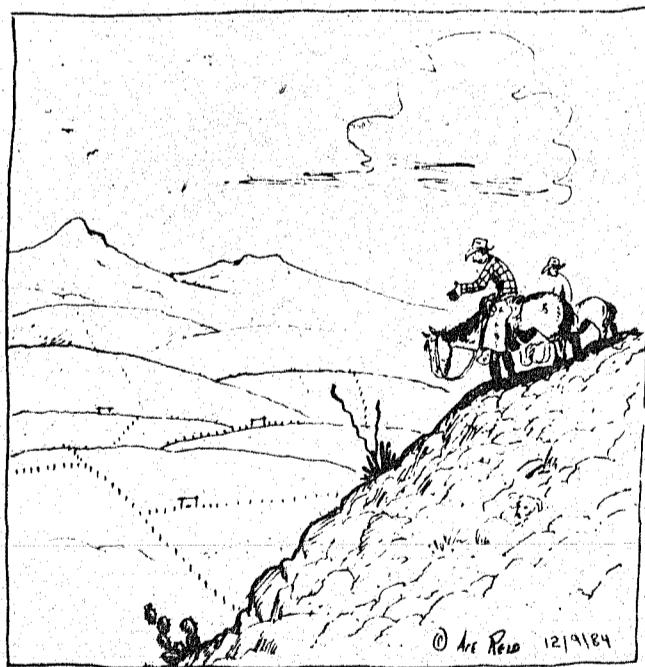

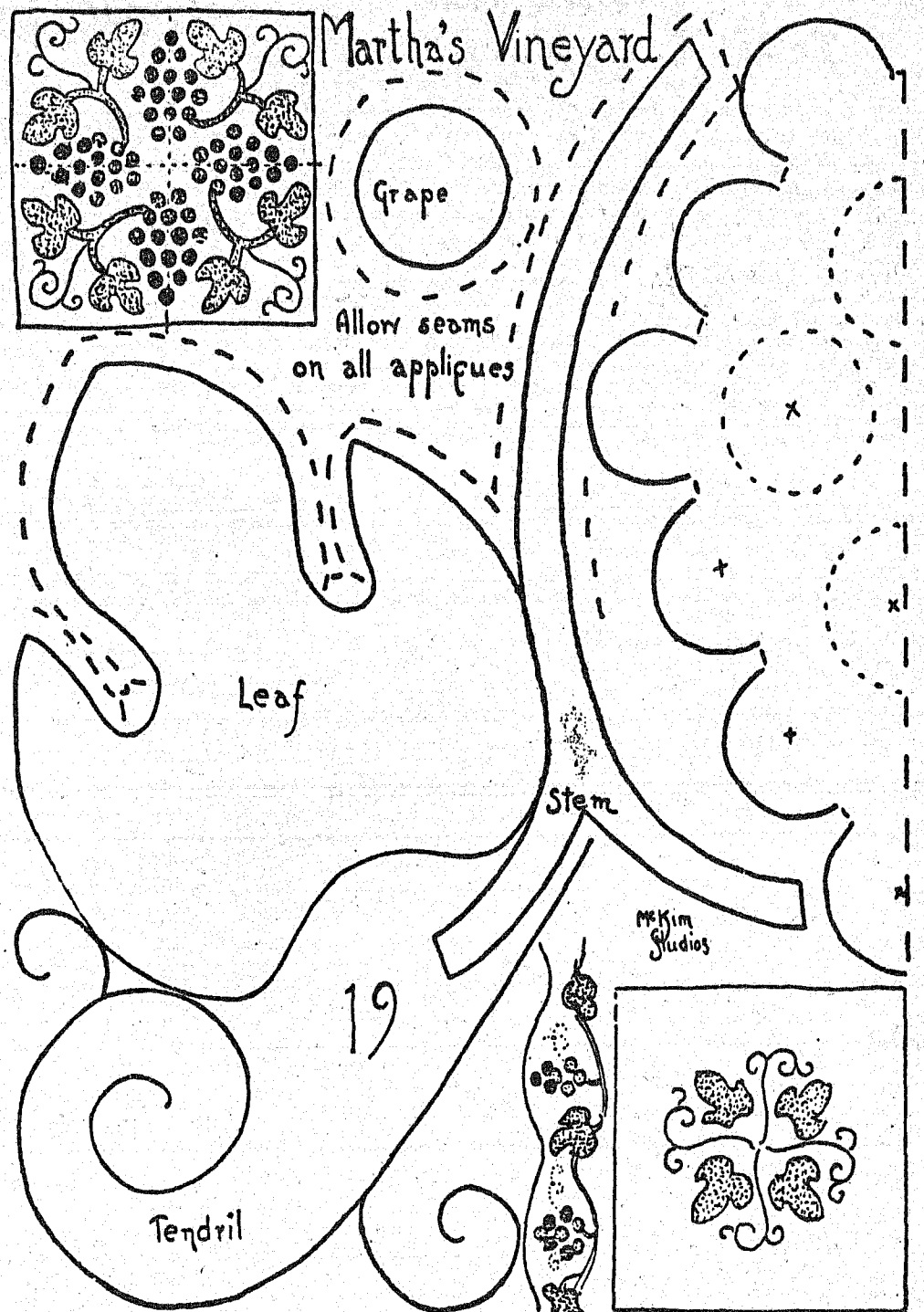

THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE



Massachusetts Quilt

This gorgeous grape design has received many prizes as the handsomest of applique patterns. Massachusetts is the mother of many original quilts but we selected this one because it is so distinguished and because the real 'Martha's Vineyard' does adjoin its coast. Background blocks cut 18 inches square or larger are creased to mark center lines for placing the

grape bunches. Then the placing pattern, half of which is here given, should be lightly marked around with a pencil. Each grape is cut a perfect circle, size of the dotted line. Gather around this very close to the edge, drawing in until a seam width is fulfilled under. This will press into a perfectly round grape, where it is almost impossible to crease back to a smooth circle. The eight lower grapes marked X may be a darker

value of violet, blue or whatever grape color is used. Stems may be a lighter value of green than the leaves; tendrils embroider in green or tan outline or small chain stitch. Alternate 18 inch blocks may be left for fancy quilting or have as simple arrangement as the four leaves and tendrils sketched in the lower block. A running vine border might be worked out, using bias tape for foundation stems and adding leaves and grapes at random. Allow six yards of white or cream for the background, 3/4 yard each of violet and deeper purple, 2 yards of green and 3 bolts of lighter green bias tape.
