war-torn Britain to the States amaz-war-torn Britain to the States amaz
ed her. The well-dressed people, the ed her. The well 1 -dressed people, the
menus with fruits and desserts, the prosperity a nd optimism never really known before. Oranges
and candy were two luxuries for her and candy were two luxuries for her
to be bought everywhere and she could not get enough of them as for years she had hardly tasted either. Texas was an overwhelming ex perience as well. The Horner family welcomed her on the farm near San-
ta Anna, and the feast they prepared ta Anna, and the feast they prepared
for her to meet her new relatives was marred by the fact that she had never seen or heard of most of the foods: pinto beans, potato salad,
