School board meets

Resignations were accepted by the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees for three faculty members when the group met in regular session Tuesday, March 12, at the school office.

Letters of resignation were read from Eric Wharton, band director; Dale Ash, physical education teacher and coach; and Joe Young, a junior high social studies teacher and coach. The three faculty members have taught in the local school system only one year. Their resignations are effective at the end of the current school term.

In executive session, the School Board reviewed teacher contracts and renewed contracts of all faculty members. Administrators had contracts renewed at previous meetings. Supplemental salaries for extra duties were also set during the executive session.

Polly Warnock, vice president, presided at the session in the absence of the president, Max Eubank. Visitors with the group were welcomed and their presentation heard.

Plans were made to have a called meeting Tuesday, March 19, to meet with representatives of an Austin building firm concerning proposals and plans for the district's building program. Additional classrooms and office space are being studied as future needs.

The school policies were studied and updated to comply with legislative requirements, and approval was given recommendation by the 1985-86 Textbook Committee, comprised of local faculty members.

The 1985-86 school calendar was approved, with the first day of classes slated on Tuesday, September 3. Faculty workdays and in-service sessions will start on August 19.

It was also voted to accept the administrative recommendation to have two sessions for the Kindergarten class in the coming year, with children to attend all-day sessions for one semester instead of implementing a half-day class schedule for the entire school year.

The next regular meeting of the School Board will be Tuesday, April 9.

Delta Omicron Sorority of District VII will host the March District meeting on Sunday, March 24.

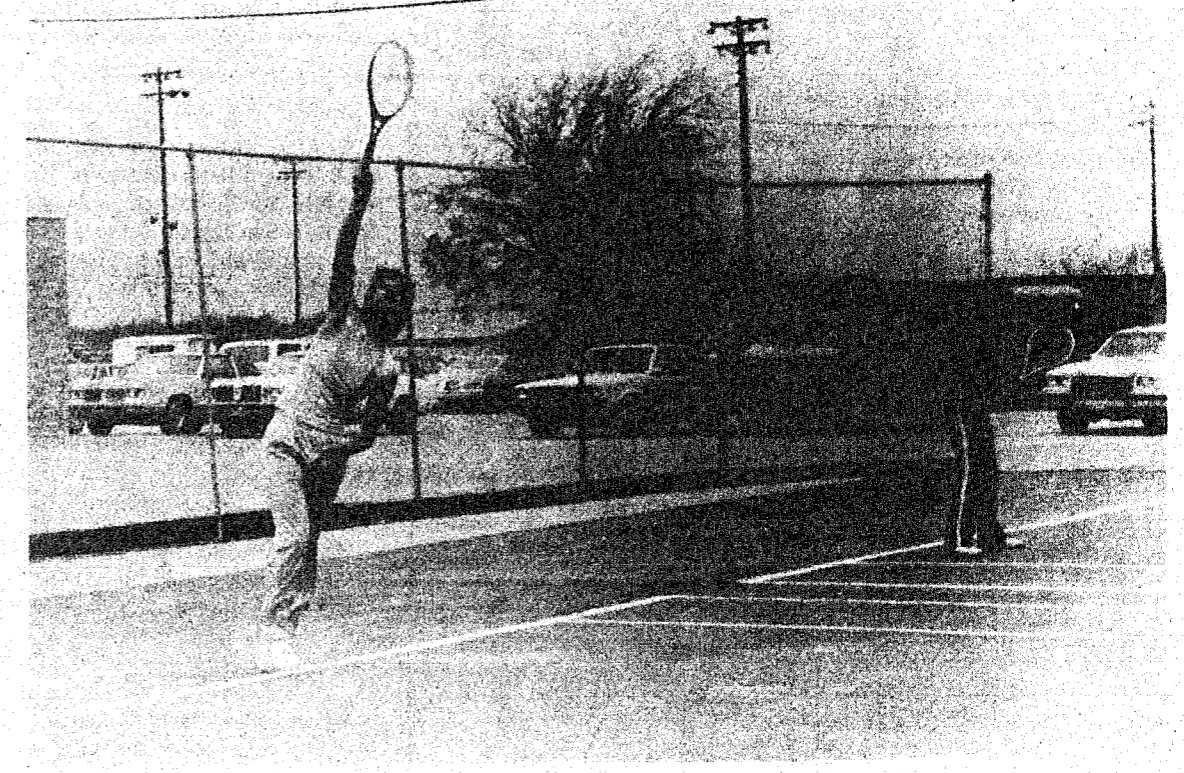

Pre-kindergarten in schools

The Santa Anna ISD may offer pre-kindergarten classes during the 1985-86 school year. To be eligible for enrollment in a pre-kindergarten class a child must be at least four years of age on September 1, 1985, and must be:

(1) unable to speak and comprehend the English language; or

(2) from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level.

If you have a child you feel will qualify, you may register between now and April 15, 1985, in the Superintendent's office.

Self Culture Club meets

The Spring luncheon of the Self Culture Club was held Wednesday in the home of Mrs. James Spillman, with Jane Gustavus as co-hostess. The buffet table was laid in the dining room of the home, the white cloth covered with a large symbol of the British Jack. Centerpiece was a miniature model of Windsor castle, which the Spillmans bought in Spain while living there. The theme for the day was Great Britain, and this was carried out in napkins, decorations on the small tables, and ornaments. The family room had tables for six, with white cloths and centerpieces in the chosen theme. Patsy Isenhower assisted the hostesses.

Mrs. Oran Hendewrson, president, conducted the business meeting. The observance of Library Week for the school children was tabled, as arrangements will be in view of school requirements. Also, the awards made in previous years to students in the public and Adventist schools will be voted when school officials announce subjects and grades.

Mrs. Bailey Horner was guest speaker for the day. A native of Northern England, she was married to Bailey Horner of Santa Anna during World War II. Then a girl of seventeen, she saw some of the worst of the horrors of the bombing by the Nazis, which came night and day to her manufacturing city. While in

school, her duty was when the siren was heard, to assist the smaller children to the bomb-shelters, calming them by joking and singing. Her two best friends were lost in a raid on her school, she herself escaping by a few minutes.

Finishing school at fourteen, she and her classmates began working in munitions or war material factories. She became a welder on Spitfire fighter planes and was there throughout the war; her night duty was to assist neighbors to the shelters, which occurred almost nightly, and to knock on doors and call neighbors, being sure that everyone in her block would escape the German bombs. The morale of the British never wavered through the four years of the war.

Many thousands of American G.I.'s were stationed in army camps all over the British Isles, and in their free hours, they visited with the people; romance bloomed for many of them, among them the young man from Santa Anna, Bailey Horner, and the pretty sixteen-year old, Minnie Mary Burke. Their wedding picture shows a carefree, laughing bride and groom, he in uniform, of course, and she with wedding dress, veil and flowers. As a British citizen, Mary had to continue her work at the airplane factory, and with the war ending Bailey was returned to the States. The next year, Mary came to America; her baby girl, Rita, was sick on board the Queen Mary and was hospitalized before they could come to Texas.

The change in environment from war-torn Britain to the States amazed her. The well-dressed people, the menus with fruits and desserts, the prosperity and optimism everywhere were something she had never really known before. Oranges and candy were two luxuries for her, to be bought everywhere and she could not get enough of them as for years she had hardly tasted either.

Texas was an overwhelming experience as well. The Horner family welcomed her on the farm near Santa Anna, and the feast they prepared for her to meet her new relatives was marred by the fact that she had never seen or heard of most of the foods: pinto beans, potato salad, chicken and dressing, and ice cream. Later on she learned to be fond of these foods, but that day she could only make a sandwich of bacon and slice tomato. Her north-of-England accent sounded very foreign to the large Horner family, but through the years she has learned to speak almost like a born Texan.

After a few years, Bailey left the farm and began his work in the field of gasoline refineries. This job started first in Monument, New

Mexico and carried on to Odessa, Texas with Shell Refinery; from which he retired in June of 1962.

On his retirement, Bailey and Mary returned to Santa Anna to make their home, buying and restoring the Brown-Hunter home on Avenue B. The turn-of-the-century two-story house had been well preserved through the years, and the Horners have returned it to its original interesting condition.

Displayed for the Self-Culture Club members were several of Mary's mementos: a white mug of eggshell British china given her by the king of Great Britain during the war; a pair of the clogs (shoes) worn by most British children, with metal soles and copper reinforcements; and her certificate of American citizenship, her most precious possession. Of this she spoke with emotion, saying that she who are born with this great privilege do not realize the indescribable treasure which we have.

Bailey and Mary's children all live in Texas. Rita Kerr and her two children live in Abilene. Gary Horner and wife live in Waxahachie. Teresa Carter and family live in Santa Anna.

Tax regulations for preparers

If you choose to have your tax return completed by a commercial tax preparer, the IRS notes that you should be aware of certain regulations. In brief, your paid preparer is responsible for providing a copy of the completed return to you when you sign the return. Preparers are required to keep copies of returns or a list containing taxpayers' names and identification numbers for 3 years. These records must be available for IRS inspection during this period.

Paid preparers are also required to sign completed returns and to provide their employer identification number on the return. Rubber stamps and signature facsimiles are not acceptable.

The handling of your refund check is also regulated. Paid preparers (other than bank preparers) cannot endorse, cash, or in any way negotiate a client's refund check. The preparer can be penalized \$500 for each violation. In addition, understanding your tax liability can result in the preparer being penalized \$500 for willful understatement or \$100 for negligent or intentional disregard of rules and regulations.

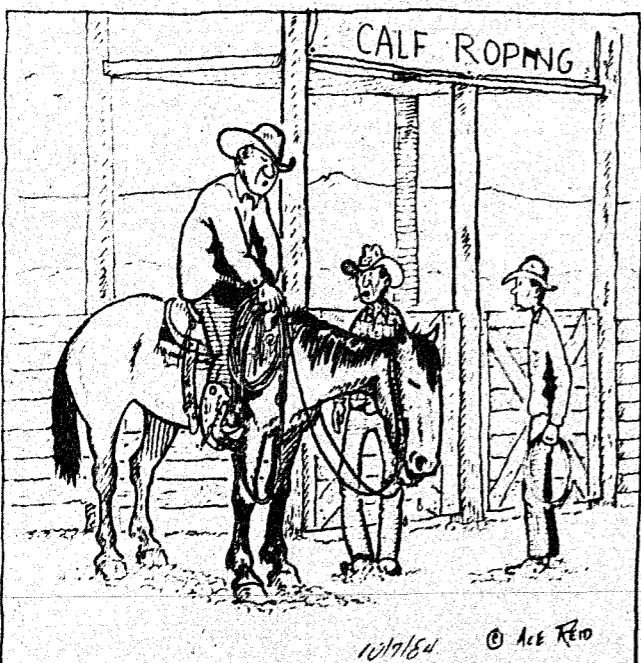

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Cystic Fibrosis test

WHAT DO YOU REALLY KNOW ABOUT CYSTIC FIBROSIS

Sandy Hosch, the local cystic fibrosis chairman, has submitted the following article on cystic fibrosis.

The No. 1 genetic killer of children and young adults in the United States is Cystic Fibrosis. Cystic fibrosis is a fatal genetic disorder of infants, children and young adults that primarily attacks the lungs and digestive system causing acute difficulties in breathing and digestion.

What is your CF IQ? Greater public awareness and understanding of cystic fibrosis will aid in the battle against this tragic disease. Check your own CF 'IQ' with this quiz.

Parents should know the symptoms of cystic fibrosis: a salty taste to the skin; recurrent wheezing; persistent cough; Pneumonia more than once; excessive appetite but poor weight; bulky, fatty stool; clubbing (enlargement of the fingertips). Any child with one or more symptoms should be examined by a physician, preferably at a CF Center.

I. R. S. tips

Taxpayers can help speed up the processing of tax returns by using the pre-addressed, peel-off labels and by double checking their arithmetic before mailing the returns. As simple as the items appear, they are the cause for thousands of errors every year, the IRS says.

The label comes with the tax package in the mail and lists the taxpayer's name, address, social security number, and other bits of information which help the IRS in processing the return quickly.

If any of the information on the label is incorrect, the correction can be made directly on the label. Taxpayers should also use the coded envelope included in the tax package. It's pre-addressed and helps the IRS sort returns.

Errors such as checking the wrong filing status, failing to sign the return, math mistakes, and the omission of necessary documents are common mistakes which can delay taxpayer's refunds. The IRS must correct the errors or obtain the documents before processing the return.

Most errors can be avoided if the return is double checked for accuracy and the label is used.

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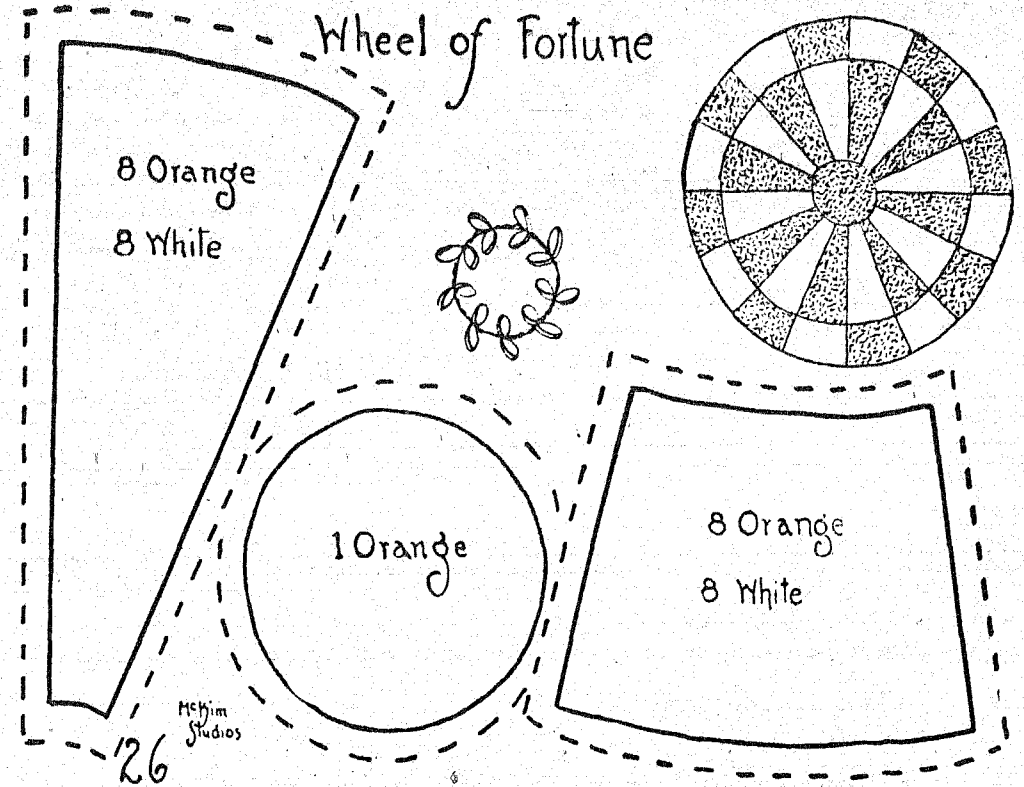

placed to form a sort of hexagon or a long diamond effect. The antique quilt from which we drafted these patterns had a 'victor's wreath' the circle of which was about 5 inches across alternated in placing with the wheels of fortune. Leaves were ellipses 1 1/2 inches by 1 inch wide.

Success is everyone's job

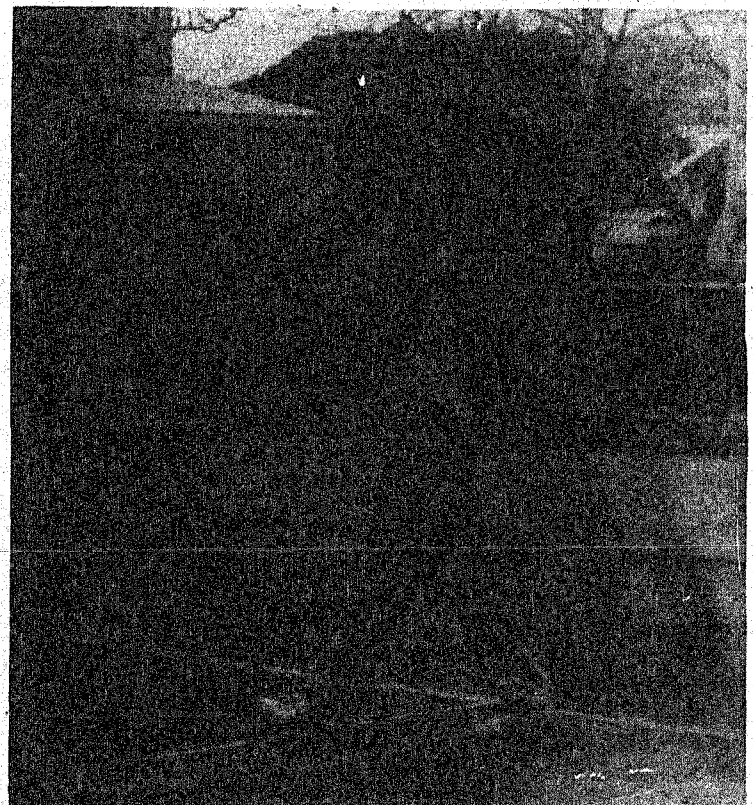
