EDITOR'S NOTE: They Came In Peace by leona Bruce will not run this week, so that we may run Mrs.

They Came in Peace will return
next week in the paper. Thank You. The first two-story rock building in the town of Santa Anna was planned and financed by L. V. Stockard; he was the first Santa Fe agent, pro bably coming as the railroad was nearing the town. The dozens of men and teams worked all daylight hours, grading, smoothing and level ralls were laid, the crews seeming to race with the carpenters who put up little store buildings along the future Main Street. Stockard's first office was in a boxcar where the depot would be there was a two-story
Aready ther hotel diagonally across the Main
Street from the lot which he had bought as an investment. A British familly named Harvey operated the hotel-a fabulous place for the frontier, with two tall stories, porches with wooden-lace rails upstairs and down, and wide halls. Stockard's wife and young baby soon came, and the family lived, or rather, boarded, as the term was used, at the hotel. The Harveys had a daughter and
son-in-law the W B. Meltons, who assisted with the duties there, along with servants
The coming of the Santa Fe was eagerly, not to say frantically, an ticipated. Every day hacks, buggies, saddle-horses and covered wagons arrived at the town-site; some men
wanted work, some wanted homes or stores built as soon as possible some planned to buy farmiand. Henry Broum told his own story to Beatrice Grady Gay, the area's second historian. He was chairman of a committee to draw up a Local Option (no liquor) petition, and said that there were only sixteen men in the town, all of whom signed. They were Willis Brooks and his two sons, Frank and Lewis; his son-in-law, Parker, Duke Jackson W. C and Parker, Kilgore, W. C and Tom Crosby, H. H. Brown, J. D. Simpson, Crosby, H. M. Brown, Jam H. Phillips, Calvin Holmes and C. M. Grady,
Lumber for building was hauled in by wagon, but good stone was righ at hand; the caprock of the two hills which would shelter the town on the north was excellent material, soft enough when freshly uncovered for blocks of the proper size. It was neesssary for the town to be moved a part in "The Gap," as the settlement had been called. The terrain sloped up from valleys to east and west and the depot and siding would be on level ground. Springs were many around the foot of the hills; one of these J. D. Simpson sold to the McGonagilis who sold it o W. M. from Trickham, came with plans to open stores, Lennie a grocery, open stores, Lennie a grocery,
Charlie a drug store and Willie, who later moved farther west, another business. L. L. Shield had his stock of general merchandise hauled from Trickham to a new little structure facing Main Street. The future was here This was in March 1886, with Sbring heginning, and hopes flourithing For a time this was the end of the line, though construction was going on to the west. Mrs. O. H. Overall in her memoirs tells of this. The Gulf Colorado and Santa Fe Company gave contracts separately for each mile of track; this meant that perhaps one hundred men, many oftheir camping families, with crapers and plows and around crapers and plows and around camped for each contractor. Thes people cut the trees and brush for uel, trespassed on lands owne along the way, shot the deer and often the cattle, and leff the trash of heir camps when they finished. But they did patronize the new little stores with their ready money, and usiness was good.
To the dismay of the county seat southwest after it scaled the rise to the west of Santa Ann and was plowed and scraped toward Valera The Coleman citizenry after com plaints, raising of money and perhaps some political activity achieved the short line from what became the Junction, and the Santa Fe trains were in that twon by the next year. For years all trains puff d into Coleman, backed onto a Y urried around and went back to th Ballinger and points where th ights of way were completed rights of way were completed.
Stockard's new store building was the pride of the town. The front was to the north, on Main Street. as we have said, and probably the first merchant to rent the lower story was W. R. Kelley, whose wife was sister of Caleb Grady. Like many of this had bea proposas cultured family before the Civil War, and were bringing thei precious heirloom furniture and heir culture and ideals to the open land. Anyone with adequate financing and careful management could succeed in business, and the affable Kelley made friend of all his customers.
