One word means more to the future of Texas than any other, "Water!"
With a sufficient, widely distributed supply of water, the state Until recently Until recently, Texans have deal haphazard fashion. In many in stances, water has been the focus of bitter regional disputes-usually - with water-rich coastal areas pitted against dry West Texas.

For the first time in the state's history, lawmakers from throughout Texas bent to the task of developing Texans, Concerns for all regions were considered; none was slighted nor favored
On Nov. 5, Texans will have a chance to vote on this plan, most of which is contained within two amendments-the first two-in a con-
stitutional election. Voters, especially West Texas voters, should begin to mobilize now to push for approval of Amendments 1 and 2.
Constitutional elections usually attract few voters. They often feature bohum amendments, and this elec-
