No Pass--No Play at SAHS

Report cards for the first six weeks of school went out last Thursday (10-17-85). Like all other schools in the state, SAHS had its share of students who did not make at least a 70 in all of their classes. Twenty-seven (27) of the one hundred and eight (108) high school students failed one or more classes. That figure represents 25 percent of the student body. Nine of those students had been participating in extra-curricular activities. They are scholastically ineligible until the end of the second six weeks (November 27).

The failure rates by grade classifications were: 9th grade, 18 of 44 (41 percent); 10th grade, 6 of 25 (24 percent); 11th grade, 2 of 20 (10 percent); and 12th grade, 1 of 19 (5

percent). The failure rates by extra-curricular activities were: football, 7 of 40 (17 percent); girls basketball, 2 of 19 (11 percent); band, 5 of 50 (10 percent); and cheerleading, 0 of 6 (0 percent).

Although the failure rate seems high, it is down from 37 percent at the end of the first three weeks. Another positive note is that one football player who was ineligible at the beginning of school brought his grades up to passing.

As a comparison, twenty-four (24) high school students made the honor roll. Their average in classes (excluding band, physical education, and athletics) was 90 or higher. The final tally: 22 percent honor roll vs 25 percent on the failing list for the first six weeks of school.

WATER! Spread the Word.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This article taken in part from the Abilene Reporter News, dated Sunday, October 20, 1985.)

One word means more to the future of Texas than any other, "Water!"

With a sufficient, widely distributed supply of water, the state will flourish. Without water, it won't.

Until recently, Texans have dealt with water in a somewhat haphazard fashion. In many instances, water has been the focus of bitter regional disputes--usually with water-rich coastal areas pitted against dry West Texas.

For the first time in the state's history, lawmakers from throughout Texas bent to the task of developing a comprehensive water plan for ALL Texans. Concerns for all regions were considered; none was slighted nor favored.

On Nov. 5, Texans will have a chance to vote on this plan, most of which is contained within two amendments--the first two--in a constitutional election. Voters, especially West Texas voters, should begin to mobilize now to push for approval of Amendments 1 and 2.

Constitutional elections usually attract few voters. They often feature ho-hum amendments, and this election is no exception.

The only difference this time is that the two water amendments are of nearly life-or-death importance.

The first amendment authorizes the state to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds to create a special fund to

develop new water sources, help conserve water and guard against floods and pollution. The second authorizes funds to aid conservation of agricultural water.

Gulf Coast voters may view the state plan as "foreign aid" for West Texas. And these are the voters who are assured of going to the polls.

Houston (with a hotly contested mayoral race), as well as San Antonio, Dallas and other major East Texas cities will have other races on the ballot as well as the two water amendments.

Perhaps they will favor the water plan, but then traditionally they are suspicious that only West Texans will benefit. West Texans cannot afford to leave these amendments to an uncertain fate; they must go to the polls.

Concerned citizens, chambers of commerce, elected officials, civic organizations--EVERYONE--must work to mobilize voters. A huge West Texas turnout is essential to ensure approval of the water plan.

Letter to the Editor

To the Citizens of Santa Anna: I feel obligated to let the citizens of Santa Anna know how important the fire department is to our community, especially to property owners.

In the state of Texas the amount of insurance that you pay on homes and buildings is affected by key rates and fire record percentages. The key rates are determined by two things: the water system, and the fire department. Key rates are rated from 99, which is an unprotected town with no fire department, to as low as 13, which is a town with a paid fire department like Dallas and Fort Worth. Santa Anna's key rate is 34, which is very good for a small town with a volunteer fire department. In comparison with other towns our size: Cross Plains has a 71 key rate; Rising Star has a 73 key rate; Bangs has a 46 key rate; and DeLeon has a 48 key rate. In key rates lower numbers are better and save you money. On a \$20,000 home in Santa Anna, as compared to one in a town with little or no fire department you will save over \$100 a year just on your homeowners insurance. So the next time the volunteer fire department has a fund drive, or puts on a hamburger cook, give them your support.

Isn't it good to know that when you dial 348-3100 that you are going to hear "Fire Department". Be proud of your local fire department.

Members with lambs will be able to have them sheared on December 15. This will be the ONLY day 4-H Sponsors will shear the sheep.

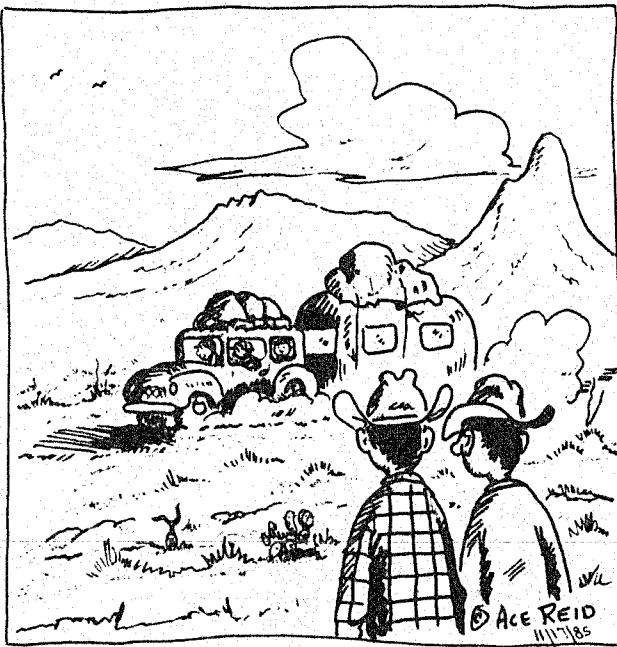
On November 23 a lamb and swine showmanship will be held. Details will be given at the next meeting.

Class of 1945 Meets

Usually on Friday morning at 9 o'clock all classes were gathered to the auditorium for Assembly. We had various types of programs. A movie star, a magician, an artist, or maybe a great sportsman may come by and speak to us. Many times one of the ministers in town would come and bring us a little sermonette and have prayer. Our ways were patterned and disciplined. Freshmen sat in the southeast corner and sophomores in the southwest corner. Juniors sat behind freshmen and seniors behind the sophomores. We also sat in alphabetical order in Assembly and in all our classes.

All students of SAHS were called into the auditorium by Superintendent D. D. Burns on Monday, December 8, 1941 to hear by radio the declaration of war on Japan by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. In the Southeast corner sat the wide-eyed young class of '45-Freshmen of the day.

During our high school years the most drastic changes America ever witnessed took place. As Freshmen we had 80 students but in a few months there were many changes in our class roll. Wartime moves by families to work in defense plants took many away to far places. Homemaking classes learned to knit and to roll bandages. Parking lots were no problem for you'd not find but two or three cars there. Tires, gasoline, sugar, shoes, etc. were rationed. In previous years it was so unusual to see an airplane that when one was heard in the distance everyone would run out in the yard to watch it. Now they were a constant thing as men trained for war. Rockwood consolidated as we added several new members to our class as Sophomores. All sports were stopped as were any interscholastic activities. As Seniors the girls were finally allowed to wear pants but only on the very coldest days. Vacant seats in the classrooms probably meant someone has joined the Army, Navy or Marines.

Wartime causes maturity, responsibility, commitment, and patriotism. In due season this class graduated and took their various places of responsibility. They were so busy and so involved that class reunions were hard to come by. In 1965 we had a small group to meet, but this year for our 40th anniversary our class president, now professional motivator, Oran Lewellen began to work on this reunion. Others joined in the effort and we can report a great and wonderful reunion for the Class of 1945.

back by Shelby Tuttle's pass interception at the goal line.

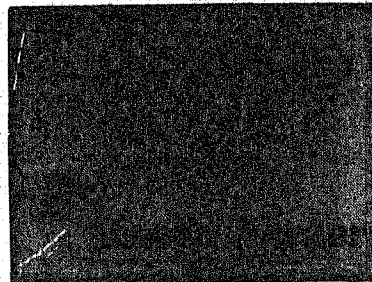

This Friday the Mountaineers will host Robert Lee for a game with a 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

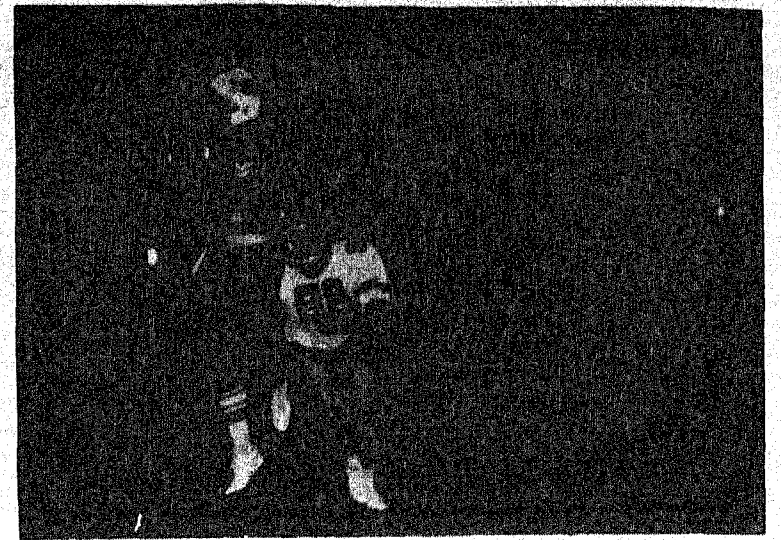

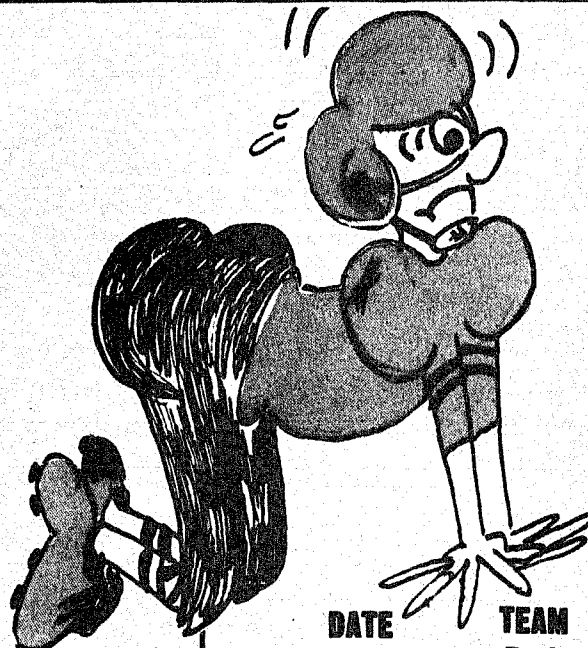
On City Council Meeting

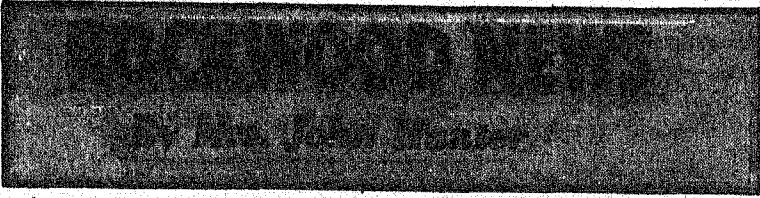

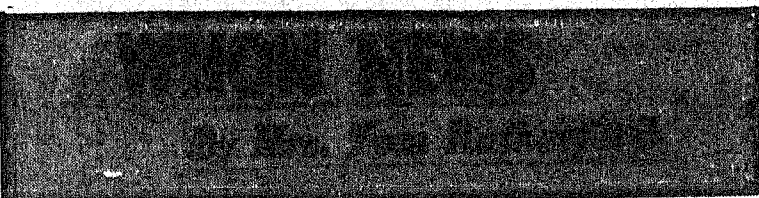
