#### Abstract

There's one exercise that everyone-from toddlers to oldster atheltes-can do, and that's stretch. The wonderful thing about stretching is that you don't have to be in top physical condition or have top physical condition or have special athletic skills. Also you can special athletic skills. Also you can do it any time, like at the start of your day, at work to release nervous tension, when watching TV or in the tension, when watching TV or in the car. Simply stretch any part of your car. Simply stretch any part of your body to the point where you feel body to the point where you feel mild tension, and relas as you hol mild tension, and relas as you hold the stretch. The whole process should take 10.30 seconds.

Those few seconds of stretching, if done on a regular basis, will reduce feel more relaxed. It will increase your range of motion and help your coordination. Stretching Stretching should always be done before and after physical activity like running, skiing, tennis or swimming. It prepares your body for the activity and can prevent injuries such as muscle strains.
