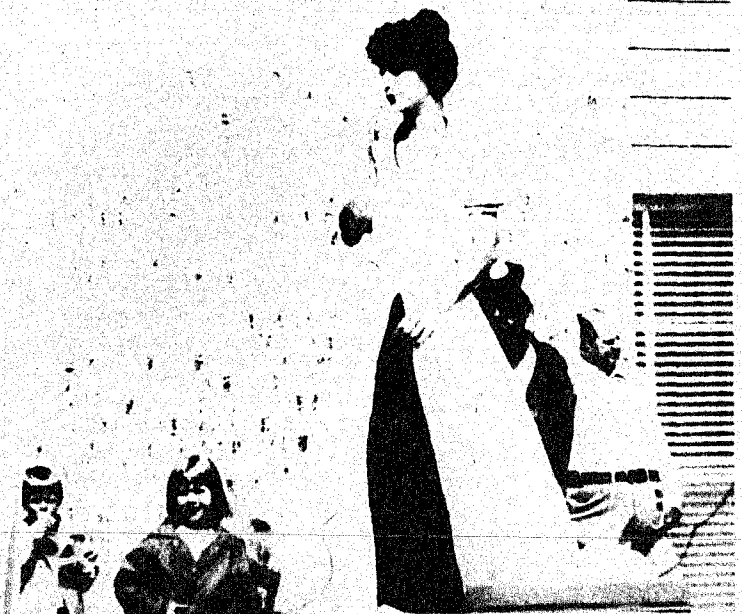

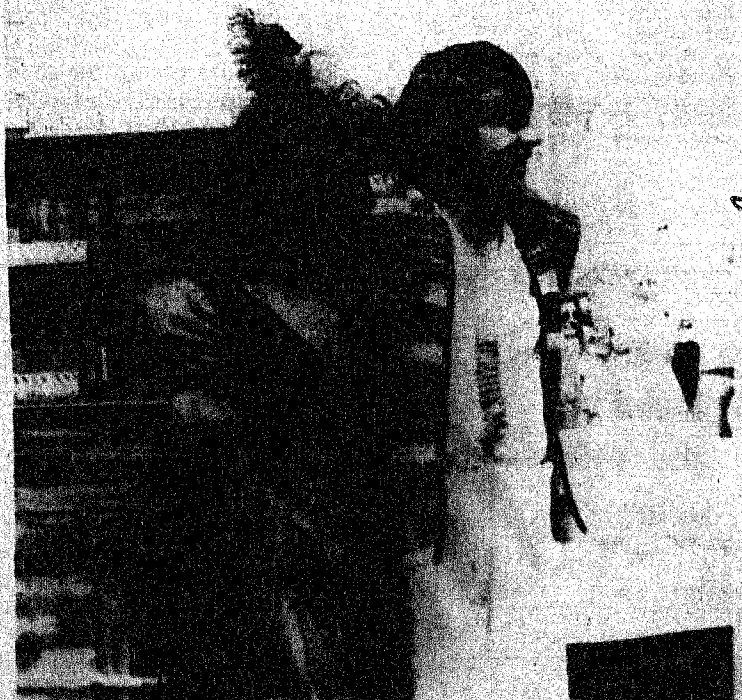
## Sewer Survey Being Taken

## Charlotte Garrett Nominee For Miss WTC

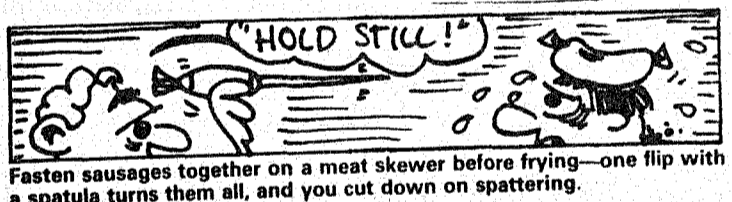
SNYDER-Charlotte Garrett of Santa Anna was a nominee for the title of Miss WTC at Western Texas College recently.

The Orioles are now 2-1 on the year. They take on the Coleman Astros Thursday night in Coleman at 7:00 p.m.

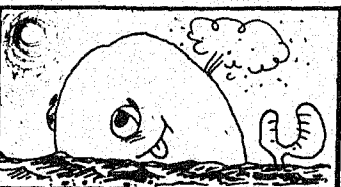

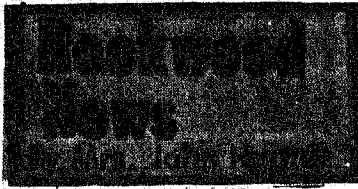

Stopping to see Linnie recently were Mr. and Mrs. Andy Hancock of Midland and Mr. and Mrs. Robert See of Coleman.

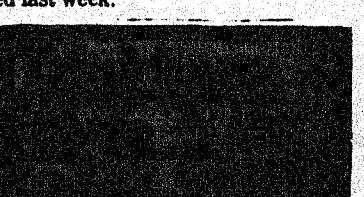

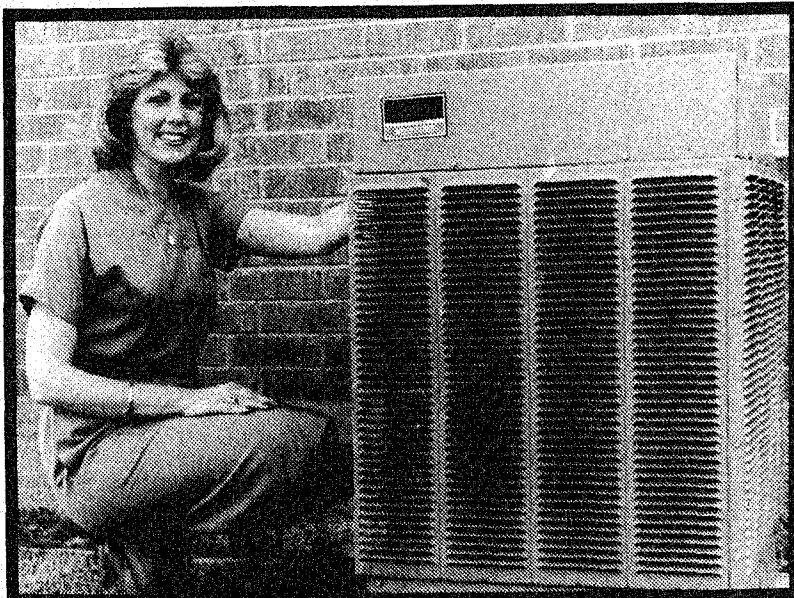

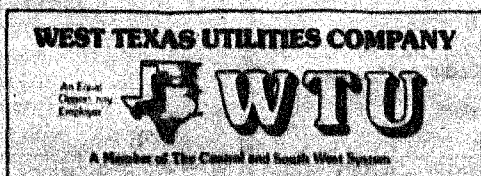
