Christ. We see the symbol of the power that can break the bonds o every captive. We see the symbol of a redeeming love that can heal any broken heart. We see the shame of the cross and we see jo
unspeakable and full of glory When we look upon the cross all of our illusions about ourselves are shattered As we experience a
special awareness about the cross special awareness about the cross
sin must stand revealed for what it sin must stand revealed for what it
is. Sin is revealed as a destroyer. For when I look at the cross I can hear God speaking. I hear Him saying, "This is What your sin means."
There is not much in life as terrible There is not much in life as terrible worry about sin it is because we have never looked upon the cross. I cannot stand at Cavalry and fool myself int thinking that sin does not matter. It must matter to me because it matters terribly to God. Revelation the souls of sinful men when faced with the Lamb and His scars, when confronted with the nail
scarred hands of Jesus, when confronted with the price that was paid are heard crying to the mountains, "Fall On Us" and to the rocks,
"Hide us from His face." And $I$, when I look at what my sins have done to Jesus, $I$ am ashamed and $I$
wonder at the possibility of hope. So
as I become aware of the shame of
the cross I also become aware of the me cross I also become aware of the across the earth. But how has a Cross that was made to kill become a symbol of a death defying home? Why can a revival be started by the crass? Why do our hymns fill
themselves with the wondrous light of the cross? How has that hill so far away become the center of the universe? Couldn't it be because of
the inexpressible gift of the grace of God in Jesus Christ? For Cae of God in Jesus Christ? For Calvary
was not just Pilates deed, of Judas, of the Romans, or the Pharisees, or the crowd, nor was it only my deed, or the deed of any of the Adam's and
Eve's in our world. I believe the Cross was God's deed. It was God's Cross was God's deed. st was God's
action. It was God himself taking the sins of a tragic, wrong, warring world upon Himself and upon his heart. It was God defeating the prin-
cipalities and the powers of cipalities and the powers of
darkness at the point of their seeming victory. It was the story of the prisoners being set free. So a great
light shines from the cross. It is a light shines from the cross. It is a light that examines our hearts and
shatters my illusions about myself. It is a light that blesses and gives life, and shame gives way to a brand new life in Jesus Christ. So in Christ our chains fall off and our hearts are made free. Jesus has risen as the
