Good Rains Here During May

The Santa Anna area—and much of Central Texas—has received rainfall several times this month.

At the official gauge in Santa Anna, rainfall this month has included .02 inches on Thursday, May 8; 1.30 inches on Friday, May 9; 1.20 inches on Saturday, May 10; 1.22 inches on Saturday, May 17; and 0.75 inches on Sunday, May 25.

The total rainfall in Santa Anna for the month of May stands at 4.49 inches, with a total for the year at 8.81 inches, having received 0 inches in January; 1.27 inches in February; 0.55 inches in March; and 1.50 inches in April.

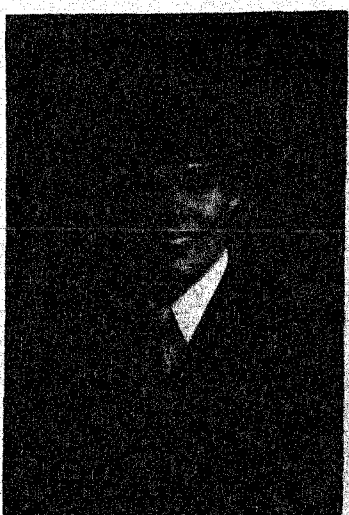
The band and band boosters recognized each graduating senior by presenting each with a red rose to be presented to their mothers.

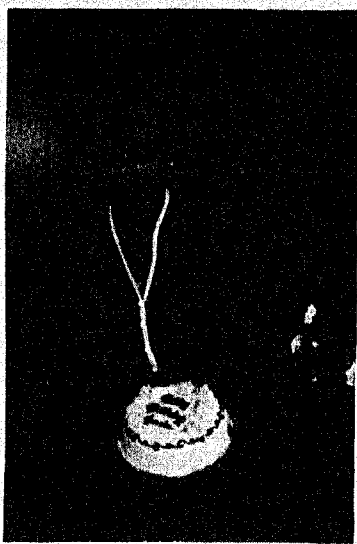

Thoughts From Our Pastors

GOD HAS SPOKEN
"God, who at Sundry times and in divers manners spake in time unto the fathers by the prophets, hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son, whom he hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also he made the worlds" (Heb.1:1-2). There can be no doubt in the mind of even the casual Bible student that it claims to be the inspired word of God. If this claim be true, and it most certainly is true! Then people ought to be interested enough to really listen to what He has spoken—see John 5:39 and II-Tim. 2:15. When wise and honorable men speak people listen. How much more important it is that we listen to what God has spoken—see Heb. 2:1-4.

putting his words in their minds and in their mouths. He sometimes revealed his will through visions and dreams. Peter said, "Holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost". II-Peter 1:21.

Essential to a proper understanding and application of the scriptures is the recognition of the fact that the Bible is divided into two distinct parts, referred to in the Scriptures themselves as the Old Testament and the New Testament, or the Old Covenant and the New Covenant. Each of these serve a distinct purpose. The Old Covenant, testament and law (used interchangeably with reference to one and the same) was given specifically to the Israelites (Deut. 4:13 and 5:1-21). Paul affirms that its primary purpose was that of a "schoolmaster" to bring the Israelites to Christ, as a fulfillment of God's promise to Abraham (Galatians 3:19-29).

Bible believers accept the fact that it is a revelation from God of himself and of his will to man. It is most important that we understand how, to whom and why God has revealed himself. God did not speak or reveal his entire will to any one person at any one time or by any one method or manner; but as we learn from Heb. 1:1-2, it was at "sundry times and in diverse manners" that he "spoke unto the fathers by the prophets". Also, that he has "in these last days spoken unto us by his Son". The Bible was divinely revealed and recorded (written) by about forty different writers over a period of about 1500 years. It was not always revealed in the same manner. God sometimes spoke orally and directly to the prophets. Sometimes he inspired the prophets,

Our text further states that God "hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son" (Heb. 1:2). We are further warned "to give the more earnest heed to the things we have heard—which at the first began to be spoken by the Lord, and was confirmed unto us by them that heard him" (Heb. 2:1-4). Under the Old Covenant dispensation God spoke to the Israelites through Moses and the other prophets, but today he speaks to people of every race and nation by his Son and his apostles and prophets. Are you listening?

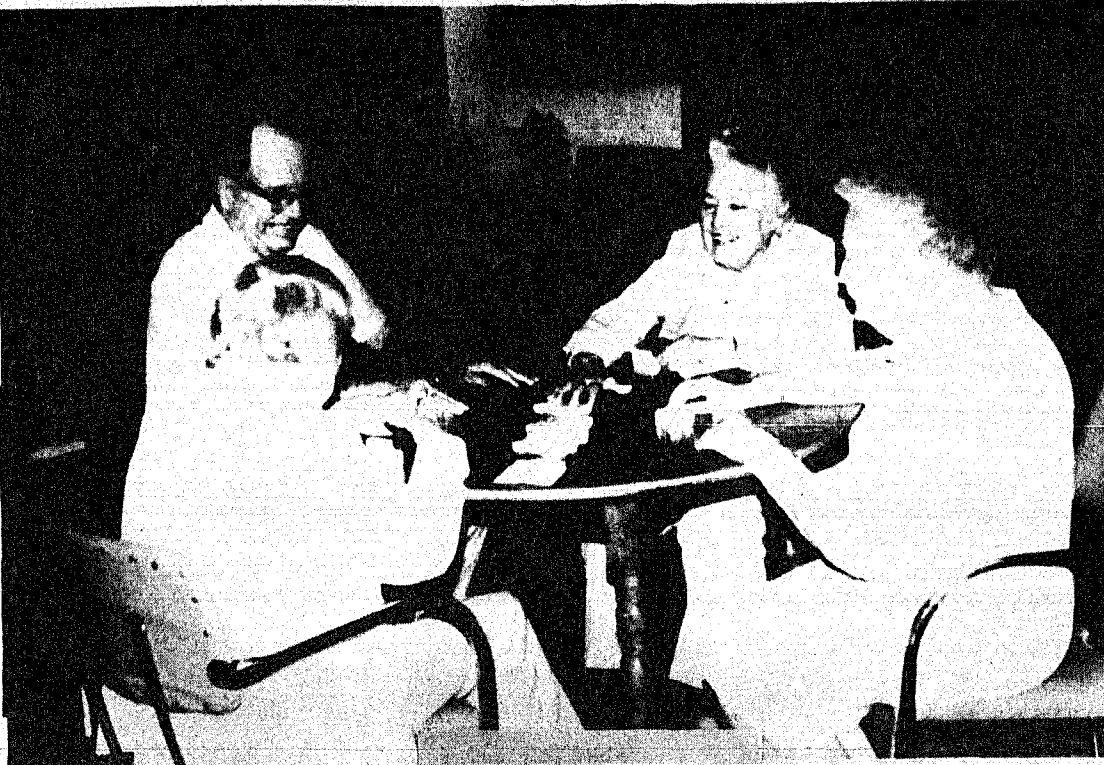

Social Security Helps Younger People Too

By PRISCILLA ELY

Social Security is not just for older people. Test your knowledge of how the program also affects younger Americans. Answers are at the end.

- 1.) People of all ages can get Social Security checks. True or False
- 2.) You must be needy to get benefits. True or False
- 3.) Most employed and self-employed people pay Social Security taxes. True or False
- 4.) You must be at least 40 and permanently disabled to get disability checks. True or False
- 5.) Children can get survivors benefits only if the deceased parent worked under Social Security at least 5 years. True or False
- 6.) In some cases, benefits for children can be paid past age 18. True or False
- 7.) If you need a Social Security card to get a job and don't have one, you can borrow someone else's card. True or False
- 8.) A young widow with children cannot receive survivors checks if she has a part-time job. True or False
- 9.) If an employer makes a mistake reporting my wages, it can be corrected. True or False
- 10.) By the time I retire in 30 years, there will not be enough money left in the Social Security funds to pay me benefits. True or False

ANSWERS—If you got 9 or 10 correct, you did "Excellent." A score of 7 or 8 would be "Good" and 5 or 6 is "average."

- 1.) TRUE. Social Security pays retirement, survivors, and disability monthly benefits to some 37 million people. Also it provides Medicare protection for most older people and some with severe long-term disabilities.
- 2.) FALSE. Benefits are paid as an earned right. If a person has earned enough Social Security credits through covered work, benefits will be paid.
- 3.) TRUE. Over 9 out of 10 working people are covered by Social Security.
- 4.) FALSE. Disability benefits can be paid to workers at any age under 65 if they are insured and are unable to work for a year or more due to disability.
- 5.) FALSE. Survivors benefits may be payable to children if the deceased worker had Social Security coverage for as little as 1½ years in the 3 years before a death.
- 6.) TRUE. Payments can be made until 19 if a child is still in high school. Also checks can be paid if a son or daughter becomes severely disabled before 22.
- 7.) FALSE. Each person is issued a

number which he or she keeps for life. Earnings from all jobs are recorded on a lifetime earnings record and result in credits needed before benefits can be paid. If you borrowed a card, your earnings would erroneously be recorded to someone else's Social Security record.

8.) FALSE. In 1986, a beneficiary under 65 can earn up to \$5,760 and receive all benefits due. If earnings exceed that, \$1 in benefits should be

withheld for each \$2 of earnings over \$5,760. (There are special rules, which include medical considerations, for disabled beneficiaries.)

9.) TRUE. Report errors promptly to Social Security so they can be corrected. About every three years, you should request a statement of your earnings to make sure all earnings

have been properly reported. Entitlement to and the amount of future benefits will depend on your record.

Ask at any Social Security office for a free form to request this free earnings statement.

10.) Because Social Security is compulsory for most workers, it is assured of regular income. Also important financing reforms were

enacted in 1983 that ensure that benefits will continue to be paid, now and in the future.

Cream the margarine and cup of sugar. Beat in the egg and molasses.

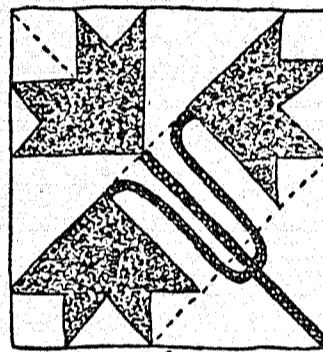

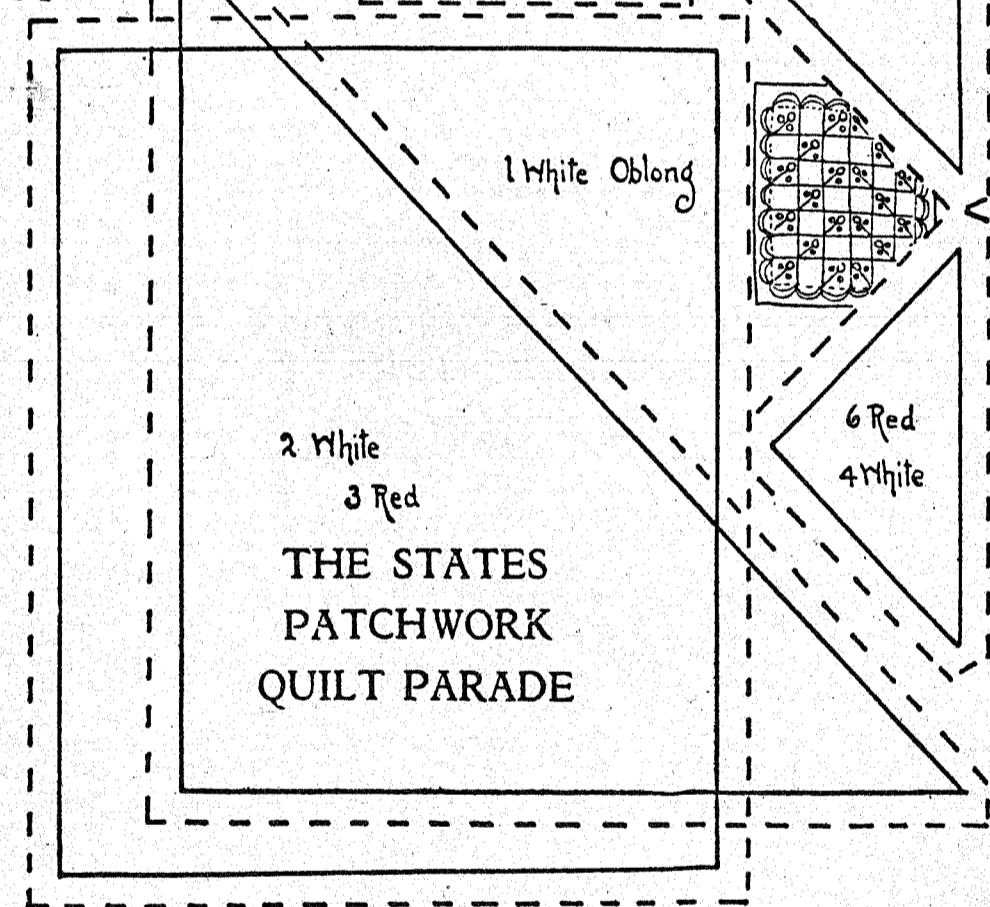

THE STATES PATCHWORK QUILT PARADE

North Carolina Lily Here is an heirloom block with a new and interesting placing suggested in the small sketch for a quilt top. This takes 22 pieced blocks and 20 plain squares about 11½ inches square. After your blocks are pieced you can determine the exact size of the alternate squares, but it will be over 12 inches.

The large triangle for which there is no pattern will be almost seven inches on its two right angle sides and hence about nine and one-quarter on the long side. The stems are bias tape in green or brown and will place quite easily if you are careful to cut them exactly alike in length for all blocks. The block itself is quite easily pieced by making the large top triangle with the flower center and then the band with two flowers and oblong center. That large top triangle by the way, would make a wonderful border for your quilt alternated with plain white triangles of equal size. It would be about seven inches wide.

For a quilt having 42 blocks and this pieced border, finishing about 83 by 95, you will need two yards of red, seven yards of white and three six yard bolts of tape.

HPU Incentive Scholarship

BROWNWOOD—An incentive scholarship plan for high school seniors—reducing tuition charges by about two-thirds—has been announced by Howard Payne University.

The plan will be introduced during 1986 summer sessions, and continue through the long terms of 1986 and 1987. In effect, three-hour courses whose usual tuition charges are \$294 will be available to qualifying high school seniors for \$100 each.

High School students who have completed their junior year, with permission of parents and high school principals, may take college courses during the summer prior to their senior year of high school, as well as one course per semester during their senior year of high school.

It is anticipated that some students will earn up to 18 hours of college credit which will be awarded upon high school graduation. While students will not qualify for these

scholarships after their class has completed high school, most will qualify for other scholarships if they choose to continue their education at HPU.

"Obviously, this program is for students who are above average in their high school work," said Dr. Don Newbury, HPU President, "We feel that these incentive scholarships will encourage them to sample college work early at an extremely attractive cost. Upon high school graduation, they will be well ahead in their college pursuits, whether or not they choose to continue their education at Howard Payne."
