Library Reading Program Scheduled for Summer "Celebrate Texas"

The Santa Anna Library and the Self Culture Club of Santa Anna are sponsoring a summer reading program for children of the community. The Library is appealing to each parent to get their child or children involved in the reading program. A child's participation could make a difference in his or her grades in school next year; and a preschooler would delight in being read to.

The theme of the summer reading program this year is "Celebrate Texas" and each meeting will focus on a different subject. The dates and programs are as follows: June 11-Texas Rangers-History of Santa Anna; June 30-Cowboys; July 9-Texas Highways and Wildflowers; July 23-Indians and Wild Animals; August 6-Space-NASA; and August 20-Party-Presentation of Awards. The sessions will last about 1 to 1 1/2 hours and will begin at 9:30 a.m. Each session will give children an opportunity

to have fun and learn new things about their state and its heritage. At each session there will be a short program with special guest speakers, a read aloud time (for small children) or game time (for the older children) and a time for checking out books to read. Awards will be made for reading a certain number of books. At the last session there will be a party and an awards ceremony.

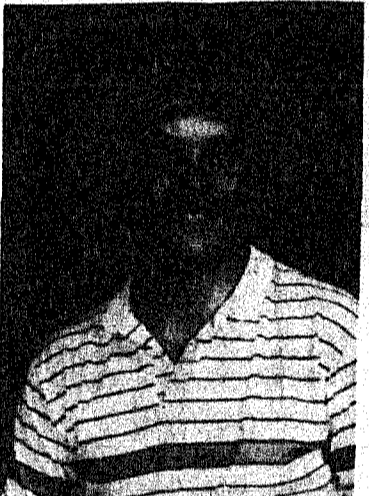

Photography Contest

One of the nation's oldest and largest human relations agencies, the Anti-Defamation League, in conjunction with the Texas Press Association, is sponsoring a photography contest that will reflect Texas' progress since its inception 150 years ago. Amateurs and professionals are invited to enter the statewide Sesquicentennial contest based on the theme "The American Dream in Texas."

The American Dream to some may be a chrome-gull winged Cadillac to many others it may be equality of opportunity, freedom of choice, better education or harmonious relations," says Andrew Solomon, chairman of the ADL Texas Sesquicentennial Planning Group. "However Texans view the American Dream, they should capture it on film and enter their pictures in the contest."

The Texas Press Association and the Anti-Defamation League are sponsoring the contest to get Texans involved with the spirit of the Sesquicentennial. The Texas Press

Savings Bonds Sales In Texas Up 16 Percent In March

During the first quarter of calendar year 1986, Texas sales of U.S. Savings Bonds amounted to \$94,802,245, an increase of over \$13 million over 1985 for 16.4 percent, T. J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced today. These sales represent 25.8 percent of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370 million. March 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds were \$33,634,254, an increase of 15.1 percent over March 1985.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$5,673 during March 1986 in Coleman County, Larry D. Willard, Volunteer County Chairman, said. Total sales in the County during the period January-March, 1986 were \$35,341, which represents 47.7 percent of the County's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, March sales of U.S. Savings Bonds totaled \$969 million, 46 percent above March a year ago and the highest sales for any March since 1979. Sales of U.S. Savings

Good Rains During May

Santa Anna received 0.58 of an inch of rain on Friday, May 30 and 0.82 of an inch of rain on Saturday, May 31, making a total rainfall count of 5.97 for May. Santa Anna received 1.30 inches on May 9; 1.20 inches on May 10; 1.22 inches on May 17; and 0.75 of an inch on May 25.

On Sunday, June 1st, Santa Anna received 0.5 of an inch of rain and on Monday, June 2, we received 0.8 of an inch, making June rainfall standing at 1.3 inches.

\$9.1 Million Collected In Back Taxes For State

AUSTIN-State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that a roundup of delinquent and inactive taxpayers in April netted more than \$9.1 million in back taxes for the state.

Last month Bullock refused to hand out new sales tax permits to some 150,000 business that owed taxes or failed to file reports last year. Of the taxpayers who lost their permits in April, Bullock has reopened the accounts of \$18,787 taxpayers who have settled their debts.

"We let folks know that if they wanted to do business in Texas, they had to hold a new permit. And we weren't issuing permits to tax delinquents until they paid what was due. I guess they knew we were serious. We have \$9.1 million in the bank to prove it," Bullock said.

Besides the delinquent taxpayers who paid up, another 300,000 tax-

payers with clean records received new permits. The remaining taxpayers who failed to file returns or reported no sales during 1985 are considered to be out-of-business.

"Sometimes businesses fail, but the owners forget to tell us so we can take them off the books. Besides the money we picked up from back taxes, we're saving the state another \$250,000 each year in paperwork, processing and postage on those 134,000 dead accounts," Bullock said. "I've got to declare this project a success."

Bullock reminded consumers to be on the look out for the new red, white and blue permit and "Be aware of who you're doing business with." Businesses not displaying the new permits are operating illegally, he said. The money collected in back taxes has been placed in the General Revenue Fund.

Franchise Tax Checks Sent

AUSTIN-State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday sent checks totaling \$97.4 million from the second year's collection of the state's franchise tax on banks to 2,022 local taxing jurisdictions.

"We've had several large banks in Houston and Dallas file for extensions-leaving another \$9.6 million on hold until these banks file their returns with the allocation reports in mid-June," Bullock said.

Banks are granted extensions if they pay 50 percent of the tax due. The City of Santa Anna received \$2,086.19 while the Santa Anna ISD

received \$2,665.00.

Taxing jurisdictions in Harris County received \$11.6 million. The Houston Independent School District received \$3.7 million and the city of Houston got \$2.8 million. Payments to taxing units in Dallas County totaled \$11.7 million. Dallas ISD's payment was \$4.3 million and the city of Dallas received \$3.3 million.

Tarrant County checks totaled \$3.4 million and total collections in Bexar County were \$3.4 million. Travis County taxing districts received a total of \$1.9 million. El Paso County payments totaled \$788,178.

The Legislation in 1984 brought banks under the franchise tax for the first time and allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other local taxing units where the banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the new bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

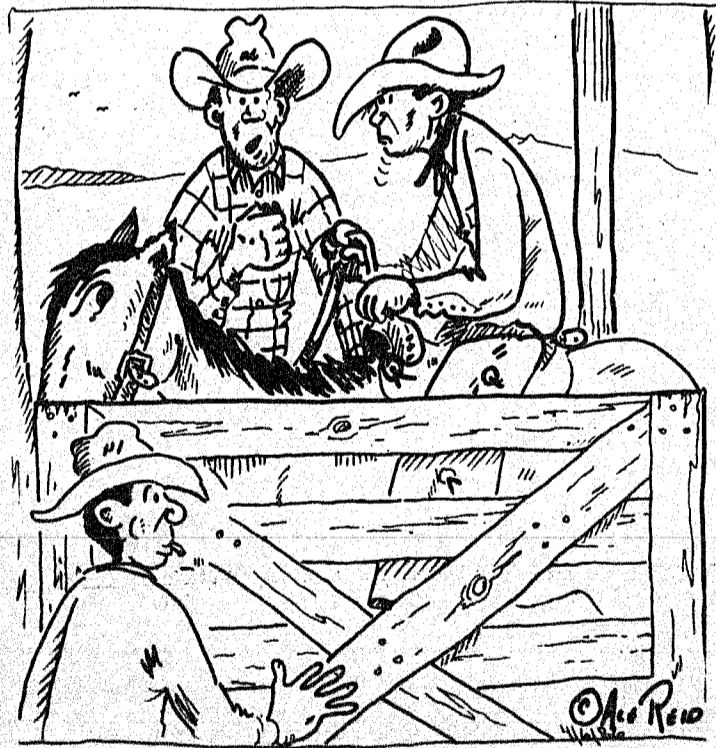

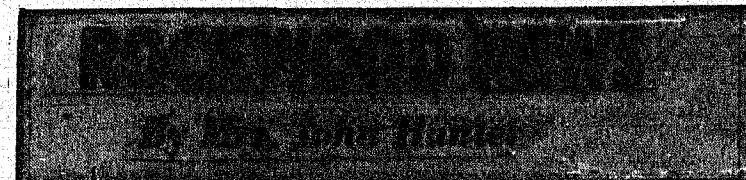
A Farm Girl?

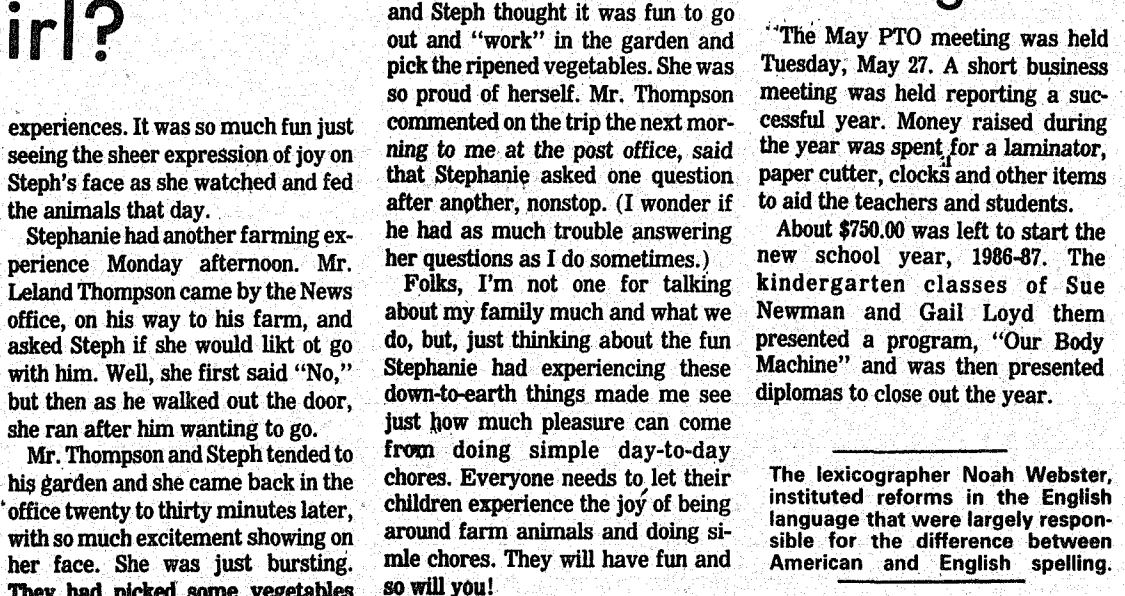
MAY PTO Meeting

Low-income households may be eligible for energy assistance

AUSTIN—Some low-income Texas households may be eligible for help in paying their cooling bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Commissioner Marlin Johnston.

Commissioner Johnston said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Households which this month received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income will be mailed applications automatically. Other low-income households may request an application from DHS during the enrollment period of June 16 through July 18.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a one-person household having less than a \$547.49 gross income per month. The gross income limit is \$733.49 for a two-person household, \$919.49 for three, \$1,105.49 for four, \$1,291.49 for five, and \$1,477.49 for six.

Eligible households must be subject to energy cost increases—because of bills or rent being higher due to rising energy costs.

Households in privately owned or rented housing are eligible if the cost for cooling is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are

made payable to the energy company for the benefit of the eligible person.

Households receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy company business office with the regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy company. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.

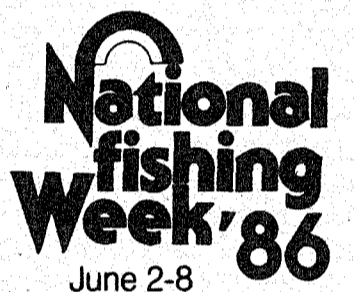

The Unseen Killer

Heartworm disease is a growing problem in our area. Because the symptoms are not severe until the animal becomes heavily infested, many dogs are not treated until they have spread the disease to many other dogs. There have been cases in all areas of Santa Anna, surrounding towns, and even in rural areas; so no locality is safe. The disease is spread by mosquitoes, and since mosquito bites are not obvious on dogs, you will not know when your dog becomes infected.

The adult worm lives in the heart, is about 12 inches long, and can shed as many as 5000 baby worms into the blood stream per day. The baby worms are transmitted by mosquitoes from dog to dog. Rarely do they infect cats or humans. It takes about 6 months for the baby worms to develop into adults within the heart. After the adult worms begin producing microfilariae (baby worms), a blood test performed by your veterinarian will diagnose the presence of heartworms. If the test is positive, your veterinarian can begin treatment of the disease. If the test is negative, the dog can be started on preventive medication. All dogs should be tested every 6 to 12 months to be sure the disease does not progress to a dangerous level before it is detected.

If the worms have been present long enough in large enough numbers to cause damage to the circulation, the symptoms may include a dry cough, shortness of breath, lack of stamina, listlessness, and weight loss. When damage has become severe, the dog may develop a pot belly from build up of ascitic fluid in the abdomen.

The disease is treatable if detected before severe damage has been done to the liver and kidneys. The disease can be prevented by giving the dog oral treatment to kill the infective larvae before they develop into adult worms. Prevention insures that the dogs vital organs not be damaged by the worms and that he not have to experience the discomfort of treatment.
