The 1971 sale was under the record \$28,212 receipts last year, but well over the \$18,282 mark from two years ago.



### THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE has its work cut out for it as it convened Tuesday for the 62nd session.

Not the least of its problems is where to get additional tax money for the next biennium Governor Preston Smith is scheduled to offer some solution to the problem in his speech to the joint houses but whether the members go along with him is something else.

Another problem which the session will face is what to do about the Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass enabling laws for liquor by the drink. They are also required in establish regulations, and predictions are that such legislation will be difficult.

If the enabling legislation allows for local option elections, then any precinct can vote in liquor by-thedrink and all surrounding precincts will have the problem with none of the say.

Local option for liquor is the most unfair type of legislation that can be devised. Instead of allowing the majority of the people in a county vote, a small segment can get together and vote liquor, but the whole area has the problem of regulation and law enforcement.

Proof lies in the fact that appliance service companies report on automatic washers alone, about 40 per cent of first-year service calls could be avoided. Service calls, on most ap-

First, learn all you can about your appliance.

Second, check a few simple items before you call a technician, Not only is it embarrassing to have a service technician tell you the machine isn't plugged in or that a fuse is blown . . . it can be expensive, too.





Katherine went to neighnood laundry to pick up her week's wash. But the proprietor greeted he with bad news.



When you leave clothing at either a laundry or a dry cleaner, you are creating what the law calls a "bailment." The company, as the bailee, must take reasonable

care of your belongings. Although not to blame for an unavoidable loss, it is liable for a loss it could fairly have prevented.

Suppose the company tries to protect itself by a notice saying it is not responsible for losses of any kind. Does' that make a difference?"

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





Right now hundreds of Americans are being held captive in North Vietnam.

A few prisoners have made it back. They talk about bamboo cages. Vicious beatings. Malnutrition. Humiliation. But the North Vietnamese will tell us

nothing. And it's this silence that makes our appeal more urgent.

For the families at home, there is no word on who's alive. Who's dead. Or even who's being held. There is nothing. Except the anguish of not knowing.

It'll cost you a quarter. But it might saye a life.




