LOCAL BOY SCOUTS ATTEND SOIL CONSERVATION CAMPEREE

The Santa Anna Boy Scout troop took part last weekend in a Soil Conservation Campere at Hords Creek Lake west of Coleman. The local group was under the leadership of Allen Early, scout master for the troop.

Sponsored by the Soil Conservation Service, the two-day campere was attended by about 70 boys from the southern district of the Chisholm Trail Scout Council, including boys from Santa Anna, Winters, Eula, and Clyde.

The Friday night program was presented by Roy Winborne and James Lewis of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. They showed a film on poisonous snakes and talked about wildlife preservation.

Bob Roth, a civil engineer with the SCS, gave a demonstration Saturday morning on soil conservation and ways to preserve our soil and other natural resources. David Kelley, area soil scientist with the SCS, demonstrated different types of soil and uses of certain types of soil.

The Saturday afternoon program was directed by Bob Pearson, district soil conservationist, and included a talk on ecology and a field trip which showed different plants and types of grass common to this area.

The campere ended at 4:00 p. m. Saturday afternoon.

ASC NEWS . . .

Coleman County has been approved by the Office of Emergency Preparedness to carry out wind erosion control practices. They have allocated \$15,000 to this county for that purpose.

The practice to be approved for Coleman County is listing or chiselling. Eighty per cent of the cost of carrying out these practices will be approved provided they are not carried out for routine farming practices performed in connection with the preparation of a crop.

It would appear that these emergency practices would be applicable on land that would be summer fallowed this year.

All farmers and ranchers in Coleman County will receive a newsletter containing the information on the emergency livestock feed program as it is now operated. A certification and financial statement must be filed by each producer who files for emergency feed or hay.

Grain in the form of milo, oats and the grain content of mixed feeds will be available.

Farmers may receive feed grain, mixed feed or hay or a combination of these three types of grain under the program.

On the transportation of hay the rate will be two-thirds the cost of freight or hauling not to exceed \$20 a ton. Hay hauled by the livestock owner will be six cents per ton, per loaded mile, not to exceed \$20 per ton.

For the primary herd the producer's price for milo will be \$1.61 per cwt and for oats 59c a bushel. For the secondary the producer's price for milo will be \$2.11 and for oats 78c.

A producer is eligible for one and a half times as much hay as grain under the program.

For mixed feed the producer is eligible for that portion of grain that is contained in the mixed feed. The price will be at the same rate he will pay for milo.

A maximum charge of leasing grazing on set-aside and CAP is \$1 per acre per month. The maximum charge for baled hay is \$30 a ton, if baled by the owner and sold.


