Free Public Library Plans For SA Announced By City Library Board

The Santa Anna City Library Board unanimously adopted a plan for the City Library to be a free public facility, beginning immediately. The action came after the City Council approved monthly financial aid for the library. The new procedure will make the library books available to everyone in the community at no charge. Only overdue fines and charges for lost books will be assessed readers. Prior to this time readers have been charged \$1.00 a year for reading privileges.

Beginning in June the library will be open each week-

day, 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and 2:00 to 5:00 p. m. Linda Dean, Neighborhood Youth Corps worker, will serve as summer librarian. At the end of the summer the library will resume its once weekly day to be open.

Library Board members voted to have no fines assessed for overdue books returned by Friday, June 4. People having unreturned library books are urged to have them back to the library by that date.

Readers are granted two books at a time and given two weeks in which to return them. Books may be re-checked for additional time if needed. Fines for overdue books will now be 25 cents for the first week and 10 cents a week thereafter.

The Texas Readers Club, a summer reading program for children, will be started next month. Any child reading 12 books before the middle of August will be awarded a cer-

tificate from the State Library at Austin. Each child may make his own selections from the many books at the library.

A loan agreement with the Brownwood Public Library provides new books every few months, with a new group of books to be put on the shelves next month.

It is hoped that the new plan for the City Library will encourage people in the community to take advantage of the good reading material available in the library.

It is also noted that the library building clubroom and kitchen are available for club meetings and parties, with table settings on hand for 30. Reservations for the building may be made by contacting Mrs. Bob Garrett, City Secretary.

The City Library Board is composed of representatives of local clubs and organizations, of which Mrs. Elgean Harris is now chairman.

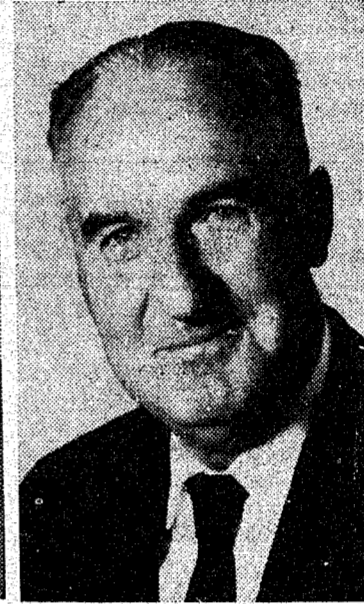

He was named first in the All-West Texas Track Team 880 yard run for classes AA, A and B, with a best time of 1:56.8. Nancy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Baugh, is a graduating senior and salutatorian of her class.

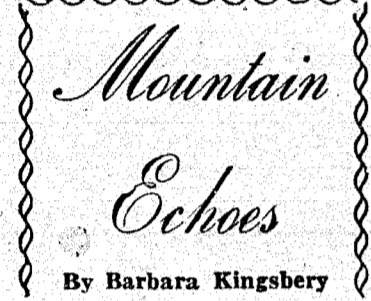
Rev. Ray Elliott Guest Speaker For Men's Group

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In Our Opinion

THERE IS A DRIVE urging Congress to raise the minimum wage to \$2.00 an hour, and as nice as this would be for many employees, the repercussions could cost more than it would gain.

According to an analysis of the survey data gathered by the National Association of Independent Business the impact of the 1966 minimum wage laws was not felt until eight to nine months later. It became effective in February, 1967.

The results showed that following that raise in the minimum wage, 16 per cent of the businesses laid off an average of 3.5 employees each. It was estimated from the survey that over a million jobs were lost because of the raise in the minimum wage.

It was not because these employers wanted to abolish jobs, because the theory of employment is that each employee will earn his salary plus an extra profit for the company. When an employee costs more than he earns it becomes a loss and the job is abolished. No business can stay when costs outweigh income.

The big fallacy with a set minimum wage nationwide is the fact that cost of living varies from one part of the nation to the other. There is no doubt that \$2.00 an hour is a small income in New York City or Chicago, and as a matter of fact, any big city in the United States, even though the variance in living costs is great even among them. But that kind of wage is pretty good in some of the areas where the living costs are much lower, especially in many rural areas of the nation.

What it boils down to is that labor, like commodities, reacts to the law of supply and demand. When the supply is great, the price goes down, and when it is limited, the price goes up.

Indications are that by fall the unemployment rate in the United States will be substantially above the current six per cent. If unemployment goes up, then an increase in the minimum wage will only aggravate the situation, and cause it to go even higher.

One consideration that proponents of a high minimum wage overlook is the impact it has on the hiring of the young. Many of them, fresh out of high school, with no experience, find it hard to find jobs because they must be trained in almost anything they go into. Not many businesses can afford to start a youngster off with the minimum wage and then train him for a job that might take at least a year to put him in a position of earning his pay. Another group who have been hit hard by the minimum wage are the elderly who need to work, as well as the physically handicapped.

Another problem faced by the employer who is forced to pay higher wages is that in order to do so, he must also raise his prices. Resistance to higher prices is getting stronger and stronger, especially in the depressed rural areas and others where many people are living on fixed incomes.

Surveys have shown that there would be many job opportunities to teenagers if employers were not required to comply with a minimum wage. These employees could then be trained, and afterward enter the labor market as skilled or semi-skilled workers with the opportunity of receiving greater wages than the minimum wage would pay them. It was estimated that should employers be exempt from the minimum wage there would be around five million jobs open up for teenagers. Of course this is an estimate as there is no way of actually establishing how many would be hired under these circumstances, but it was reached from surveys taken among independent business firms nationwide.

One thing that has to be considered by employers of so-called "learner" jobs is not only the fact that the employee can not produce until he has learned, but he first must be taught good work habits, then the damage to tools and equipment that goes along with any learner, when put with wage costs can turn the total into quite a salary for no return.

Naturally everyone needs a livable wage, and everyone should be paid for his work, but when we set a standard for the entire nation, regardless of individual situations, then we are asking for trouble. It just won't work. It would be like setting a standard price on tomatoes for every store in the United States. It just won't work successfully.

Wouldn't it be nice to return to the private enterprise system when every business could operate the way the owner wanted it to without government interferences, then each could succeed or fail on its own merits.

I was chosen as Miss SAHS, Miss Spirit of Christmas, and Junior-Senior Prom Queen.

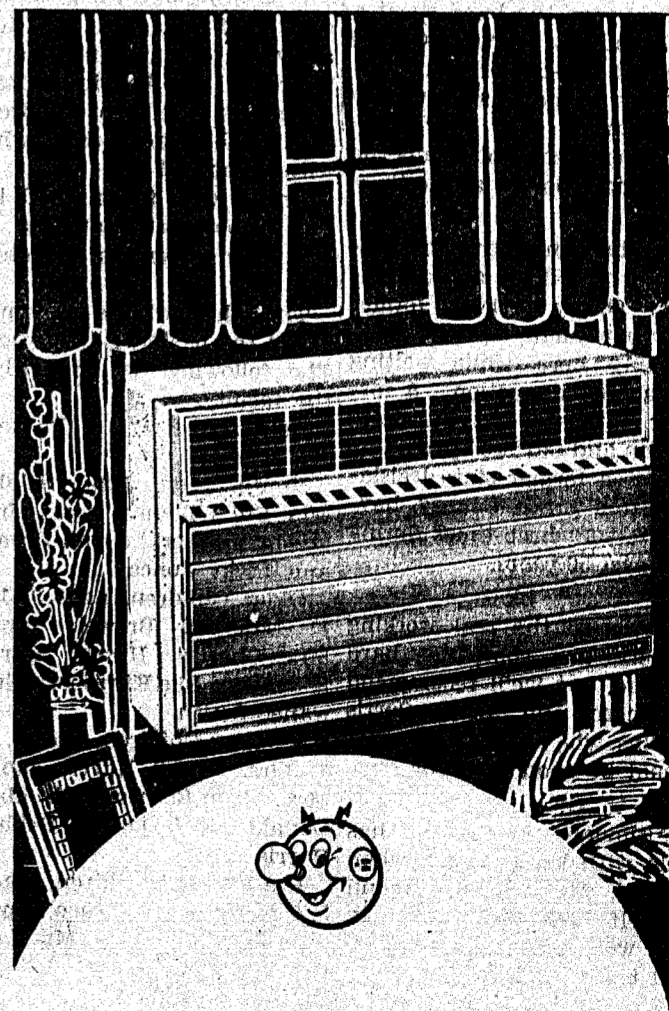

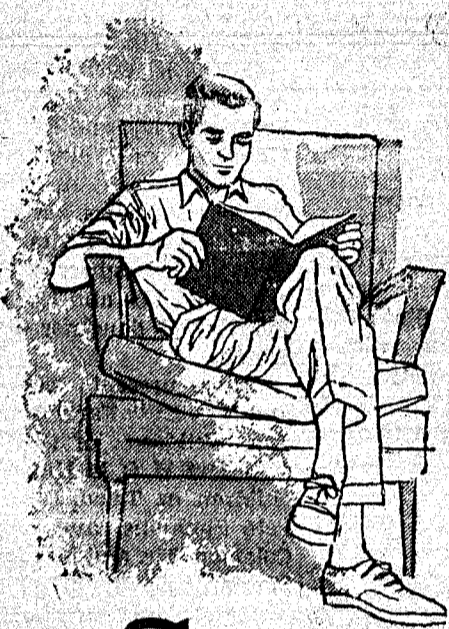


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CINDY HARTMAN

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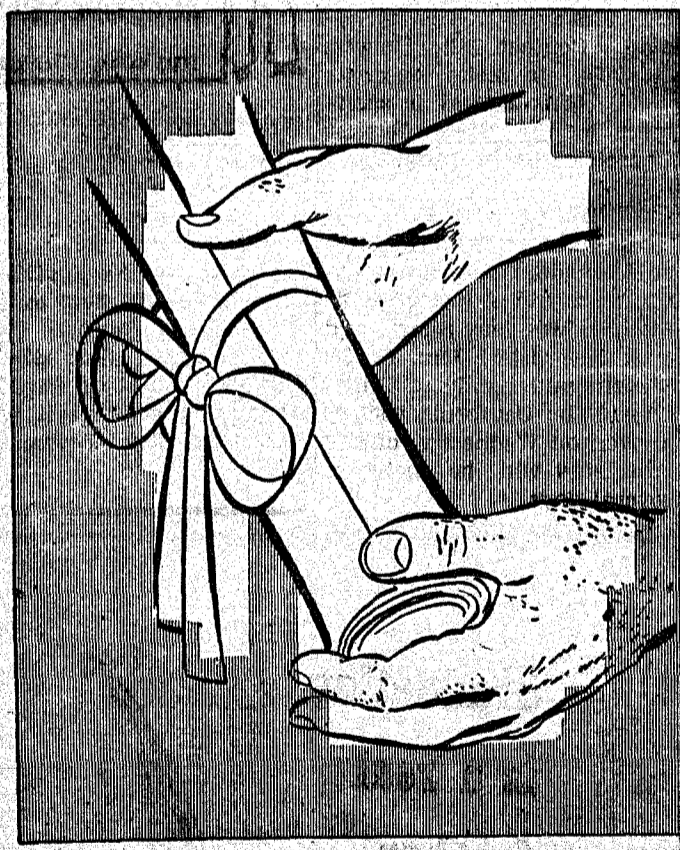

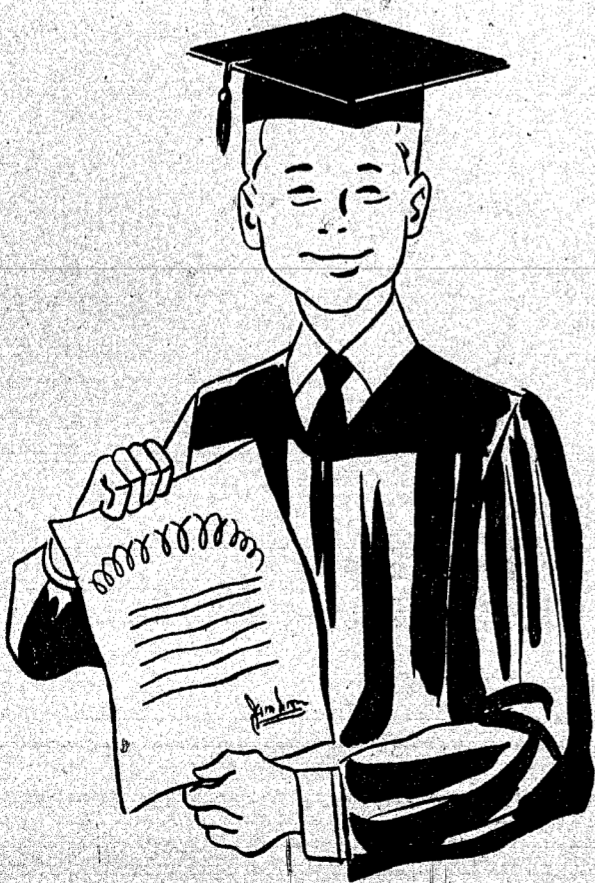

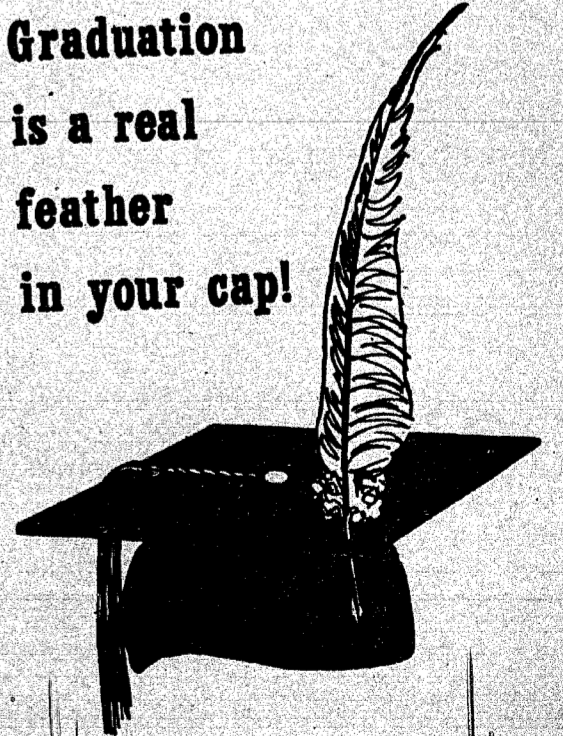

The opportunity presented time to do many things when living in town, but I had very little time to think and achieve things for myself.

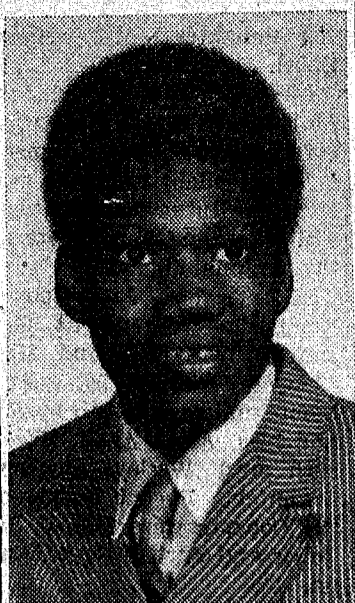
I look forward to vacation time each year. One summer I rushed through 17 states. It was an interesting trip but on returning home, I had only memories and souvenirs to share with other people.

More Loans Are Expected For Drought Areas

Emergency loan funds are available, applications are being taken, and more money has been requested to combat the serious effects of the drought which grips Texas, Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration, said.

The FHA has already made 1503 emergency loans totaling \$15 million to farmers and ranchers in Texas to help them overcome the disastrous effects of the drought which has scorched parts of the state since the spring of 1970.

Emergency loans are made to enable farmers and ranchers to continue normal operations which have been disrupted by natural disasters. These loans previously were available in 53 Texas counties, and last month, the Secretary of Agriculture increased the number to 235 counties.

The impact of the drought has centered primarily in Texas and Oklahoma, but Mr. Futch said that emergency loans are 4-7-8 per cent, repayable as soon as possible, consistent with the financial ability of borrowers, Mr. Futch said.

Applications for loans should be made at the county office of FHA, located in the Rhone Building, Coleman, Texas.
