Dwight won first in the 880 yard run with a time of 2:04.1 and also won the first in the 880 yard steeplechase event with a time of 2:38.8.

The plaque was presented Eppler for being the outstanding long distance runner in the meet.

The two events at Goldthwaite both have records set by Dwight two years ago. In both events he has been first place winner for three consecutive years.

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In Our Opinion

SEN. JOHN TOWER introduced legislation last week which would relieve the National Labor Relations Board of its judicial powers and return the responsibility to the federal courts.

The NLRB, which has been in operation for 36 years, was designed to hear alleged cases of unfair labor practices, and was charged with the administration of union representation elections. It was designed to guarantee employees right to organize without employer interference and to impose upon the employer the duty of bargaining in good faith.

But over the years it has been gradually packed with those who favor organized labor and has become a force for the union without any consideration for management.

It behaved as if it were just an extension of the union, and management with hearings before it were licked before they were heard. The board assumed powers never given it by Congress and in hearings before the Senate subcommittee on Separation of Powers revealed that the public in general had completely lost faith in the board. Witness after witness testified to the fact that there was no such thing as freedom to choose employees under the board's jurisdiction because that free choice had been subverted by the board's obvious preference for a policy of enforced unionization.

The NLRB has not assumed power any more than a lot of the established boards which the Congress has authorized. Our form of government was not set up giving such powers to independent agencies of the government, but over the last 30 years many have been established and the individual business man is sunk any time he has cause to appear before them.

These boards are given powers by Congress and then over the years they assume more and more, and until the people rise up and pressure Congress into doing something about it. Such has been the case with the NLRB.

It is time for a reversal of the tendency to set up boards and more boards because we now have so many boards that even the President don't know who and what they are. There are bureaus for this and bureaus for that, many with overlapping jurisdiction until the average citizen had just better not have any argument with the government for any thing.

A case in point is the Internal Revenue Service. Any lawyer will tell you, with them you don't have a chance. Just go ahead, pay what they say, and grin and bear it.

THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE is facing the problem of liquor by the drink, and the Senate has already passed a bill. It will go to the House where it will either be passed or changed and sent to a conference committee.

It would seem that people could see just what they have voted in. A lot of well-meaning people voted for the amendment that authorizes the Legislature to pass controlling legislation.

According to traffic safety authorities drinking drivers kill 25,000 people every year in this country, and 800,000 are involved in nonfatal crashes. Property damages are estimated to be in the billions annually.

How anyone could support legalization of such a thing is beyond comprehension.

Maybe traffic fatalities, like the rising crime rate, are becoming so commonplace that people pay no attention to them any more. The only time we are affected by them are when they hit close to home, or when we are actually a witness to one where there is twisted steel, shattered glass, and bloody, lifeless victims for us to see.

The only solution now is making the punishment for drinking and driving so harsh that it will discourage anyone to drink and drive at the same time.

Another good solution would be to follow the policy of one judge. Don't fine any of them, give them all jail sentences. If money doesn't have any affect on them, maybe confinement will.

Austin — Senate hearings on a multi-million-dollar tax bill are under way, and where they stop nobody knows.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes indicated they may continue for a week or two.

Key argument as hearing opened centered on whether the state should have a corporation, income tax.

Texas economy will be slowed down by the corporate income tax, representing the of Midland, representing the new Texas Association of Taxpayers, at hearings before the State Affairs Committee.

Corporate profits tax, countered AFL-CIO President H. S. (Hank) Brown, will meet revenue needs and "create balance between corporate and consumer taxes.

Sealy backed the House-passed increase of sales tax from 3.25 per cent to four per cent, but said his group needs more time to formulate a complete tax plan.

Brown favored a six per cent corporation profits tax, which he said would raise \$600 million over the next two years.

Business, said Sealy, already pays 34 per cent of the state sales tax.

Consumers and non-business interests, said Brown, pay 62 per cent of all state taxes, while business pays 31.7 per cent in direct levies, including its share of the sales tax.

Minimum tax bill, said Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris, based on the Senate's Finance Committee budget proposals, would be \$643 million for the coming biennium.

Lieutenant Governor Barnes said he hopes to have the tax bill on the Senate floor for debate by April 12.

House of Representatives, said Appropriations Committee Chairman Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah, will have the budget bill ready for debate by Easter.

WELFARE CUTS ORDERED — True to advance warnings, Welfare Board ordered a cut in Aid to Families with Dependent Children effective May 1.

Average grant of \$118 a month will be reduced to approximately \$80, about one-third of current payments. Cutback also will eliminate

4,500 families from AFDC rolls.

Gov. Preston Smith expressed regrets, but said he has no legal authority to alter the cut, since the state has reached the \$80 million a year ceiling for welfare outlays.

Smith gave his endorsement to the constitutional amendment (Amendment 3) to be voted on May 18 which will raise ceiling.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith designated Joe K. Butler of Houston chairman of Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and Robert W. Baker of Houston to fill the unexpired term of Manuel C. DeBusk of Dallas on the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

He named Dr. Leonides Gonzalez Cigarroa of Laredo, Dr. Olin Burr Gober of Temple, Dr. Walter Allen Brooks of Quanah and O. J. Baker of Prairie View to MH-MR. Board.

Leon Jackson Coker Jr. of Texarkana and Thomas Brazelton Steely of Paris were re-appointed to Board of Regents of East Texas State University, and E. G. Pharr of Lubbock was placed on E. T. S. U. Board.

Tom Foster of Center was appointed to Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz Memorial Naval Museum Commission.

Dr. Edawrad B. Evans, Prairie View, was designated honorary consul of the Republic of Senegal for Texas.

Smith chose for Texas Surplus Property Agency Bill Bitner of Centerville, Grady J. Hester of Terrell, Dr. William J. Hamm of San Antonio, Garland P. Ferguson of Gladewater, Jess M. Irwin Jr. of Austin, Dr. Thomas M. Spencer of Pasadena, Cyril O. Layne of Austin, Ed F. Riedel of Austin and Clarence A. Roberson of Fort Worth.

Ret. Brig. Gen. James U. Cross is the new Executive Director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court upheld an injunction against a Coleman businessman who sold liquor and food in the same building. Texas attorney general's office is studying the case to determine how far-reaching it is.

High Court rejected a Bryan discount store's appeal to stop district judge from ordering it closed for failing to observe Sunday blue laws.

Court of Criminal Appeals held in a San Patricio County case that inmates serving life sentences are eligible for parole after 15 years of sentenced before the 1967 change of law.

Same court, reversing its own ruling, knocked out murder-convictions of two men for a Weslaco knife slaying.

AG OPINIONS — A special district judge elected during one term of court who continues to serve without objection during the next term without being re-elected by members of the Bar should be paid for all his services, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

- Bill to allow counties to collect either a county registration fee of \$5 per vehicle or personal property taxes on the vehicle is unconstitutional.

- State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers does not have authority to make and enforce a rule requiring every applicant for a professional engineer's license to take a written examination.

- Bill authorizing state-supported colleges and universities to close a street or alley running through the campus would be valid and a constitutional law.

- A barber school teacher may be employed in more than one school.

- Commissioners Court has authority to sell unmaturing U. S. government bonds belonging to the permanent school fund of the county for their present market value if the value is now in excess of the price paid for the bonds yet less than par value.

CRIME FUNDS RECEIVED — Texas has received an additional \$10.78 million for funding crime-fighting projects in the state during fiscal 1971. New award was made on ap-

proval of the 1971 Criminal Justice Plan for Texas prepared by the staff of the governor's office. It brings to \$18.393 million the total block action grant for crime control projects for the current fiscal year.

Texas' plan sets out a five-year program for upgrading criminal justice with 12 broad programs subdivided into 62 categories. Funds are administered by the governor with advice of a 22-member Criminal Justice Council.

INSURANCE PAYBACK ORDERED — Attorney General Martin has directed 105 insurance companies to pay back \$2 million in premiums to state political subdivisions for property damage liability coverage.

Martin advised the companies they issued policies in violation of the Texas constitution. Under the tort claims act, Martin noted, local governmental units are liable only for personal injury liability in connection with motor vehicle accidents and not for property damage.

Attorney general said he intends to file suit within 10 days if premiums are not returned to the local governmental units. Course of action was determined before Martin was hospitalized with a heart attack.

DEATH TOLL RELEASED — Department of Public Safety said 3,560 Texans died on streets and highways in 1970, nine more than for 1969.

In addition to the death toll, there were 223,000 injuries last year, about the same as in 1969. Economic loss from traffic mishaps was \$1,042,200, compared with \$955,300 in 1969.

DPS noted there was many more miles traveled in 1970 than in the previous year.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor signed an order creating the new Interagency Transportation Planning Council.

Senate moved fast to ratify the federal constitutional amendment to lower the voting age to 18; House approval also was likely.

Bill to create "permanent" voter registration system passed the Senate.

Senate also approved a measure designed to give students more flexibility in repaying student loans and to let the loans be insured under a federal program.

Governor Smith says emergency drought assistance for many areas of Texas is expected to be recommended soon by U. S. Department of Agriculture State Defense Committee.

Texas cities levying local sales taxes collected \$39.6 million for last quarter of 1970, reports the State Comptroller.

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New Simulator In Mobile Unit To Be Bought

Region 15 Education Center has received the official okay for a \$43,000 driver education grant to purchase a driving simulator and cover initial operation expenses.

The twelve-station mobile simulators are designed to resemble an American automobile including brakes, head lights, steering column, gear shift, speedometer and other controls and instruments.

The simulator unit will be equipped with 12 sequenced films and a 16 millimeter movie projector which gives students simulated driving experience in city driving, heavy traffic driving, unexpected driving situations and other driving experiences.

The mobile unit will also have a mini-computer which converts driving actions of the student to signals that can be recorded for teacher observation.

School districts in Region 15 area will be using the driving simulator during regular and summer terms.

Presently two driver education multi-media vans are being used in area schools for the classroom phase of driver education. The simulation instruction will follow the classroom phase of driving.

It is hoped that the simulator unit will be available for the Santa Anna DE classes next summer.

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

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

SS Information On Filing Your Medicare Claim

People over age 65 who have the doctor bill part of Medicare should plan now how their 1971 claims should be filed according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

"If your doctor doesn't take assignments, you must file for reimbursement yourself," he noted.
As soon as your doctor bills go over \$50 in a year, you may want to file a claim. Begin now to put all your doctor bills in order. This way you can be sure of filing a claim on all your doctor bills. You will need more than just a receipt. You'll need the bill itself. It should show which doctor treated you, when he treated you, what he did for you and how much he charged.

Tuley added filing a claim is easy: "Tear out the blank Form 1490 from your Medicare Handbook. On the form show your name and claim number just as it is on your Medicare card. When you write in what your condition is, don't try to say it like the doctor. If you have heart trouble and that's what the doctor treated you for, simply show 'heart trouble.' If you were treated for arthritis, show that. Don't forget to sign the form before you drop it in the mail. If you don't have a Medicare Handbook or a blank, your social security office will be glad to furnish one and help you file your claim. Your question can probably be handled by phone so if you need help phone first. It might save you a trip and a lot of time."

The number of your Abilene social security office is (915) 677-5262.
After the blank is filled in where does it go? This is also in the Medicare Handbook. As a rule, you send claims for payment to the state in which you were treated. If all your treatment was in Texas, for example, you would send your doctor bills to: P. O. Box 22147, Group Medical and Surgical, Medicare-Part B, Dallas, Texas 75222.

Accent on Health

How many times have you noticed a label on your new mattress, pillow, or sofa cushion that loudly proclaimed "Do Not Remove Upon Penalty of Law?"

The State Health Department would like to see more people begin checking those labels before making their purchases in the stores. Those labels indicate whether the material used passes both the state and federal safety requirements.

The federal government is now moving to strengthen some of those requirements. Analysis by the Department of Commerce has led it to conclude that the existing standard does not adequately protect children, against the flammable sleepwear.

Research showed that purchased items of children's sleepwear were readily ignited when exposed to a small natural gas flame for as little as three seconds. Such fabrics are capable of producing severe injury or even death.

Recent federal tests indicate that more than 37 percent of the blankets now on the market failed to comply with the present flammability standards for wearing apparel.

Standards are also being formulated for mattresses and other bedding materials. At present, there are no such regulations.

The Southwest Research Institute of San Antonio has conducted several experiments in which bed assemblies were ignited by one of several small ignition sources such as

cigarettes or matches. Measurements showed that hazards to life developed in such fires from toxic fumes reduced oxygen in the atmosphere, suffocating concentrations of carbon dioxide, smoke, and excessive temperatures. Lethal conditions were developed in each experiment, except one which used blankets, sheets and mattresses treated with flame-retardant chemicals. The burning mattresses were found to be the primary cause of the lethal conditions.

Standards are also being formulated to measure the surface flammability of carpets and rugs. Again, no such standards exist at present.

The Texas State Health Department has been enforcing the state's own bedding law since 1939. That law prohibits sale of unsanitary bedding materials and false labeling of concealed materials.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced that a mail referendum among mohair producers will be held on April 19 through 30, to determine whether or not they approve a proposed new agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America, Inc.

The agreement provides for the Secretary to withhold up to 1 1/2 cents a pound from producers' payments on mohair marketed during 1971-73. The payment deductions, authorized by Sec. 708 of the National Wool Act, would be used by the Council to finance advertising and promotion programs for mohair and mohair products.

The new agreement is similar to the present one. By approving it, producers would authorize deductions of up to 1 1/2 cents a pound on mohair marketed, the same rate at which deductions have been made for the last four years.

The agreement was requested by the Mohair Council and is supported by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. The referendum will be conducted through the county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The county offices will distribute copies of the agreement and ballots to mohair producers in April. Producers may cast their ballots by mailing or delivering them in person, to reach county ASCS offices by the close of the referendum.

Anyone can vote who has owned Angora goats, 6 months old or older, for at least 30 consecutive days during 1970. Votes may be cast by individuals, corporations or partnerships. Cooperative associations may qualify to vote for all of their eligible members who would not then otherwise vote in the referendum.

The agreement requires approval by two-thirds of the total number of producers

voting, or by producers of two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum.

During the past three years, the Council's annual budget for advertising and sales promotion program has been \$395,000. With mohair production expected to total about 20 million pounds in 1971, deductions at the maximum rate would amount to about 30,000. The Council proposes to maintain its advertising and promotion program near the current level by reducing its reserve fund built up over the last four years when the deductions from producers' payments exceeded the Council's expenditures.
