Eleven F. F. A. boys have made application for certificates of merit in Parliamentary Procedure. These boys have completed all necessary requirements for this certificate of Merit except an examination to be taken Friday afternoon.

Some of the requirements to receive a Certificate of Merit in Terracing are (1). Set up and operate level in the field a minimum of five times, (2). Test and adjust farm level three times, (3). Handle rod and target on at least three occasions, (4). Find slope of land in feet per 100 feet three or more times, and work out a satisfactory system of terracing three or more times. This part of the examination is graded on a basis of 80. The second part of the examination will include determining the vertical drop between terraces, methods of running rows on terraced land, maintaining terraces, gully control, soil saving dams, constructing terraces across deep washes, cost of terracing, implements for terracing, proper width and height of terracing, value of terraced land as compared with unterraced land, and laying out both uniform and variable graded terraces. This part of the examination will count 40.

The local F. F. A. Chapter aims to have all officers secure Certificates of Merit in Parliamentary Procedure.

Cotton, the major enterprise of Coleman County, leads in the number of applications for Certificates of Merit in the local Chapter.

In order to receive a Certificate of Merit, a boy must acquire all the skills required by the State Department, and pass an examination with a score of not less than 85.

The local F. F. A. Chapter is working hard to get back its charter, which was lost about four years ago.

## PRODUCING QUALITY CREAM IN COLEMAN COUNTY

The cause of low prices for cream is overproduction by the producer. Bad cream caused by flavor "taints" is another cause of low prices. Flavor "taints" are caused by bacteria or germs. These germs get into the milk or cream by carelessness or unsanitary conditions.

The cows udder should be washed before milking. Covered pails should also be used to prevent bacteria or germs and dirt from getting into the milk or cream. Milk or cream is an excellent place for bacteria to grow and multiply. Bacteria also grow on unclean or improperly cleaned milk utensils. Utensils should be washed with warm water and scalded and allowed to dry in the sun. Utensils should be cleaned in such manner immediately before and after using. Do not dry utensils with a cloth but let them dry in the sun. Do not use soap as it is made of grease, but use washing powder.

Do not mix warm cream with cool cream. Always keep cream below 60 degrees F. if possible. If cream producers in Coleman County expect to receive good prices for cream they should produce good cream. There will be two grades of cream to be bought, so to produce the best prices producers must produce good cream.

## Com. Court Halted For Expression From Public

Curtis Collins, Commissioner from this precinct, was in this office Tuesday, enroute home from Coleman, and gave out the following interview.

The Commissioners Court recognizes the poor condition of the present County Jail, which has been in service over fifty years, from a standpoint of safety and sanitation, and in all probability a new jail and also a new Court House could be built cheaper now than a few years later, but the Court does not feel inclined to order the work done without first getting an expression from the people over the county.

Mr. Collins states that the present building has been given a thorough examination, and there is no question as to its condition, and if the citizens over the county desire the Court to order a bond election and erect a new building, they will do so upon a petition signed by a sufficient number to justify such action.

Some of the points of interest in favor of the plan is it will furnish considerable work for people needing employment this year, as most of the cost will go for labor. Sufficient rock to erect the structure can be salvaged from the present building, and practically all the expense other than the labor will consist of the dimension material necessary to erect the building, and the work of tearing down and rebuilding will represent the greater portion of the cost.

If the public feels enough interest to circulate petitions and request the Court to proceed with the preparations they will act accordingly, otherwise, the matter will be dropped.


