More Rain Here Sunday, Oct. 3

More rainfall in the Santa Anna area got the month of October off to a good start. Nearly three inches of rain was recorded at the William Brown place in the Buffalo community on Sunday, Oct. 3.

Rain began falling just at noon Sunday and two and one-half inches was the unofficial measurement in Santa Anna. The south part of the community received less than one inch.

The official rainfall report for Santa Anna for the month of September has been submitted by Ray Owen, rain reporter. The monthly total was 6.90 inches. On September 19 the first .25 inch was recorded and the major portion was received during the four day period from September 22 through 25. The last measurable amount for September fell on the 29th and was only .10 inch.

Although the official total for Santa Anna gives approximately 20 inches of rain for 1971, many area people have received more than that amount in the last six weeks.

The mighty Santa Anna Mountaineers took their third straight victory Friday night when they defeated the Menard Yellowjackets 20-0 on the home field. The win was over

a Class A team as were the previous two, giving Santa Anna a 3-1 record for the season.

The Class B Mounties outplayed the Menard eleven

and got on the scoreboard during the second quarter with two touchdowns. Ricky Beal scored the first TD on a three-yard plunge and Rocky Dean kicked the extra point.

With only minutes left in the first half, Dean drove over the goal line for another score and booted the extra point.

The Santa Anna defense held the Yellowjackets to only four first downs, 66 yards rushing and four yards passing. Three Menard passes were intercepted by Santa Anna, including an interception in the third quarter by David Horner that was carried for a touchdown, the only score in the second half of play.

In Our Opinion

THE NATION'S PRESS prints thousands of column inches of editorial opinion every week and most of it has very little good to say about the social, economic or political situation in this country.

Much of it would be amusing if it were not so serious. The *Alamo* (Texas) News ran this: "Wanted — 1,000 cats, must be house-broken and able to travel. Cats must be in crates of 25 and ready for shipment. 'Fair' price will be paid. Cats will be sent to Washington, D.C. to cover up the farm program mess."

As Washington fills up more and more with bureaus and hires more people for the taxpayer to pay, the hue and cry from those who must bear this burden gets louder and louder.

The White Salmon (Wash.) Enterprise complains; "When will our legislators listen to the pleas of the people. New taxes are not the answer. Less bureaucracy in state and national government, less departments and less commissions and appointive offices. Right now the taxpayers wonder where the next payment will come from. Such treatment is the cause of all our troubles. When you force people to the limit, nothing is left but bankruptcy and rebellion. The people have a right to call a halt to waste — and departmental padding, and waste and senseless departmental padding is not the answer. The people do not desire more services — not in many a category of government."

The writer is probably not 100 per cent right in stating that people don't want more services. However, generally speaking, the ones who yell for more and more government services are not the ones who pay the bill. Most of us like to be on the receiving end but don't like to be on the paying end. But it is a fact of life — if we receive something it has to be paid for by somebody.

The Dallas County News of Adele, Iowa comments on this: "I often wonder . . . what would happen to some able-bodied persons, who find it more profitable to relax on the relief rolls rather than work, if we who do work fold up some day. What would happen to the army of idlers who are living high on the hog at our expense. I sorta figure it's time to get some of them off their rears and get some callouses on their hands."

The Sikeston (Mo.) Standard continues, "The liberals love to give away money — your money. They would say 'elect rich humanitarian politicians — elect rich folks who don't have to steal.' Reminds me of the cockroach — it's not what they steal, it's what they carry off."

These comments come from every section of the country. And it may sound egotistic for a newspaper to say so, but in a large way the press mirrors the feelings of the people it is printed for. An editor who thinks differently from his readers usually don't last long. Not that an editor would write for the benefit of readers, but he is usually pretty well in agreement with the people he lives with, or vice versa.

The politician, then, must be taking his cues from the lobbyist or some pressure group, rather than the people. They continue to spend, spend, and spend, the biggest contributor to inflation is government spending, and to give, give and give, our tax money away to many who don't deserve it, and build, build, build up the deficit in the national budget, and one of these days the goose that lays the golden egg is going to be killed by it all and where will they be then?

WAGE AND PRICE CONTROLS seemed to be the only immediate answer to spiraling inflation and we don't criticize the President for his action. However, inflation is caused by something far more deepseated than the annual raise of wages and process by labor and management.

The law of supply and demand, left to its own, will control both prices and wages. But when the government spends more and more, using the vast amount of the national production as it does, and much of it unnecessarily, what is left for the consumer is in such demand that it stimulates price rises. Then when the wage earner wants to buy it, he has to make more to be able to afford it — so goes the vicious circle.

The best place to beat inflation, then, in our opinion, is to begin in Washington — throw out about a zillion bureaus who serve no useful purpose, turn those who work in them back into the labor market where there will be some competition there, and cut government buying to where there are more items on the market than there is a demand for.

What would that do to the country. You're probably right. It would cause a recession. But that may be the only answer to the problem we face right now.



Austin — The State Legislative Redistricting Board, ordered by the Supreme Court to reapportion the House of Representatives as well as the Senate, is in the process of writing its bill under deadline pressure.

Finding of the Court that the Board should take over the unfinished legislative reapportionment task was doubly significant.

Aside from setting a precedent as to responsibility of drawing new district lines, the decision eliminated the necessity of an early special legislative session. This pleased both House Speaker Gus Mutscher and Gov. Preston Smith.

Mutscher, under bribery indictment, escaped an early showdown with legislators who want to force him to step down as speaker and replace him with another.

Although speculation was widespread he would hand his duties to a speaker pro tempore, he announced four days after the Court's decision he had decided to stay on the job, confident he will be found innocent of charges.

Governor Smith applauded the Court's decision. He said he wants to wait "as long as possible" to call a special session on budget matters so the Legislature will have full advantage of data on available revenue which might curb the tax bill.

Indications are there will be no special session now until June, 1972, after the primary elections.

The five-member Redistricting Board held a hearing September 30 and heard only testimony of big-city residents debating the merits of single-member vs. multi-member (or countywide) House districts.

Apparently, the Board is divided two-and-two, with Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin undecided on the metropolitan district issue. Whichever way it rules, another lawsuit challenging the decision seems likely. The Board has only until October 23 to complete its work.

GOVERNOR'S RACE WARMS — There is official competition in the governor's race with the entry of Uvalde rancher and banker Dolph Brisco. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes announced last June he would run.

Brisco made clear the stock-loan scandals (which resulted in three state-house indictments September 23) will be a major issue in his campaign.

He focused attention on quick passage by the Senate of the same bank deposit insurance bills which figured in the indictments of Mutscher, Rep. Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth and S. Rush McGinty of Austin. And, he maintained, Barnes "helped push them (the bills) through the Senate."

Barnes declined to reply. He said there will be "plenty of time to set the facts straight" with the next seven months before the election.

Brisco also emphasized need for innovations in mass trans-

portation and further environmental protections.

ETHICS COMMISSION COMPLETE — A new Ethics Commission to police behavior of public officials is now complete, though top state judges have expressed doubt as to its effectiveness.

Three members elected by the Senate are Sens. A. M. Aikin of Paris, Charles Herring of Austin and Oscar Mauzy of Dallas.

House members elected Reps. John F. Boyle Jr. of Irving, Clyde Haynes Jr. of Vidor and James E. Nugent of Kerrville.

Court of Criminal Appeals Presiding Judge John F. Onion Jr. appointed Rabbi David Jacobson of San Antonio and University of Texas Law Professor John Sutton Jr. of Austin.

Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert earlier designated Baylor University Law Professor Mrs. Margaret Harris Amsler and Houston Attorney Alf Roark.

First Court of Civil Appeals Chief Justice Spurgeon Bell picked Dallas Attorney J. W. Hassell Jr. and retired Houston newspaperman William H. Gardner, now of Austin, for the Judicial Qualifications Commission.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith named Dr. William L. Anderson of Dallas to the Texas Animal Health Commission for a six-year term.

Frank Hildebrand of Austin was selected state travel director of the year as the result of a nationwide poll of travel promoters.

Lubbock Mayor J. H. Granberry was appointed to the Board of Directors of the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation.

Governor's appointments of the last week include:

Richard (Cactus) Pryor, Austin, to Texas Tourist Development Board.

Jack B. Dale of Houston and John T. Bean of Fort Worth to the Board of the Commission for Rehabilitation (reappointments).

Lee D. Herring of Grand Prairie to the Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

Mrs. Eunice M. King of Amarillo (reappointment) and Sister Mary Vincent O'Donnell of San Angelo to the State Board of Nurse Examiners.

Dan E. Stroppe of Waxahachie, Ralph S. Abel of Dallas, Vernon E. Walter of Harlingen and Norman L. Maderer of Houston to the Structural Pest Control Board.

Mack C. Adams of Dallas will join the staff of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System as head of the division of student services October 15.

AG OPINIONS — Texas Air Control Board must keep "confidential information" label on data it collects in investigation of air pollution matters where parties insist, Attorney General Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:
• In proceedings in eminent domain in Cass County, petitions should be filed with the Fifth district judge, and he will appoint special commissioners, receive awards and enter judgements.

• Deer hunting with dogs is lawful in San Augustine County during open season provided in a 1971 game bill.

• Laws requiring additional water safety equipment on boats and specifying that children 12 or under aboard motorboats must wear life preservers should be enforced.

• Texas Optometry Board may use written exams made available by international associations if they meet state requirements.

• State Comptroller can require proof of authorization for Parks-Wildlife Department employees to sign vouchers in reference to deposit, expenditure and investment of department funds in the state treasury.

• Fifty dollar license fee for mobile home manufacturers is no longer required to be paid to Bureau of Labor Statistics.

ROAD EMERGENCY DECLARED — Governor declared a state of emergency in 21 South Texas counties with respect to highway conditions resulting from Hurricanes Fern and Edith winds and rain. Smith said immediate re-

construction is vital in Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Cameron, Chambers, Duval, Goliad, Hidalgo, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Jefferson, Karnes, Kleberg, Live Oak, Matagorda, Nueces, Refugio, San Patricio, Starr, Webb and Willacy counties.

QUAIL SEASON EXTENDED — Enlarged Parks and Wildlife Commission voted to extend the closing date of quail season statewide to February 15. Action provided two additional weeks for most counties, but in some areas the season is still two weeks shorter than last year.

At the same meeting, the Commission voted unanimously to reopen the Canadian River under an attorney general's ruling of September 16.

SHORT SNORTS
Cities levying local option sales tax will be \$40.1 million (combined) for the last quarter.

October 1 deadline has been extended 45 days disabled veterans to get special free license plates (which also carry exemptions from parking fees).

Governor has urged Treasury Secretary John Connally to investigate the federal interpretation of wage-price freeze order which refused to allow travel allowances and insurance premiums.

Orice Green of Lubbock resigned as Governor Smith's top aide, increasing speculation as to whether Smith will run again or not. Governor said Green's move is linked to his plans, but wouldn't say how.

"Real" income of Texans rose about four per cent from August 1970 to August 1971 in spite of rapid price inflation, University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Biking Is Back

Car exhaust is the chief cause of air pollution.

Experiments to ban cars from congested areas of cities have been hailed with joy by pedestrians. Eventually, all cars may be banned from cities. But that time may be far off. In the meantime, bicycles are coming back.

Sale of bicycles have doubled in the last decade. Bikes are now selling at the rate of 7 million a year. Many bike-store owners report that 80 per cent of their sales are now to adult riders, whereas only five years ago, 90 per cent of their sales were for children's bikes.

Local groups across the country are pressing for—and getting—bike lanes. In Davis, Calif., where bike lanes were built just a few years ago, there are 24,000 people and 20,000 bikes. In Greater Miami, Fla., 100 miles of bike-ways have been built in the last five years. And more are coming, says the Mass Transit Administration for the state, because of the "tremendous interest." In Tacoma, Wash., the city council voted to prohibit all cars on a five-mile scenic route for the summer. Two nights a week and every weekend, Central Park in New York City is closed to cars and bikers take over. The trend is clear.

Even in Los Angeles, bike riding is on the rise. Charles Johnson, who is in charge of the bike detail for the city's police department says, "Because of the traffic, because of the smog, because of the price of gas, you are going to have hundreds and hundreds of bikes in the streets."

Bicycles are one way to cut down on carbon monoxide and other noxious pollutants in car exhaust. To find out more about other ways to curb air pollution, check with your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association. It's a matter of life and breath.

Texas FHA Loans Nation's Largest

J. L. Futch, Texas State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, announced here today that the agency extended credit to rural Texans in the amount of \$155,456,871 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1971. This credit was furnished farmers and rural residents through the many loan programs administered by the agency with rural housing leading the way with \$72,302,453. Loans for community services facilities such as rural water systems and sewer systems totaled \$24,205,192. Credit extended to individual farmers and ranchers for operating expenses, capital purchases and land purchases totaled \$58,949,182. This was the largest yearly volume of loans in the history of the organization, which has its overall mission the development of rural areas.

Futch said that he was also pleased that there was a sizeable decrease in the percentage of loan delinquencies as compared to previous years. Due to the severe drought in the spring and early summer of this year, it is expected that the demand for emergency credit to farmers and ranchers this fall and winter will substantially increase the volume of farm loans in fiscal 1972, with all other programs also expected to be expanded. The program is administered in Texas by 144 county offices and the state office in Temple.

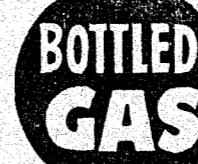
