Vehicle Mishap Scatters Glass On City Street

Three vehicles were involved in an accident in the downtown area Wednesday morning about 9:00 a. m. The mishap caused damage to two of the vehicles and scattered glass along the street and sidewalk near the Lions Club building.

A trailer truck belonging to the Bond Brick Transport Co., Inc., of Conroe and driven by R. D. McCleery of San Angelo apparently jackknifed while braking for a slow moving vehicle. The east-bound truck struck a parked truck belonging to the Brownwood Glass and Mirror Co. The Brownwood truck, extensively damaged in the impact, rammed into the rear of a 1969 Ford sedan belonging to Publisher W. T. Hays. The Ford was shoved along the curb where it was parked, damaging the rear of the vehicle.

The street, slick from a slight shower, was said to be the cause of the truck's skidding.

City maintenance crews cleaned up the scattered glass along the street and sidewalk following the accident.

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In Our Opinion

ACCORDING TO A SURVEY made during the last year in Texas by the National Federation of Independent Business, an organization of small independent business men, the biggest problem to face the state legislature is the welfare problem.

The survey showed that 95 per cent of the small business men felt that any able-bodied person should be required to do some kind of work for their welfare check.

Back before the days of big government, each community took care of its own, and that is still so to a degree in the smaller towns. However, as cities grew larger the problem became more complex and then the state took over. After that the federal government got in the act, and then many who were really not deserving managed to get on the rolls.

Like most government programs, some people manage to make a racket out of it and get their cut whether they deserve it or not. That has been so in every give-away program the state or federal government has fostered.

When it is in the community, the local people know the true facts and can make a judgement from them, but when it gets bureaucratic, then it becomes vulnerable to the racketeers.

Another phase of the survey showed that 88 per cent favored paying no unemployment compensation or welfare benefits to persons while on strike.

"Hot checks" entered into the picture in the survey when 84 per cent of those surveyed favored a garnishee law applying to that area. Many merchants are being made the scape goat in hot check cases because the effectiveness of the hot check laws is determined by the attitudes of the various district attorneys over the state. Some places the merchant gets no help while in others the DA's office goes all out to help him get his money.

Then came the pet peeve of many people, the value of daylight saving time. The result was split right down the middle when 46 per cent favored the change and 46 per cent were against it.

One group who pay no attention to it are the chickens. They get up or go to bed by the sun and they seem to get along all right.

TALK ABOUT RIDICULOUS, just recently a bill was introduced in the House of Representatives and the Senate to allow up to 8½ per cent alcohol in candy.

In some states legal beer is only 3.2 per cent by volume, and some still become intoxicated on it.

If one can get drunk on 3.2 beer, what could he do on 8.5 candy?

Maybe this is the way of getting our kids to become alcoholics. Just add the alcohol to their candy and they will become addicted. From there they will go to beer then something stronger until the whole country will be dependent on the stuff.

Just imagine as the kids go to school each morning, they would have to stop by the store and get a few bars of 8.5 candy to make the day. Wonder what they would learn?

SPEAKING OF BUREAUS, The Stephen, Minn. Messenger tells the story of the research director of a major government bureau who made a study of fleas. He obtained a flea with a high IQ, placed it on his desk and finally succeeded in training it to jump over his fingers on spoken command. Then he removed two of the flea's legs. "Jump," he ordered and the flea still jumped. Two more legs were removed and still the flea jumped to command. At last the final two legs were removed. "Jump," the research director commanded, but the flea didn't move. The director then wrote a lengthy report on the project, concluding that: "When a flea loses all six legs, it becomes deaf."

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STATE Capital NEWS

Austin — Hearings of major interest to insurance policy holders are scheduled here December 8.

The State Board of Insurance slated for that date public airing of new regulations to prevent insurance companies from arbitrarily cancelling coverage and a proposal to lower auto policy rates through "shock-absorbing" bumpers.

Allstate Insurance Company of Illinois recommends a 10 per cent premium discount for new cars equipped with the tough bumpers beginning next year. Rates would be reduced to 15 per cent if cars can by demonstration take a five-miles-per-hour front-end crash and a two-and-a-half-miles-per-hour rear end wallop. Rates would drop 20 per cent if the bumpers can absorb a five-miles-per-hour blow fore and aft.

New federal regulations call for the shock-absorb bumpers with five mph (front) and two-and-a-half mph (rear) capacity by 1973 models.

Proposed regulations would prohibit cancellation of hazard and liability insurance which has been in effect 60 days or more unless holders fail to pay premiums or lose a driver's license (auto coverage).

Under the rules to be examined at the early December hearing, companies would have to give at least 30 days' written notice if they do not intend to renew a policy at the end of a year. Unless the notice is given, renewal would be required for another year. Firms which violate the rules could lose their licenses to operate in Texas.

The latter regulations resulted from special legislation passed this year following repeated complaints of motorists who claimed policies were cancelled without advance notice.

A hearing was scheduled earlier for December 7 to consider all aspects of problems in operating the new catastrophe insurance pool in 14 coastal counties.

JUKE BOX HEARINGS SET. The new Texas Vending Commission decided to air its problems in a series of seminars over the state after being hit with criticism over the regulations it must enforce.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin suggested a Commission-led seminar discussion of the coin-operated amusements machine industry and pertinent laws.

Meanwhile, State Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena called on

Gov. Preston Smith to remove Raymond B. Williams of Dallas, a vending machine tycoon, as chairman of the Commission. Smith noted the law provides for three industry representatives to serve on the Commission, and said it is too late to remove Williams. Williams said he has no intention of resigning.

The House General Investigating Committee gathering material concerning the vending industry controversy and Chairman Rep. Menton Murray of Harlingen has indicated a probe may be directed at a later meeting.

Commissioner Williams and the other two industry representatives vowed publicly they will not use their official positions to get information about their 2,800 competitors from Commission files.

PAY RAISES ORDERED. The state proposed to begin the last half of this month granting state employees and school teachers pay raises approved by the Legislature unless stopped by the Federal Pay Board.

Governor Smith said an application has been sent to the Pay Board requesting permission to make retroactive raise payments to September 1 when the new state budget took effect.

The Pay Board set a 5.5 per cent salary increase guidepost on expiration of the wage-price freeze. The Legislature approved a 6.8 per cent pay raise for state employees. Texas was the only state government in the country blocked by the freeze from employee pay raises this year. Hikes in other states took effect before the president's order.

AG OPINIONS. "Surge" brakes for small trailers (such as those used in hauling boats) will meet the new requirement of central braking systems for trailers, Attorney General Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- Counties are responsible for damages inflicted by reserve deputy sheriffs or constables to persons or property, but they are not liable for injuries to the reserve officers.

- A local option election to legalize liquor sale cannot be conducted in a new Randall County precinct because it has not been in existence 18 months.

- The State Comptroller must transfer to the Texas Vending Commission all records and memoranda needed in enforcing coin-machine li-

ense fee requirements.

- Counties are not authorized to contract with cities for the municipal tax assessor-collector to assess all property for tax purposes, but can contract for appraisal or assessment recommendation that do not abrogate the county tax assessor-collector's constitutional duties.

- School districts may purchase liability insurance for employees who are exposed to individual liability in their duties, but may not buy policies protecting others against tort claims for bodily injury and property damage.

- No certificate of authority can be issued to an automobile club whose services constitute an insurance business.

APPOINTMENTS. Hugo H. Lowenstern Sr. of Amarillo, John McKee of Dallas and Hulen Marshall of Houston were appointed by Governor Smith to the Committee on State and Local Tax Policy.

Smith named William M. Streckert of Brownwood and Morris E. Bailey of Amarillo to the Texas State Technical Institute Board of Regents.

He appointed Robert J. Long of Austin to the Lower Colorado River Authority.

First Court of Civil Appeals Associate Justice Phil Peden of Houston and Austin attorney Robert C. McGinnis were named to the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, and District Judge R. C. Vaughan of Sherman was reappointed.

Governor Smith made official his 18 appointments to a Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

Dr. James H. Granberry of Lubbock and Mrs. Holt Ather-ton of San Antonio are co-chairmen of the Texas delegation to the Southern Republican Conference.

Earl Luna of Dallas is new State Democratic Executive Committee counsel.

COURTS SPEAK. — A state law declaring desecration of

the flag a felony was upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals in a Dallas case where a 20-year-old flag burner got a four-year prison sentence.

The Court's opinion called such acts "an invitation to violence" and said they are not protected by constitutional guarantees of free speech.

The State Supreme Court said it had no jurisdiction in a damage case involving a contractor's suit for damages over failure of metal rods used to raise the "top house" of the famous Tower of the Americas in San Antonio to its lofty place.

VACCINATION OUT. — Compulsory vaccination for smallpox has been lifted by the State Board of Health as a requirement for entering school.

Required immunizations effective next January 1 include for grade school pupils, diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, rubella and measles (if the child hasn't had measles). The U.S. Public Health Service recently held compulsory smallpox immunization is no longer necessary in the U.S. since risk of the disease is so small here. Last known cases were in 1949 in the Rio Grande Valley.

SHORT SNORTS

Atlantic Richfield Foundation gave Texas Conservation Foundation \$5,000 (its first major cash gift) to buy and preserve public lands.

The 26th amendment to the U.S. Constitution lowering the voting age will have enfranchised 664,646 new Texas voters by November, 1972, according to the University of Texas population research center. Projections see a total of more than 1.4 million young Texas voters who were not old

enough to vote in the 1968 general election.

Governor Smith is calling for a "take crime out of Christmas" campaign to curb the crime wave which frequently accompanies the Yule season.

State Board of Public Welfare met Monday to discuss revisions in the food stamp program and policy changes required by lawsuits.

Gubernatorial candidate Dolph Briscoe demanded an investigation of use of state employees to turn out mailing lists for campaigning Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, also a candidate for governor.

INJURED CHILD IMPROVES

Little Jenifer Carter of Clovis, N. M., has been dismissed from Lubbock Methodist Hospital after spending two weeks there for treatment. The six-year-old girl was hit by a pickup near her home on October 30 and sustained critical injuries.

The granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Reed and the great-granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Christopher, all of Santa Anna, Jenifer is now getting along well and will apparently be all right.

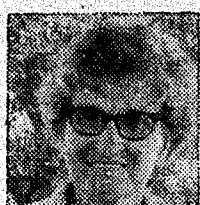

Richland Springs teams are scheduled for return matches in Santa Anna on Tuesday, Nov. 30.

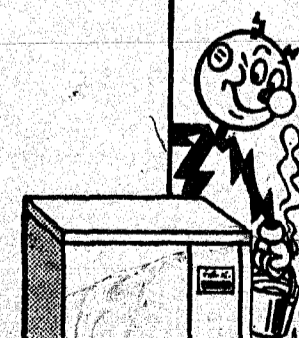
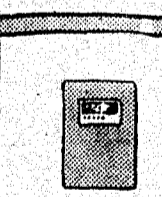
