## Water for Shrubs And Flowers

## PALE OF GLOOM OVERSHADOWS HOME OF BRADY EDITOR

Editor H. F. Schwenker of the Brady Standard, together with his estimable family, have the sympathy of friends throughout the state in the loss of their sixteen year old daughter, Miss Helen, who passed away in a Dallas hospital last Friday at noon.

Miss Helen and twin sister, Miss Clara, were attending the Ursuline Academy in Dallas. Helen was a constant sufferer from mild attacks of appendicitis, but her condition had never been considered of a serious nature. About one week prior to her death she underwent a surgical operation, and her condition was reported satisfactory until shortly before she died when peritonitis set up and she was not able to overcome the complications, and death was the result.

The body was prepared and brought to Brady for burial. Interment was made Monday morning in the Brady cemetery, following funeral services in the little Catholic Church where she had worshipped all her life with her mother and other members of the family.

The funeral was attended by friends from all parts of Texas including friends of the family from various towns over the state among the newspaper fraternity, Editor Schwenker being one of the past presidents of the Texas Press Association, and one of the very active members. This editor and family extend sympathy to Editor Schwenker and family in their bereavement.

## Melvin Wins District Track, Field Title

Unheralded by pre-meet dopesters and all-but unknown, the well balanced track and field team of Melvin high school of McCulloch county displayed a versatile attack Saturday to upset other more favored teams and walk off the 1935 District Eight track and field championship. The Melvin team took an early lead and managed to stay out front the entire distance, and with every event disposed of except the mile relay, the 1935 champs were leading Santa Anna, 1934 champs and this year's runner-up, 21 to 18.

The relay teams of the two leading schools ran in the same heat of the concluding event and neither placed, giving the title to Melvin.

## Two Records Broken

Two district records were topped Saturday, these being in the 120 high hurdles and the shot put. John Arthur Thomas of Brownwood smashed the high hurdles record in Saturday morning's preliminaries and came back that afternoon to clip another tenth of a second off his new mark, his time in the finals being 16 seconds. J. Price, sophomore member of the Santa Anna team, tossed the 12-pound shot a mere 50 feet, 2 1/2 inches, to establish a new district record. The former record of 46 feet, 5 inches, was made by Necessary of Lohn in 1930.

Theron Huggins, veteran track star of Zephyr, came within six-tenths of a second equalling the record in the 880 and had he have had any competition he might easily have smashed the record set by DuBols of Santa Anna in 1931. Other district records were comparatively safe Saturday as the 1935 athletes strutted their stuff.

## School Funds Are Approved

AUSTIN, April 8. (INS)—A conference committee report on the 1935 Summer school appropriation bill was approved by the Texas House Monday by a vote of 95 to 23. The total appropriation of \$206,966.65 represents a 10 per cent increase over last year's allotment.

Under the bill, the University of Texas would receive \$49,966.50 for the coming Summer session and A & M College would get \$11,980.50.

Other appropriations include: John Tarleton Agricultural College, \$7,364; North Texas Agricultural College, \$3,010; Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College, \$5,000.00; Texas College of Arts and Industries, \$9,555.00.

Texas Technological College, \$29,685; East Texas State Teachers College, \$26,355; North Texas State Teachers College, \$34,366.50; Sam Houston State Teachers College, \$17,651.90.

Southwest Texas State Teachers College, \$23,877; Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College, \$15,177.75; Sul Ross State Teachers College, \$10,290; West Texas State Teachers College, \$14,798; College of Mines and Metallurgy, \$6,358.

Ray Hamilton, the most notorious outlaw and desperado since the death of Clyde Barrow and his woman pal, Bonnie Parker, was surprised by a posse of officers in the railroad yards at Fort Worth last Friday and returned to jail.

Hamilton was carried to Huntsville and placed in the death cell from which he escaped about nine months ago.

Hamilton, covered by several officers with guns pointing directly at him, was commanded to 'hoist 'em' and he did so without resistance, contrary to his recent statements that he would shoot it out with the law any time they accosted him.

Hamilton was arraigned before District Judge S. W. Dean of Huntsville Monday and sentenced to die in the electric chair at Huntsville Friday, May 10th. Joe Palmer, a partner in crime and a member of the gang who escaped with Hamilton is to die the same day.

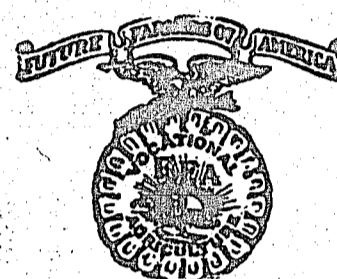

Mr. J. D. Williamson came after the Agriculture II Class March 28, and had them terrace 80 acres of land.

The Horticulture Team composed of Floyd Gilbreath, Billie Stapleton, and Samuel Elliott, was the high team in pecans and vegetables at the Tarleton F. F. A. Judging contest at Stephenville last weekend. These boys were the three high point men in this division, with a score of 440 points each out of a possible 500. As a result of their fine showing they received a trophy donated by the Vin-nedge Co. of Fort Worth.

The other division of the Horticulture Contest was composed of building and grafting, and the local team won fourth place. The team was scored third after scores in the two divisions were averaged.

Floyd Gilbreath was high point man on the team with a total of 709 points out of a possible 1000.

The Crops team, composed of Jot Tucker, H. W. Kingsbery, and P. B. Lightfoot, also gave a good account of themselves at the Tarleton Judging Contest, though they failed to place. Out of a possible 3600 these boys scored 2600.

H. W. Kingsbery was high point man with 955 points out of a possible 1200.

Corn, grains, sorghums, small grains, and cotton were judged. Three classes under each of the four groups were judged.

The terracing team composed of Jesse Brown, Bill Mitchell, and W. C. Burden did not place, but gave a good account of themselves. Jesse Brown was high point man on the team.

The Horticulture team, Crops team, and Terracing team will leave Sunday, April 14, for College Station, Texas for the State Contests to be held April 15. These teams are determined to place even higher in the State Contests than in the Tarleton Contests.
