## Mountaineers Defeat Buffs, 6-0; Will Play at Bangs on Saturday

The Santa Anna Mountaineers took their first victory of the season when they defeated the Cross Plains Buffaloes 6-0 in a defensive game last Friday night. The game was the first home game for the Mounties this season.

The final three minutes of the game brought the score to the board for the Santa Anna team despite amassed yardage from the hard-playing Cross Plains team. The lone score, with two and one-half minutes left in the game, came on a quarterback sneak by David Horner. The PAT attempt failed.

The Mounties attempted a field goal in the first quarter which was blocked by the Buffalo herd.

The victory over Cross Plains was the first in three years for Santa Anna. The Buffaloes won by a 18-7 score last year and 28-7 in 1969.

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**In Our Opinion**

IT USED TO BE that the majority ruled, and as we understand it that is the basis of democracy, but it seems that such a notion is passe this day and time.

Now it seems, there are a few, who have gained a foothold in Washington, who know what is best for us and therefore we should accept their decisions regardless of our own opinion. That is the way of totalitarian government wherever it is found in the world.

Some of us, however, object to trusting our well being to those super-intelligencia who claim they have the right to make our decisions.

What it will take for a turn-about in this policy, we don't know, but certainly wish we did. Maybe they are smart enough to tell us.

We made the statement, it is terrible not to be able to find something good to write about, but with the present world and national conditions, it is hard. It is easy to find something to complain about as it has been through the ages, and many of us are looking for a little bit of good that we can mention. One good thing we have noticed is that people are rising to object to central government control over our very lives, and that is long over due.

People who have children of school age are protesting the stupid forced busing to students to attain racial balance, and in Texas doctors and pharmacists are refusing to go along with an unworkable welfare plan in treating and dispensing medicine to the elderly and other welfare recipients.

The loud noise of protestors has taught us that the only way to get anything is to make a louder noise than they. That is the only thing that politicians seem to understand. The other way is to speak at the ballot box, but some of these people are not elected by the people, so with them we are hamstrung.

The percentage of unemployment has been played up as a big thing, and there is no doubt that there are some who are unable to find work. However, one man said recently, "I wanted some help, so I went to the employment office. There were lines stopping to get their unemployment checks, but not one would work for me. Why? I wanted them to haul hay."

So when we take a good look at unemployment, and weed out the unemployables, the sick and those who don't want to work, we find that the true unemployment picture is different than the figures would lead one to believe.

There are those, though, who will take these figures and use them to political advantage, and a lot of naive people will believe them. That is how incompetents get into office.

Communication between the people is blamed for a lot of our troubles, and maybe that is true. If people were interested enough in our government to get out and vote, and to investigate the facts before they did so, there would be a difference in the operation. We could get what the majority wanted and government at all levels would run smoother.

Many think that there should be a review of foreign aid, and that the welfare picture could be improved considerably. They also think that schools are a state problem and that the federal government should stay out. They object to the tax structure and feel that a minority of citizens bear the major burden of government at all levels, and they object to the massive bureaucracy in Washington that continues to grow with every administration regardless of party.

A few days ago, a business man, who is successful in that he operates a business that pays wages and helps keep the economy going, not that he is necessarily rich, made the statement, "as horrible as it would be, the only answer to the things that are happening in this country is another depression."

That would be bad, but there is a lot of truth in his statement. If things got bad enough, the people would demand changes and they would be made. Everyone wants times to be good, but any time inflation runs rampant, we are riding for a fall.

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Austin — A big push is on from the top to bring about drastic revision in the state's auto insurance system which is the subject of increasing criticism as rates go up nearly every year.

Gov. Preston Smith at the recent national governor's conference in San Juan, Puerto Rico, once more reaffirmed his support of competitive rates and "no-fault" insurance.

State Insurance Board Member Larry Teaver at the same conference announced a wide-ranging survey will get underway with a view to switching to competitive rates and "no-fault."

The survey will be financed with a \$175,000 appropriation to the Insurance Board for research purposes. Teaver said out-of-state specialists with no industry connections will be called on to advise the Board.

"I want the study approached from a consumer standpoint and not for the companies' benefit," Smith announced.

Under no-fault insurance, insured accident victims are compensated regardless of who was at fault. Instead of buying liability insurance to cover losses of others, a driver under the no-fault system buys coverage that pays for his loss in spite of who was at fault.

Pennsylvania Insurance Commissioner Herbert S. Denenberg told the nation's governors in their recent conference that the federal government will move to set up a national no-fault system if states don't act to create a reasonably uniform and adequate network of laws.

Massachusetts Gov. Francis W. Sargent claimed the plan saved motorists \$76 million in premium charges in his state this year.

American Trial Lawyers Association members oppose no-fault as reducing legal rights of accident victims to sue for fair recovery on all losses.

**OIL ALLOWABLE DOWN AGAIN** — For the sixth straight month, Texas Railroad Commission lowered the state's oil allowable.

October production maximum was set at 63.2 per cent of potential, compared with 65.1 per cent for this month. Maximum production for October is estimated at 3,131,217 barrels daily, a reduction of about 78,861 from the September top.

Commission Chairman Byron Tunnell said Texas crude supplies total 102.9 million barrels, a decrease of about 5.4 million barrels from last year.

Eleven of 15 major crude oil purchasers asked for the same allowable in October as in September. Three requested less and only one wanted more.

**REDISTRICTING ROW RAGES** — Texas Supreme Court scheduled hearings this week (September 23) on a Dallas senator's petition that it order the State Legislative Redistricting Board to redistrict the House of Representatives.

The Court finally put in writing its earlier finding that the reapportionment is unconstitutional. Sen. Oscar Mauzy

sued to force the constitutional, five-member Board to act on House redistricting.

The Board last week voted four-to-one to limit its work to Senate reapportionment, since no form of senatorial realignment was passed by the Legislature. Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin said the Board should await guidelines from the High Court on the House act.

Mauzy said if the Board does not do the job, a special legislative session will be required, or lawmakers would have to run statewide at large. October 23 is the Board's deadline for action. Legislative candidates must establish residency by November 7 for the 1972 elections. Mauzy wants the Court to order the Board to create single-member House districts in the metropolitan counties.

**AG OPINIONS** — Attorney General Martin held the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is without authority to prevent hunting in the bed of the Canadian River or any other stream.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:  
• Reciprocal or inter-insurance exchanges are exempt from the requirements of the new Texas Catastrophe Insurance Pool Act.

• The teacher retirement system is not governed by the position classification plan in granting a merit salary increase. The system is governed in paying insurance premiums for employees by Texas insurance code and may be subject to the presidential freeze order.

• Dallas Independent School District can negotiate a lease contract for a computer without competitive bids; the lease to terminate Aug. 31, 1972.

• Money appropriated to build a Parks and Wildlife Department office building at McKinney Falls State Park is payable out of general revenue fund and special funds.

• A \$1 special fee on each delinquent tax receipt is applicable to the 1971 single-payment tax receipts issued for the period Feb. 1-June 30, 1972.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State officials conceded the unconstitutionality of the state law requiring unmarried voters under 21 to register to vote only in hometowns of their parents.

A three-judge federal court knocked down major sections of Texas' vagrancy laws.

Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the death penalty conviction of a man for killing a Baytown bus ticket agent.

Same court reversed the sentence of a Houston law clerk accused of masterminding a \$13,000 stickup of a supermarket.

Court rejected the appeal of a man sentenced to 50 years imprisonment for killing the husband of his former girlfriend.

**APPOINTMENTS** — A seven-member research advisory panel headed by State Health Commissioner Dr. James E. Peavy has been formed to authorize experiments with narcotics and dangerous drugs with immunity from legal prosecution.

Governor Smith named T. A. Kincaid Jr. of Sutherland Springs and Don G. Brothers of Paducah to the Animal Health Commission.

The Governor reappointed Alvin H. Badger of Dallas to Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes named a three-member Senate committee to study tax revenue to fund education costs and a five-member workmen's compensation study panel.

State Board of Education November 13 will consider an interim appointment to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Richard Kirkpatrick of Texas City.

**TEACHER PAY SNAGGED** — After a series of reverses, the Cost of Living Council finally concluded that a Texas school teacher to get a pay raise during the freeze period must have been at work before August 15 or have received recently an advanced college degree.

COLC first indicated that most teachers could get raises if their contracts were effective before August 15, then changed its position the same day.

The first load of Texas citrus has been certified as mature. Quality of upcoming crop is seen as good, although it may not be so bountiful as last year's.

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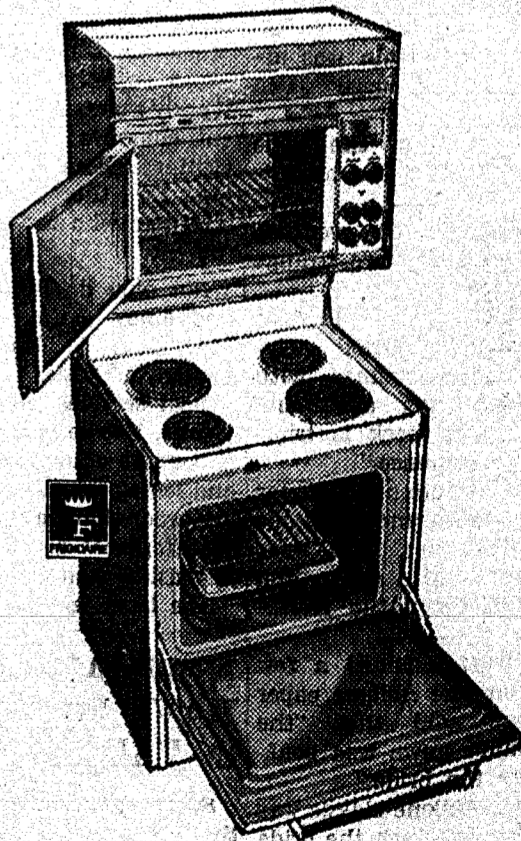

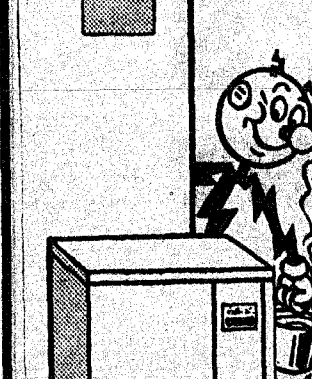

## Texas ID Cards Are Available For Non-Drivers

Col. William E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety said today that Texans are now able to obtain a special personal identification card.

The card, which was authorized by the 62nd Texas Legislature, is laminated and contains a color photograph of the holder. It is the same size as a Texas drivers license.

Information appearing on the card will have a special identification number issued by the DPS.

Speir said the cards should be of value to those persons who do not hold a Texas drivers license, but who need some sort of official card to help establish their identity.

In order to obtain a personal identification card, the applicant must appear at a DPS drivers license field office, execute a special application form, present a birth certificate or other documentary evidence of identity and date of birth, be fingerprinted and pay a statutory fee of \$5.00. The special cards, which will be mailed from DPS headquarters in Austin, will be dated to expire four years from the applicant's next birth date.

## SMOKING DOGS DEVELOP ILLS AS HUMANS DO

Dogs who were trained to smoke cigarettes through tubes inserted in their throats developed emphysema as well as lung cancer.

The dogs smoked seven cigarettes a day for a little over two years.

In emphysema, the air sacs of the lungs, where oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged, are damaged. Some of the 300 million air sacs in human lungs may rip and tear. The damage is irreversible.

Normally, scavenger-type cells called macrophages protect the air sacs. As soon as any foreign matter floats toward the air sacs, the macrophages literally gulp down the offenders. But cigarette smoke slows down the action of the macrophages, lays low this devouring line of defense.

Not enough is known about these scavenger cells and how they work. To find out more about their specific function around the air sacs in humans, Dr. R. R. Martin of the Texas Medical Center in Houston is conducting experiments to obtain these microscopic macrophages from normal individuals by washing out their lungs with a salty solution. He wants to test and observe their ability to kill bacteria in test tubes.

Dr. Martin's research, which is supported by a grant from the National Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, will provide data on how the macrophages combat infection in the lungs. An eventual next step in medical research will be to observe just how cigarette smoke debilitates the macrophages and exposes the air sacs to infection and damage.

week. Every morning a different officer or representative of the council puts a thought for the day on the boards. When classes become too tedious you can stop and ponder on the thought of the day!


