SA Application For COG Grant Waits Approval

The West Central Texas Council of Governments will receive \$162,000 in Federal funds to be distributed to local governments to help generate new jobs in the area. COG Executive Director Cecil Mayes confirmed Monday, August 30.

The funding will come through the Emergency Employment Act of 1971, which is a Federal job creation program enacted to generate employment for unemployed and under-employed persons.

Under the plan as administered in Texas, regional Councils of Governments will serve as "program agents" to equitably distribute their allowable funds to local governments in their respective planning regions, excluding cities or counties of 75,000 population or greater, which will serve as program agents to public agencies in their own respective jurisdictions.

In announcing the plan, Gov. Preston Smith said that the money will help satisfy unmet needs in state and local government in such fields as environmental quality, health care, housing, recreation, education, public safety and park and street maintenance.

All applications are to be in by Sept. 10 when a rough guideline will have to be presented in Austin to the Department of Community Affairs.

Also the WCTCOG executive will have to approve this work plan before the funding will start about October 1.

Santa Anna, a member of the COG organization, has applied for funds from the recent grant to employ an assistant city secretary. The local application is for \$3,900 for a 12-month period.

Two Are Named Directors For SA Co-op Gin

Area Doctors, Pharmacists Vote Against Welfare Vender Program

Doctors and pharmacists of the Central Texas area voted not to go along with the new Vendor program of the State Health Department in a meeting held Tuesday night at Brownwood Community Hospital.

Declaring the program as "completely unworkable" they agreed that compliance with it would be next to impossible.

Attending from Santa Anna were Robert and David Barkley of Phillips Drug, and many doctors and Pharmacists from Brownwood, Bangs, Coleman and other area places were in attendance.

"The paper work on a single prescription under this plan takes at least 20 minutes," Robert Barkley said on Wednesday morning.

In other aspects of the program, recipients would be limited to two prescriptions a month with a maximum expenditure of \$12.00. "Most of the older people are taking up to five prescriptions now," Barkley said, "and even at cost their prescriptions will run over \$12.00 a month.

If the doctor orders more than their maximum allowance, it must first be approved by a board in Wichita Falls, and returned to the physician before it can be filled. "They could die in that time," Barkley said.

Not only the pharmacists are loaded with paper work, but the doctors also. According to opinions expressed at the meeting, doctors would spend more time signing papers than seeing patients. Also, even at best, every doctor's

office and pharmacy would have to hire additional help to take care of the "red tape." The group prepared statements to send Raymond W.

Wowell, commissioner of the State Welfare Department, and also letters to Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and other officials in Austin, expressing their objections to the program.

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In Our Opinion

WHEN THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT resorts to blackmail to get its way it is carrying bureaucratic power too far.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has threatened to cut off federal funds for the whole state of Colorado because one county, Montezuma, has not performed according to their prescribed program.

The whole thing stems from the HEW demanding that their welfare staff be increased from 14 to 21 people for a county of 13,000 population which has a present case load of 700. This would give each employee a load of 35 cases to work every 90 days, that would be one each two and a half days for each worker. Now there ain't no use working a good mule to death, is there? If a business man didn't get any more work than that out of an employee, he would be broke in 24 hours.

Yet a bunch of Washington bureaucrats can sit up there in their ivory tower, spending our money, and demand that we accede to their nutty notions and we sit back and take it. I believe it is about time we quit sending their pay checks!

Getting back to Colorado, what really confuses the situation — even if Montezuma County wanted to do the HEW's bidding — is that the Colorado state legislature prescribes in detail how much taxes a county can levy for specific purposes. Under the law the county can only levy a tax of three mills for welfare and the county has already run out of this fund. But in far off Washington, the HEW has decreed that unless Montezuma County performs according to its decree then federal payments for the entire state of Colorado will be cut off.

Where do they get that stuff? Since when are we going to sit down here and let a bunch of radical liberals dictate what we are going to do — especially when they don't have a law to back it up.

What they are doing is making their own laws, and interpreting present laws to suit their particular desires.

People, we had better get off our "blessed assurance" and get a bunch of mail going to Washington. Write everybody you can think of, whether they are from our district or not. And that includes the President

We have had so much slop crammed down our throats that it is difficult to understand how we can keep anything on our stomach. And the sad thing is that as long as we allow them, they will continue to cram it down.

Are we going to sit back and take it? Or act?

WATER USERS in Santa Anna, Bangs, Brownwood and Early and others who get their water supply from Lake Brownwood, are up in arms about the application of the City of Coleman to dump 1.2 million gallons of sewage effluent into Hords Creek, which runs into the Jim Ned and eventually into Lake Brownwood.

Of course the result of this application is yet to be known, but the downstream water users do not relish the idea of drinking Coleman's sewage effluent.

The Texas Water Quality Board and the State Department of Health have the last say about this and citizens have the right to let their wishes be known. So if you wish to write them, the addresses are as follows:

Texas Water Quality Board, James Showen, acting director, 1108 Lavaca, Austin 78701; and Texas State Department of Health, Dr. James C. Peavy, commissioner, 1100 West 49th Street, Austin 78756.

You must understand that in cases where sewage effluent is drained into a public stream, the bacteria count is required to be below a certain standard. However, how well this check is made can be an important factor.

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STATE Capital NEWS

Austin — Governor Preston Smith sprang one surprise after another in announcing appointments to key state positions.

One of the biggest was selection of his longtime legal aide and top political campaign worker Robert D. (Bob) Bullock, formerly of Hillsboro, as Secretary of State succeeding Martin Dies Jr.

A few days earlier, he selected another staff assistant, V. Larry Teaver of Lubbock, to the State Board of Insurance. Surprise here was that Teaver did not replace Durwood Manford, veteran member of the board.

Manford got a new six-year term and Charles D. Mathews, a Dallas trucking executive and attorney until two years ago, was moved from the board to an Austin district judgeship. Teaver replaced Mathews when the freshman board member became judge of the new 200th Travis County district court.

Smith stirred some controversy by naming a successor to Brig. Gen. James M. Rose an assistant adjutant general of Texas for air. On recommendation of Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers, the state adjutant general, he picked Lt. Col. Belisario D.J. Flores of San Antonio for the Air National Guard command.

Smith's other appointments included:

• T. E. (Gene) Mitchell of Plainview as chairman of the Governor's Committee on Human Relations. Dies previously doubled in that job before his appointment to the Ninth Court of Civil Appeals at Beaumont.

• Robert W. Kneebone of Houston for a new six-year term as a member of the Texas Youth Council.

REDISTRICTING MOVES ON — A two-way legislative redistricting fight moved toward a Supreme Court decision last week.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin filed briefs in appeal from the August 2 Austin district court ruling that House of Representatives reapportionment this year is unconstitutional because it improperly violates county lines. Martin said the "one-man-one-vote" rule of federal courts eliminates state constitutional provision safeguarding county lines.

At the same time, 53rd District Judge Herman Jones refused to prevent the Texas Legislative Redistricting Board from reapportioning the State Senate and said the Board may also do preliminary House realignment. Time for attack on board's work, concluded Jones, is when it finishes.

Rep. Fred Head of Henderson brought suit in Jones' court to prevent the Board from redistricting House and Senate. He contended new census data is not complete and that reapportionment should be left until 1973. Head indicated efforts will be made to get his suit before the Supreme Court at the same time as the attack on House reapportionment of the regular session.

TAX STUDY LAUNCHED — New Legislative Property Tax Committee began a four-year study of how property taxation can be made "fair, viable and efficient."

Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg was named chairman of the group and Jack Hart of Midland, staff director.

Hart noted a recent decision of the California Supreme Court may make the Texas committee's job more difficult. California court held reliance on property taxes alone to finance public schools is unconstitutional.

TEACHER PAY HIKE OK — Up to 90 per cent of 138,000 Texas teachers will get their pay raise as approved by the Legislature in spite of the 90-day wage freeze, under a Texas Education Agency ruling.

Cuts are expected in a few months, however, State Welfare Department reports. Average of \$118.53 per month assistance for families with dependent children is expected to remain through January.

SHORT SNORTS

Texas motor vehicle registrations topped \$7.5 million mark for first time during registration year which ended March 31. Figure was 7,515,053, plus 120,295 exempt registrations.

New Texas Film Commission launched drive last week to get more movie production companies to work in state.

Top government and business leaders will brief Texas industrialists on economic and manufacturing developments at governor's conference here October 13-14.

Texans spent \$283 million on new autos from 1,700 franchised dealers last year. All new car dealers after December 1 must have special license from new Texas Motor Vehicle Commission.

Dear Editor:

I would like to call attention to what is happening to our water supply at Lake Brownwood.

AG OPINIONS — Appropriations bill limitations on extended state pay to aliens do not prohibit the Texas Industrial Commission from hiring a Mexican National to work in Mexico fulltime in a Texas Industrial Commission branch office there, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

• A justice of the peace who is not an attorney must have served a minimum of two terms of four years each to be exempt from attending a 40-hour course of instruction for non-lawyers.

• Texas Rehabilitation Commission is authorized to deposit funds received from local agencies under a federal establishment grant in a local depository.

Martin said a governor's veto of funds for payment of court costs will handicap his office in prosecution and defense of state cases.

WATER PLAN ALIVE — Master \$10 billion water plan to move surplus Mississippi River waters to Texas High Plains farms is still alive, according to Harry Burleigh, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board.

Burleigh urged campaign to win congressional support of plan in 1973, when federal agency water conservation report is due.

Although Texans rejected \$3.5 billion bond issue to finance state's share of giant project, it is believed much of the money can now be obtained from the federal government, Burleigh indicated. Two groups, West Texas Chamber of Commerce and Water Inc., are spearheading the new drive for financing.



CHELATES and COTTON



Chelate! To a linguist, the word—literally—means "claw." To a cotton grower, however, "chelate" can mean the difference between profit and loss at picking time.

It all has to do with micro-nutrients, minute soil-nourishing agents that plants need to flourish. When these are deficient—either depleted or tied up in a form plants can't use—the results are unhealthy crops and reduced yields.

And that's where chelates come in.

A chelate is a micronutrient compound formed by combining a metal with a special organic mixture. In a chelated state, this metal stays in the ground in an available form until plants are ready to absorb it. Unlike other sources of micronutrients, such as sulfates and chlorides, chelates can not become tied up in the soil.

Further, a chelate like Sequestrene zinc can be used either dry or as a liquid, which means it can be simply and conveniently combined with

dry or liquid fertilizer for time-saving, dual-purpose application.

How can a cotton grower find out if his soil needs a chelate supplement?

One way is to take a soil sample for testing. If the grower doesn't know how to do this, his local county agent will be glad to provide the necessary information and cartons for sending the sample to the laboratory.

Another way is for the grower to be able to recognize starved soil symptoms in his crop. A zinc deficiency in cotton, for example, will cause bronzing and yellowing between the veins of leaves shortly after emergence.

If this symptom is allowed to progress unchecked, the cotton plants can become stunted, which results in late fruit set, disappointing yields and loss of profit.

All of which can be prevented or cured with the proper application of the proper chelate at the proper time.

Internal Clocks

And Breathing

Many animals, including man, have built-in daily clocks. Some scientists now suspect that animals, maybe even man, also have annual clocks or yearly cycles.

Most people fall asleep at roughly the same time every night. Their peak activity periods are not too different from day to day. They have daily clocks. So do most animals.

But many animals also have yearly cycles, most obvious in hibernating animals and migratory birds. According to a recent article in *Scientific American*, "Annual Biological Clocks," some scientists think yearly clocks may be as universal as daily ones. Research suggests the clocks are internal, already set and wound at birth, and operating independently of the environment.

Even ground squirrels raised in the laboratory — stop eating in October, just as they do in the natural environment. Their breathing becomes drastically slower and their body temperature drops almost 40 degrees.

Investigators are just beginning to explore the possibility of annual clocks in man, and a preliminary study of psychotics suggests yearly rhythmic ups and downs and cycles of inactivity.

Very little is known about annual clocks, or even daily ones, for that matter. No scientist completely understands why sleep occurs. It just does; and if people are deprived of sleep they show psychotic symptoms.

Changes in daily and yearly cycles are usually accompanied by drastic changes in breathing patterns. Your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association does not have any information on yearly clocks; but they have booklets about breathing and how the lungs work. They know it's a matter of life and breath.
