VFD Membership Drive Underway

The annual membership drive of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department is now underway with letters being sent this week to hundreds of local and area people. The annual drive is to solicit honorary memberships

to the organization with the membership dues going to help finance the organization.

The Santa Anna VFD is a very active group, having an active membership of 22. Floyd Smith is president of

the group this year and Edd Hartman is fire chief.

During the past year members of the department have contributed about 5,200 man-hours. Over \$1,600 has been spent for equipment and for other projects. Teams from the VFD have participated in the Hill Country Firemen's Association contests during the past year, and the Ladies Auxiliary has also been active in local and area events.

One of the projects this year has been the distribution of free emergency home fire extinguishers throughout the community. Recent expenditures have included about \$600 for reconditioning the old rural fire truck and installing an independent pump. This makes two rural trucks in good shape and ready for use in the county.

Future plans of the department include purchase and equipping of a small van for emergency use. The emergency vehicle would be available not only for fires but in case of drownings, electrical shock or other emergencies. Members of the department plan to take training and be qualified to operate the emergency vehicle and equipment.

Response has been good to the past membership drives and VFD members urge all area people to again help the department in this way. A list of honorary members will be published in the NEWS as their contributions are received. Other 400 families and individuals were enlisted in the drive last year.

In Our Opinion

TEXAS SHOULD BE PROUD of the fact that, although our crime rate has increased, the increase has been less than the previous year. According to Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Department of Public Safety, the increase in 1971 was less than 1970 and 1970 was less than the increase in 1969. However, up to that time there had been an increase almost every year since 1961.

Based on population, the crime rate still dropped 2.6 per cent over the previous year.

Oddly enough, the only crime that did not increase in Texas during the year was thefts which dropped by about 11 per cent. Otherwise most all other crimes were up with murder up 15 per cent, rape up nearly 7 per cent, and robberies up over 20 per cent. Burglaries, aggravated assaults and auto thefts were also up.

One thing that should concern our community is that crime generally was up in rural areas.

It used to be that one who lived in the small community had little to worry about as far as crime was concerned. We would leave home without locking our doors and never worry whether we would have intruders or not. That is not the case any more. Now if we leave our doors unlocked we might find that someone has entered and helped themselves to whatever they wanted. Several cases in the area have resulted in losses of everything from guns to television sets, and in many cases the items were never seen again.

One wonders if the criminals are coming into rural areas from nearby cities and playing their trade. However in some cases it would seem that the burglars must have known the habits of the victims in order to pick the right time and place for their crime.

Most of us would not like to return to the "good old days" because almost everyone is living better than they were then. But it would be nice to return to a time when you could trust your neighbor and a man's word was his bond.

THERE IS BEGINNING to be considerable publicity on the fact that everyone who wants to can vote. Now all one has to do is register and he can cast his ballot on election day.

But the one thing that the government can't remedy in voting is the apathy of the people. In 1970 eligible voters in Texas numbered 6.5 million, yet only four million registered and of that number a little over 50 per cent cast a ballot. It boiled down to the fact that of those eligible to vote, only about a third were interested enough to cast a ballot. Now Congress can pass all the laws they want to, but that is not going to cause people to go to the polls on election day. Something is going to have to make them want to go, and what will that be?

People become disgusted with politicians who become corrupt, and we certainly have our share of them. Texas has been a forerunner in such antics of late, and that doesn't stimulate a man to want to vote, unless it is to get rid of the culprits.

Another breed of politicians seem to be on the verge of socialism and play into the hands of the totalitarian countries who would destroy our very way of life and they also have a loud following who make a big noise, which actually frightens the one who would keep America a free and independent country. In fact the presidential aspirants have several in their number.

What is the answer to the problems of this country? Crime and violence on the increase, lack of respect of country and law and order, selfishness and self-centeredness, among many of our ailments are some of the things we face each day. How far can people go under this kind of duress and maintain a way of life that is tolerable?

Only the good Lord has the answer.

STATE *Capital* NEWS

Austin—Gov. Preston Smith left timing of a special legislative session up in the air after the Texas Supreme Court, in effect, said there has to be one.

The High Court, not unexpectedly, concluded that Secretary of State Bob Bullock could not order public financing of primary elections without prior legislative authority. Smith conceded that apparently left him no alternative but to summon law-makers back to work in advance of the May primaries. He said he wanted to postpone the unhappy deed as long as possible and was not prepared to say when he would have to act.

Meanwhile, to help Smith with his decision, Bullock's staff compiled data on estimated costs of the May 6 and June 3 elections and when the bills would fall due.

Most legislators faced with election campaigns hoped session would be limited to the primary finance issue alone — or perhaps that and highway billboard controls. The latter legislation is needed soon to avoid a threatened \$24 million cut in federal road building funds allotted Texas.

Another special session will be needed later (unless Smith decides to jump all business into a single pre-election call) to approve a 1973 state appropriations act replacing the budget items vetoed last year by the governor.

Bitterness is expected to flare in the House of Representatives on opening day of the session — whenever it is. An effort is almost certain to be made to oust Speaker Gus Mutscher who is being tried in Abilene on charges of conspiring to accept a bribe in the form of 1969 bank loans and pre-arranged insurance stock profits.

A coalition, in an effort to avert the House clash, is pushing Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi as interim speaker. The leading speaker-ship candidate, Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine, wants a showdown vote on electing a new speaker immediately.

CRIME INCREASE — More major crimes were committed in Texas in 1971 than in 1970, but the increase actually was the smallest since 1963, the Department of Public Safety reports.

Cities over 100,000 population reported fewer major crimes — a total of 298,033 as compared with 307,149 in 1970. The overall crime rate for the big cities was up three-tenths of one per cent.

The DPS Crime Report based on information submitted by Texas sheriffs and chiefs of police shows 482,386 major criminal offenses during 1971, an increase of 13,324 over 1970. All categories except theft (which declined 11.7 per cent) increased. There were 1,687 murders, 3,075 rapes, 14,385 robberies, 137,140 burglaries, 34,472 aggravated assaults, 48,323 auto thefts and 243,344 thefts.

STORM INSURANCE CUT — 26 per cent reduction in windstorm insurance rates for nonbeach property in 14 coastal counties was ordered last week.

The cut, directed by the State Board of Insurance, takes effect before the hurricane

season for those structures at least 2,500 feet from shore, 20 feet above mean sea level or protected by a seawall.

Property owners have been paying 150 per cent above normal rates through the Texas Catastrophe Property Insurance Pool. Beachfront property will continue at three times standard rates.

The Insurance Board also raised the maximum amount of insurance available through the pool from \$100,000 to \$200,000 on dwellings and from \$500,000 to \$1 million on commercial properties including schools and public buildings.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith named Moises V. Vela of Harlingen and reappointed Mrs. Marialice S. (Allan) Shivers of Austin to the board of regents of Pan American College, Edinburg.

Smith also appointed Luther May Jr. of Olney to the Midwestern University, (Wichita Falls) board of regents; Mrs. Jackie Blackstock of Austin to the Teachers' Professional Practices Commission and Robert H. Cutler of El Paso, Joe P. Cain of Houston and Albert W. Rollins of Arlington to Texas Mass Transportation Committee.

VETERANS LAND BONDS SOLD — Forty million worth of Texas veterans land bonds were sold last week at the lowest rate — 4.03658 per cent — paid by the program since 1961.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale assures continued financing of the program until early 1974. Constitutional interest rate ceiling for the bonds is 4.5 per cent.

The Veterans Land Board is constitutionally authorized to sell another \$30.7 million in bonds to finance the program which has enabled almost 46,000 Texas veterans to buy land.

LABOR RECOMMENDS CANDIDATES — The Texas AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education recommended support by labor union members of five statewide candidates but didn't agree on a candidate for governor.

Delegates recommended former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough for senator; State Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso for lieutenant governor, Houston lawyer John Hill for attorney general; John White for reelection as commissioner of agriculture and Bob Armstrong for re-election as land commissioner. They also strongly recommended State Rep. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty for speaker of the Texas House of Rep-

resentatives.

Although the necessary two-thirds of COPE delegates did not rally behind any candidate for gubernatorial nomination, State Rep. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi did get a commendation for her legislative reform efforts which she is carrying into the governor's race.

AFL-CIO President Roy Evans said COPE will try to raise \$500,000 for primary campaign efforts.

AG OPINIONS — Texas is entitled to its proportionate share of the federal credit for state death taxes even though the decedent was a non-resident and specific property is exempt, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

• Deputies of county officials are "employees" as defined in a new law creating a county civil service system for counties 300,000 or more.

• The Navarro County criminal district attorney paid entirely from state funds is entitled to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, but not the County and District Retirement System.

SIGNS CHANGING — Watch for changes in traffic control devices, signs, signals and markings along Texas highways.

Texas Highway Commission approved them in the manual on uniform traffic control devices, based on recommendations of the American Association of State Highway Officials and Federal Highway Administration.

Changeover will be from words to symbols and pictures as part of an international move toward greater uniformity and clarity in road signs. The change will be gradual, with new signs going up initially on a replacement basis. Panels explaining the new symbols will be placed under the signs at first, then removed in about five years.

SHORT SNORTS — Texas Court of Criminal Appeals held extending voting

rights to 18-year-olds did not give them the right to serve on juries in this state.

New regulations allowing insurance companies to cancel auto policies only for failure of the insured to pay premiums or for license suspension or revocation have been adopted by the State Board of Insurance.

Internal Revenue Service said a spot check of 4,579 retail stores showed 95 per cent are complying with base price posting regulations.

Cigarette smokers paid \$3.5 million more in state taxes last month than in February 1972, State Treasurer Jesse James reported.

A University of Texas study group believes debris washed away from coral reefs in some coastal waters to deeper ocean could provide the key in finding future fuel and energy resources.

UT Bureau of Business Research says the Texas economy is off to a slow beginning this year but is "dawdling along in the right direction."

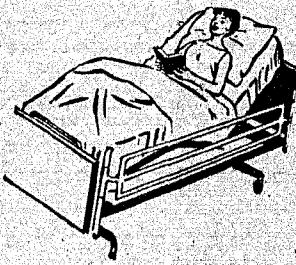

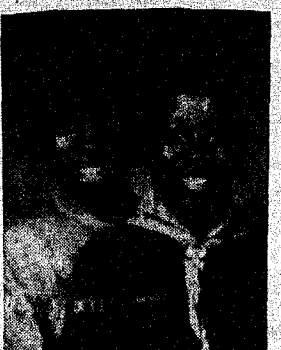

COLEMAN CO. FARMS INCREASE DURING PERIOD OF 1964-1969

Coleman County showed a total of 1,073 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Adm. The number is an increase of 72 over the last previous census of agriculture in 1964 when farms reported in the county were 1,001.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 738 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 615 in 1964. The report also shows the

average farm size in the county was 741 acres and the average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$73,309.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all from products sold in 1969, \$9,265,082; in 1964, \$7,105,150.
2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$1,660,130; in 1964 \$2,296,636.
3. Value of all livestock, poultry and their products sold in 1969, \$7,604,474; in 1964, \$4,802,869.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, two of the county's \$2,500 and over farms are incorporated.

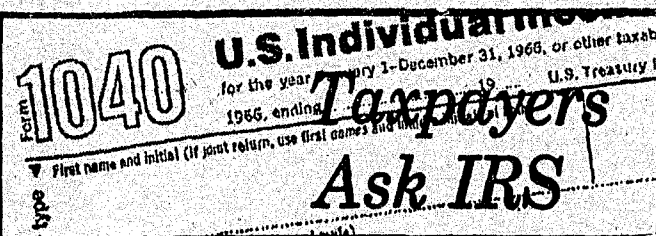

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) My employer transferred me to another state last year and as a result I plan to claim a moving expense deduction. In addition, my wife and I are thinking of filing separate returns. Are the dollar limitations on moving expenses different for spouses filing jointly and separately?

A) In addition to direct costs of moving, expenses may be deducted for the sale or purchase of a residence of the termination or acquisition of a lease, house-hunting trips, and temporary lodging and meals at the new location. However, the total deduction for these three categories cannot exceed \$2,500 with the latter two limited to no more than \$1,000 in total. The limitation is half the above amounts, \$1,250 and \$500, for certain married couples filing separate returns. However, if you and your wife file separate income tax returns and one of the following circumstances exists, the \$1,250 and \$500 limitations do not apply:

1) Only one spouse commences work at a new principal place of work for which a deduction is allowable, or

2) Both spouses commence work at new principal places of work which are at least 50 miles apart and they do not

reside together at the same residence during the taxable year.

Under the second situation, a husband and wife filing a joint return may each deduct up to \$2,500 for expenses in connection with the sale or purchase of a residence or the termination or acquisition of a lease and \$1,000 for expenses for house-hunting trips and temporary lodging and meals at the new location.

Married couples who meet the qualifications under the revised rules may disregard the dollar limitations for married filing separately listed on Form 3903, Moving Expense Adjustment.

Q) Some friends and I are planning to form an investment club. Does the IRS have a publication on the tax duties and responsibilities of such a club and its members?

A) Yes. Call your local IRS office or write to your IRS district office and ask for a copy of Publication 550, Tax Information on Investment Income and Expenses. It's available free.

Q) My son purchased a car last year. Does the amount he paid count toward his support when I figure out whether or not I can claim him as a dependent?

A) No. The purchase of an automobile, whether by you or your dependent, is not considered when determining total support.

Q) If I let the IRS compute my tax, will it delay any refund I may have coming?

A) No. The IRS can compute the tax and issue a refund within 4-6 weeks from the date the return is filed with the service center. So, actually, your refund will not be delayed by having IRS compute the tax since the computations are checked on all returns received.
