Three councilmen will be elected and only names of the three incumbents are on the ballot. Glen Copeland, Glen Pope and H. A. Burden are all seeking re-election to the

Council. Those with one year remaining on their terms are Mrs. Gale Allen and Julian Kelley.

A light vote is anticipated as there is no contest on the ballot.

In the election for trustees for the Santa Anna Independent School District, five names are on the ballot. The terms of two trustees expire this year and both Jesse Williams and A. R. (Buddy) Neff are seeking re-election.

Others whose names appear on the ballot are Max Eubank, Floyd Smith and Mrs. Carmen Rendon.

The school board election will be held at the Lions Club building. Mrs. C. D. Bruce is election judge and Mrs. Loren Rice and Mrs. Don Clifton will be clerks. Polling will be from 8:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m. The two candidates with the largest number of votes will be named to the three-year terms.

Others on the board of trustees are Richard Horner, M. L. Guthrie, Jr., and Vernon Parnell, two-year terms, and A. D. Pettit and Barbara Kingsbery, one year remaining in their term.

Absentee voting in both the city and school elections ended Tuesday.

## FUNERAL HELD ON TUESDAY FOR LEE HUNTER, 82

Funeral services were held here Tuesday for Lee Hunter, 82, a well-known retired businessman. Mr. Hunter died at Ranger Park Hospital on Sunday night, March 26, after a long illness.

Rev. Bill Brewer officiated for the service at the First Baptist Church. Interment was in the Santa Anna cemetery.

Born in Santa Anna Nov. 7, 1889, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Hunter. He married Bernice Brown on March 28, 1915. He was co-owner of Hunter Brothers Grocery store with his brothers, Archie and Roger, which they purchased in 1925. The business had been established by their father in 1905.

Lee Hunter became the sole owner of the grocery store in later years and operated it until illness cause his retirement. He had been a member of the First Baptist Church for 64 years and a member of the Santa Anna Masonic Lodge for the past 61 years.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Brownlee Hunter of Austin and Edwin Hunter of Plains; one brother, Roger Hunter of Austin; two sisters, Mrs. Juanita Robertson of Austin and Mrs. Mattie Woodruff of Comanche; and three grandchildren.

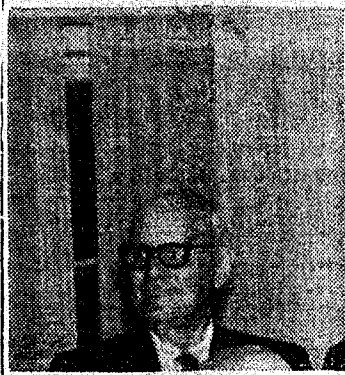
## Mr. Lee Moore New Employee At WTU Office

## Henry O. Newman Buried Tuesday In S. A. Cemetery

Henry O. Newman, 82, well-known Santa Anna resident, died at 3:30 p. m. Sunday, March 26, in Ranger Park Inn nursing home. Mr. Newman had been in failing health for several months and had been transferred to the local nursing home last week after a two-months stay in a San Angelo hospital.

Funeral services were held at United Methodist Church at 3:00 p. m. Tuesday afternoon with interment in the Santa Anna Cemetery. Rev. Louis Shambeck and Rev. Bill Brewer were officiating ministers. Nephews served as pallbearers.

Born in Washington County Sept. 27, 1890, Mr. Newman had lived in Santa Anna nearly all his life. He was married to Verna Kirkpatrick at Santa Anna June 6, 1915. He was a member of the Baptist Church and the Masonic Lodge. He received his 50-year Masonic pin in September 1970. He was a retired rancher and had been in the real estate business in recent years.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Kirk Newman of Denver, Colo.; two sisters, Mrs. Bessie Hall of Dallas and Mrs. Mabel Parrish of Fort Worth; four brothers, Virgil and Walter Newman of Santa Anna, Roy Newman, Dallas and Frank of San Angelo; and one granddaughter, Cathy Newman of Lubbock.

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**In Our Opinion**

CLEANING UP TEXAS seems to be the big word for candidates for governor this year and this might be the right thing. However, their ideas of the way to clean up the state seem to vary.

One, with whom we can't agree, Mrs. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi, would begin by doing away with the Texas Rangers. How this would aid in cleaning up Texas is a question we have not been able to answer.

Mrs. Farenthold is a member of the "Dirty Thirty" group who tend to lean toward the left, some more than others, but she, for one caters to the dissident minority groups. She spoke last week to a Latin-American group in south Texas and received plenty of applause when she suggested disbanding the Rangers. Some among the Latin group believe the Rangers are discriminatory against them.

Of course there may be some Texas Rangers who are prejudiced and as far as that goes, there is not one among us who is not prejudiced in one way or another on some subject. Generally, however, the Texas Rangers are a dedicated, competent law enforcement agency, and do a great service for the state.

In the Central Texas area, Ranger H. R. Block has been most helpful and cooperative with local law enforcement agencies. Much credit must be given him in the solving of the Bangs bank robbery last year, and he has been instrumental in the solving of many crimes. How would getting rid of his and those like him in the Ranger organization help Texas?

Of course, Mrs. Farenthold is running for office, and she is after the Latin-American vote, as well as all other minorities. She also wants the labor vote and almost got an endorsement from that group. Had she had a better chance of winning, she probably would have been endorsed by labor.

She also wants the vote of the average person in Texas, but so far her platform isn't the type that will draw the average citizen.

She supports more welfare, more state money for many things that have become suspect to some of us, and at a time when we would like to see a reversal of the constant growth of state expenditures and the seasonal increase in state taxes. We are just about to the point to where we are taxed out of a livelihood.

She is, of course, for rhome, mother, children and everything all the other candidates claim to be for. But who isn't?

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MANY OF US WONDER, the president of the American Trial Lawyers Association, said, why it takes months and sometimes years to get a case to court. He said there had to be some reason for excessive delays in trial procedures and stated that they were out to find out and do something about it.

He was referring to such trials as Charles Manson and Angela Davis, and we think that many trial lawyers already know the reason is — fear. Fear that in some way in every step of the procedure the defendant's rights might be violated and the trial held in vain because of reversals of a higher court because of some technicality.

It starts with the arresting officer, continues right on through the prosecutor's part of the proceedings and then sits like a dead weight on the courts themselves.

While the defendants in the cases has all the odds on their side. Their lawyers sit back and watch every technical detail for something that can upset the appellate of the prosecution.

Caution by the courts is commendable, for justice is the aim of every proceeding, but there is no doubt that defendants have made both pretrial and trial procedure a playground of frivolous delays of justice.

So every trial becomes two — the state's trial of the defendant, and then the federal courts trial of the state's fairness in dispensing justice.

Also it boils down to the higher court's interpretation of the law. Is it to be interpreted literally, or is it up to them to interpret what they think the framers of the Constitution meant when they wrote it.

We prefer the literal translation.

STATE **Capital NEWS** By BILL BOYKIN

Austin — Texans have just a few days more — until April 5 — to register to vote in the May 6 primary elections.

Major state candidates, including Gov. Preston Smith, viewed with alarm registration totals so far. They noted that less than 3.8 million had registered as of last weekend, although there are nearly 7.7 million qualified voters in the state.

Present registrations are trailing the corresponding period in 1968 by 294,000 and the 1970 figure by more than 370,000.

In 1968, observed gubernatorial candidate Frances Farenthold, 64 per cent of qualified voters were registered before the primaries. This year, only 48 per cent of the potentially-eligible are registered. Former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough pointed out that 63.4 per cent of those qualified registered in 1970, and the 1972 dropoff is reflected in many "working class" neighborhoods.

Nearly one million more should register by April 5 if previous patterns are followed, Smith said.

Under the state's new voter registration system, which candidates Farenthold and Yarborough lauded as one of the nation's best, citizens have until 30 days before any election to register and become eligible to vote.

The U. S. Supreme Court threw some confusion over the registration system with a ruling that 12 months' state and six months' local residency requirements for voter eligibility (like those of Texas) are unconstitutional.

The High Court said 30 days' residency is sufficient for any state. Secretary of State Bob Bullock took the case under study. Special legislative attention may be necessary.

**TPA POLLS NORTH AND EAST TEXAS** — Editors and publishers were polled at the annual meeting of the North and East Texas Press Association in Palestine last week.

First question was — "Who will carry your county in the primary?" In the Democratic Governor's race, the newsmen voted: Barnes, 25; Briscoe, 20; Smith, 8 and Farenthold, 3. Republican gubernatorial candidates rated were: Fay, 12; Grover and Reagan, 9 each.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race it was: Hall, 27; Connally, 14 and Hobby, 12. The editors selected Sanders 28 to 19 over Yarborough in the U. S. Senate primary.

Asked whom they would vote for personally, the tally read: Briscoe, 19; Barnes, 14; Smith, 8 and Farenthold, 5.

They selected Hall, 26 over Hobby, 10 and Connally, 7. In the U. S. Senate primary they voted for Sanders 18 to 7 over Yarborough. In the 1972 General Election poll they voted for Tower 21 to 5 over Sanders.

**SPEAKER'S BATTLE LOOMS** — House Speaker Gus Mutscher, appealing a bribery consent conviction in Sharpstown stock scandals, announced he will step aside as speaker.

The long-expected move set the stage for a head-on battle for the key presiding officer's post when Governor Smith calls a special legislative session.

Reps. Rayford Price of Palestine and L. DeWitt Hale or Corpus Christi both claim majority support to take over the gavel during the special session. Hale has agreed to serve only as interim speaker.

and pledges he will not seek the job in the 1973 regular session. Price is considered the leading candidate for speaker in 1973, but he wants to take over at the first opportunity to enhance his long-term chances.

Most other speakership hopefuls line up behind the Hale interim bid. Rep. R. B. McAlister of Lubbock, radio-television executive, announced he also will seek the speaker's position in 1973.

**INSURANCE RATES AGAIN** — Insurance Board Chairman Larry Teaver lambasted two Board colleagues for proposing a \$27 million homeowners increase which he termed "unnecessary, unjustifiable and an insult to the intelligence of the people of Texas."

Board members Ned Price and Durwood Manford denied any new rates have been finally adopted and said they likely won't be before June 1.

Teaver, who advocates a \$14 million decrease in fire and other building coverage, called another meeting for March 29 to review Board actions and to recommend an "economic trend factor" be kept out of rates pending a study of the price freeze and inflation.

**DEMOS LEAVE OFF DST** — Democrats ignored a legislative resolution directing a May 6 statewide (non-binding) vote on daylight saving time. Republicans put the issue on their ballots.

Authors of the resolution, Reps. Hilary Doran of Del Rio and John Poerner of Hondo, blasted Democratic Chairman Roy Orr of DeSoto who accepted responsibility for the omission. They also petitioned the State Democratic Executive Committee to reconsider and overrule Orr.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The State Supreme Court April 26 will hear a lawsuit concerning invasion of privacy and whether a telephone company owes customers protection from a wiretap by an employee.

Court of Criminal Appeals granted a new trial for a Smith County man convicted of raping his sister-in-law.

The State Supreme Court declined to issue orders under which an Austin investor sought to require a deposition from a San Angelo Savings and Loan Association president which may touch on stock scandals.

A \$55,500 claim by a Houston couple against the city as the result of their son's drowning in a garbage dump was

refused by the Supreme Court. **HOSPITAL BUDGET COMPILED** — Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation will seek a \$141.8 million from the legislature for its 1973 fiscal year operations.

Major requests will include a new children's psychiatric unit at Austin, alcoholism and drug abuse programs at Big Spring, maximum security buildings at Rusk and a critically needed 100-bed treatment facility for drug abuse patients at San Antonio.

Other major allocations are sought for the Rio Grande State Center for MH-MR, construction of an El Paso State Center for Human Development, community-based MH-MR services, funds to meet Medicare-Medicaid certification requirements, a new drug dependent youth program at Vernon Center South and new intensive treatment centers in Houston and Dallas.

**SPECIAL ELECTION SET** — A special election has been set for June 13 in Jefferson County to fill the unexpired term of the late Rep. Will Lee Smith of Beaumont.

Smith, dean of the House of Representatives, died March 17 of a heart attack. He was opposed for a 13th term in the Democratic primary.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Four were named by Governor Smith to the new Texas Council on Marine-Related Affairs.

They are Dr. John C. Calhoun Jr. of College Station, John J. Pepe of Houston, James J. Flanagan Jr. of Port Arthur and Joe B. Harris of Austin — all appointed for six-year terms.

Smith also announced reappointments of the following to the Board of Trustees, Texas County and District Retirement System as well as appointment of Dallas County Judge W. L. Sterrett; County Commissioner A. J. Ploch of San Antonio, Tarrant County Criminal Court Judge J. C. Duvall of Fort Worth and Lamar County Judge Lester Crutchfield of Paris.

**HOUSING SUB-STANDARD** — Nearly 350,000 Texas housing units need replacement of major repair, a statewide study informed the governor.

The survey showed the high-

est percentage of poor quality housing in rural areas, some in urban centers and moderate-sized cities and the lowest percentage in suburban areas. Mexican-Americans and blacks live in most of the low quality residences. Only 4.5 per cent of white households live in inferior quarters, the survey showed.

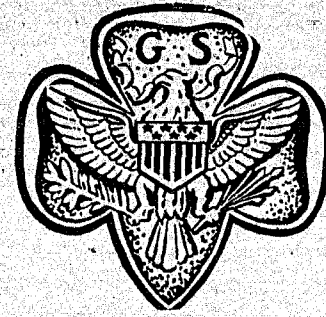

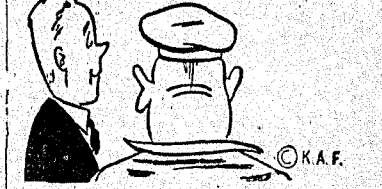
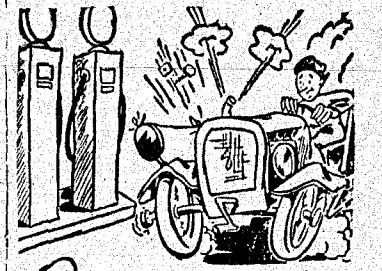

## THE CRUCIFIXION

As the crowd led Jesus away to his death, Simon of Cyrene, who was just coming into Jerusalem from the country, was forced to follow, carrying Jesus' cross. Great crowds trailed along behind, and many grief-stricken women. Two others, criminals, were led out to be executed with him, at a place called "The Skull." There all three were crucified. Jesus on the center cross, and the two criminals on either side. "Father, forgive these people," Jesus said, "for they don't know what they are doing." And the soldiers gambled for his clothing, throwing dice for each piece. The crowd watched, and they laughed and scoffed. "He was so good at helping others," they said, "let's see him save himself if he is really God's Chosen One, the Messiah." The soldiers mocked him, too, by offering him a drink... of sour wine. And they called to him, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" A signboard was nailed to the cross above him with these words: "This is the King of the Jews." One of the

criminals hanging beside him scoffed, "So you're the Messiah, are you? Prove it by saving yourself... and us, too, while you're at it!" But the other criminal protested, "Don't you even fear God when you are dying? We deserve to die for our evil deeds, but this man hasn't done one thing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom." And Jesus replied, "Today you will be with me in Paradise. This is a solemn promise." By now it was noon, and darkness fell across the whole land for three hours, until three o'clock. The light from the sun was gone... and suddenly the thick veil hanging in the Temple split apart. Then Jesus shouted, "Father, I commit my spirit to you," and with those words he died. When the captain of the Roman military unit handling the executions saw what had happened, he was stricken with awe before God and said, "Surely this man was innocent."

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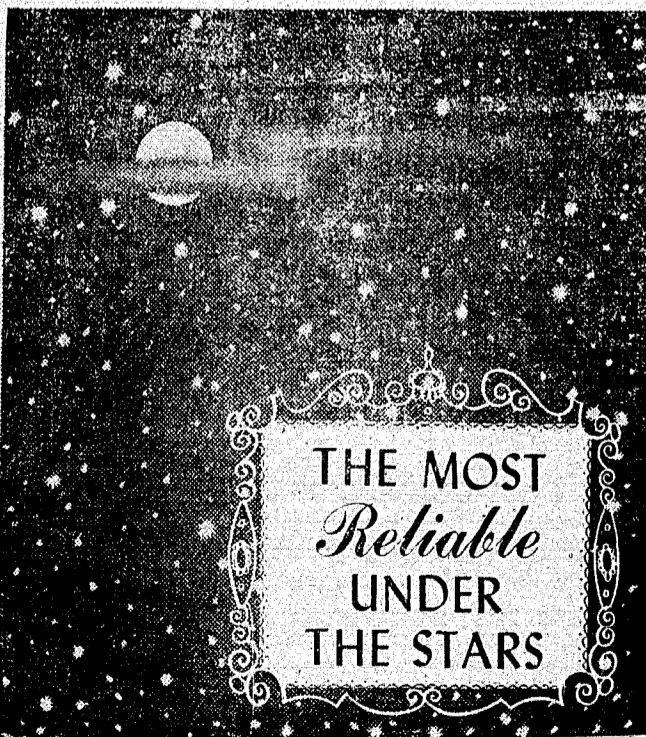
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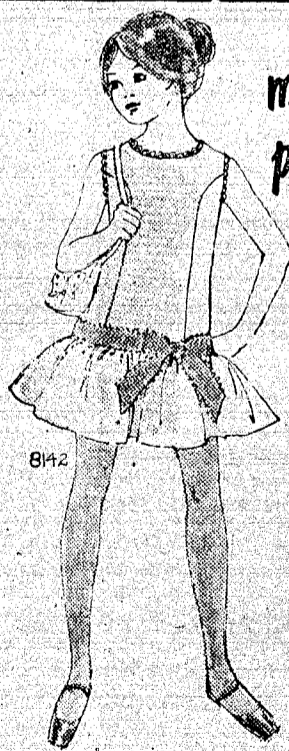


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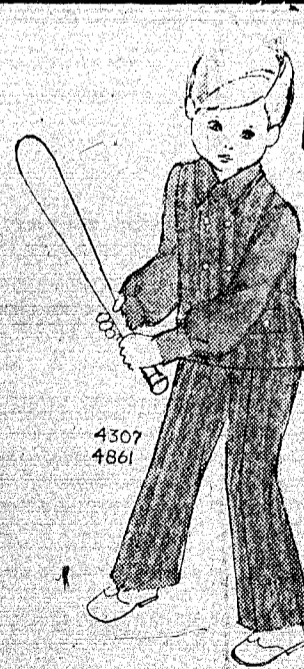

# Many Mini-Bikes Cause Headaches

Mini-skirts, mini-shorts... everything's a "mini" these days. But "mini-bikes," the latest craze in midget motorcycles, have the potential to cause maxi-headaches for many parents in Texas, the Insurance Information Institute cautions.

These packages of pint-sized propulsion look like toys, the institute notes, and they are notorious for their ability to win their way into the heart of youngsters — particularly those between 10 and 14. However, unless the driver is of legal licensing age (15 years old in Texas) or he operates the mini-bike only on his parents' own private property, the vehicle is being operated outside the law and insurance coverage is non-existent.

Texas law prohibits operation of a motor vehicle by anyone under the age of 15 on any public thoroughfare or street in the state and mini-bikes come under the provisions of this law, the institute says. This covers riding on sidewalks; in parking lots; in apartment complex entrances, exits and access roads, as well as alleyways and highways.

If the mini-bike is being operated by an underage driver on his parents' property, any damage or injury caused by that driver is covered — within the limits of the policy — by the usual homeowners insurance coverage.

However, the institute cautions that if the vehicle is being operated outside these narrow limits, the parents of the driver assume responsibility for any damage or injury... and neither the family automobile nor homeowners insurance will offer relief.

The institute urges parents to consider the problems involved in allowing underage drivers to operate these mini-bikes, from the standpoint of possible harm to the child driving the vehicle and also from the standpoint of possible legal liability and resultant damage suits that could arise from injury or property damage that the youngsters might cause.

# Absenteeism Costs - Not Pays

A pupil asked me a few days ago why I was always concerned about absenteeism in school and why I bothered their parents making telephone calls and requiring excuses for absences from the parent.

Naturally, the first reason I could present was the financial side of absenteeism. Each day a pupil misses school cost

the school district approximately \$6.00 a day. Figures for the reporting period closing March 10 revealed the following figures:

There have been 1,429 absentees in grade school and 709 in high school; enrollment has been 249 in grade school with an average daily attendance of 230. The high school has enrolled 120 with an ADA of 110.38.

These figures indicate that the Santa Anna Independent School has lost approximately \$2,560 in per capita state funds alone. This could possibly hit along a certain figure which could cost the school a teacher, since the number of teachers a school qualifies for is determined by ADA.

Granted, pupils should not be in school when they are sick, because this passes the germs to other pupils and sometimes prolongs a later absence. Some parents are prone, however, to take their pupils out of school "at the drop of a hat."

# Assistance By SCS Given For Conservation

Is there really a conflict between conservation and wildlife? Between good sound ranch management and wildlife habitat preservation? Or is there no place in our modern farming and ranching operations, with its improved technology, modernized machinery, and the cost-price-squeeze, for wildlife? These are just a few of many questions land owners and sports enthusiasts are asking. Let's take a look at some of the problems that brought about these questions.

When operating units were small and labor plentiful, the brush did not create too much of a problem in managing livestock. But then the brush wasn't so thick, and land prices were not so high. Now there is a whole different story. Brush is taking over where tall grasses have been grazed out and on abandoned cropland fields. Labor is scarce and machines are fast replacing the cow-horse. The size of the operating units are increasing year after year. The rancher must employ every "trick-of-the-trade" if he is to compete, or stay in business.

Brush is the number one thief of our precious moisture supply. We know that brush takes at least four times as much water as grass to grow one pound of dry forage. We also know that planned brush control will increase the supply of wildlife such as deer, turkey, quail and doves. Planned brush control allows the grasses to increase in both quality and quantity. Removing brush in strips also enhances beautification of the country side. Brush strips that provide food and cover for wildlife also provide shelter for livestock from the summer heat and winter cold. Farmers and Ranchers are discovering a ready market for their hunting and fishing where conservation measures and improved management practices have made game more plentiful. This extra income may put land owners ahead of the cost-price-squeeze. Resource conservation and management then must take into account all of our natural resources; land, water, plants, and animals. Even the air we breathe and the beauty of the countryside cannot be overlooked.

There is a proper and harmonious relationship between conservation, wildlife, sound rangeland management, modern farming methods, outdoor recreation, and beautification. This relationship is achieved when a complete resource conservation plan is applied. Plan your farm and farm your plans. The Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District assisted by the Soil Conservation Service are organized to give assistance in planning wise use of our renewable natural resources.

# Training, Jobs To Be Provided With CTO Grant

Governor Preston Smith has announced his approval of a community action grant of \$119,250 in federal funds to Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. in Coleman for operation of the agency's programs.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective May 1, 1972, through April 30, 1973. Program accounts and the amount of federal funds allotted each are: Administration, 48,278; and General Community Programming, 70,972.

Through General Community Programming the agency will utilize neighborhood centers to implement job placement as only one Texas Employment Commission office is located in the agency's six-county area of service—Calahan, Brown, Concho, McCulloch, Coleman and Runnels counties. Efforts will also be made to entice industry to the area, 140 persons will be trained as nurse aids, 150 youths will receive leadership training and be involved in community improvement projects and elderly persons will be involved in projects designed for their special interests. Approximately 400 persons will be trained in the proper use of food commodities, 700 involved in gardening and canning projects and 100 will receive food on an emergency basis.

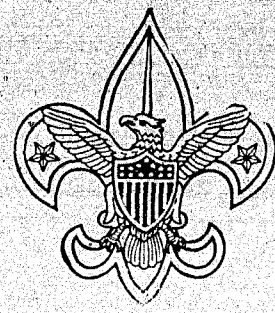

**1040 U.S. Individual Income Taxpayers**  
for the year ending 1-December 31, 1966, or other taxable year.  
Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) Last year I purchased a \$5,000 certificate of deposit having a redemption value of maturity in three years of \$5,960. Can I wait until this certificate matures before paying tax on the interest?

A) No. Starting Jan. 1, 1971, deferred interest became taxable annually on a monthly pro rata basis if the maturity of the deposit or account is more than one year. For example, if you purchased the certificate of deposit on July 1, 1971, you must include in income \$160 of the total deferred interest of \$960 on your 1971 return.

Q) Are tips taxable?  
A) Yes. All tips you receive are subject to Federal income tax. In addition, cash tips amounting to \$20 or more that you receive in a month while working for any one employer must be reported to that employer so that income tax and social security tax may be withheld.

Q) My grandfather died last year and left me 200 shares of stock he purchased at \$10 per share. The stock was worth \$20 per share when he died. Do I have to pay tax on this inheritance or the amount the stock appreciated?

A) No. Bequests or inheritances you receive are not taxable. The amount the stock appreciated up to your grandfather's death is also not taxable as income. However, you are taxed on any further appreciation in the stock from that point when you eventually dispose of the stock.

Q) Are the costs of work clothes and uniforms deductible as employee business expenses?

A) Generally you may not deduct the cost and maintenance of work clothing. However, if your occupation requires special apparel or equipment as a condition of employment, its cost and maintenance are deductible if it is not adaptable to general or continued usage in place of ordinary clothing. Examples are special apparel and equipment required of firemen, police officers, letter carriers and nurses.

Q) Who is eligible to file as a "Head of Household?"

A) To qualify as a head of household and thus be eligible to compute your tax at the special rate, you must meet the following conditions:

- 1) You must be unmarried (or legally separated under a decree of divorce or separate maintenance) on the last day of your taxable year;
- 2) You must have furnished over half the cost of maintaining a household for the entire year for at least one relative who must live with you (except for your parents), or be your dependent, or both;
- 3) Your father or mother has

to be your dependent, but need not live with you. Your unmarried child, grandchild, stepchild, or foster child must live with you but need not be your dependent. Any other relatives must both live with you and be your dependent.

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**

Sue The Weatherman

"Fair and warmer," says the weather man's morning forecast, and you dress accordingly. But during the day a cloud-burst hits town, drenching — and ruining — your clothes. You might feel a distinct urge to sue the weatherman for damages. Or, to be more technical, to sue his employer, the United States Government.

Could you win such a lawsuit? A quick answer would be no, because a weather forecast is only an educated guess, not a guarantee. But what if the weatherman was not only wrong but also guilty of negligence in making his prediction.

That complicates matters. Consider this case:

A hurricane was bearing down on a coastal city, and the weather bureau issued a series of warnings. But the winds and flood waters arrived several hours ahead of the predicted time. A woman, caught on low land, was drowned.

Later, her husband demanded damages from the government.

"I realize," he told the court "that weather predicting is not an exact science. But this was worse than just a mistake. It was outright negligence. They had discovered that the storm was coming in ahead of schedule, but they failed to pass the word along to the public."

Nevertheless, the court turned down his claim. The judge said the government cannot be held liable for broad, generalized activities like forecasting the weather because this would place too heavy a burden upon basic governmental functions.

But that may not apply to weather forecasting in a limited, specific situation. Thus:

The weather bureau at an airport, although aware of air turbulence near the ground, failed to warn the pilot of a private plane that was just taking off. The plane crashed, the pilot was killed, and the government was sued for damages.

This time, the government was indeed held liable. The court decided that in a particular, localized situation like this, the government ought to pay the penalty for its negligence — just like any other wrongdoer.

## A New Wrinkle For Smokers

Trying to stay young—or at least look that way—is an obsession in this mod age. But locking young may be even tougher for men and women who smoke.

Facial wrinkles like crows-feet may be caused more by cigarette smoking than by exposure to sun and wind—according to Dr. H. W. Daniell of Redding, Calif. In a recent article in the Annals of Internal Medicine, he describes his study of 1104 subjects between the ages of 30 and 70. Each subject was asked to fill out a questionnaire about his or her smoking habits, sun exposure, weight changes, and medical history.

Without seeing the questionnaires, the doctor first assigned each subject a wrinkle score from one to six. Close-up photographs were taken. And three other sets of observers also scored the pictures.

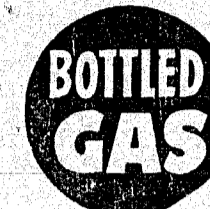
After all correlations were made, prominent wrinkling and heavy smoking were related for all age groups. Dr. Daniell suggests that smoking may cause wrinkling because nicotine causes the small vessels to contract. Over a period of time, he says, this might cause deterioration in skin tissue.

The most striking, however, was the correlation between heavy wrinkling and heart disease. Among male smokers over 50, those with the highest wrinkle scores had a past history of heart attacks almost twice as great as those of men with the same smoking habits but less wrinkling. And of the 15 smoking men who had the highest wrinkle scores, seven developed major cigarette-related illness, including lung cancer and heart attacks, during the year after the study was completed. Deep facial wrinkles, says Dr. Daniell can be a significant warning sign.

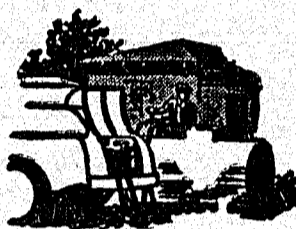
