## MOD Walkathon Set Saturday From Coleman to Santa Anna

A March of Dimes Walkathon is planned for Saturday April 29, with over 160 marchers already enlisted for the 20 mile hike.

Sponsored by the Teenage Action Program of the Coleman County March of Dimes, the walkathon will be co-sponsored by the Coleman and Santa Anna chapters of Epsilon Sigma Alpha.

The walk will begin at the Coleman Courthouse and be to Santa Anna, then back to

Coleman. Prizes and supplies for the walkers are being collected, and those to participate are securing sponsors and other donations for the MOD.

Although students will make up the major part of the walkers, anyone who is willing to walk the 20.9 miles is eligible.

The walker collecting the most money, the one having the most sponsors, the first to finish and the youngest walker to finish the walk will all be presented gifts from Coleman merchants.

## Kindergarten, Headstart Kids To Pre-register

The Santa Anna Kindergarten - Head Start will have pre-registration on Tuesday, May 9, 1972 from 3:15 until 4:00 p. m. in the kindergarten room. All children in the Santa Anna School District who will be five years old on or before September 1, 1972 are eligible and urged to attend.

Mrs. Edna Wells, the school nurse, will be on hand to explain the school health program to the mothers. She requests that the mothers bring with them a record of her child's immunizations, date given, and signature of the doctor giving them if such a record is available. Mothers are also reminded to bring a copy of the child's birth certificate. The health record and birth certificate are not required for pre-registration, but are requirements for registration in August.

Any person unable to register on May 9 is requested to come by the school between 3:15 and 4:00 any day that week to complete registration forms.

Four Santa Anna Future Homemakers of America joined over 6000 other FHA's from throughout Texas at the annual state convention held in Fort Worth last weekend. The three-day meeting was held at the Tarrant County Convention Center.

Leann Bryan and Sandra Hosh, SAHS juniors and officers in the local FHA organization, were among the 400 girls who were awarded State FHA degrees of achievement. Miss Glenda Reed of Pleasanton, second vice-president of the state organization, presented the degree awards.

Bobbie Strickland and Cynthia Rolfe were voting delegates and alternate for the meeting which included the election of state officers for the coming year. Don Ray Williams of Pepperdine University, Los Angeles, Calif., was the keynote speaker.

## Rain Thursday Adds Moisture To Dry Country

A total of 1.45 inches of moisture was recorded in the official rain gauge in the last edge of town last Thursday night and early Friday morning. Other measurements in Santa Anna were as high as two inches.

The rain last week was the first reported at the local gauge since February 11, when 2.1 inch was recorded. The total for the year is now 2.60 inches.

In the rural areas the rainfall varied from one-half inch at Rockwood and Triokham to three inches in Cleveland community. Also over two inches was reported in the Buffalo area.

## REA Awards \$1,738,000 Loan To Local Telephone Cooperative

The Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, Inc. received notification last week that the Rural Electrification Administration has awarded a \$1,738,000 loan for the upgrading of the system. The first notification came in a

telegram from Senator John Tower on Thursday.

The loan approval comes after many years of planning and is about three years since the first application. Funds from the loan will be used for improving and expanding the

telephone facilities to include one-party service for all customers, underground lines in most areas, and additions and improvements to several rural exchanges. Future growth will also be planned during the extensive project.

A new exchange will be built at Lake Coleman, the site of the largest expected growth in the system. Exchanges at Burkett, Mozelle and Rockwood will be replaced.

Preliminary work has already started for the project and actual work with staking and easements will start soon. REA engineers and the Cooperative's consulting engineer will meet with local representatives in Abilene May 8 to make further plans.

There are presently 1,365 subscribers in the system and there are expected to be over 1,500 within three years.

According to CTC manager Thomas Wristen, Telephone Cooperative officials hope to have the project completed within about two years.

Special recognition will be given to the 1971 bi-district champion football team and the coaches, J. A. Smelley and Larry Steele. All other athletic teams and coaches will be recognized.

*In Our Opinion*

WHAT SOME PEOPLE WON'T DO to get into office just doesn't exist, it seems. A little-known candidate for governor has filed suit in the Texas Supreme Court last week to keep the names of the other six off the Democratic ballot, claiming a minor technicality. If he were to win the suit, he would be the only one on the Democratic ballot.

Robert Looney of Austin, whose chances of winning the nomination are practically nil, filed the suit. He also claimed that 18 other Democratic office seekers should be disqualified.

His reasoning is that he claims the other candidates did not take the loyalty oath or sign the loyalty affidavit before a qualified notary public. Most candidates took their oath and signed their loyalty affidavit before Jo Ann Pool at the state Democratic headquarters, but, Looney claims, she posted her notary bond and took her oath of office before she was appointed by the Secretary of State last December 29, which is illegal.

He also claimed that the word "Mrs." before Frances Farenthold's name was a method of campaigning for the votes of those who would be swayed by the knowledge that they can vote for a woman, and a married woman at that.

If the Supreme Court should rule in Looney's favor, it would disqualify every other candidate on the Democratic ballot, leaving him as the sole survivor.

The pathetic thing about the whole thing is that courts have ruled on minor technicalities in such cases in favor of the plaintiff and the decisions have been just as crazy as this one would be if they should rule in his favor. Even if they did, his chances of becoming governor are still so slim that he is really wasting his time.

I wonder if they should remove the word "Mrs." in front of Frances Farenthold's name, the people wouldn't still know that she was a woman?

We are assuming that surely the court will not rule in his favor. If they do, he might be saying, "I can't believe I ate the whole thing!"

THE NORTH VIETNAMESE have suddenly decided that they want to return to the negotiating table, following the resumption of bombing in the north. Those who say that the bombing can do no good should learn something from this. Although it is the consensus of opinion that the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong did not want peace in the first place, and we suspect that they still don't. They want to use the peace table as a propaganda tool in their efforts to turn people in the United States against their government. The surprising thing about their efforts is their success. Some supposedly intelligent men in high places have fallen for the communist line and would give up the battle as of this minute.

Personally this writer is tired of the hypocrisy of those in this country who would bow to the reds and give them anything they want just to get out of Vietnam — or into office. We suspect that their motives are far less than the best interests of the country.

Appearances on television of some of the "notable" Democrats running for the presidency is enough to make one chuck up his lunch. They remind us of some TV commercials. They seem to consider the viewing audience as a bunch of morons, unable to think for them selves.

Don't believe that the bombing won't stop the north. If it is done effectively, and it can be if the military is left alone, we can destroy their supplies and the ports from which their supplies are received from Russia and other countries, until they have little or nothing left to fight with.

We just regret that it was ever stopped in the first place.

**June Deadline For Transfers To School Dist.**

Parents who wish to transfer children from their home school to a nearby district for the 1972-73 academic year must submit their requests to the receiving school district by June 1, 1972, according to an announcement from the Texas Education Agency.

Once approved by the receiving school board of trustees, the request must then be cleared by the Texas Education Agency. This state approval is a requirement of the order issued by the U. S. District Court at Tyler.

The order, related to the desegregation of schools in Texas, states in part that the Texas Education Agency shall not permit, make arrangements for or give support of any kind to student transfers, between school districts, when the cumulative effect in either the sending or receiving school or school districts will be to reduce or impeded desegregation, or to reinforce, renew, or encourage the continuation of acts and practices resulting in discriminatory treatment of students on the grounds of race, color, or national origin.

Only hardship cases will be considered for transfer approval after June 1, according to Leon R. Graham, Texas Education Agency assistant commissioner for administration. Any late application must state specifically the exact nature of the hardship and why the application was

Again producers are reminded the final date to certify wheat and barley is May 1. Failure to certify this acreage will result in no payment for wheat and perhaps milo and loss of wheat history.

The final date to make this certification is Monday, May

1. Aerial spraying of mesquite will get under way about the first of May.

Producers who have made application for aerial spraying by using Tordon will not be approved until it is first approved by Dow Chemical Company and the applicator.

Farmers and ranchers who indicated on their application that they would use either Tordon or 2-4-5T will not be approved for 2-4-5T until Dow has turned down their application for Tordon.

Farmers and ranchers who carry out the practice of spraying mesquite are responsible for any damage done to other crops, trees or shrubs on other producer's property.

Farmers who have an application for sprigging or planting coastal bermuda grass are again reminded that these sprigs must be planted in moist soil. We are required to spot check a number of these farms. Upon finding a failure to get a stand, it is possible the application will be cancelled and no cost-share paid.

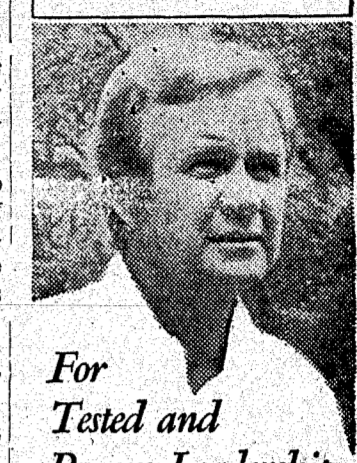
Any producer who has an application and does not expect to carry out the practice is requested to come by the office and cancel the practice. The County Committee can use this money to approve practices farmers and ranch-

ers carry out in the county.

The County Committee mailed a report to all producers who received feed under the drought program last summer. This report should be completed and signed and returned to this office immediately. This is a very important report.

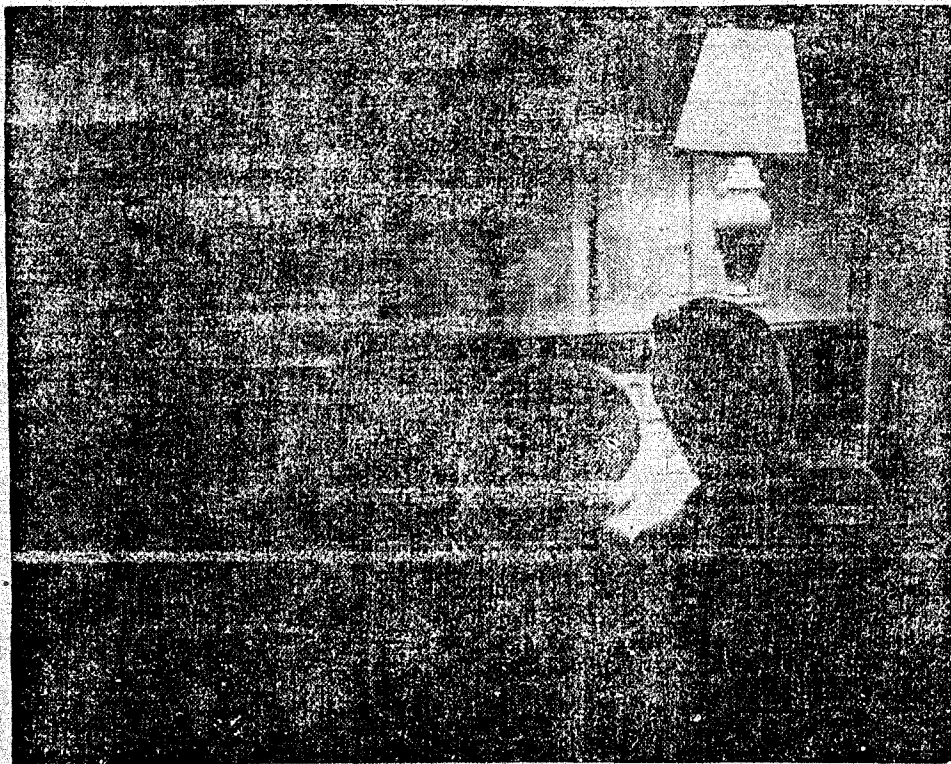

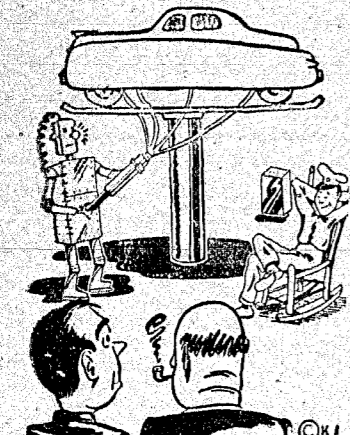

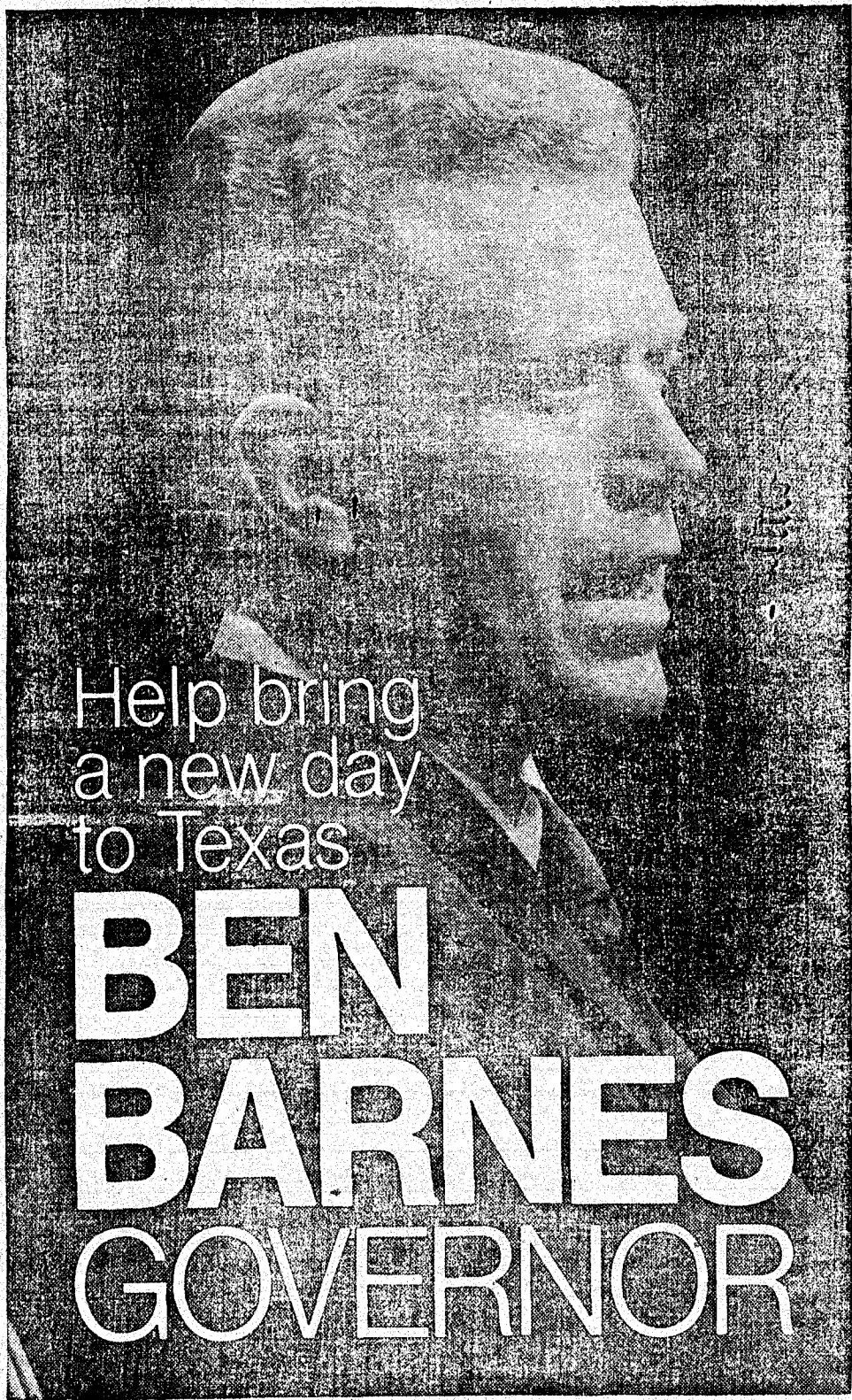

(A tribute to Lena A. Boyd by a sister)

Lena Agnes Boyd was born March 23, 1883 to Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Boyd in Santa Anna, Texas, one of nine daughters.

After high school she received special training and was a graduate of Trinity University and New York Biblical Seminary in preparation for foreign mission service.

When Lena received an assignment for mission work in India in 1912 she said to some friends, "I think the members of my family are as happy as I am."

We shared her willingly through 40 years of service; the first furlough was in 1920. There were four more.

During the years, she unofficially adopted a number of orphans whom she placed in boarding schools while she carried on her regular duties on the mission field.

After one year of retirement in America in 1948, she returned to India to care for untainted children of leper parents while the supervisors were on furlough in America.

After this charge she found so much need that she remained for extra service, giving 11 full years after retirement.

We felt we were being cheated this time, and shared less willingly since we had looked forward to full retirement.

A new chapter began October 1960 when Lena was again a local citizen of her hometown.

She was a member of the United Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. She purchased a home near the local church with relatives among close neighbors.

Here she lived peacefully, comfortably, and we think contentedly for six years and four months. Of her neighbors she said, "I love them all."

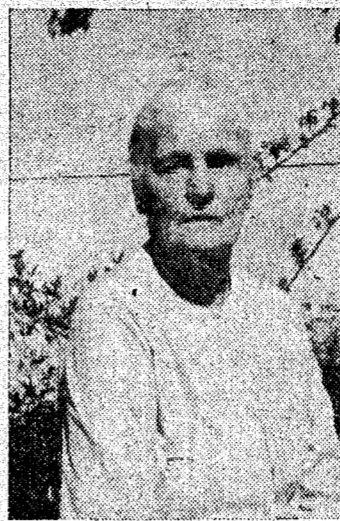
The highlight of this closing chapter is that God graciously granted the exact number of years at home that she gave to India after retirement.

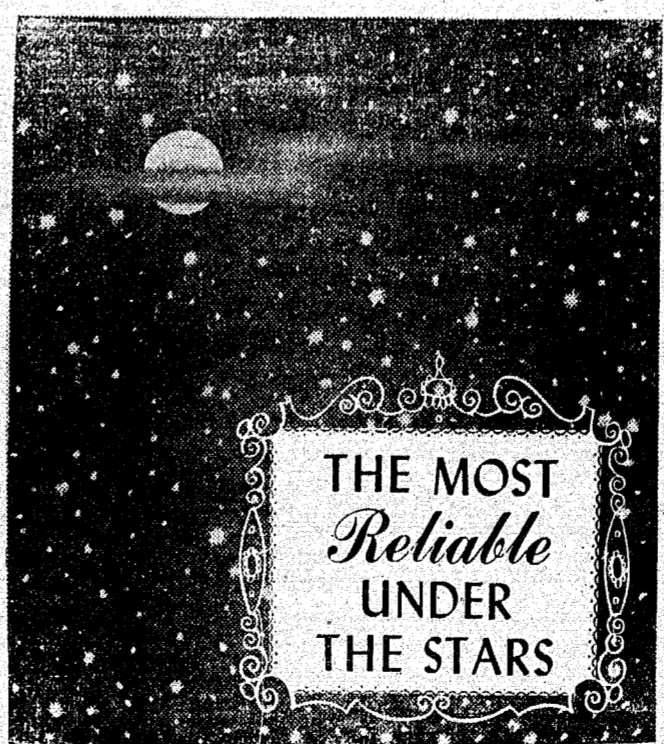
