## City Council Adopts 2 Resolutions

On Thursday, October 9, 1986 the Santa Anna City Council met with all members present. The minutes of last month's meeting were read and approved.

Mayor Guerrero introduced two resolutions. The first resolution was for Evidence of Financial Responsibility. The second resolution is for Establishing a Procurement Policy for Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA). Councilman Stanley Hartman made a motion that the City adopt both of these resolutions with Councilman Jim Spillman seconding. The motion unanimously carried.

Bill Gilbreath was next on the agenda. He was unable to attend and Mayor Guerrero spoke on his behalf.

Gilbreath wanted permission to hold a Santa Anna Bass Tournament at the lakes the weekend of October 11 and 12. Councilman Joe Taylor made a motion that the City let Gilbreath hold the tournament with Councilman Susie Voss seconding. Motion unanimously carried.

The water storage tank's support beam was next brought into discussion. The City had received a letter from Mr. Ken Martin with a bid of

\$2,250.00 for the replacement of the center pole. Councilman Jim Spillman made a motion that the City table this matter until the man from Bulldog can come down and talk with the council. Councilman Taylor seconded and motion unanimously carried. Vikki Wristen and Rusty Wells were to get with this Company on Friday, October 10 and set up an appointment.

Old business was then brought up. Councilman Spillman asked if the State had gotten back with the City

on the gas line, if there was anything the City could do about cleaning up the City for Homecoming, and about

Clark Street between Jefferson and Lee Street. Mayor Guerrero asked about the School Zone street signs.

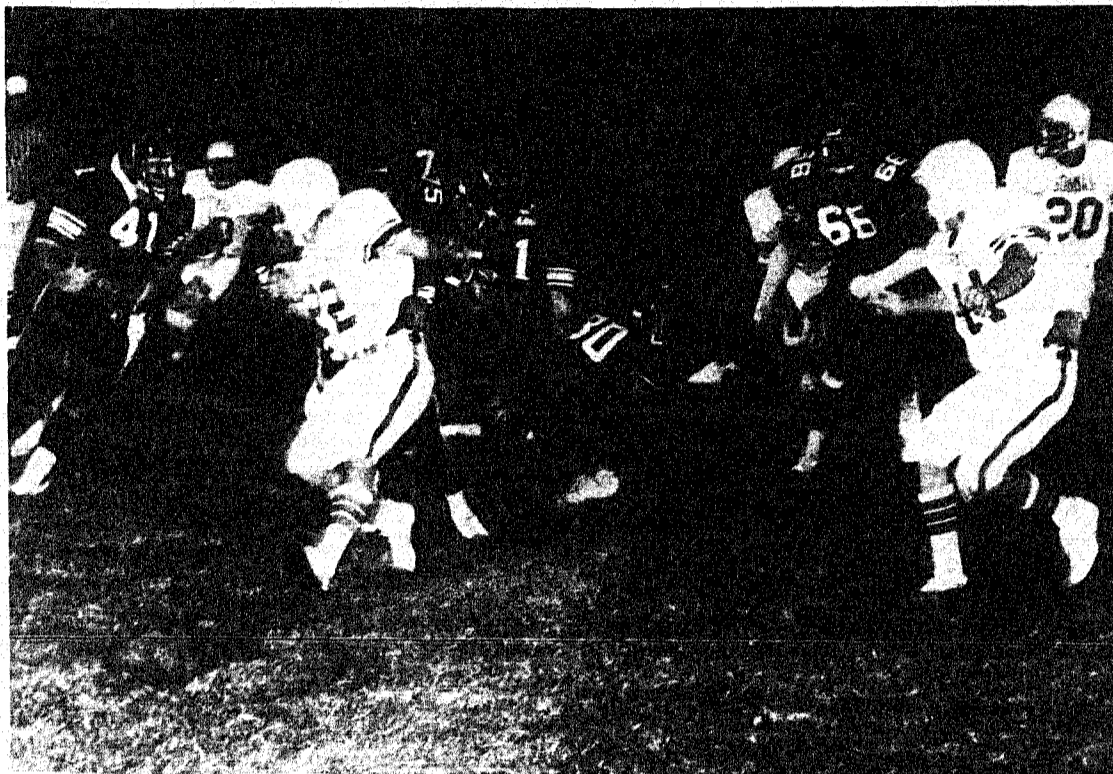
Mrs. Glenda Cook was then introduced to the Council. Mrs. Cook turned in her resignation on the Park Board due to the fact that she felt that she did not have the time needed to help. Mrs. Cook suggested that the City should appoint Thelma Brooker to fill her position on the Park Board. Councilman Hartman made a motion that the City accept Mrs. Cook's resignation and appoint Mrs. Brooker to take her place on

the Park Board. Councilman Taylor seconded and the motion unanimously carried.

Mayor Guerrero brought into discussion that the Fire Department would like to use the Old City Jail for the purpose of building a fire in it to teach people how to fight a fire. Councilman Hartman made a motion that the City let the Fire Department use the building. Motion died for lack of a second. Councilman Taylor made a motion that the City let the Fire Department use the City Jail after the City receives a written agreement saying what they want to use it for. Councilman Spillman seconded and motion carried with one abstaining, J. T. Avants.

Council then went into executive session. When the council returned to open session it was stated that the City would give Officer Craig Terry a Uniform Allowance of \$30 per month, retroactive to date of hire.

Accounts payable was then brought into discussion. Councilman Spillman made a motion that the City pay accounts payable. Councilman Avants seconded and motion unanimously carried.

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## Coleman County Farm Bureau To Offer

### Ag In Classroom Program

Nine counties across the state have been selected to participate in Texas Farm Bureau's Agriculture in the Classroom pilot program during the 1986-87 school year.

The purpose of the pilot program is to determine if TFB can increase the knowledge of Texas school children on the importance of agriculture and if the program warrants expansion to other counties and schools in the future. This phase of the program concentrates on the fourth grade level.

CCFB President John Vance appointed Cliff Horn, Jack Knox and Tommie Connelly to the committee to select the schools and to monitor the program, analyze its effectiveness and suggest changes to improve the program.

Two schools were chosen to start the program here in Coleman County. At Southward, Paulette Connelly and Doug Burroughs 4th grade classes will study the course and at Panther Creek Debbie Vance will be

teaching the course to her 4th graders.

The Coleman County Farm Bureau Board of Directors feel this is a good way to get the story of agriculture into the lives of fourth graders. Cliff Horn, Chairman of the local committee, states the program consists of a resource guide, developed by TFB staff and written by two Waco school teachers, Hazel Rowe and Diane Sydow, and a video.

The guide is designed to integrate knowledge about agriculture into the existing curriculum through the use of information which has been broken down into daily activities. Each day's activities are already laid out in a lesson plan that includes objectives, essential elements and teaching procedures.

Horn states that the aim of the program is to educate children about the various facets of food and fiber production and agriculture's contributions to the lifestyle of people throughout the world.

## County Baptist Association 81st Annual Meeting

The Coleman County Baptist Association will meet October 21 for its 81st Annual Session. The Annual Meeting will be at the Harmony Baptist Church.

The evening session will include a presentation of the New Expanded Church Annuity Plan by John Shanks. The evening session will be concluded with the Annual Sermon to be brought by Rev. Lee Bevely, pastor of Valera Baptist Church. The moderator, Roger Hammonds, of First Baptist Church, Coleman, will preside at all sessions. The public is invited to attend.

Memorial building and gathered information from local sources and historical information.

## Santa Anna Receives \$1,136.09 Check

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$55.4 million in local sales tax to 1,033 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1986 payments to date were down .6 percent as compared to the payments to date in October last year. The decrease in the checks is a continuing reflectin of the downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

Santa Anna's check was for \$1,136.09, bringing total payments in

1986 to \$21,105.49, down 7.75 percent from last year.

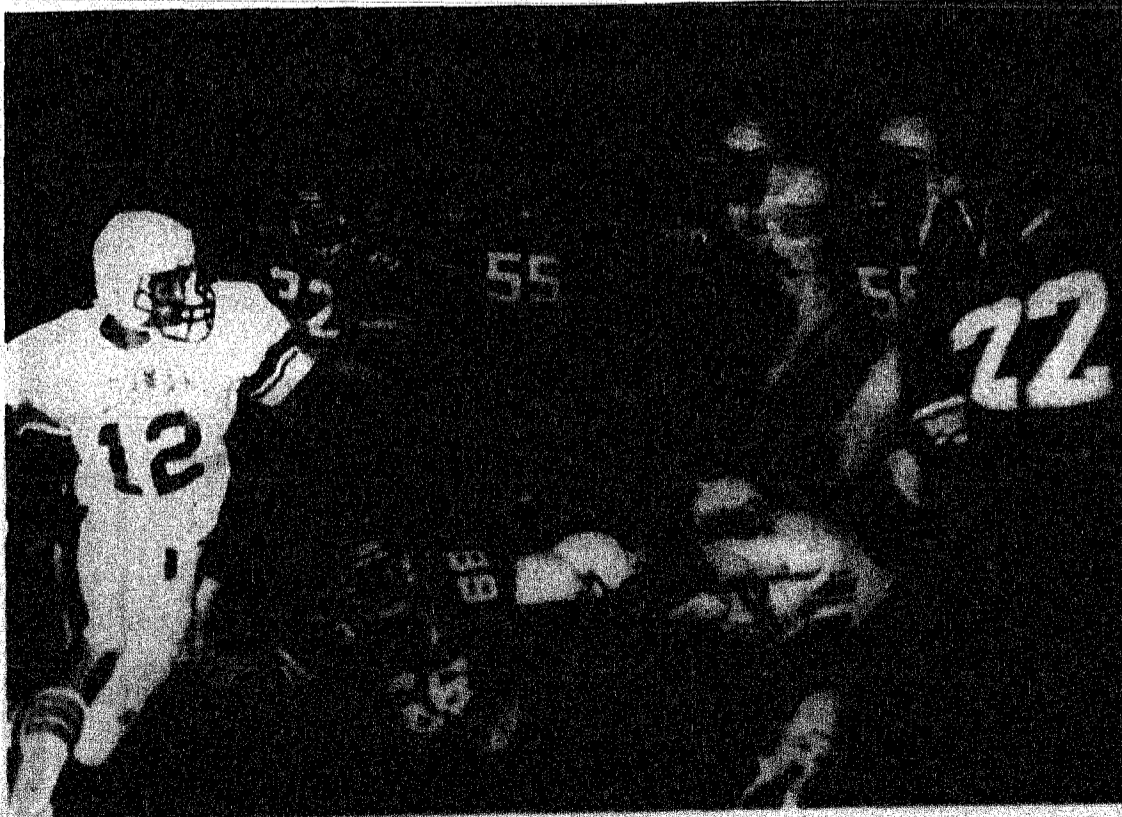
Houston's check was the largest—\$8.4 million—bringing total payments in 1986 to \$116.7 million, down 5 percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$6.6 million for a 1986 total of \$86.5 million, a 5 percent decrease from 1985.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.4 million pushed payments for 1986 to \$46.1 million, up 1 percent. Austin's check for \$2.6 million brought total

payments this year to \$34.3 million, a 4 percent decrease from 1985.

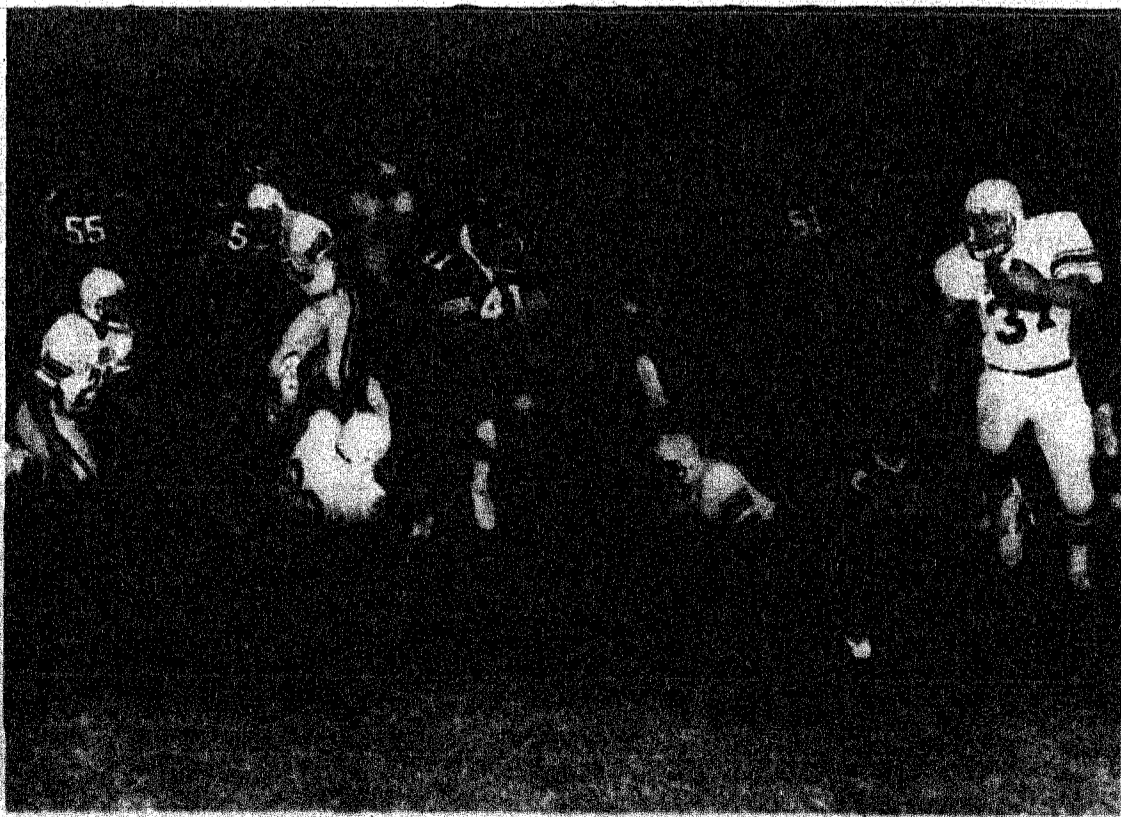
Fort Worth received \$2 million for a total of \$28.3 million in 1986, up 3 percent. El Paso's payment of \$1.7 million brought its total to \$18.5 million, a 9 percent increase from 1985.

October checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by September 20.

He has a perfect score on all of his training so far. He recently took his first "Gate" Test and passed it with the highest score.

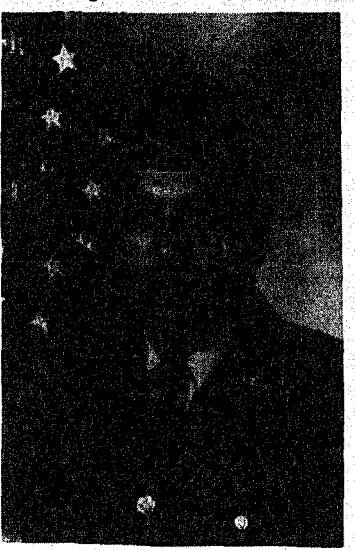
He is training to be a U.S. Army Armor Crewman, commonly called "Tankers."

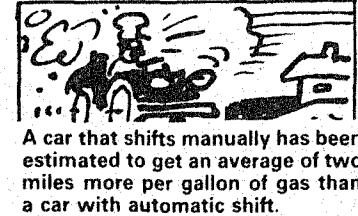

### School Zones

Yellow pentagon (5-sided) signs are used to identify school zones. Two different signs are normally used near schools. The advance warning school sign will show two children with books in their hand. The school crosswalk (on-site) sign looks very much like the advance signs except for the addition of two horizontal black lines indicating a crosswalk. **THIS SIGN IS ALWAYS POSTED AT A POINT WHERE CHILDREN CROSS. ALL DRIVERS MUST come to a COMPLETE stop when this crosswalk is being used.** Children and pedestrians always have the right of way except at signalized intersections where the signals assign the right of way.

### School's Open-Drive Carefully

Slow down. Schools are open! Overtaking and passing a stopped school bus with flashing red lights is a violation of the law. You may not pass a school bus from either direction while the bus has stopped to receive or discharge any school children. The minimum fine for passing a stopped school bus is \$50.

The driver of a vehicle on a highway with separate roadways (that is, one which provides an insulating area, such as a median, between opposing streams of traffic) need not stop if a school bus is on another roadway. On a controlled access highway, you may pass if the bus is in a loading zone which is part of or next to the highway, provided pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

**Safety Belt Use High In Texas**

Three independent studies conducted by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) confirmed that Texans are using their safety belts in larger numbers. Dallas and Houston drivers had the highest safety belt usage rates in 19 cities across the nation. Dallas was number 1, with a 70.9 percent usage, and Houston was second with 70.1 percent, according to NHTSA.

The latest Texas safety belt use survey by TTI shows the following: Amarillo--65.2 percent; Ft. Worth--63.3 percent; Beaumont--60.0 percent; Houston--68.6 percent; Dallas--70.9 percent; Lubbock--63.3 percent; El Paso--63.8 percent; and Tyler--67.0 percent.

**Head Injuries Down**

The Director of the trauma unit at Cook County Hospital in Chicago, Illinois reported on a recent study on the effect of safety belts in frontal and rollover crashes. With safety belts worn, the RISK OF FATALITY due to neck injury was virtually eliminated. Head injury was reduced by 82 percent, and chest injury was reduced by 53 percent. Despite the lifesaving effects of wearing safety belts, the percentage of Americans who actually buckle up is FAR TOO LOW and continued encouragement is needed to protect our loved ones.
