Government Jobs Soon Available

Coleman, Texas, Nov. 8—Chas. L. South, Congressman-elect received a letter from the Bureau of Census November 8th, giving the following information:

"The enumerators will be employed for 15 or 20 days and will be paid on a piece-price basis, an energetic enumerator earning \$4 or \$5 per day. These salaries are subject to the five percent reduction provided by law for all Government salaries.

The enumerators will be selected by the supervisor of the district, assigned by the Bureau's representative from the Washington office. All applications for enumerators should be submitted to the supervisor immediately upon his appointment. The enumerators should be residents of the small areas which they are to canvass within the counties and will be required to pass a Census test to determine their fitness for the work.

As this is a census of farms, the farmers, farmers' wives, and farmers' sons and daughters will be selected wherever practicable. Preference will be given, wherever practicable, to properly qualified veterans. Persons having husbands or wives in the United States Government service are not eligible for any of these appointments.

There will be employed in the district one supervisor and one assistant supervisor with headquarters at Brownwood, and approximately 76 enumerators.


F. F. A. CHAPTER MEETS


