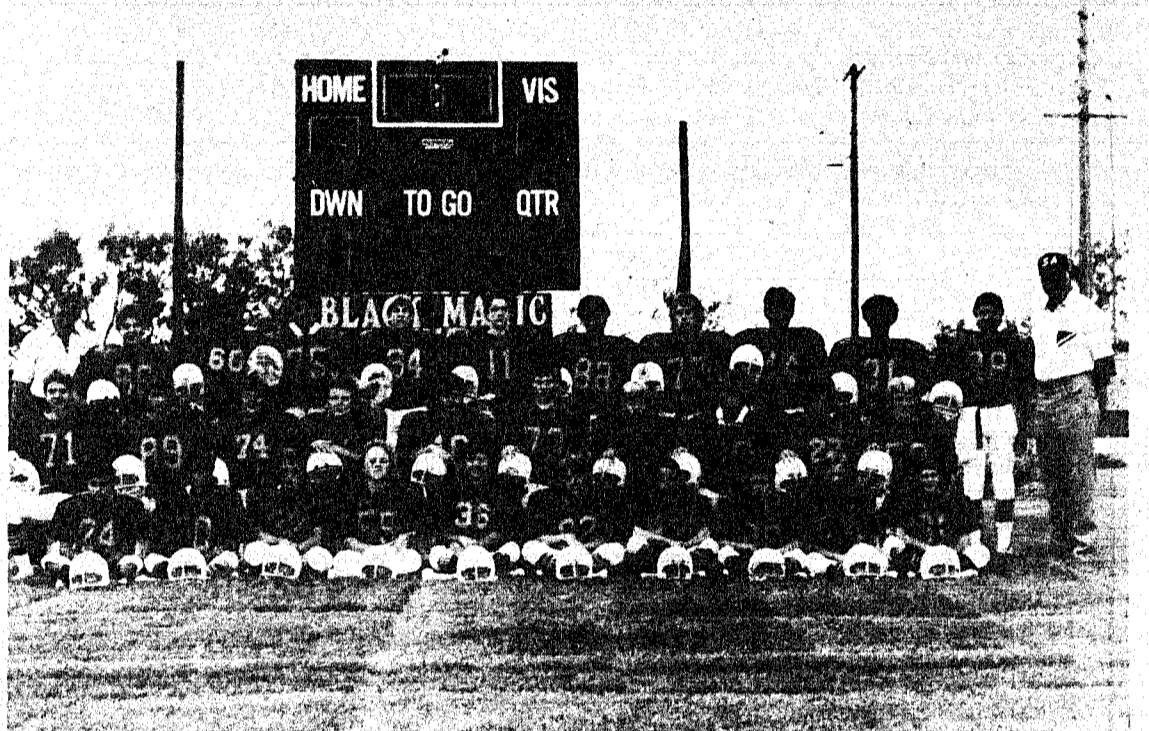
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Approval was given to purchase a new 19 passenger school bus to be delivered in the spring.

Choices and Consequences

Life is a series of choices and mankind is free to make choices time and time again. Even though man is "free" to make choices, he is ALWAYS bound by the consequences of the choices that he makes.

The greatest preacher that ever lived preached the greatest sermon ever preached and we have entitled it the Sermon on The Mount. Matt. 5-7. Jesus ended His sermon with a powerful illustration that called the listeners to action...to make a choice. (Good sermons today also call listeners to action.)

The illustration was that of two different men building two different houses, on different foundations. One built upon a solid rock foundation and the other on loose sand. The Lord said one made a wise choice, the other a very foolish choice. It is easy to see which is the right choice.

God has given to you and me the gift of choice. First, we can choose the kind of person we want to become. Jesus frequently said, "You have heard it said" such and such, "but I say to you...choose" so and so. You can choose to fight back, or to turn the other cheek. You can choose to hate your enemy or to pray for him. Either choice has its consequences and is instrumental in your

becoming what you choose.

Secondly, you can choose how other people respond to you. Seriously, do you want to receive love? then love. Do you want to have friends, then show yourself friendly. Prov. 18-24. Whatever response you would like to receive, then do that for others first. Matt. 7-12.

In the Third place, all choices have consequences, and they are reliably related to the choices. You may choose to build on the sand, but the disastrous consequence is promised. You may build on the solid Rock foundation, and the consequences are eternal. You can only select the consequences by the choices you make. You can not plant cotton and harvest wheat.

It is obvious that the solid Rock foundation is Christ Himself and there is no other foundation worth considering. What may no be as obvious is HOW we build on the right foundation. Jesus made that simple also, "He who obeys the Word of God is building on the solid Rock. He who hears the Word of God but does not obey, is foolishly building on loose sand." Choose now to obey the Word of God and the consequence is that you are among the wise. Continue the same choice and you will continue in wisdom. The only alternative is foolish.

James Hartman's 80-yard sprint gave Santa Anna its early 6-0 lead before Rising Star struck for 17 straight points.

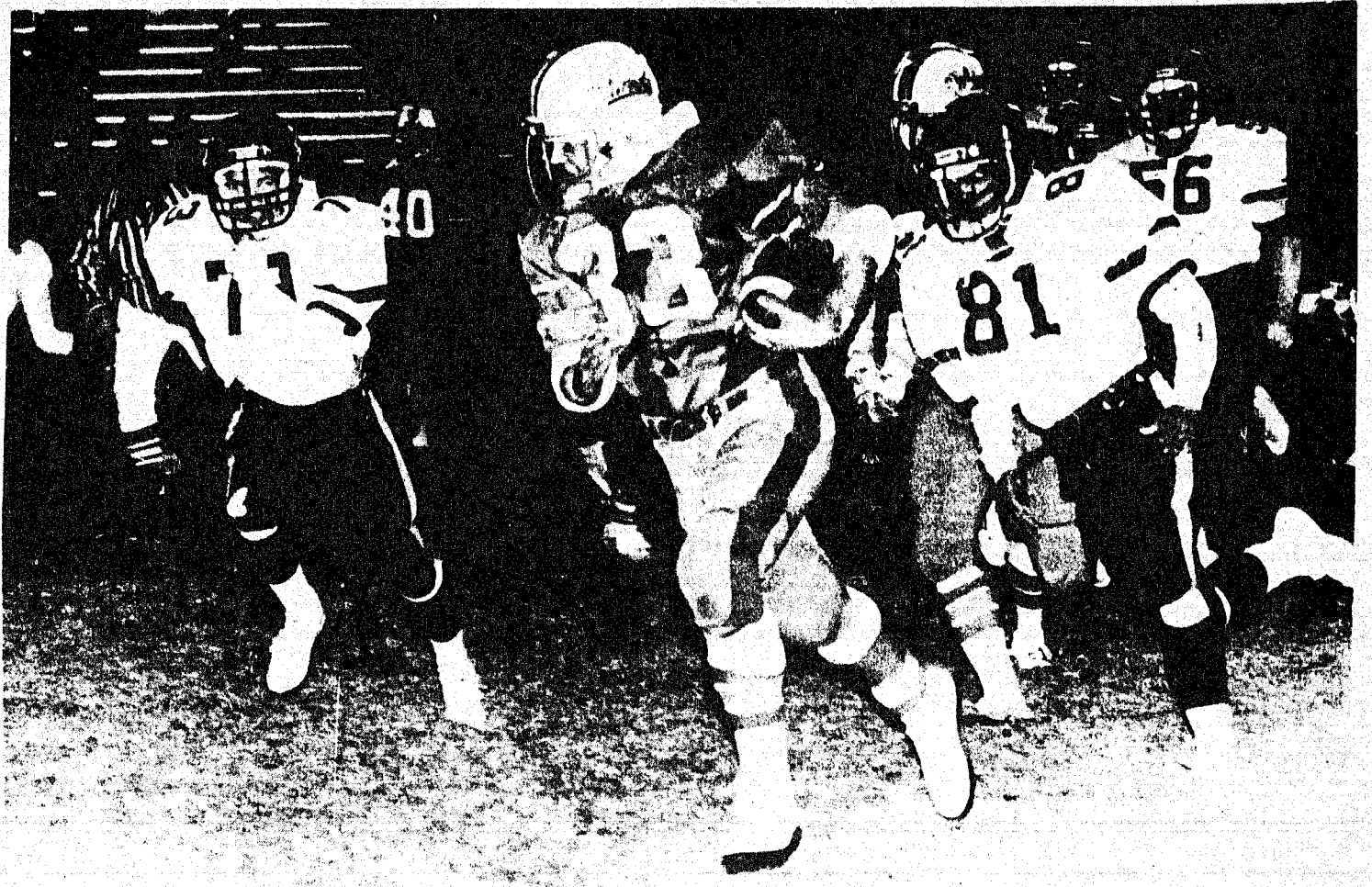

Mono-Produces Weakness, Swollen Glands

At first you might think you have the flu. The initial symptoms may include fever, headache, a sore throat, and a general feeling of illness.

But after a day or two, other symptoms appear—swollen glands of the neck, armpits, or groin, the yellowish skin color of jaundice, or a skin rash resembling German measles.

The disease is infectious mononucleosis, says the Texas Medical Association.

Its nickname, "the kissing disease," refers to a common belief that it is spread by oral contact. How this viral infection spreads is unknown, but mononucleosis usually does not become an epidemic as flu often does.

Because the virus can spread to any organ of the body through the blood, the symptoms can vary. The most common are swollen lymph glands and high fever.

Mononucleosis is not very common; children and young adults are most susceptible to the disease. It has no cure, but eventually clears up. Although most symptoms disappear within two or three weeks, patients usually feel weak and lack energy for about two more weeks. Some feel depressed.

Mononucleosis is not a dangerous disease, but it tends to recur during the same year as the first attack. This can happen several times, but succeeding attacks usually are milder than the first. Fortunately, there are no after-effects once mononucleosis has cleared up. Unfortunately, the body does not build immunity to the disease.

Flu-like symptoms that last more than a few days, when accompanied by swollen glands, should be checked by a physician. A blood test may be used to determine if you have mononucleosis.

Rest is essential to recovery. People with mononucleosis should not return to their daily routines for about a month after the illness begins. They should drink plenty of liquids and remain indoors.

The doctor may recommend aspirin or a substitute to relieve discomfort. Because mononucleosis is a viral disease, antibiotics will not help. The disease simply must run its course.
