Police Report

Chief of Police Craig Terry would like to start his report off with some words of praise for the young people of our community, especially the school age group. The police department is very proud to say that the youth of our community have to be the best that, as Officer Terry says "I have ever had the pleasure to deal with."

Both the Homecoming and Halloween weekends were perfect examples of how youth of today should contact themselves in public. The City of Santa Anna Police Department had very little trouble from any of the young people during these times. Officer Terry would like to say "Thank you" to each and everyone of you for being a shining example to youth of other communities around.

The Police Department has had several thefts of stereo equipment, tape caddies, and tapes from several vehicles during the past month. The department issued several tickets for speeding, accidents, and other charges also. The department in-

vestigated 11 reported criminal offenses, and had some 35 calls answered. They had no arrests during the month and had four accidents with varying amounts of property damage.

The campaign to remove the junk and abandoned vehicles from the city streets has been actively pursued and all have been removed that have been found and/or reported to the department thus far.

The new patrol vehicle is continuing to give excellent service and has been in operation throughout the past month, as well as the other patrol vehicle. The Police Department is hopeful that during the next month, the police personnel for the Neighborhood Watch Program will be able to give their demonstrations and assist in starting this program. The personnel has been very busy in other communities getting them in action and were unable to make the trip to Santa Anna this past month to assist with our program.

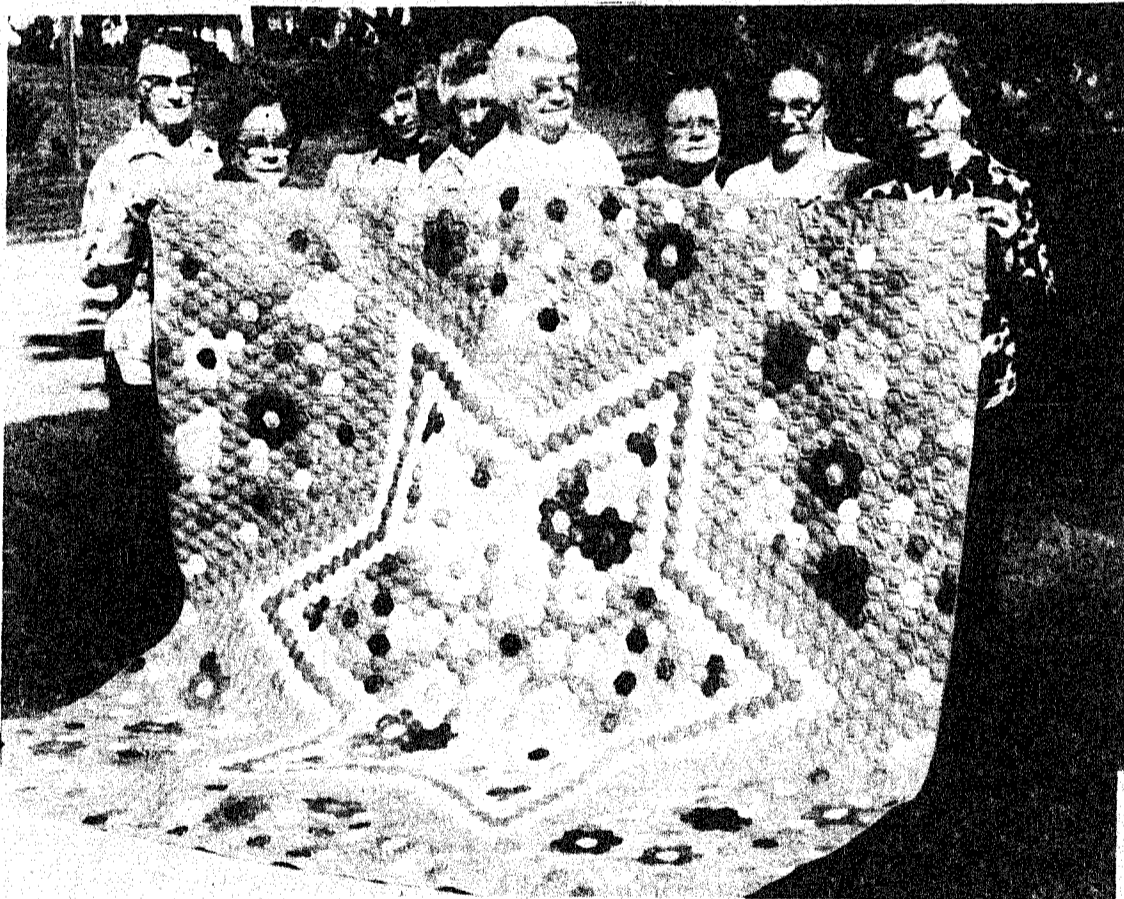
Chief of Police and the department. Both men are reserves with the department and both work at other positions in the community; this time that they give to the department is at their own bidding and Officer Terry says that he can't say

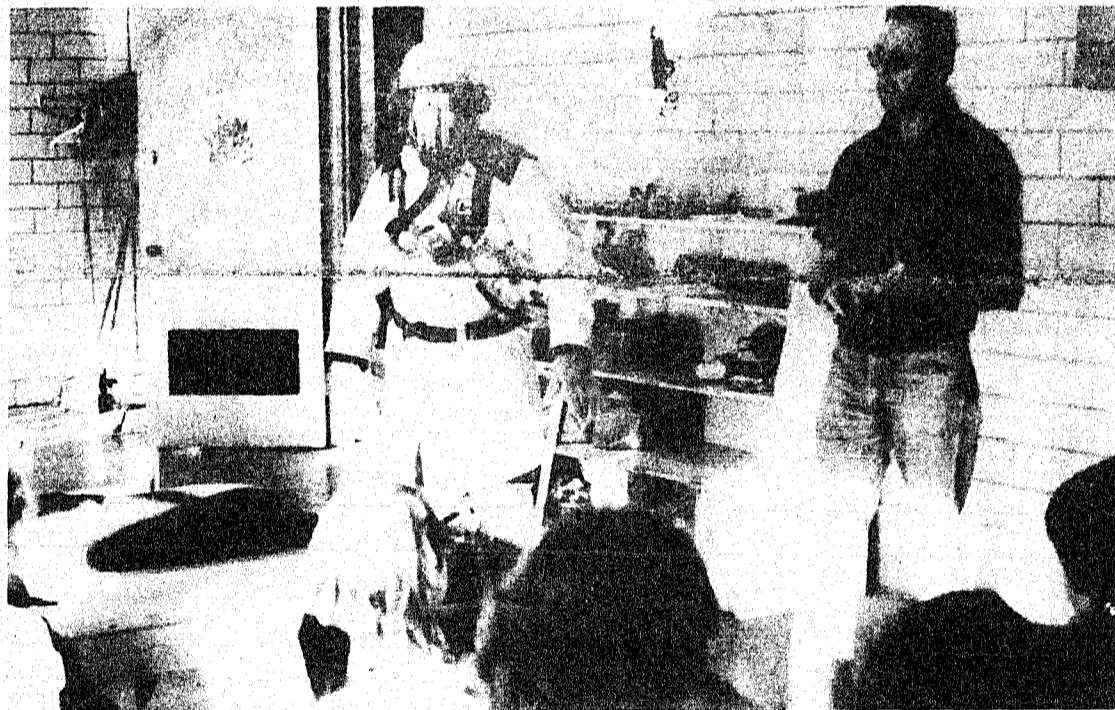

JOHN 14:3—And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also.

As I write this piece today I want to relate a story that I read some time back. I would like for us to see how much spiritual food we can get from it.

Two strangers, a small boy and an older man, were fishing from the banks of the Mississippi River. As time passed they discovered that although the fishing was rather poor, conversation was good and by the time the sun began to sink in the West they had talked of many things. At dusk a large river boat was moving slowly up in the distance. When the boy saw the boat he began to shout and wave his arms that he might attract the attention of those on board the boat. The man watched for some time and then

said, "Son, you are foolish if you think that boat is going to stop for you. It is on its way to some unknown place and it surely won't stop for a small boy."

But suddenly the boat began to slow down and then it moved toward the river bank. To the man's amazement, however, the boat came near enough to the shore that a gang-plank could be lowered. The boy entered the boat and turning to the friend on shore, said, "I'm not foolish Mister. You see, my father is Captain of this boat and we are going to a new home up the river."

As we look at this we see the boy had patience to wait. The boy had faith the father would come. The man thought as the world thinks, that we are not very important, but Jesus died for us and He promised that He would prepare a place for us. Then come and get us. Let us watch for His coming!

Living With...Commitment

As you read these words Gloria and I will be traveling towards Corpus Christi, Texas. At the Forest Park Baptist Church we will hold a two day retreat on the Three C's of the Christian faith.

Please pray for us as we try to make this weekend a meaningful time for these new Christians.

When I was contacted about this time, I was given the go ahead for any subject. As I began to think about it three words kept coming back. The words are: Called, Committed and Committed.

When a person becomes a Christian he answers the call to salvation. Jesus said it when he said, "I stand at the door and knock, if any man will answer me then will I come in and dine with him." When a person answers the call of awareness of his sins, and the call of salvation through Jesus Christ he also answers the call of separation of the world. When we answer the call we are saved from the power of sin but we are saved to the power of God. We are saved from the bondage of sin to the liberty found only in Jesus Christ. So when we answer the call we are saved from sin and to service.

As we are saved from sin through Jesus Christ we are commissioned by Jesus to do His work. In Matthew 28:19-20 we read of the Great Commission "Go into all the world and preach and teach and baptize in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and lo I am with you unto the uttermost parts of the earth." This tells us that when we are commissioned to His service, we do not go out alone. The word commissioned means to set aside or to elevate. The Christian is set aside to do the work of the Father. On a statue of Christ are these words "You are His hands and His feet." And truly we are to be His hands to reach out, His feet to go to someone.

The last big C is the word commitment. This word causes more pro-

blems than the rest. You see a Christian is to follow a different set of rules than the non-believer. We march to the beat of a different drum and march to a different drummer. No, we are not different to the point of being holier than Thou, or smug or high brow, but a Christian is different! He sees things in a different way. He views life and pain and death differently than the world.

To enjoy our Christian faith commitment is needed. There are a lot of people who are not happy Christians simply because they have not committed themselves completely to Christ. They are like the farmer who had a sack of potatoes on his shoulders. Another man who had a wagon was coming down the road. He asked his friend if he would like to ride. The man said, yes he would and got into the wagon. He sat down but kept the sack of potatoes on his shoulders. He would not commit his load to the floor of the wagon.

Jesus said "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." The Christian faith is free but it is not cheap. Bonehoffer, the disciple of Jesus who was executed by the Germans in World War II said, "The invitation of Jesus is for us to come and die for Him."

Cross bearing is not something placed on us by someone else, but is willful chosen. Bearing a cross for Jesus involves all the consequences of being a disciple. These consequences are: the demands of service; the loneliness when rejected by non-believers; the discipline of body, soul and mind; and the constant attempt to know the will of God. The phrase "Come after me" in the Greek means a continued, timeless action. Thus, the disciple is not one who has memorized all the religious tradition so he can give the expected answers. The disciple is one who daily chooses to commit himself.

Thus the Three Big C's of the Christian Faith: Called, Committed, and Committed, but above all, place one other C and that being Christ, who is our Savior, Lord and Friend. Think about it: We do not know what the future holds but we do know who holds the future and in His hands is all the power of heaven and earth.

Weatherstripping
As much cold air can enter your home through a 1/16" crack along the sides and top of a typical doorway as through a 4" x 4" hole in the wall. Help keep the cold out by replacing worn weatherstripping around all doors and windows.

Caulking
Caulking in the cracks around door facings, windows, pipes and wiring will also help prevent air infiltration into your home. Polyurethane or similar caulking is available in an easy-to-install form at most hardware stores.

You can also help draft-proof your home by installing gaskets behind the cover plates of outlets and switches around your home. (Don't forget to turn the power off before removing the switch plates.)
