cond only to service-connected disabled veterans. While you ar receiving treatment in an approve outpatient program you are eligible for needed medicine, glasses, hear ing aids or prostheses. If your POW you are also eligible for all needed dental care.
Q-Must I make a downpaymen when I buy a home using the oan guaranty program?
A-The VA seldom requires an downpayment in connection with VA-guaranteed loan. One exception
when the veteran chooses a loan with graduated payments. The othe is when the veteran pays more for a home than the amount the VA has determined to be its reasonabl larger than the reasonable value of the home. In that case the veteran must certify that the difference beteen the sale price and the cash without any borroving $Q$-What is the New G.I. Bill? A-The New G.I.  catch dust or dirt before it can enter your unit. If your filter gets clogged, your unit will have to work harder to do the heating or cooing job required,
and it will use more electricity. To avoid damage to your unit and to save energy and money, be sure your filter is clean. WTU recommends checking your filter once every 30 days. Permanent types can be cleaned according to manufacturer's instructions, while non-permanent filters should be replaced.

A clean filter, along with other conservation measures you can do at home, will help you save energy and money!

Set Thermostat at $68^{\circ}$
Set your thermostat at 68 degrees or lower. Turn it down at night and use an electric blanket, Turn 60 ro eo 90 it down even lower of lor an extended period of time. Every degree you lower your thernostat will hetp to increase your energy savings.
